ENGLAND PLANS

Pensions for Laboring Men Before They Reach the Old Age Limit.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Although the old age pension system is but a little more than two years old, the Government leaders are already at work planning even greater social reforms, prominent among which is a bill that will provide pensions for laboring men who break down before they reach the old age pension limit.

Mr. Lloyd-George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has announced that he will lay a measure of this kind before Parliament at its next session as well as one providing for the insurance against unemployment in the trades most liable to unemployment. Both measures will provide for contributions by the state.

The scheme providing for insurance of laborers who are compelled to leave work through sickness, infirmity and misfortune before they have reached the old age pension limit, has not yet been fully worked out. At the present time trade unions refuse to allow their members to accept less than the standard wage. The result is that the maximum wage is given to men in the prime of life and no wage at all to those who have passed their prime. Unless, therefore, some system of wage graduation according to age is adopted, it is likely that men who have passed their prime will in the future find it hard to keep themselves in continuous employment. Thus, the years between the withdrawal from wage-earning and the pension age of seventy presents a problem of serious difficulty. This situation would be greatly relieved by the passage of a measure providing insurance for persons who have not reached the old age pension limit and are unable to work.

Mr. Lloyd-George considers that the proportion to be contributed by the state need not be very heavy nor cast any undue strain on the resources of the nation. The scheme providing for insurance against unemployment has already been worked out, and will be presented at the next session of Parliament. The main features are: 1st. Both workmen and employers to contribute. 2nd. These contributions to be supplemented by a substantial state subvention. 3rd. The system to be one of insurance by trades. 4th. To be compulsory upon all within the specified trades, unionists and non-unionists, workmen and employers alike.

The benefits to be paid are somewhat lower, both in amount and duration, than those paid by the strong trade unions, but it affords a substantial weekly payment over a period covering more than the average period of unemployment in the insured trades. Each man would be assessed about five or six cents per week. The trades to which the scheme applies are: house building and works of construction, engineering, machine and tool making, ship and boat building, vehicles and sawyers.

Off to the Antarctic.

Christiania, Oct. 3.—According to a letter received here from Captain Roald Amundsen, on board the "Fram" at Madera, Amundsen has decided to proceed on an Antarctic expedition. He promises to send details when he arrives at Punta Arenas.

This change in plans has occasioned surprise, as it was the original intention of Amundsen to start early next year on a drifting voyage for the North Pole. The "Fram" was first to go to San Francisco, where it was to be fitted out, and it was calculated that the drift through the Polar ice would occupy not less than seven years.

The Evening Chit-Chat

What a superfluous world, at least this part of it—it may be different on the other side of the globe—has of half cocked people.

People whose judgment is always a few minutes and usually some hours behind their actions, I mean.

It seems to me that no one person would be improved by thinking and moving and acting more quickly, there are nine who would be made more desirable citizens by thinking and moving and acting more deliberately.

Most of us go off half, or at the most three-quarters cocked, the majority of the time.

A man told me recently of a stenographer whom he was about to dismiss for just that fault.

"I tell her of something I want done," he said, "and she seems to understand me perfectly. She assents to all my directions. I say, 'Are you sure you understand just what I want?' She is almost insulted by my doubts and rushes off to start the work.

"In five minutes she is back to interrupt me at whatever I have focused my mind on, with half a dozen questions that she has thought of."

"She's a nice girl in lots of ways but I want someone who doesn't go

out half cocked most of the time."

Emerson in one of his essays, speaks of "afternoon men" who upset the scheme of things by being always tardy, always lagging behind the times, always a bit too late in their decisions and actions.

Seems to me the scheme of things is upset a good deal more by "sun-raise men" who are always wasting their own and other people's energy by hasty and unconsidered action.

In one of the western states, there is a prison where the men who have committed crimes that are a result of a quick temper, such as murder or manslaughter or assault, are set to work doing some of the very finest work of watchmaking.

They deal with such microscopic and fragile parts that a hasty or ill-considered movement will destroy the work of weeks.

The theory is that the complete control and slowness of motion that this work requires acts upon them mentally and teaches them self-control and deliberation.

Seems to me it wouldn't be a bit had idea if a course in watchmaking could be introduced into the public schools.

