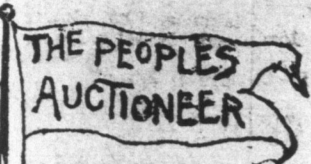

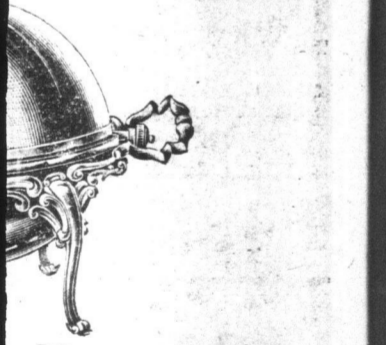

Next morning mother met me at the table with smiles, and about the best breakfast I had eaten for a long while.

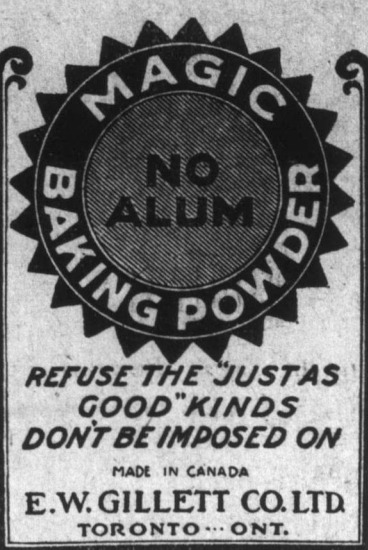
"You must imagine that your wife saw this breakfast," she whispered.

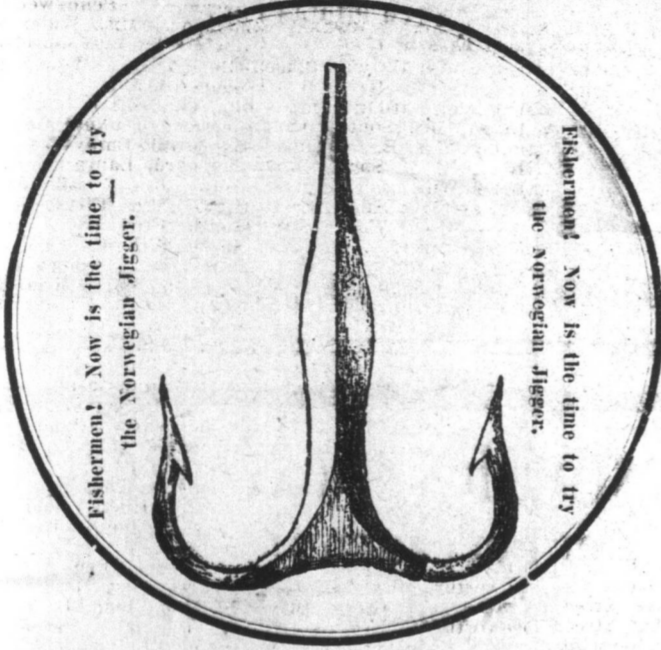

CRICKET BALLS WITH HISTORIES.

