Hints to Home Decorators.

The decorating of the home is a fine art, the best results can only be obtained by careful study of surroundings the following hints may be helpful.

If your room faces North use a Warm Coloured Paper such as Brown, Yellow, or Red.

For rooms which get a good deal of sunshine, paper of cooler shades such as Greys and Blues may be used.

Care should be taken to Harmonize Your Wall Papers with the Paints. Fawns and Tans usually blend nicely with natural wood finish or grained doors and wood-work.

Remember Green is Nature's Colour for a Decorative Background, and Green Papers of the softer shades, usually contrast well with rugs, curtains, and pictures particularly if the latter have gilt frames.

Small Rooms may be made to look larger by the use of Striped Papers.

On low ceilings only use a narrow bordering, or perhaps better again a drop ceiling of white paper which joins up almost unnoticeably with the white ceiling, and so gives the room the appearance of more height than it really has.

"Yes, were," says Hal, hotly. "You are not going to now! I'd kill him first. I'd—I'd rather kill you!"

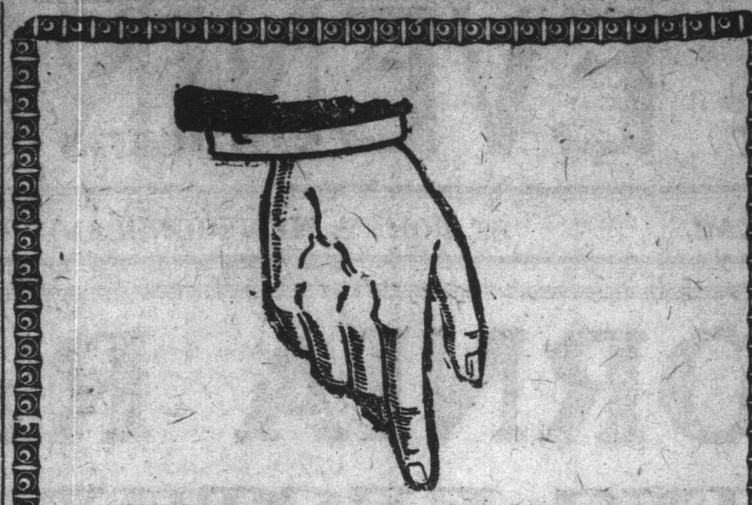
"Ah!" and she clings to him passionately—"if you would! If I could die here, now," and she lays her hand on his heart.

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Another War Imminent.

Allies Break With Germany Over Indemnity.

British, French and Belgian Armies Invade Germany--Penalties of Versailles Treaty Will be Enforced--Blockhouse Border Line for Ulster--His Holiness the Pope Speaks on Irish Matters.

WILL APPLY PENALTIES.
Application of penalties on Germany for non fulfillment of her reparations requirements was decided upon by the Allies here this afternoon.

LONDON, March 7.
Negotiations over the German indemnity were broken to-day, action to-morrow with a march of British, French and Belgian forces into Germany, and the occupation of a large section of her richest manufacturing country. Even now the Allied troops are on the move, for a Berlin despatch says that French troops will occupy Dusseldorf, and advance to within six miles of the city. The Allied ultimatum was accepted apparently with reluctance by the British Prime Minister. The French do not appear to be reconciled, while the Germans left Lancaster House, where the conference has been held plainly depressed to take their train for home to-morrow. The long sittings of the conference culminated on the final break before Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Wilson wrote telegrams ordering the members at the front to execute the orders already given to them. Dr. Brüning's Foreign Secretary presented an alternate plan whereby Germany agreed to pay annuities for five years as demanded in the ultimatum, and also an equivalent of the proposed twelve per cent. tax on exports, but clung to the conditions for retention of Upper Silesia and world wide freedom of German trade. Lloyd George, in delivering judgment for the Allies, said they deeply deplored the necessity of the decision, while Dr. Brüning clung to the last contention that the Paris demands were impossible for Germany to fulfil. The Allies regarded the German course as strategy for delay, and their latest plan as one to be reconsidered and debated after five years when Germany might hold a more favourable position. Dr. Brüning finally asked for further time in which to consult the German Cabinet. This was denied. The French army will furnish the bulk of forces for the new march into Germany. Great Britain's contribution in men will be only large enough to show her solidarity with the Allies. The United States' Government's attitude toward the new enterprise is awaited with interest. The general feeling in Great Britain appears to be one of relief without enthusiasm. The Prime Minister explained the position to the House of Commons to-night in a speech in which there was no note of jubilation. The majority of British newspapers have taken the line that the most important point involved was that the Allies should stand together, while the French press has voiced its fears that Lloyd George might desert France. All recognized that if M. Briand returned to Paris bearing burdens of con-