I suppose that is a very bad idea, but surely if the habit of control and deliberation could be inculcated, even to a small degree, in our children, it would do young America more good than some of the frills and furbelows with which its educational garments are trimmed nowadays.

Household Notes.

To clean enameled ware, rub with fine ground pumice stone.

Never leave medicines, drink or food uncovered in the sick room.

To remove a fish bone from the throat, swallow a raw egg.

A drop of kerosene on the hinge of a door will stop its squeaking.

Do not let a comb soak in order to clean it. Use a stiff nail brush.

Dishes flavored with lemons are among the most palatable known.

A clam shell placed inside the kettle will prevent the formation of lime.

Oxalic acid and javelle water are excellent for removing ink stains.

Embroideries and colored garments should be ironed on the wrong side.

Covering the pan in which the fish is cooking will make the fish soft.

Clean tins with soap and whitening.

One of the very best health guards is the drinking of a great deal of water.

Old bits of soap, when gathered up and boiled, make a splendid shampoo jelly.

To revive dying plants, pour a desiccated spoonful of castor oil on the roots.

Take the pie out of the pan as soon as it is done to prevent the crust being soggy.

Marble should be washed with ammonia and water rather than soap and water.

A few drops of rose water added to almonds will prevent their oiling when chopped.

Large red apples when served whole at the table are polished with olive oil.

Before gliding your slipper again put them on shoe trees and rub in a little banana oil.

A cold boiled potato may be used as a paste substitute for fastening back bits of torn wall paper.

To decorate a luncheon table, no flower may be utilized with more charming effect than the pansy.

When cleaning silver use gin with the whitening instead of water. It will give them a better polish.

In making a cake, grease the tin with sweet lard rather than butter, and sift a little dry flour over it.

When making a steamed or boiled pudding plect in the cloth at the top to allow the pudding to swell.

The soft brushes used for polishing hardwood floors may be washed most thoroughly by the use of kerosene.

When beating eggs observe that there is no grease on the whisk, as it will prevent the eggs from frothing.

A glazier's knife will be found an excellent thing with which to scrape and clean the bottoms of tins and kettles.

A good treatment for white spots on the nails is a nightly application of paste made of equal parts of turpentine and myrr.

A teaspoonful of lemon juice to a quart of water will make rice very white and keep the grains separate when boiling.

To cool an oven while baking never leave the door open, but cool it by the dampers, or removing one of the plates over the oven.

The best way to rest is to lie down, relax every muscle, lie as limp as a rag and banish from the mind all thought of work or care.

Charlotte russe is more appetizing and less sickening if it is flavored with sherry. This should be stirred in carefully, or the cream will curdle.

A powerful and cheap disinfectant for use in closets, stables, etc., may be made by taking chloride of lime, one pound, and water, three gallons.

An artistic receptacle for wood alcohol is a little kettle of hammered brass, with a long, slender spout, a pretty addition to the tea table.

Extremists Dissatisfied

LONDON, Oct. 12.

The special correspondent of the Daily Chronicle at Lisbon cables:

The Republic is gaining favor with the people and the Provisional Government is doing its best to redeem the pledges the Republican party made the people in the days when the Republic was only a dream.

The Ministers are showing themselves wisely tolerant in refraining from persecuting their political opponents, especially those actively identified with the late monarchy.

This tolerance, however, is not altogether to the liking of certain extremists of the Republican party, who form a powerful but misguided body.

The Government up to the present has resisted the intrigues of the powerful clique, which, being outside the Ministry, makes its headquarters in the corridor of President Brag's office.

I am inclined to think that the Government realizes how much Portugal is dependent upon Europe's good-will, and that the members of the Cabinet will resign rather than accede to the demands of the extremists; but of course there is always the possibility of triumph for intriguers.

With reference to attacks from religious houses on the soldiers, the priests all maintain emphatically that these acts are the works of agent provocateurs, who wished to supply a plausible pretext for the present anti-clerical steps.

Fear Revolution.

COLOGNE, Germany, Oct. 12.

Railway traffic between this city and France was at a standstill to-day. Hundreds of trains at different points were unable to proceed. Arrangements have been made to send the French mails into France by Beaumont on the frontier of France. Travelers in autos arriving here from France by way of Beaumont, say that many caravans of motor cars have reached the Belgian frontier from French points. They report that the railroad strikers are insulting and pelting them with missiles. Observers of the situation expressed the fear that the strikers movement will assume a revolutionary character.

