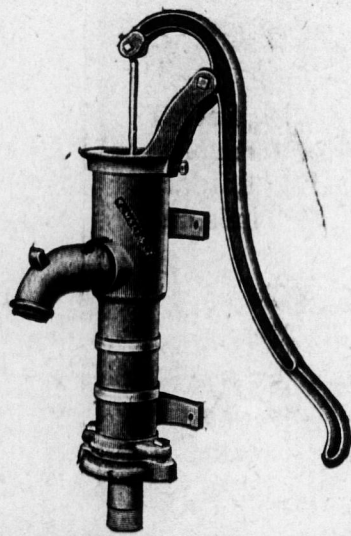

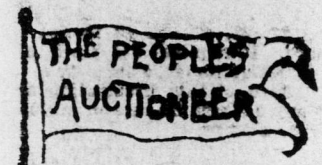

**What Is "A Decent Bringing Up?"**

BY RUTH CAMERON.

A little group of women were discussing the subject of race and the other day. One woman, who has been married four years and has a family to match, said with a good deal of vigor that she thought that these women who were married three or four years before they had any children at all were absolutely wicked.

And then, of course, someone spoke up with that familiar argument behind which so many young married women who avoid motherhood try to shelter themselves:—"I think it's a good deal worse to have children when you can't afford to bring them up decently."

Now to my mind there's a good deal to that argument.

And yet I don't think it's any excuse at all for many of the women who justify themselves by it.

You think those two statements are inconsistent? Not a bit. It certainly isn't kind to bring children into the world when you can't afford to bring them up decently. But it is these women's idea of "decently" with which I quarrel.

By a "decent bringing up" they do not simply mean enough good food to build a healthy body, enough education to develop an intelligent mind, and enough care and training to help form the kind of character a good citizen ought to have.

Indeed no.

When they say they can't afford to have children because they can't bring them up decently, they mean they can't afford to usher them into the world with all the fuss and fandango with which the modern baby often makes

his advent even into the most modest home; that they cannot afford to surround their children's babyhood with all the paraphernalia with which their wealthier friends make babyhood complex and unnatural; that they cannot afford to give them as children all the expensive playthings, the fancy trills of education, the fine gowns in which to ape their elders, and the lavish supply of spending money which the modern child must have "because all the other children do."

The proprietress of one of those little shops at which the school children of the town do most of their trading told me it was really amazing how much money the children even of modest homes had to spend.

"There are dozens of children that have a penny or two every day," said she, "and some have a dime a day, and there's one boy from up your way that comes in with a quarter almost every morning."

I remember when I was a little girl another little girl told me that she and her cousin, who was visiting her, were each to have a penny a day for a week. Ever after, that girl was a marked person to me—my youthful idea of a plutocrat.

And yet I had a very happy childhood.

I wonder if children nowadays couldn't manage to have a happy and profitable childhood without all these luxuries and trills which we have come to consider part of "a decent bringing up."

Yes, my friends, it may be some excuse for avoiding motherhood that you really can't afford to bring up a child decently, but is it any excuse that you don't want to undergo the least self-denial or loss of freedom yourself, or that you can't give a child every luxury and pleasure and still you might enjoy giving?

### Home News From Abroad.

According to an Ottawa despatch of last Thursday, no mention of which was made in the Government cable messages which reached this office, an International Tribunal will sit at Washington on April next to arbitrate upon the outstanding pecuniary claims between the governments of Great Britain and the United States. The agreement was made on August 18th, 1910.

According to the despatch, "The United States set up a great many claims against Great Britain, arising out of happenings in various British dominions. There are numerous claims against Newfoundland, most of them for repayment of various impositions upon United States fishing vessels paid under protest and which in consequence of the decision of the Hague Tribunal upon the Atlantic Fisheries question, the United States contend should be refunded. These claims do not aggregate a great amount in money, and it is said that there is a strong probability that they will be adjusted without recourse to the Tribunal."

Surely, it is time the public of Newfoundland were afforded some information. It is a strange feature of the way the Government is handling this matter that the only information available as to the present standing of the matter comes from abroad.

### Fish Held Back.

Several crafts from northern outports arrived here this morning with cargoes of fish. They report that the weather to the northward this season has been the worst in the history of the country, and that the greater portion of the fish caught this year will be kept in "salt bulk" until next spring to be "made" as the fishermen are of the opinion that all the warm spurts for curing purposes this season have passed. This will mean that a smaller amount of dry fish than usual will be marketed this fall.

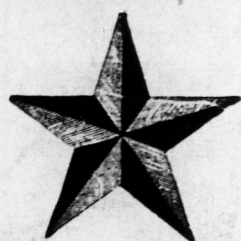
### Wedding Gift

Sir David Burnett was elected Lord Mayor of London on Saturday.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.  
Lieut. Rockwell and Sergt. Scott, of the Signal Corps, both attached to the Army Aviation Corps, are dead as a result of an accident in an army aeroplane.

MONCTON, To-Day.

BELFAST, To-Day.

