



OTTAWA, July 31.

The was is costing the people of Great Britain the gigantic sum of \$35,930,000 per day, or \$1,455,000 every hour, or nearly \$25,000 a minute, according to advices received from the British Ministry of Information by the Director of Public Information here. The British national debt increased during the year from \$3,225,000,000 to \$39,800,000,000, or an excess of twelve times over, and yet she is paying all and much more than all her debt charges out of current taxation. Before the war the people of Great Britain paid taxes amounting to approximately \$1,000,000,000 a year; to-day they are paying taxes to the tune of \$3,270,000,000 annually. In spite of this Great Britain raised her third war loan of \$5,000,000,000.



So Germany falls back on the hope of using Belgium as a "pawn." She will trade it for something she otherwise cannot get. The most obvious trade would be for her late colonies, It is Great Britain chiefly who must have the Germans out of Belgium as a matter of military security; and it is Great Britain chiefly who holds the captured German colonies. Whatecould be a more obvious chance for a "swap?" The German theory is that, when the war closes, Great Britain will hold the sea, but Germany will hold Belgium.
