

**The Evening Chit-Chat**

An English judge has made a list of fifteen of the most common mistakes of life from which list I have occasionally quoted in these letters. To-day I want to add one which the judge left out. My sixteenth most common mistake is this—"To think people are barbarians because they do not happen to know the particular things which you know."

In Jane Austen's "Mansfield Park" when the little country cousin comes to live at the great house, her wealthy cousins are astonished at her ignorance and constantly run to their mother saying "Dear mamma, only think, my cousin cannot put the map of Europe together—or my cousin cannot tell the principal rivers in Russia, or she does not know the difference between water colors and crayons. How strange! Did you ever hear anything so stupid?" In the end it turns out that Fanny, although she may be ignorant of the rivers in Russia or the distinction between crayon and water colors, knows a great many things that her cousins don't, and is developed along lines in which they are painfully deficient. Incidentally, as anyone who has ever visited Mansfield Park will remember, Fanny eventually "wins out." to use a slangy but expressive term.

Now, the attitude of Fanny's little cousins at the great house is the attitude which many much older and should-be wiser folks are prone to assume when they find that people are ignorant in any line in which they themselves are proficient.

Say that you are well versed in literature, and in conversation with a friend chance to quote from Rosetti.

and your friend lets out the fact that he never heard of Rosetti. With what holy horror you regard him, and how promptly you set him down as an impossible ignoramus. Ah, my friend, suppose he should begin to talk about the international peace situation—surely something as vital and wonderful as even Rosetti's poetry—and should he mention great names and events that were all as Greek to you, wouldn't he have as great a right to set you down as impossible and a Barbarian?

There are many thousands of branches on the tree of knowledge, and so many millions of twigs on each branch, that if a man were to live all of Methuselah's nine hundred and sixty-nine years, and apply himself to learning all the days of his life, there is no doubt that he would still die ignorant on many subjects.

Doubtless some young sprig, who was particularly interested in some tiny twig on the tree of knowledge, might start to talk to this supposititious person on this particular subject, and flinging that he knew nothing about it, set him down as an ignoramus.

If you will look very long and intently at one object and then shut your eyes you can still see that object everywhere. A great many of us look so long and intently at the particular objects that interest us, and close our eyes to other interests so tightly, that we see our own interests everywhere and cannot comprehend those who do not share with us this distortion of vision.

"There are not many men in this world after all," says David Grayson "that it will not pay us to go to school to for something or other."

If we would only remember this truth, and be willing to go to school to other people occasionally, instead of insisting on always playing teacher ourselves, I think we should make the sixteenth mistake less often.

**ALEXANDER THE GREAT.**



Alexander the Great was a famous warrior died at the age of 33 years, having conquered all of the known world and most of the suburbs. Alexander concealed his chagrin and the monthly pay checks and accompanied them, making a few important contributions to a profane history en route. Alexander was deeply attached to his horse, Bucephalus, and when the animal succumbed to old age and the colic he had the attending veterinary surgeons strung up by the thumbs until they couldn't hit the floor on the rebound. He was very fastidious about his personal appearance, had his shirts made to order and always called for a close shave. He was married so many times that he finally committed the responses to memory and was thus able to dispense with the usual rehearsal at the home of the bride.



**Household Notes.**

Potato water is good to take mud-stains from cloth.  
A pinch of salt will make the white of an egg beat quicker.  
Sunflower seeds make better bait than cheese for the mouse trap.  
A root-bound fern soon indicates its condition by drooping fronds.  
Jellied veal can be deliciously seasoned with lemon juice and celery salt.  
Equal parts of milk and luke-warm water are excellent for sponging palms.  
A pinch of borax in cooked starch will make the clothes stiffer and whiter.  
It is better to wipe off meat with a wet cloth than to let water run over it.  
A bread pudding may be deli-

iciously flavored by a few slices of candied orange peel.  
Dried lemon peel sprinkled over coals will destroy any disagreeable odor in the house.  
When blowing out a candle, hold it high and blow upward to keep the grease from running.  
Hot biscuits, generously buttered and spread with currant jelly are delicious served with game.  
To place ferns upon the window sill means their death, as they can not live in a cold draught.  
A better iron rest than the ordinary metal stand is a firebrick, as it does not cool the iron so rapidly.  
Wafer-like slices of bread, spread with caviare, sprinkled with lemon dipped in salt, make tasty sandwiches.  
Clean copper by rubbing it with lemon dipped in salt. Rinse in clean hot water and polish with a soft cloth.  
Use paraffine paper which lines biscuit boxes to polish flatirons. It is also a good lining for the cake tins.  
Banging the oven door is responsible for half the heavy bread and cake. The door should be closed very gently.  
For spring suppers sliced oranges and shredded cocoanut, put into a dish into alternate layers, are very appetizing.  
Lace washed in skimmed milk should not be rinsed in water, but should be ironed while still damp with the milk.  
Macaroni, prepared in any of the various ways in combination with cheese, butter and tomatoes, is very nourishing.  
Shredded chocolate cocoanut, which is bought already prepared, makes a tasty addition to different kinds of salad.  
If fancy shaped croutons are used for garnishing, touch the under side with white of egg. They will then stay in place.  
A delicious jelly is made of gelatine, flavored with grape juice and served with blanched nuts and whipped cream.