In an interview, Sir Edward Carson said, it is in no spirit of defiance we take this pledge, but in a determination with God's help to keep what we have got, defeating a wicked conspiracy against Irish civil and religious liberty that endangers a free and blameless God-fearing people. The Government for party purposes proposes to deprive us of our constitutional rights. It says we must submit to a constitution which has never been submitted to us or to the electors of the United Kingdom. The thing is absurd. We have equal rights. We have an equal share in all that belongs to the British Empire. We receive equal justice. That is what we are asked to give up, in order that here may be in this country an ascendancy of one religion over another, an ascendancy which we have been attempting to put down through all these past centuries. We are asked to accept what is admitted by a subordinate parliament of the Empire, to dissolve a partnership with the richest Exchequer in the world, to surrender our part in the direction of imperial affairs, an expansion for which all who have gone before us have shed their blood and to have our lily lives managed by those who have never been anything but a disloyal faction. No part of the great United Kingdom is to be ours. It is policy is persisted in, there is no length to which we may not be compelled to go, no sacrifice we may not be compelled to make. You cannot coerce a nation for being loyal. This question arose at the time of the American war, when our soldiers were sent to coerce our own fellow subjects. History may repeat itself. It is worth remembering that when our friends and supporters of John Greene, who is missing since September 2nd, and for whose whereabouts there is a hundred dollars reward offered, made their final tour of the country roads yesterday to try and locate his body, but without result. The search party scoured the roads and hunted the woods carefully, despite the unpleasant conditions, but after a search of several hours had to give up.

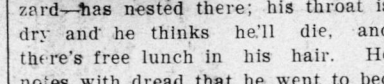

BELFAST, Sept. 29. The culminating day of protest against Home Rule opened with absolute calmness, which rendered Unionists and Home Rulers alike nervous as to what might happen. The town was gaily decorated, the Union Jack being everywhere predominant. Most of the shops and the big industrial works were closed. The spirit of unity prevailing among the Protestants was illustrated by the selection as officiating clergyman of Rev. Dr. McLean, formerly Presbyterian Moderator, who was assisted by ministers belonging to the Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational churches. Sir Edward Carson sat at the preacher's right, and the Lord Mayor of Belfast at his left.

A semi-military aspect was not lacking, as two picked stalwart members of the Unionist clubs and Orange lodges wearing bright sashes, acted as a guard of honor standing about the pulpit, while 500 of what is known as the reserve guard occupied seats in the gallery.

Among the notable personages present were Lord Bessford, who was greeted with loud cheers. Capt. Craig, M. P., reminded the audience that the service was a religious one, and Sir Edward Carson, who is to be looked upon as such in the real sense of the word.

Rev. Dr. McLean, in the course of his sermon declared that the Irish question at the bottom was a war against Protestantism and an attempt to establish Roman Catholic ascendancy in Ireland and to begin the disintegration of the British Empire by securing a second Parliament in Dublin. Ulstermen were ready to accept almost any programme of social or political reform but would not have Home Rule.

Similar services were held in churches and chapels in the city of Belfast and the villages in the counties of Ulster.

Sir Edward Carson on Saturday wrote his name as the first to sign the solemn covenant of Ulstermen, which binds them to use all means necessary to defend Home Rule and to refuse to recognize the authority of an Irish Parliament. He was followed by many other leaders in the campaign, whose names were attached by thousands of the rank and file from the northern provinces of Ireland.

The scene around Ulster Hall, when Carson proceeded to sign the covenant, was a remarkable one. The approach to the Hall was lined by a guard of men, wearing sashes and armlets, carrying wooden staves. Other men were posted around the ground much as though an attack from the Nationalists was expected. Thus far, however, those stood by as much pleased with the semi-military display as the Ulstermen themselves. Many women signed the declaration associating themselves with the men in uncompromising opposition to the Home Rule Bill.

During the course of the day Carson received many messages conveyed by despatches, riders and signa corps, from the various parts of Ulster, informing him of the progress being made. A message from the Lord Primate was received and publicly read. "My God give you Ireland's faithful sons in trying to save our beloved Nation and Law from the degradation and disaster of religious strife and civil war."

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Sept. 29. The ball, which was to have taken place at Balmoral, has been cancelled at the last minute. The reason is understood to be that the king was engaged in consultation with Sir Edward Grey and Mr. Bona Law over the political situation. The Radical papers suggest that Bona Law was summoned to Balmoral because the king was either unprepared or alarmed at the open threats of rebellion in Ulster, or annoyed at a ceremonial incident in Sir Edward Carson's progress in Belfast. The Unionist press thinks that Law's presence at Balmoral is accounted for by foreign rather than domestic policy. The Standard says it cannot be overlooked that there are grave international circumstances and possibilities in which both this country and Russia are deeply interested. Events in the near East are serious and concern all the European Powers, whilst certain possibilities, which have been referred to, must long ago have been the subject of correspondence between representatives of Britain and the Powers, whose interests lie along parallel lines.

Special Evening Telegram.

BELFAST, Sept. 29. Prior to embarking for England Sir Edward Carson delivered a speech in which he said he did not know under what circumstances he would return to Belfast. If it were to be for peace he preferred it; but if it were to fight he would not shrink. We have already, he added, which have put our enemies in such difficulty that to night they are asking what our enemies are doing to do. Our enemies better make up their minds on one thing—not to interfere with Belfast.

LONDON, Sept. 29. The battle cruiser, New Zealand the gift of the dominion to the Imperial Navy, laid down in 1910, will be run on her preliminary trial tomorrow and leave next day for Devonport. She will make a call at South African ports before taking up homeward service.

CHRISTIANA, Norway, Sept. 29. Capt. Amundsen, the discoverer of the South Pole, has postponed his proposed North Pole expedition, owing to the illness of the oceanographic investigator who is to accompany him.