Sir Clifton Robinson.

According to the Fall Mail Gazette of September 27th, Sir Clifton Robinson who is on his way to Newfoundland, is a representative of a powerful group of financiers, "who contemplate taking an active interest in the practical development of the material resources of the country." To the Fall Mail Gazette, Sir Clifton emphasized that it was the "material resources" of Newfoundland he intended to investigate. He proposes to make a complete tour of the island, to obtain first hand knowledge of what is worth developing and whether in any particular direction prospects are sufficiently encouraging to warrant a large outlay of capital.

Every one will welcome Sir Clifton or any other representative of an unlimited amount of capital, who are anxious to find openings in Newfoundland for its profitable employment.

That is what Newfoundland needs. Men like the Harnsworths who have millions to invest, who know how to place it, and who can make the investment make good. That is the best lodestone to draw other millions of money along. We have at present no means of knowing who constitutes the group which has an "almost unlimited amount of capital" at their disposal. But their agent is a well-known tramway and railway engineer whose career is set forth at some length in Who's Who, from which we extract the following information.

He has published numerous treatises on his favourite subject The World's Tramways, and has been awarded the

silver medal of the Society of Arts. In 1905 he was knighted.

This brief sketch makes it clear that Sir Clifton is a man of the highest eminence in the application of electricity to traction, and has been prominent in pioneer enterprises. His projected stay in Newfoundland will be short. He hopes to be back in London in five weeks. We hope he may see sufficient in Newfoundland to convince his principals that Newfoundland is the spot for their money. Police Actively Engaged on Grand Falls Robbery.

We learn from people who arrived by the express to-day that the police are actively engaged looking after the robbery of money from the A. N. D. Co.'s safe in the general stores at Grand Falls. All trains and steamers are being carefully watched and everything possible is being done to ensure the capture of the criminal. The day previous to the commission of the robbery was pay day with the employees of the Company and the thief or thieves evidently expected to get a big haul at the retail stores, but the Company states in answer to an inquiry we sent yesterday that there was but a few hundred dollars in the small safe there. The main safe of the Company is not in that building but in another place, and here very large sums are kept before pay day—it is said up to \$15,000. From this it is argued that the thief is not the expert crackman that at first blush was believed. The general stores, where he operated, are in the midst of the settlement. People pass that way almost continuously night and day, and that the operator escaped detection seems to be due to the accident that no person happened to be near when the explosion occurred.

Why Messina Remains in Ruins

London Oct. 5.—A firm of English constructors recently made a proposition to rebuild Messina according to plans which had been approved by the Government, to clear the streets, and to negotiate a loan of \$120,000,000 to the municipality at 3 1/2 per cent. interest. The reconstruction of the city, it was estimated, would take five years' time. The proposal was later referred to the municipal authorities, who rejected it. A representative of the English firm was summoned to Messina, and had an interview with two influential citizens, they would have the proposal accepted. The agent asked what sum they wanted. One said he was willing to accept \$20,000, but the other insisted upon 2 per cent. of the value of the contract. The agent returned to Rome, and asked the Minister of Public Works whether it was the custom in Sicily to bribe the officials. The Minister was highly indignant, and the case will be brought up in Parliament. Meanwhile, however, the two citizens are suing the agent of the English firm for slander. The ruins still remain as they were on the day of the great earthquake.

NOCTURNAL THIEVES ABOUT.

People living around Duckworth St. notice of late that thieves have been prowling about nightly stealing from hallways. Last night one of these quietly opened the door of Mr. M. Dryer's residence and stole some mats, leaving the door open when the marauder had departed, so that no notice would be made. Residents of this street should be watchful.