# Unveiling of Memorial

To a Late D. G. Master, Rt. Hon. Sir W. V. Whiteway.

Forty-Nine Years a Mason and Thirty Years D.G.M.



Inscription on the Memorial.

**MASONIC LIFE.**  
Initiated in St. John's Lodge, November, 1849, appointed Inner Guard, 1851, Senior Warden, 1854, Charter Member and first Worshipful Master of Lodge Avalon, 1859.  
Deputy District Grand Master, 1870 to 1878; District Grand Master, 1878 to 1908.  
President Tasker Educational Fund and Masonic Hall Joint Stock Company.  
Laid Corner Stone first Masonic Temple, June 11th, 1885, dedicated same December 29th, 1885.  
Laid Corner Stone present Temple, August 23rd, 1894; dedicated same April 23rd, 1897.  
Presented with a gold loving cup on attaining Masonic Jubilee.

**A. M. D. G.**  
This memorial tablet has been executed and imposed within this Temple of Masonry to the perpetual remembrance of the Masonic work and merit of  
The Right Honourable Sir William Vallance Whiteway, P.C., K.C.M.G., K.C., LL.D., &c. &c.  
who was for upwards of 30 years the District Grand Master for Newfoundland and Accepted Masons under the Registry of the Grand Lodge of England.  
In admiration of so much valuable service to Freemasonry, his Brethren of the English Registry have caused this memorial to be placed here within, to bear record to his distinguished life-work, and to their pious and affectionate Regrets and Remembrance.

**PUBLIC LIFE.**  
Born at Totnes, Devon, April 1st, 1828.  
Admitted to the Bar, 1852; appointed Q.C., 1862.  
Speaker of the House of Assembly 1865 to 1869.  
Solicitor General 1873 to 1878.  
Prime Minister and Attorney General 1878 to 1885, and 1889 to 1897.  
Delegate to Ottawa on Confederation, 1869.  
Counsel for the Colony at Halifax Fishery Commission, 1877, and received thanks of Parliament for his services.  
Addressed House of Lords on French Fishery Treaty, 1890.  
Created K. C. M. G., 1880, and Privy Councillor, 1897.  
Made D.C.L., of Oxford, and presented with the freedom of the Borough of Totnes, 1897.  
Died at St. John's, June 24th, 1908.

ings of a brother and to pour the healing balm of consolation into the bosom of the afflicted. Such then, my friends are some of the teachings of Freemasonry, and may we not claim that the man who lives according to these principles and tenets is a good man and therefore a good Mason. Having been for 25 years associated with the late Rt. Hon. Sir W. V. Whiteway, I am in a position to assert that no man has set such a high example in the practice of the principles of Masonry. If we only follow in his footsteps we also earn the distinction of being called "good Masons." And what greater name can a man leave behind him.  
The submitted brief record of the late District Grand Master was then submitted by Mr. Clift.  
In November, 1849, he was initiated into St. John's Lodge by Bro. Oliver Goldsmith, a grand nephew of the great poet. He was appointed Inner Guard in 1851, and Acting Senior Warden in 1853, and, as such, signed the address presented to Bro. Dr. Kane, when he called in here on his way to the relief of Sir John Franklyn. He was appointed Senior Ward in 1854, under the Mastership of Patrick Tasker.  
He became a Charter member and first Worshipful Master of Avalon Lodge in 1859, of which Lodge he continued to be a member until his death. In 1871 he was appointed Deputy Grand Master by the late Hon. James Shannon Clift, who was, at that time, District Grand Master.  
Seven years later the Most Worshipful Grand Master, H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, appointed him, on the death of Mr. Clift, District Grand Master; which office he held until his death, in 1908.  
In 1878, in conjunction with the late Hon. A. M. Mackay, Provincial Grand Master, he laid, with Masonic honors the corner stone of St. Andrew's Church. During a visit to England, some few years later, in an audience with the Most Worshipful Grand Master, the Prince of Wales, he received from him an autograph portrait of His Royal Highness, which has ever since adorned the walls of our Lodge room. In June, 1885, he laid the corner stone of our first Masonic Temple, and, in December of the same year, he performed the dedication ceremony. In August, 1894, he laid the corner stone of our present Temple, and dedicated it on St. George's Day, in 1897.  
During his visit to England, in connection with the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria, he presented, on behalf of the Free Masons of Newfoundland, an address to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, Grand Master. On this occasion he was elevated to the rank of Privy Councillor, and the Free Masons of Newfoundland assembled on the 24th of June and passed a resolution of congratulation, which was transmitted to him by cable.  
On the occasion of his visit to South Africa, in 1899, he was received with marked attention and kindness by several of the Lodges there and, on his return, an address of thanks was forwarded by the District Grand Lodge to the South African Lodges.  
In 1900, on attaining his Masonic Jubilee, he was presented by the Lodges under his jurisdiction with a Golden Loving Cup.  
As it was in St. John's Lodge that he first saw the light of Masonry, it was fitting that he should there end his Masonic career. His last appearance in a Masonic Lodge was at the installation in December, 1907.  
He was for many years President of the Tasker Educational Fund. He was also President of the Masonic