cession to Germany his Premiership was doomed.

TO OCCUPY GERMAN TERRITORY.
PARIS, March 7.
The hour for advance of Allied troops to occupy Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhr will be at daybreak to-morrow, it was announced to-night.

TROOPS ARRIVING.
BERLIN, March 7.
The first contingent of French troops assembled to participate in occupation of Dusseldorf is reported to have arrived at Benrath, six miles south of Dusseldorf.

ALLIED TROOPS ORDERED TO MARCH.
LONDON, March 7.
Allied troops will march into Germany to-morrow in accordance with the decision of the Allies to inflict on Germany penalties provided for because of her non fulfillment of her reparations obligations. It was announced officially this evening after the Germans left the conference. Late in the afternoon British, French and Belgian Premiers telegraphed orders for immediate occupation by Allied troops of Ruhr, Duisburg and Dusseldorf.

THE POPE ON IRELAND.
ROME, March 7.
Pope Benedict, in his allocution delivered at the Secret Consistory to-day, alluded to Ireland having her ancient struggles renewed. There had been an outbreak of appalling violence and crimes in contradiction of laws and morality, the Pontiff declared "which we condemn by which ever side committed."

ANOTHER LABOR GAIN.
LONDON, March 7.
Another Labor gain is reported in Fenistone, Yorkshire West Riding, by-election, result of which was announced to-day. W. Gillis, Laborite, was elected to the House of Commons by a plurality of six hundred votes over Independent Liberal and Coalition Liberal candidates. The seat was previously held by Sidney Arnold, Liberal.

BORDER LINE FOR ULSTER.
LONDON, March 7.
Preparations are in progress for erection of a chain of military blockhouses to indicate the new boundaries of the Ulster area in Ireland under the new Home Rule Act, says a Belfast despatch to the Evening Star to-day. Government surveys have commenced in Clones, in North Monaghan County, near Fermanagh border, the despatch adds. Sites are being marked for a number of new stations for thirty thousand troops to six county areas. The stations will be two miles apart.

U.S.A. MEDIATOR.
SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, March 7.
An armistice between Panama and Costa Rica and final settlement of boundaries question is being negotiated through mediation of the United States government, it was announced here to-day.

RAILWAY STRIKE IN GREECE.
ATHENS, March 7.
All railroad communication was suspended in Greece to-day as a result of a strike affecting every line in the country. Men are demanding increased wages and shorter hours.

CANADA REDEMPTIVE BONDS.
NEW YORK, March 7.
The Canadian Government will pay off twenty-five millions of bonds that mature here on April first, it was officially stated here to-day. Canada has rather large balances here at the present time, but paying off this maturity will involve a shipment of certain amount of Canadian gold to New York. It is estimated that about ten millions in gold will be sent.

SOME DIVIDEND.
NEW YORK, March 7.
The Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal Company to-day declared special cash dividend of one hundred and fifty per cent. on its nine million, two hundred and ten thousand dollars worth outstanding.