Player Who Last Touches Ball Can Claim It—Some Trophies of Cricket are Prized. It is a law, but an unwritten one, of the cricket field that the player who last touches the ball in the county matches can claim the same. This being so, says an English writer, it is not unusual for a batsman to handle the ball and dismiss himself when he is the last man in and has scored well for his team. Scotland did this during the Non-Smokers' match at Melbourne in 1887, when the former made a grand total of 803 runs. Scotland and Boyle were at the wickets at the close of the game, and when the former had scored 18 runs he stroked the ball gently with his bat, and as it rolled at his feet he picked it up and put it in his pocket. Naturally the umpire gave him "out," and "Handed ball—!" appeared on the scoring-sheet. Scotland had handled the ball for its possession. It was Abel's good fortune to secure the ball used in the England vs. Australia match at the Oval on August 12th, 1896, when the mother country came off victorious. Abel brought the game to a conclusion by catching McKibbin, and he walked towards the pavilion with the ball in his hand. In a few moments he was surrounded by collectors who wanted to buy the sphere. One gentleman offered Abel £10 for it, which was very nearly the value of half its weight in gold. A cricket ball that is exceedingly valuable is the one that was used in the Varsity match of 1870, when Cambridge won by two runs. The hero of this exciting finale was F. C. Cadden, the famous Harrovian, who took the last three balls of his over. The ball was mounted in silver and presented to Cadden as a memento of his bowling feat. Lord Hawke has a silver-mounted cricket ball, and upon a tablet attached to it appears the inscription: "A. Palmer, c. Ricketts, b. Hawke. Witness, Chawles! Ottawa, October 24th, 1891." "Chawles," by the way, is C. W. Wright, of Nottingham, and he presented the ball to Lord Hawke. Tom Emmett, the great bowler, was the last man to handle the ball in a certain match, and he claimed it as his own. As he was making his way to the pavilion he was offered £25 for it, which sum he is said to have accepted. At the Vine Club, at Sevenoaks, there is a snuff-box of silver made like a cricket ball. This trophy, which is over a century old, is marked with seams in a similar manner to the balls in use at the present day. In days of yore this snuff ball was filled and thrown from hand to hand after inner. Anyone who missed a catch was forthwith fine several bottles of claret. Bats, stumps, and pads used in big matches very often fetch large sums when put up for sale. Tom Hearne sold for £18 a bat, which he used for a couple of seasons and with which he had hit up seven centuries. T. Horan, a member of the earlier Australian teams, once endeavored to pull a fast toss from Spofforth, in a match with Australia. The experiment, however, resulted in a broken stump, and this was mounted in silver and presented to the bowler as a memento of the event.

## The Royal Link.

The real value of the Conference of the Premiers of Great Britain and the Overseas States is the exchange of views and the discussion of problems, more or less common to all, from the view points of the respective States. The adoption or failure to adopt any particular scheme at the present time is not of vital importance. Immature schemes, based on lack of understanding of the necessary view points of each, would in all probability retard rather than promote the future welfare of the realms acknowledging George V. as King. The strongest link is that of sentiment and a common allegiance to one King. The trend of development at the present time is towards the building up of great British States in different parts of the world which shall rival in strength and stability Great Britain herself. Mutual love, intimate intercourse, a common speech, similar dangers, allegiance to the same King will tend strongly to make matters ripe for British Hamiltons of the future who will recognize the time when a more rigid union is feasible and necessary. We believe when the hour comes the statesmen will be ready.

The dominant feature of the week is the Coronation of the King and the raising on high of the institution of kingship, which is the principal link which holds the States of the Empire together.

## Havoc of Lightning at Avondale.

**Destroyed—Awe-Inspiring Scene—Marvelous Escape From Death of Five Persons in a House Struck by Lightning Yesterday in Another Electrical Storm.**

**Special Evening Telegram.**

AVONDALE, To-Day.

The thunder and lightning storm which swept Avondale Saturday night, destroying the pretty little church of that settlement, was the most severe ever experienced in memory of any person in this district. The peals of thunder were terrific and shook the dwellings and caused consternation. Many rushed to the streets in terror, and the lightning flashes which like tongues of fire for several seconds duration lit up the firmament. During the storm at about 11 p.m. when one of several bursts of thunder and lightning shot over the place, all eyes turned towards the church, where flames were seen issuing from the spire and almost instantaneously fire burst from all parts of the sacred edifice, illuminating the settlement for miles around. The church on the summit of hill overlooking settlement, instantly enveloped in flames, amidst thunder peals and lightning flashes of pitch darkness, was an awe-inspiring sight and one that will never be forgotten by beholders. Father Sheehan made several attempts at great risk to save the vestments and sacred articles with partial success. Pieces of tower were driven several yards from the site of the building, as if by force of heavy dynamite charges. Yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock heavy clouds were seen rolling from southwest, and with scarcely moment's warning, thunder and lightning again burst forth, sweeping along the valley and hill tops reviving the terror of the previous night. It was of short duration, but it caused damage to dwellings and five persons narrowly escaped death. Lightning entered by the chimney the house of Edward Cook, broke through chimney tore away the earth and through the floor. Four persons in the house were left unconscious. An old woman's boots she was wearing torn off her feet and her feet lacerated, attended by doctor. A fire started but was quickly extinguished and the house saved. Two miles distant the house of Peter Walsh at Hr. Main Point was broken to pieces. The owners were out at the time. Other minor damages done. The Avondale church was built from 1885 to 1887 at a cost of fifteen thousand dollars. It was not insured.

