The Roilway trouble going is not employers vs employees altogether this time, it is an attempt evidently of the red element endeavoring to wreck and disobey the saner, more conservative section of the workers who belong to old and established unions. The outome from present appearances, will be the net result of the average strike, a tremendous loss of production and earning disorganization of business and traffic affecting a whole continent irritation and ill feeling between employers and employees.

The strike is said to cost the United States three million dollars a day and the workers themselves are the ones who pay most of it.

#### LEACOCK'S VIEWS

With the views of Prof. Stephe Leacock, as expressed in the London Times that prohibition in Canada and the United States has been an appalling failure, a good many people of reosonably sound morals will be disposed to agree. They may not go so far as Mr. Leacock and declare it an "appalling failure" but they will declare that it has not been much

It is alled prohibition but it does not prohibit to the eextent of its severity; nor does it prevent people of means from getting and drinking

all they want.

In our own local police court the number of liquor cases of one kind and another that come up in the course of six months is quite convining evidence that thee legislation has not accomplished anything like it was expected to accomplish by its

If under prohibition there could be little or no discrimination, if liquore were prohibited abridutely from coming in, then the results from the standpoint of drinking would be more apparent. As it is, however, he who wants liquor very badly con get it either by inportation or from medical practioners who have reduced the dignity of their profession by assuming the obligation of dispensing

Mr. Leacock is a keen observer and a cautions student. His statements are not easily set aside.

### WOULD ABOLISH FLOGGING

TOKIO, April 15-Baron Saito, gov. ernor general of Corea, says he believes the independence movement in Corea is dying out, although he admits that the Coreans still are making secret efforts to free themselves from the Japanese rule. The baron has been in Tokio lately to urge the Japanses Diet to provide funds to enable him to abolish flogging of Coreans and substitute imprisonment as

The baron said that he was making efforts in Corea to put into effect the emperor's recipt that the Coreans be advanced politically with the ultimate object of establishing local autonomy. Coreans, he said, were being trained to conduct the public service in Corea. In addition the government will establish a railway enginerring school in Seoul to teach Coreans to operate their own rail-

Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months imprison ment or to both fine and imprisonment.

## Volunteers Are Rushing to Hit Railway Strike

NEW YORK, April 14-Aithough ranks of the rebellious railroad. strikers were strengthened substantially by further walk-outs here today, railroad officials, listening to a clamor of volunteer strike breakers, professed optimism last night that a break in the mob movement was

The general manager's organization of the railroads interpreted the indignation meetings of commuters and the offer of assistance to man trains with civilians as a spontaneous movement to put a prompt end to this nation-wide illegal strike. The mayor of Englewood, however, announced from the cab of an engine he had volunteered to drive that the citizen's movement was without favoritism to either side.

There were many secret and separate meetings of strikers and loyal union men last night and while railroads had arranged to have sixteen additional trains with volunteer help tomorrow, the threat of an extension of the strike was not allayed.

Some food trains have arrived, but there still was a possibility of a food shortage. Prices of some commodities have gone up and department of justice agents were investigating with a view of preventing profiteering. The movement of non-perishable

freight was virtually at a standstill. Brotherhood leaders were working with railroad officials to induce strikers to return to work, but the attitude of the strikers' representatives was uncertain. The mayor of Jersey City, who at first approved the purpose of the strike, called a meeting of twelve strikers' representatives and leaders of three of the big four railroad brotherhoods today in Jersey City. The meeting was secret, but afterward Timothy Shea, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomo tive Firemen, expressed the opinion the strike leaders would urge their men to abandon the walkout. Another meeting of these representatives was arranged for tomorrow.

The fear that more than 3,000 shopmen of the Pennsylvania would join the strikke was partly dispelled tonight when President John Hennig of the mechanics' association announced after a meeting of the local tthat the men would remain loyal.

A special agent of the department of justice reported he had been unable to secure evidence of Industrial Workers' of the World's influence behind the strike.

U. S. SOLDIERS WILL GET A BONUS

WASHINGTON, April 14-More than 3,000,000 United States ex-service men of the world war will be given bonuses of \$1 a day under the terms of a bill tentatively agreed to by the Ways and Means Committees sub-committee considering bonus legislation. To raise the necessary money, estimated at \$1,000, 000,000, a general sales tax of one-half of one per cent will be imposed upon all business men who do an annual business of

The bonuses proposed in the bill are limited to those who had a service of more than sixty days Regular army enlisted men, officers and others who had especial financial advantages during their term of service, are eliminated from the provision of the bille. While approximately 4,800,000 men were in the American service abroad or under colors when the armistice was signed, about 1,800,000 will not obtain bonus payments by the limitations imposed by the bill.

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