Kyle's Passengers.
S.S. Kyle, Captain Tavernor, arrived from Louisburg yesterday at 1 o'clock after a very stormy passage, having had to contend with ice, fog and gales of wind the whole way. She brought a large mail, about two-thirds freight and the following passengers:—G. Meade, Capt. E. Seeley, J. J. Murphy, L. McLean, A. Ber, Miss M. Emilly, Col. Joseph MacMillan, Capt. R. Keeping, J. Petties, Miss M. Fiko, Mrs. Keeping, D. F. Darcy, G. Phillips.

Scholarships for Primary Grade.
The Royal Scarlet Chapter of Bay of Islands has voted two scholarships of ten dollars each for children of the Primary Grade obtaining the highest number of marks in the C.H.E. exams next June. In view of there being no prizes provided for Primary Grade in the rules and regulations of the C.H.E., this action of the Bay of Islands Scarlet Chapter is a very commendable one which might well be followed by other organizations.—Western Star.

Old Landmark Gone to Rest.

The oldest man in Codroy Valley, and probably on the West Coast, Capt. Magloire Blanchard, died at the home of his youngest son, Charles, Little River, on the 9th inst., at the ripe old age of 99 years, after an illness of only three days.

Seventy-odd years ago Capt. Blanchard moved from the land of his birth in Cape Breton to Grand River, Codroy, where he started a home in the heart of the forest. Although meeting with many hardships and sometimes very serious losses, he kept up the work of providing comfortably for his large family and improving his farm.

He was one of the most successful seal hunters of the Gulf sailing fleet and for many years prosecuted this one-time important industry and was always captain of his own schooner or some vessel out of Channel. Capt. Blanchard was the soul of honor. His word was his bond, and he despised a deceitful man. His home at Grand River was one of the places where the old and young, the tired and weary, the rich and poor, and the friend and stranger were always welcome. The free meals and lodgings given there would mean a very large amount in cash to-day. There was never any need to worry about money in your pocket when approaching the Blanchard home, hungry.

The parish church at Seaton was built on part of his farm with another part of the farm for the cemetery. He is one of the very few of whom it can be said that he made the farm, gave part of it for church and cemetery, and was laid to rest in the same cemetery after a very long and useful life.

Capt. Blanchard leaves to mourn their loss three sons in Newfoundland, one son and one daughter residing in Lowell, Mass., and a goodly number of grand-children and great-grandchildren here and elsewhere. His funeral was largely attended. Although the morning was very cold and roads in bad condition, the people at a distance, with about twenty teams, turned out, besides a great number of nearer neighbors on foot. Interment took place immediately after Requiem Mass at Seaton, on the 11th inst. R.I.F.—Western Star, Feb. 23.

Coaker's Regulations have reduced the sale of Newfoundland fish to Italy by 80 per cent. Norway, Iceland and France getting the preference because of the hold up made on the Italian market by Mr. Coaker and his advisers. But for the action of Messrs. Hickman, Moore and Mann in moving several cargoes to Italian ports in defiance of the regulations, not one cods tail of our fish would have entered into consumption in Italy during 1920. What then are the prospects for 1921, should Furey and Hawco be elected in Harbor Main on Saturday next? Electors there should study the above figures carefully and then vote for JONES and LEWIS.

How they Pulled Coaker's Leg in Lisbon

The latest joke along Water Street is that Mr. Coaker wired Mr. Collishaw a fortnight ago telling that he had everything fixed in Portugal and that some of the fish people in Oporto were giving him a banquet that night. They may have given him a banquet, but they certainly didn't give him a very favorable reception with regard to his plans for buying fish. The explanation is probably embodied in the subjoined extract from the London Times of February 12th, in which the Lisbon correspondent of that Journal describes the financial situation of Portugal, which country is suffering from very severe financial depression, and its people are not able to pay very high prices for foodstuffs.

PORTUGAL STRIVING AFTER FINANCIAL REFORM.