## Head-Constable McBey Dead.

A venerable and respected citizen in the person of Head Constable Peter McBey passed to the great unknown this morning after an illness of long duration, in his 88th year. The deceased was born August 21st, 1823, in the town of Glasgow, in the city of Linlithgow, between Edinburgh and Glasgow, where Mary Queen of Scots was born. He enlisted in the 1st Royals at Glasgow on the 15th Aug., 1839. He went to Gibraltar with his regiment, where he was stationed for 6 years and 3 months. After he served in Barbadoes, thence to the Leeward Islands. On his leaving the 1st Royals, in 1848, he joined the Newfoundland Companies and completed his time. He was pensioned on discharge and joined the Newfoundland Constabulary and went Head Constable at Carbonear in 1862. There he remained 20 years, and was later stationed at St. John's. He lived in the reign of five British Kings and served here under Inspectors Mitchell, Foley, Garty, Pawett and McCowen. Mourning him are four daughters—Mrs. Marmaduke Forward, Mrs. H. J. Corrick, Mrs. Jas. Hodge and Mrs. John Mann; and two sons—Messrs. Thomas and Samuel McBey. To the relatives the Telegram extends its sympathy.

LATEST CABLE NEWS.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day. The Imperial Conference which at the outset many persons feared would be a failure, has justified its existence. The cause of the pessimism at an early period of the Conference was the rejection by the Dominions of the proposal for the establishment of an Imperial Advisory Council, which most of the Dominions were afraid would interfere with their autonomy, so jealously guarded by Premier Laurier, Borden and Fisher. The Home Government was unable to support a scheme for state-owned Atlantic cables, as the cost is considered prohibitive, but it is hoped to secure cheaper cable rates by negotiations with telegraphic companies. The movement to appoint royal commissioners to visit overseas dominions and report on their trade and resources and the best methods of their development is regarded as important. Other important matters are the taking of the dominions into the confidence of the Government on foreign relations and the suggestion that negotiations with foreign governments to secure the right of the dominions to withdraw from any commercial treaty while leaving it in force elsewhere.

LONDON, To-day. On the eve of the Coronation week London is ablaze with colour. Musical rehearsals are proceeding with full choir and orchestra for the ceremony at Westminster Abbey. Early in the week the last of the Royal regiments will arrive. London will then contain as distinguished a company as ever gathered in any capital. Lord Kitchener, in command of the soldier, is so overwhelmed with work as to be unable to take time for meals and sleep. Soldiers, publicans and princes are pouring into London by every train, through full crowds attracted in all the colors of the rainbow and brilliant uniform.

PARIS, To-day. Fifty aeroplanists took wing from an aviation field at St. Gennes for the first stage of the European circuit race, which calls for a flight to London and return with stops at various places going and returning. Two aviators met tragic deaths, immediately after starting, one was killed later and one seriously injured.

PEKIN, To-day. Sir Robert Hart, Imperial director of Chinese Customs, has received further leave for one year. Ching found some objection to Sir Robert's work two years ago, and gave him a year's leave of absence. This was granted in the spring of 1910, and he got another year off. Now his leave is extended to 1912.