Portuguese Reform.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LISBON, Oct. 12.
Colonel Barretto, Minister of War, says that the Government intends to reorganise the Army thoroughly, bringing together a formidable force of 250,000 men. The Minister of Marine, Amaro Gomez, considers that the remodeling of the navy will prove an arduous task. On account of the utter neglect which the Monarchy has shown towards the sea forces, he favors the building of small Dreadnoughts. It is reported that one of the first great works to be undertaken by the Republic will be to transfer the arsenal from the left bank of the Tagus to the opposite shore. It is estimated that this will cost several hundred thousand dollars. The present location of the arsenal is inconvenient for foreign ships. Jose Relvas has been appointed Minister of Finance to succeed Basilio Telles. The administrator of the King's property has proposed to the Minister of the Interior to liquidate the King's indebtedness to the State by yearly payments, and at the same time to guarantee the King an annuity. Senor Almeida replied that the Government would consider the proposition. The Lords in Walling and Court nobles who accompanied the King to Gibraltar have returned. The King has expressed a desire to be alone in exile. All the officers and crew of the Royal yacht Amelia have been discharged and a new crew, all staunch Republicans, put on board. The Government has published notices that severe punishment will follow any raid upon private houses which, the notice states, are inhabited by priests, and declaring that the priests are hiding in nobles' houses is untrue. A detachment of soldiers making the rounds at the Campello Jesuit College yesterday was fired upon. One of the men was killed and another seriously wounded. The incident caused excitement among the people believing that an attack had been made upon them by concealed Jesuits, but inquiry disclosed that it was due to a sentinel's mistake. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Priest Laurence Mattos, who is a leading militant Catholic. The Minister of the Interior, questioned regarding the disposal of the King's property, said that nothing has been decided upon definitely. The palace may be converted to museums or schools. He believed that any property or palace belonging to the King personally would be kept for him, but the King's debts to the nation must be settled.

The British Army is All Right.

London, Oct. 12.—There has been much criticism over the recent Army manoeuvres, and an article in the Daily News by Robert Blatchford is therefore interesting. He says in part: It is not the British custom to boast about or gush over things British, but the British Army is all right. It has only one fault—there is not enough of it. There has been much discussion here as to the merits and conduct of the Special Reserve men mobilized for these manoeuvres. We have had many conflicting statements. Some reports describe them as weeds, and say that they have fallen to pieces on the roads. Others say they are as good as we can expect, and that they have marched the long distance with few lame ducks. Speaking only of that which I have seen I should say the Special Reserve have done as well as could be expected. Some of the Special Reserve men looked tired, some were falling lame, some of them are not equal in physique to the Regulars, with whom they are brigaded. But a little hard marching and steady drill and regular feeding will make new men of them. And certainly behind the brigades I saw there was not a single straggler, nor did I see one man in the ambulance. All the infantry marched briskly and steadily and in close order. All the lads looked hard and fresh. Also, it is worth noting that these thousands of men, after three or four days' marching on dusty roads, were all clean and trim and tidy. Indeed, the appearance of the men was remarkably soldierlike and good. This means good discipline and good will as well as good material. There are no dirty slovenly soldiers in the British Army. And cleanliness is a part of godliness and indicates a sound and healthy morals.



Serious Situation.

Special to the Evening Telegram.
PARIS, Oct. 12.
The French Government is to-day confronted with a strike of railroad employees that is rapidly spreading throughout the Republic, and threatens to become general by to-morrow morning. Traffic is disorganized. The inconvenience to the public can be scarcely appreciated by one not present at one of the great concourses of travel. The railroad managers cannot possibly cope with the situation. It is upon the Government, however, that the burden rests. The Cabinet has called the strikers to the colors in their capacity as Reservists. The strikers declare they will not respond, holding that the law providing for military organization did not intend to make it impossible for trainmen to protest effectively against conditions of labor, which they consider unfair. This issue between the Government and strikers constitutes the most serious phase of the situation. The Reservists who failed to report for duty may be declared deserters, and may be dealt with accordingly. Following the strike on the Northern railway, yesterday, the Central States Committee of the National Railroad Union decided to call out every employee of the private and state owned roads. The employees of the Western railroad, who also have grievances, decided to go out last night. Their example was followed this morning by the trainmen of the Eastern railroad who voted they stop work at noon, and by the men of the Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean lines who voted to quit this evening.

WEATHER MESSAGE.—The Marine and Fisheries Department received this message from Toronto yesterday evening: "Gale, promises to increase again on the south and east coasts and blow very hard from the north-east and north."

CARD TOURNAMENT.—Nearly 200 players attended the card tournament at the Mechanics' Hall last night. Twenty-eight games were played. A. Good won the first prize with 21 games, and P. Jackman second, with 20 games. To-morrow night another series of games will be played. The proceeds will be given to the thimblemen on strike.