Hall Joint Stock Co. since its formation.  
The inscription on the Memorial is from the pen of our lamented brother, District Grand Registrar Alexander J. W. McNelly, and forms, I believe, his last inscription of a public character.  
**MEMORIAL UNVEILED.**  
At the conclusion of the address Mrs. Clift came forward and gracefully drew aside the veil and exposed to view the handsome Memorial. It is of bronze, 8 feet by 6. The design is very artistic and was done by an English firm under the direction of Bro. T. J. Duley, D. G. D. of C. It will stand in the east of the Lodge behind the Master's chair. At the conclusion led by D. G. D. C., Bro. Duley, the brethren gave the Grand Honours to the "Memory of our Illustrious Brother."  
Mr. Clift, on behalf of the Grand Lodge, presented Lady Whiteway with a life size oil painting of her late husband. It is a duplicate of the one now hanging in the Hall, and was originally in the possession of Bro. A. F. Shirran whose family presented it to the Lodge.  
A sweetly voiced solo, "P a l m Branches," was then sung, feelingly and faultlessly, by Miss Strang.

The closing address was given by Mr. Herbert Rendell, W.M. Designated "Whiteway" Lodge, which will be inscribed on this evening.  
Dr. Rendell said, in part:—  
Deeply as I appreciate the honorable and responsible position which has been assigned to me, I must address you in another capacity than that of Master Designate of Whiteway Lodge, though inseparably associated herewith, for another honour has been conferred upon me and a heavier responsibility has been gently laid upon my shoulders. Lady Whiteway has asked me to speak on behalf of herself and family, and, in doing so, referred to me as one of Sir William's oldest friends. That remark will ever be a treasured memory. I only mention it now because it seems to me so characteristic of the great Mason who has gone from us, that gentle, kindly manner he had when conferring in honour, almost making one believe that, in receiving it at his hands, one was doing him the honour; and because it shows so clearly that his impress has been deep chiselled upon those he loved so dearly and yet left without a murmur at the summons of the Most High.  
I am but feebly and inadequately expressing the sentiments of those to whom I refer when I say that this memorial to our late District Grand Master, and to their idolized husband and father, not only tends to soothe their sorrow and allay their grief, but it sends a deep vibration of gladness to their hearts to know that his brother Masons have, in some measure, formed a just estimate of the man as they knew him, and as I know him, of those internal qualifications which we, as Masons, hold in such high esteem.  
It may be that the Valkyries have already borne him to the halls of Valhalla, that can only be seen from higher and more distant peaks than ours, and probably will never be given his dear ones to know. Therefore, they welcome this present expression of esteem all the more warmly, all the more gladly; and bid me say to you that in the long years to come, when life's fires are burning low, the memory of this evening will be as it were a bright radiance to them, some gleam from which, they trust, may be permitted to reach their loved one.  
In the unavoidable absence of Bro. Stott, the Deputy D.G.M., Bro. S. Collier, D.G.S.W., presented to Mrs. Clift a handsome engraved card case, in memory of her unveiling the Memorial; the D. G. M. briefly replying in her behalf.

Sir William Vallance Whiteway, P.C., K.C., LL.D., took place. Deceased was District Grand Master for 29 years, viz. from 1878 to 1908. There was a large gathering of the brethren and special invitations had been extended by the D. G. M. to a large number of the lady friends of the members, their wives and daughters. The front seats were occupied by Lady Whiteway, Miss Whiteway, Mr. Max Whiteway, Mr. Justice Johnson and Mr. Vallance. The District Grand Master, Right Worshipful J. A. Clift, entered the Lodge accompanied by the District Grand Master Scottish Constitution, the Grand Representative of the Royal Arch Chapter of Nova Scotia, the officers and members of the District Grand Lodges and representatives of Shannon Chapter. The D. G. M. of Ceremonies, Mr. T. J. Duley, led the grand honors for the D. G. M. Rev. J. Thackeray, Chaplain of St. John's Lodge, then offered prayer, whereupon the hymn "O God our help in ages past" was sung. Bro. Clift, the W.D.G.M., then delivered the address. He said:  
"We are assembled this evening for the purpose of paying a humble but lasting tribute of respect to the memory of one who for thirty years held the highest position in our fraternity in this Colony under the jurisdiction of the United Grand Lodge of England, and one who performed his duties as such with marked distinction and with more than ordinary acceptance to the Craft. WASHINGTON, To-day.