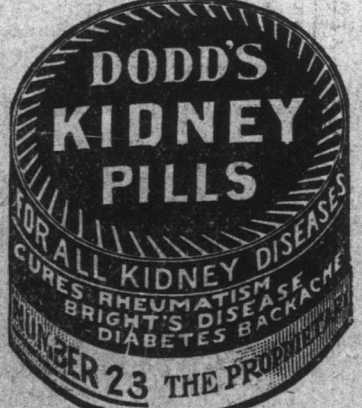

## Brigade Matters.

### FURTHER CORRESPONDENCE.

St. John's, 13th, 1911.

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 2nd inst. in reply to mine of the same date, addressed to His Excellency in reference to the proposed Coronation Parade.

Our Governing Committee notes that His Excellency has determined to inaugurate an order of precedence amongst the Brigades of this Colony and to establish the claims of the C. L. B. upon as firm a basis as may be by giving his proposed arrangement all the weight of his official sanction. Against this we respectfully but firmly protest.

We note also that His Excellency, having secured the assent of the other three Corps to his proposals, abandons all attempts to reason the matter and arbitrarily intimates in effect that if we do not choose to accept our position under an arrangement which we have time and again repudiated we must submit to the penalty of exclusion from this parade in honour of His Majesty's coronation. As we are not prepared to forfeit our independence as a Corps, we must only accept the penalty should His Excellency enforce it, however objectionable and unjust it may be.

We think we are correct in saying that it has been a recognized principle in inter-British negotiations that no brigade should be coerced by any combination of the other brigades. We regret to note that His Excellency has no hesitation in apparently using the assent of the other three Corps to his invitation as a reason for doing what they themselves expressly decided they would not do.

We note further that His Excellency is of opinion that the C. L. B. could not abandon the parade, no matter how much they might desire to meet our views, inasmuch as His Majesty the King is Patron of that organization. The C. L. B. did decide to abandon the parade simply because its

claims to precedence were refused recognition. The ground of its claim to privilege has been stated by that Corps to be priority in date of local organization only. The same ground has been apparently irrevocably accepted by His Excellency as a convenient solution of the difficulty pointed out in our protest.

We were not aware until so informed by His Excellency that His Majesty is Patron of the C. L. B. If that Corps had stated that fact and had suggested that on that account on this occasion it would like to be placed in a position to do special duty in honour of His Majesty, we would regard it as a privilege to have extended any courtesy in our power with that object in view. We should have been pleased indeed to have connected the C. L. B. the point of honour on the occasion of His Majesty's Coronation under these circumstances and to have drawn with the other Corps for the other positions. We refer to this point very respectfully. The C. L. B. never mentioned the subject. They rested their claims on an alleged right arising out of the fact that they happened to be organized locally earliest and on no other ground whatever, and freely stated that they would not parade with any Brigade which did not acknowledge their contentions.

We were not aware until His Excellency informed us that the C. L. B. had any "desire to meet our views." On the contrary we felt quite sure that they had not. It is true that the representatives of all the Brigades seemed desirous of avoiding a rupture and came to a conclusion with that in view, not to parade at all, but we would again point out that the danger of a rupture would never have arisen except for the presentation of the C. L. B.'s claim to precedence and their persistent demand for its unqualified recognition.

We beg to state that His Excellency's wishes and desires will always receive our careful and respectful attention and whenever practicable we shall comply therewith. On this occasion, however, we cannot refrain from protesting against His Excellency's action in concluding an arrangement against our well-known objections—an arrangement which he knew beforehand would have the effect of excluding a section of His Majesty's most loyal subjects from participating in the public festivities in honour of His Majesty's Coronation.

We do not quite understand the concluding paragraph of your letter. We fail to see how the possibility of any dispute on the Parade ground is a matter of precedence. Learning that the Brigades were at issue in respect to precedence His Excellency pointed out to each Brigade, and suggested its adoption.