Snake Venom a Boon.

Tuberculosis Yields to It—Good Results in Three Cases Treated by N. Y. Doctor—Strong Hopes for Epilepsy.

Rochester, N.Y., Oct. 3.—Declaring rattlesnake venom as a cure for tuberculosis, one of the most remarkable discoveries of medical science, Dr. M. C. Rutherford revealed to-day that he has a patient under treatment in this city.

Dr. Rutherford, whose interest in the rattlesnake venom—known medically as crotalin—was aroused by the reputed cure of Henry Hoefen, a Rochester druggist, says he has another patient, A. J. Clark of No. 319 Jennings Street, well on the way to recovery by means of the new treatment. He says he will undertake the treatment in a third case this week.

"Several years ago I sent Mr. Clark to Colorado," said Dr. Parkhurst, "he became better, but did not like the West and returned to Rochester. His old tubercular trouble reappeared until he took to his bed. Soon he could move neither hand nor foot.

"I advised Mrs. Clark to see Mr. Hoefen and the physician who had treated him. She did so, and then at her request I began using crotalin in her husband's case. In ten days he was better. He has improved steadily and is now able to walk about. I am now treating another patient in the same way.

"This week I shall try the venom on an epileptic patient. I have strong hope of its success."
Dr. Rutherford is known as a conservative physician of the old school. He has practised here for more than a quarter of a century.

Widows Get Herring

since Town Still Follows Time-Honored Custom. In one place in the United States at least widows and maiden ladies

are in favor. One hundred of the largest and most tender herring is the annuity offered to all widows residing within the confines of the town of Pembroke, Maine. It is a time-honored custom, and its

origin is beyond recall of the oldest inhabitant's memory. But the custom is faithfully obeyed and at the end of the year's run about fifty women claim their share. The weirs are town property, and

the law providing that 10,000 herring be taken from each season's catch and returned to the lake is rigidly observed. But whoever of the 1,500 residents of the two towns may find himself deprived of his share, the widows

are certain of obtaining theirs. John Le Farge, who is in charge of the fishing, says: "It is not charity. The way we look at it is that large tender herring is about the best the town can offer without charge, and in

the old days it must have been quite a help to a woman whose husband died to have such a quantity of ever-ready food on hand. The custom is honored and no one cares to break

Strikes Derelict, SINKS IMMEDIATELY.

One Fisherman Drowned—Seven Missing—Thirteen Saved—Accident Occurs to French Schooner "St. Pierre" During Gale Yesterday Off West Coast of Miquelon—What Can the Derelict Be?

Another marine tragedy which possibly may have resulted in the drowning of eight fishermen, occurred yesterday west of Miquelon. It is certain that one man has been drowned, and the fact that the other seven have not yet turned up is sufficient cause for great anxiety about their safety. The seven are evidently the portion of the crew that left the banker in one dory after the collision. The full crew appears to have been 21 men and it is probable that they got away in three dories, seven in each. We judge from the despatch that two of the dories reached St. Pierre safely this morning, having been rowing all night. There was a strong breeze of north and northwest wind blowing the past 24 hours, and the missing dory may have been swamped. It will be seen from the headline that the French banker struck the derelict yesterday, presumably in broad daylight, a fact which indicates that the wreck must have been well submerged, otherwise the look-out would have seen it. The wind was blowing on the Miquelon shore yesterday a strong gale from the N.W., and as the St. Pierre sank so quickly, it is likely that she struck the wreck head on, allowing the crew barely time to launch the dories and jump into them when she went down in a hurry and scurry of doing this.

doubt the man referred to fell overboard and was drowned, or possibly he may have been sick in the bunk and would not have time to get on deck. Our despatch published yesterday referred to a large quantity of floating deals having been seen by a vessel that had arrived at Lamaline. The word "Empire" was stencilled on some of the plank. It is possible that those deals may have come from the derelict that sank the French banker. If the derelict was floating bottom up it would be no easy matter to discern it, even in the daytime, in the heavy fog that was caused by the gale of N.W. wind that blew there yesterday.

The information given above we received from our correspondent at St. Pierre this afternoon.

