





JOFFRE OPTIMISTIC.

HEADQUARTERS OF GENERAL STAFF IN FRANCE. General Joffre, to-day, received an Associated Press correspondent here for upwards of an hour, and talked freely and fully on many interesting current phases of the war. He expressed the view that the turning point of the great conflict had now here greaters.

Answers to the telegrams which he sent to the heads of the various Allied nations on the second anniversary of Britain's entry into war, have been received by King George. A message from Emperor Nicholas of Russia, dated at General Headquarters, said: "I am equally determined that we in Russia shall make good the sacrifices which my brave troops and people have given to the just cause, which will bring the reward we seek, and that peace for which we fight shall be secured by complete victory over our enemies." From the Emperor of Japan: "After all the trials of a great defensive battle the indomitable armies of the Allies are now marching forward steadily and successfully on all fronts. London, To-day.

One of the biggest demonstrations by working men that has occurred during the war, took place at Trafaigar Square to-day. The great gathering demanded reprisals for the execution of Captain Fryatt, of the British steamer Brussels by the Germans in Belgium. Speakers urged the impounding of all German property and the hanging of Emperor William, Admiral Von Tirpitz and Governor-General Von Bissing, of Belgium, as "Common Malefactors" before the conclusion of peace. Shipwrecked Crew Arrived.

By Saturday night's train Capt. Wilson and crew of the s.s. Samuel Blandford, which was lost in St. Mary's Bay, reached town. The particulars to hand of the wreck corroborates the story, though brief, already told. The ship was coming from New York to St. John's with a cargo of coal and on Thursday night last, between ten and eleven o'clock, during a thick fog, the vessel struck the Keys near St. Mary's. So foggy was it that the bow of the ship was not discernible from the bridge. She was going slowly when she struck. At first she only grazed the rocks, but when she only grazed the rocks, but when she started to settle aground amidships the stokehold became flooded. The ship then began to leak badly all along the bottom. It was useless to stay operating the pumps as it was impossible to cope with the inrush of water. Ere long Capt. 