Three of the Brigades were of the opinion that it would be convenient to follow that practice and stated that they would turn out on that basis. The Methodist Guards declined to do so. Surely it can not be contended that three Brigades, perfectly satisfied with the order followed by the British Army, should abstain from parading because one Brigade declined to conform to the views of the majority.

But whether that be so or not the Governor has no authority to dictate in the matter and does not desire to do so. His Excellency simply states that in his opinion the Brigades should turn out, and having pointed out to them a means of avoiding the difficulty of precedence without any suggestion of inferiority, he leaves it to the Brigades to act as they please and three Brigades decide to parade.

His Excellency will regret the absence of the Methodist Guards if they adhere to their determination not to attend, as they are a fine body of young men who credit to the colony, but he cannot abate his view that in default of any better precedent that followed by the British Army should be adopted in Newfoundland. ## Struck by Lightning.

R. C. Church, Avondale, Destroyed as Result of Saturday Night's Thunder Storm.

Yesterday morning the Postal Telegraph Office and Reid Mfd. Co. were applied over the wires that the R. C. Church, of Avondale, had been burned to the ground Saturday night after the steeple had been struck by lightning. Watchman Thomas McGee, who is a servant with Mr. E. Kennedy, saw the lightning strike the tower from his position on Mr. Kennedy's premises, and he says that almost instantly the current of electricity flames as the current of electricity shot down through it. It took McGee less than 5 minutes to reach the structure but when he did so he could not get in. The steeple was so high that it was doomed. At great personal risk McGee forced an entrance to the Church and succeeded in saving the Chalice and the Sacred Host which it contained. He also grasped some vestments, but the fire had gained such headway that when he emerged these were partly burned in his hands. The Sacristy being in the Church he could not get to it and all the beautiful and costly vestments, silver plate, etc., for the use of the altar, the handsome altar furnishings, valued at a considerable sum, were destroyed together with the whole building which by 11:15 p.m. was a mass of ruins. The people notwithstanding the prevalence of the worst electrical storm witnessed in that section for years, were quickly on the scene in hundreds and worked hard to save the Church but to no purpose. The fire having had too much headway, they then turned their attention to preventing the flames from reaching the new Presbytery erected last year at a cost of \$4,000, and were successful in saving it. This fine Church was started by Bishop Ronald McDonald in 1886 and was finished in 1900. It was a handsome wooden structure capable of seating between 500 and 700 comfortably, and often over 1,000 persons attended the services there. It was built on a concrete foundation and this alone is left to mark the spot where the handsome structure stood. Rev. Fr. Sheehan is the Parish Priest of Avondale, and the loss to him and his parishioners, who freely gave their labour to build the Church, is a severe one, especially so considering that in saving it, this fine and well held on the property. It is a sad coincidence that Rev. John Roe, former Parish Priest of the place and who ministered at there while the edifice was being constructed, died only a day before the Church was destroyed. The loss is an irreparable one to all the people of that section of Harbour Main.

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Thunder Storm. A fierce thunder storm raged Saturday night last. It began at 4 p.m. and continued till after midnight. Rain fell in torrents. The lightning flashes from ten till 12 at night were frequent and vivid. The thunder storm broke first in the west and worked right round the horizon to the east, frequent flashes of lightning causing intervals of daylight brightness. Only destruction so far reported as the result of the storm is the destruction of the church at Avondale.

### Will Be the Greatest of All Sea Pageants.

LONDON, June 13.—The great naval review by King George at Spithead on June 24, two days after the coronation, will see gathered together in full commission the largest number of vessels of the Dreadnought class ever assembled. Most of them naturally will be units of the British navy, but the United States navy will be represented by the most powerful and up-to-date battleship participating in the review, the Delaware, which is considered in naval circles to typify the latest ideas of battleship construction. The system adopted in her case of placing the five masts in a single line is being followed in all the new battleships of the British fleet now under construction.