Lisbon.—"Business, not politics in the ordinary meaning of the word, dominated Portugal before the Armistice and dominates Portugal to-day. Not parties or policies, but contracts and concessions have determined the majority of the Ministerial changes and the protracted Cabinet crises that have marked the years since 1918. "These years have witnessed a striking contrast in the impotence of successive Governments to secure the amendment and adoption of the national Budget, and the forcing through Parliament of great financial, commercial, industrial, and agricultural transactions.—Bank concessions, railway concessions, transport schemes, contracts for the furnishing of foodstuffs and raw materials upon a great scale.

"Meantime successive ministers have striven vainly to secure the regularization of the national finances by the imposition of essential taxation. Government, with difficulty resisted amid the conflicting trade currents, and unsupported by any great mass of public opinion or by efficient party organization, have lacked strength to carry through the great financial reforms that the times demand. The great interests have grown and strengthened with the war. Before them no Minister has been strong enough to stand. Hence it is that successive Budgets remain unvoted, financial proposals remain proposals still.

"Meanwhile business itself has taken a new aspect. These years have seen what may be termed the Americanization of trade. Trade in Portugal has always favoured monopolies. Under a regime of privilege, virtual monopolies have developed in bread, water, lighting, transport, matches, tobacco, petroleum, and chemical manures. In the past the capital for the financing of these great businesses was in many cases foreign—not a little of it British—and in not a few cases the administration was also foreign. Thus a tacit alliance of Portuguese knowledge of local conditions and social and political influence existed side by side with foreign money and initiative. National capital, except upon a small scale, was wanting.

The Fruits of Coaker's Policy.

The most alarming news in connection with this year's fishery is that the manager of a prominent fishing concern on Southern Labrador, after a series of consultations with his principal the past week or two, decided to abandon his annual cod fishing venture in that area because the head of the firm cannot guarantee that the price of fish would be anything more than five dollars a quintal, and the manager argued very reasonably that at the present price of outfits he would lose thousands of dollars, even if he had a good catch, because no man could fit out and carry on the codfishery this year with fish only five dollars a quintal. This is one of the first and most direct results of the tragic muddle into which the Squires-Coaker Party have got this country by their crazy attempts to control our foreign markets by the notorious fishery regulations. To-day it is not possible to sell a quintal of Newfoundland fish in any market in Europe, except at a loss of five to six dollars a quintal. In Portugal, in Spain, in Italy, and in Greece the situation is the same. These countries are so stocked with Norwegian, French and Iceland fish, and so disgusted with the Squires-Coaker attempts to take them by the throat, that they refuse to trade in Newfoundland fish at all, if they can avoid it, and the only sales that can now be made are at such a tremendous loss as indicated above. During the past week or two attempts have been made to effect sales in all of these countries, but nowhere is it possible to obtain more than about half what the fish regulations fixed as the lowest price at which fish sales could be made. For instance, the fish regulation prices in Greece were from \$2 1/2 to \$7 1/2, and to-day we understand it is only possible to get forty shillings to forty-five shillings. But for the blundering of the Squires-Coaker Party; but for the attempts to take the people of Greece by the throat, and compel them to pay what the Squires-Coaker crowd thought fit, the whole of the fish required for that market could have been sold at profitable rates all through the fall and winter, but now scarcely anything can be done. Lent is half through, and after Lent the demand will drop off and there will be a tremendous lot of our fish intended for that market, which cannot be sold under any circumstances.

In Italy, the position is even worse. No sales are being made there at all, but stocks of fish are being put in on consignment to be sold for whatever they will fetch. The Italian market is already stocked with fish from other countries, and it is not human nature to expect that the Italians will pay high prices for our fish when they know they have us in their own hands, through our own bungling and stupidity, and when they are

