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

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

Close Scrutiny Essential.

The demises, grants, agreements to make concessions, to give powers, and to exempt from taxation, which are contained in the Deal, now subject to the approval and confirmation of the Legislature, before they can become effective and be turned into law, are on such a colossal scale that it will behove the members of the Legislature to subject the Deed and the Resolutions and the relations of one to another to the closest scrutiny. Moreover, in reply to a question asked by Mr. Lloyd, the Prime Minister stated that the Resolutions confirming the agreement had been drafted at the request of the Government, by the Solicitor of the House, who had a result of Embolism.



THE HAGUE, April 23. -It is rumoured in military and diplomatic circles here that the closing of the Belgian and Dutch frontier to traffic of all kinds, outward and inward bound, is connected with im portant German troop movements in Belgium. It is hinted in variou quarters in the Hague that the Ger mans are about to fall back on the Liege line, thus relieving a number of troops for possible use against Italy, in the event of that country in tervening in the war. There is no confirmation of the rumor.







And He Was a Leper.

A man whose life of supreme value and heroism was too little known to his fellows has passed away with the death from leprosy of Sir George Turner. He entered the Civil Service of Cape Colony as Medical Officer of Health in 1895, at the age of fifty, and in the next twelve years placed the Colony under a debt which it can never forget. Koch had been earnestly engaged in seeking a preventive for rinderpest for the Cape Government, but was recalled before his work was finished. Turner took his place, produced an effectual serum, and within a year of its discovery the outbreak in the Union had been stamped out. Rhodes supplied means for carrying on the work until Rodesia and Egypt had similarly benefitted, and before it finished Turner had saved the Gov-

Pretoria had a leper asylum, and in his spare time Turner worked there ceaselessly, trying to alleviate thel ot of the lepers and winning their deep devotion. When he retired it was only to seek in the laborator ies of this country a cure for the scourge. After several years of work at home he noticed one day marks on his hand that told him the worst. He lingered for three years, and in 1913 the King, on his own initiative, knighted him. His name will live with that of Father Damien while records remain of the ultimate sacrifice bravely made in relief of human suffering.