TEN DREADNOUGHTS.  
There are to be ten battleships of the Dreadnought class in line on the review day. These are the Colossus, Hercules, Neptune, St. Vincent, Colingwood, Vanguard, Bellerophon, Temeraire, Superb and Dreadnought. To these will be added four cruisers

Germany is the only nation to send a Dreadnought. She will be the Von der Tann, which recently undertook a lengthy cruise to the ports of South America and is declared to be the fastest warship in the world.

FOREIGN WARSHIPS.  
The other foreign naval powers are sending vessels of the pro-Dreadnought class, although in some instances they are of quite recent construction. France will be represented by the Danton, Japan by the Kurama, Austria by the Radetzky, Italy by the San Marco, Russia by the Rossiya, Spain by the Reina Regente, Argentina by the Buenos Ayres, Chili by the CNavacabuco, Sweden by the Flygia, Turkey by the Hamidieh and China by the Hai-Chi.

### The Susu Arrives.

The s.s. Susu, Capt. Horwood, arrived here at 4.30 p.m. Saturday from Belleoram and had head winds and thick fog all the way here. She left Belleoram Thursday night at 10 o'clock and landed one passenger here. Upon arrival the ship went on the quarantine ground and hoisted the yellow flag. The reason for this was that the vessel brought Con Cluett from Harbor Breton to Belleoram, landing him at that place on Tuesday last, where his parents live. While he was on board the ship he complained of being ill and on Thursday the illness from which he seemed to suffer was diagnosed as small pox by Dr. Fitzgerald. Cluett was a school teacher at Little Bay, Hermitage Bay, and walking down to Harbor Breton, boarded the ship to go to Belleoram. He is a pretty sick man and it is thought contracted the disease from a man named Rose, who was affected with it and lived near Cluett at Little Bay. Cluett's residence at Belleoram has been quarantined and Dr. Fitzgerald is looking after the patient. Dr. Campbell visited the ship on her arrival and had her thoroughly disinfected and fumigated, after which she was given a clean bill of health and hailed into Crosbie & Co's premises to-day. The ship reports a very poor shore fishery in Fortune Bay to date, but the bankers are doing fairly, their catches running from 70 qtls. for 4 dorries to 1,100 for the larger vessels, while the average is about 800. The vessels are now away trying to secure a caplin baiting.

### A Splendid Spectacle.

The grandest display of electrical illumination and adornment ever before attempted in this city will be witnessed Thursday and Friday nights when the handsome station of the Held Nid. Co. is lit up. The building, from an architectural standpoint, is a fine structure, but when each pretty feature is traced in electrical brilliance during the Coronation festivities its beautiful appearance will be enhanced. Thousands of electrical bulbs have been placed in position around its many windows, over the main portico, along the roof and the eaves and even the railings which guard the top of the structure and around the illuminated clock and dome. Over the front of the building will be placed a large crown which will be illuminated with 846 electric lights, so that the building at night will present a radiant and unique spectacle to the beholder.

### A Plucky Rescue.

Saturday night, as the Florizel was hauling off from Harvey & Co's pier, one of the firemen named Miller narrowly escaped being drowned, and a plucky rescue of the man was made by Jas. Bruin, a brother stoker of Miller. Miller tried to jump on board the ship as she was swinging off from the pier and mistaking his footing went overboard. Bruin promptly jumped from the ship's deck into the water, and grasping Miller by the arm swam with him to the pier, where both were quickly hauled out by the crowd assembled there. Bruin is a good swimmer and this is not his first time in saving life.

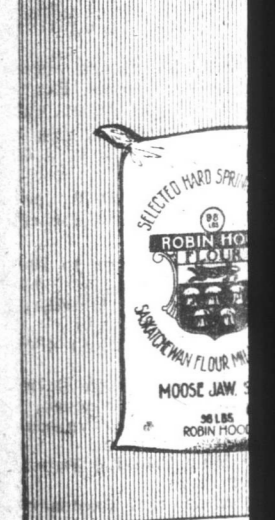