They have no seeds to plant, no animals, no plowing. This condition of affairs has gone so long they have lost all desire for work. There were people walking either side roadway coming and going. They were all beggars and starving. A few years ago the majority had been successful farmers, now they have absolutely nothing. There was not a day we did not pass two or three bodies of men, women and children lying on the road. When people got tired and gave up, they simply dropped down where they were and died. They did not even go to raised track on side but dropped in roads where they lay buried. These were some of the observations of Jameson, Red Cross Engineer, sent to inspect the famine district in China and to report on the possibility of flood prevention in Hwai Valley. These appalling conditions apply to three million people. Unless outside relief is instantly forthcoming he declared, untold thousands of these must die before the scanty new crops are ripened and gathered.

ST. BON'S WIN OVER FEILDIAN'S BY SIX GOALS TO THREE.

In the League Hockey Match last night the St. Bon's and Feildians contested, and possibly the fastest game for the season ended in the victory for St. Bon's by 6 goals to 3.  
The attendance was not as large as at former games, but those who were present certainly received the worth of their money. The line up was:—  
St. Bon's—S. Walsh, goal; Hearn, point; Godden, cover; Thompson, rover; Collins, right; D. Walsh, centre; Shortall, left.  
Feildians—N. Hunt, goal; G. Hunt, point; Collier, cover; Pinsent, rover; Strong, right; Lilly, centre; P. Winter, left.  
When the referee's whistle opened the game the Feildians were on the disc with a rush and took it up the rink but Thompson checked their attempt at scoring and passed to Walsh who took it to Feildian territory but Hunt repulsed him and there was a general mix up. Collier was sent to the "fence" for slashing, and after some exciting play Collins passed to Thompson who banged the rubber into the net and scored first blood for St. Bon's, 6 minutes after the game opened.  
The Feildians in trying to equalize put up very fast play. Pinsent and Winter made clever attempts to score but were deftly foiled, and Walsh, in goal, who was kept busy for some time, put up a splendid defence of the net. Shortall now secured the rubber and passing all opponents put in No. 2 for St. Bon's.  
After the rubber was again put in play, Collier took a smart run with the disc but was beaten by Walsh when he tried for goal. D. Walsh now visited Hunt but was blocked, when on making another trial he succeeded and sent in the 3rd goal for St. Bon's amidst great applause.  
Good play marked the end of the half but no further scoring occurred, and the teams crossed:—  
St. Bon's, 3 goals; Feildians, 0.

### SECOND HALF.

This opened with lively play on both sides, when Collins gave all a surprise by hitting up No. 4 for St. Bon's a couple of minutes after the rubber was put in play.  
Just three minutes later Thompson beat Hunt and scored the 5th goal.  
Play again became fast and exciting and after Godden had been penalized for slashing, the Feildians put up a fine spurt and it fell to Collier to put up their first goal which he did in capital style.  
Soon after Walsh got a fine run with the rubber and scored the 6th and last goal for St. Bon's.  
Both teams now got in some strenuous work; Hearn was penalized for rough play, Strong broke his skate, and Thompson quit to equalize this deficiency for the Feildians. ### Seven Frozen to Death

In Oklahoma and Three in Kentucky Mountains.

Delhart, Texas, Jan. 16.—Seven persons are reported to have been frozen to death in what is known as "No Man's Land," in the extreme southwestern corner of Oklahoma, during the recent blizzard. Five members of one family were found dead on a farm near Guyton, Okla., the body of Henry A. Alla, a farmer, was found in a route near Hooper, Okla., and a "freighter" was frozen to death while en route from Ochiltree, Texas, to Liberal, Kansas.

Hazard, Ky., Jan. 16.—Snow bound in their mountain cabin home, the three children of Mrs. Nancy Allen Fuzzy, of Grapevine, near this town, perished from cold, and Mrs. Fuzzy was found lying unconscious beside the frozen bodies on the floor. A neighbor noticed that no smoke issued from the chimney and dug his way through the snow into the cabin. A search revealed the fact that there was neither food nor fuel in the hut. Efforts to revive the mother have proven unavailing.