By the Bruce express to-day Rev. J. S. Sutherland accompanied by his wife arrived in the city. There also came with him Rev. Robert Johnston, Moderator of the Presbytery at Halifax, who on Sunday next will preach at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church here, and on Wednesday will induct Rev. Mr. Sutherland as pastor of the church here. Mr. Sutherland comes from Halifax where for several years he was pastor of a prominent Presbyterian Church.

Hove Up Off Port.

The banker Dove, owned by H. Hollett, of Burin, hove up off the Narrows at 10 a.m. to-day and landed the pilot, Stephen Mercer, who brought the vessel up from Labrador. The vessel has been fishing at Cape Harrison the past three weeks and secured 700 qts. of fish which she found very plentiful. She has now 2,500 qts. to her credit for 9 dories, and left for home at 10.30. She had very bad weather lately and broke her main boom besides having her sails torn.

Sheltered at St. Pierre

Two Grand Bank bankers arrived at St. Pierre on Tuesday from the Banks. Both had their sails torn, their booms broken and lost nearly all their fishing gear and cables in the storm of Sunday and Monday while on the Banks. They are giving up the banking voyage.

Bankers Arrive Here.

The banker Bohemia, Capt. W. J. Poole, of Burin, arrived from Holton, Labrador, this morning. She had been fishing there since September the 5th, and secured 500 qts. fish which she found plentiful. She has now 2,100 qts. to her credit for 7 dories. She had very rough weather since Sunday and was compelled to lay to for hours at a time. She had her foremast torn up and carried away all her head gear in the storm, with the wind blowing a hurricane from the S. S. E. by S. Last Thursday there was a heavy fall of snow at Holton and neighbourhood.

The Gloucester banker Hazel B. Hynes, arrived here also to-day from the Grand Banks with 500 qts. fish. She also had very stormy weather, and had her sails and gear damaged.

New York, October 4.—A new long-distance record for wireless transmission is claimed by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company, which announced yesterday that the officials were informed in a despatch from London that Mr. Marconi, who is now in the Argentine Republic, has successfully received signals direct from Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, and from Clifton, Ireland, at the high power station, now almost completed, in the Argentine Republic. The distance covered is estimated at 5,600 miles.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

To-day a Scotch seaman, who yesterday surrendered himself to the police, pleaded guilty to the larceny of a pair of pants and a vest, worth \$5, the property of Mr. Dillon, on the 10th inst. He also admitted the stealing of a watch, valued at \$10, the property of Ivan Dunlock, on the 5th inst. For the former offence he was given 2 months' imprisonment and for the later 3 months.

As the flowers grow without cultivation, and the bees work without wage other than caretaking, producing their food supply, the honey crop is in great part clear profit. The Swiss honey is of very delicate flavor and fine quality.

Stella Maris Here From The Northern Labrador.

The s.s. Stella Maris, Capt. Wm. Winsor, arrived here at 7.30 last evening from Northern Labrador, and during the summer ran down as far as Port Burwell. She left here on the 6th August last and made five separate trips, one to Sedtke Bay, two to Ryan's Bay and one each to Davis' Inlet and Killinek. When the storm of Sunday and Monday last was on the ship lay all the time at Indian Harbor, and the wind, which blew from the N.N.E., reached hurricane force. As a matter of fact Capt. Winsor told the Telegram that since Saturday week terrible weather prevailed along the Labrador coast with frost and very cold weather. There were heavy snow falls and when the ship left Indian Harbor there was 3 feet of snow on the ground. Codfish was very plentiful at Chillelight and Ryan's Bay when he left these places on the 20th September. The ship on her voyage south called at Quirpon and took on board the crew and passengers of the schr. Welcome, which became dismasted in the Straits of Belle Isle. The vessel is at anchor in Quirpon, and 37 men and 7 girls who were passengers in her were taken to Bay Roberts in the Stella Maris. Head Constable Sheppard, who has been down the coast since June 15th last, returned on the ship. He did general police duty on the Northern Labrador and acquitted himself well in the oftentimes rather delicate tasks which he had to perform. This is Mr. Sheppard's 5th year on this service, and a competent and efficient officer he has proved himself. The cargo of the s.s. Harmony was landed at Nain after she went ashore at the entrance to that port, and this with goods which she had landed there on a previous visit was taken to Okak, Hebron and Killinek, thereby relieving these stations of the possibility of being short of a winter's supply of necessaries which must have occurred but for the presence of the Stella Maris, as the accident to the Harmony prevented her calling at these stations. The ship returned with oil from Killinek and transferred it to the Invermore at Hopedale. While at Porcupine Bay it was reported that the death of a woman in August last was caused by foul means, but Head Constable Sheppard looked carefully into the case, and found that she had died from natural causes. During the summer several Eskimos were convicted of various offences, but chiefly of ill-treating their wives and of unfaithfulness to the partners of their joys and sorrows. Three of the natives were held before Capt. Winsor at Hebron, and two of them on being convicted of beating their wives were each fined \$20 or 30 days, and a third \$10 or 20 days. At Porcupine Bay one of the natives seemed to be imbued with a spirit of polygamy and had several women besides his chief wife living with him. He was given a lecture on morality generally and the duties which he should observe as a husband, and was compelled to relinquish the company of the women he had taken into his household. One Eskimo woman had her leg broken at Okak by the premature explosion of a gun which she carried, but when the Stella Maris left she was doing well and the broken limb was encased in plaster of Paris. Augustus Friday, aged 45 years, of Nain, was tried before Capt. Winsor for criminally assaulting his niece, aged 14. His wife preferred the charge and also asserted that he had committed similar misconduct with his step-daughter, aged 19. He was given 3 months hard labor and came along here in the ship to spend the term in the Penitentiary. All on board the Stella Maris agree in saying that the Eskimos are a most immoral people despite the efforts of the missionaries in their behalf. There are a few fishing crews at Batteau, Grady and Francis Harbor and these will leave the coast by the next Invermore. Some bankers were seen at Batteau, Grady and Parridge Bay, but the weather was then very stormy and it is believed all have by now gone home.

Five Hours Sailing Amongst Deals.

Passengers who arrived here by the Glencoe and came in by last night's train say that a schooner which arrived at Lamaline Friday reports being 5 hours sailing through scattered deals and scattering well on that coast. As Mr. H. W. LeMessurier's message stated the lumber was not long in the water from its appearance, no schooner could have carried so much as a deck load, and the belief now is that it was a deck load washed from some steamer and driven landwards with the sea and current and the S. E. gale which blew in on the land. These people don't think that any disaster has occurred to a vessel. The people on the shore are gathering the material, some of which bears the word "Empire" marked in stencils. It is believed this is the name of the ship which lost the deal.

Submarine Goes 1,625 Miles.

Paris, Oct. 1.—The submarine boat Archimede has accomplished a non-stop voyage from Cherbourg to the mouth of the River Gironde and back, a distance of 1,625 miles, in less than five days.

The vessel is of a size sufficient to allow four officers' cabins and accommodations for a crew of thirty-two men. She is as comfortable as a torpedo boat destroyer. She could blockade a port for a week.

The press maintains that her voyage beats that made by the American sub-marine Salmon from Quincy, Mass. to Hamilton, Bermuda, made in July.

Married With Handcuffs On.

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—An unusual wedding took place to-day. Oslas Millace, who was married to Josephine Xvois Millace, had handcuffs on during the ceremony, and immediately afterwards left on his wedding trip to Kingston, where he will spend five years in the penitentiary. The bride did not accompany him.

The ceremony took place in St. Joseph's Church. Detective Ryan, who secured Millace's conviction for pocket-picking, was best man and Turnkey Young, of the jail, also gave his support.

After Millace was convicted the young woman declared that she would not abandon him and arrangements were made to take the prisoner from the jail to the church for the ceremony.

With the increasing price of lumber, this class of dwelling which is durable and fire-proof, will be adopted by most people instead of wooden erections.

Ruining the Lobster Fishery.

Yesterday Mr. Piccott, of the Marine and Fisheries Department, showed our reporter two tins of fish which were labelled lobster, but one of which contained squid in an advanced stage of decomposition, while the meat in the other can which resembled lobster had also greatly deteriorated. Mr. Piccott says that this season hundreds of tins of inferior fish have been found, and as the packers of this class of goods have been located they will be prosecuted with the utmost rigor. The putting up of lobsters in such a careless manner, if allowed to go unchecked, would spell ruin to this important industry.