fully aware also that we have such stocks of fish here in Newfoundland that we cannot get rid of them. Consequently the prospect for profitable sales of our fish in Italy is out of the question altogether. The calculation to-day is that if this fish sold on consignment brings forty shillings, it will be doing very well, and yet the regulation prices for Italy were fixed at seventy-five to eighty shillings, or twice the figure that is now possible. The story is that Messrs. Hickman, Moore and Munn sold their fish in December at sixty to sixty-five shillings, but in three months since then the price has dropped to forty shillings, a drop due entirely to the Italian Consorzio having stocked up with other fish, because they refused to be bulldozed by Coaker & Company into paying the rates he demanded for the Newfoundland article. Everybody knows the situation now; just as the Government was compelled at the end of December to take off the regulations with regard to Italy and allow everybody to sell as best he could, the Government is now being called upon to take off the regulations with regard to Portugal and permit the same thing to be done. The reason is the same—the Government policy has been ruinous to the country, and to prevent a frightful smash altogether the Government is now being asked to allow the trade to do business along sensible lines again. Sales are said to have been made in Portugal last week at about 36 shillings for Labrador fish, a figure that will mean a loss of six dollars a quintal for the people who had that fish and shipped it there, and if the opinion of Water Street is to be considered, things will grow very much worse yet, because there are about eighty thousand quintals of fish in that market at present, and as much more to follow, and under present conditions it will take at least six months to consume this stock, and before that, new fish will be offered. In Spain the position is even worse. Here is a market that was free and never "regulated." Last fall fish was fetching the very best prices there, but as the Coaker policy prevented fish from getting into Portugal, Italy and Greece, all that fish was diverted to Spain, the result being that to-day it is worse than even the markets that were regulated. Labrador fish is to-day fetching only 35 shillings and Shore fish only 50 shillings, or just half what these grades brought in September last. "By their fruits ye shall know them," and by the fruits of the Coaker policy will the present Government be judged by the country now and in the future. The people of Harbor Main will have an opportunity to judge them on Saturday, and every elector in that District should make up his mind to give his judgment against the Government and mark his ballots for the Opposition candidates.

Sample Falsehood.

Last night's Star had some reference to the election campaign in Harbor Main, in the course of which it was stated that Mr. Peter Cashin was at Topsail, Saturday, and openly stated that he had enough money to buy five hundred South Shore votes. This is a concoction for which there is absolutely no foundation whatever. Mr. Peter Cashin left here on Friday by the tug Ingraham to search for the missing schooner Tipperary, reported abandoned by her crew off Cape Race, and on Saturday, when the Star has him at Topsail looking to buy votes, he was actually in Trepassey Bay on the Ingraham, and did not arrive back here until Sunday. This is a sample of the sort of stuff the Star is putting out in the present campaign, and will enable the intelligent people of St. John's and of Harbor Main District to judge what reliance is to be put on anything it says.

Bragg recovered but Williams, after an hour, succumbed, having received about a quarter of a million dollars, which sum they are now endeavoring to illegally take from the pockets of the consumer by charging 25 cents per pound for Sugar, when the highest price should be not more than 12 cents.

\$35 for Three Loaves of Bread.

Newfoundland women have ever been noted for the excellence of their baking, and so gratifying are the results procured from the use of "Windsor Patent" flour that at the request of many of its constant users it has been decided to hold a bread-baking competition to see which lady in the island produces the par excellence loaf. Now, it must be remembered at the outset that the bread made from "Windsor" flour (the product of the largest mills in the Empire) is generally so uniform that it is going to be no easy task to judge the numerous entries which will doubtless be received, but still and by consent of C. J. Fox for the defendant, it is ordered that the matter be adjourned until Monday the 14th March at 11 a.m. The Court adjourned until tomorrow.

CARBONAR SELECTED.

The competition will be held at Carbonar on Thursday, April 7th, and the reasons for holding it in this progressive town are obvious for it must now be considered the hub of Conception Bay—being the terminus for the Heart's Content, Bad de Verde, and Shore branches of the railway—thus ensuring all entries in the competition being received in a fresh and satisfactory condition.

EVERY ONE MAY COMPLETE.

The competition is open to all parts of the island and entries from everywhere will be gladly welcomed, though we are asked to announce that the ordinary manufactured "baker's bread" while not debarred from being displayed yet is not eligible for prizes as the competition is confined to genuine home-made bread. Our readers are asked to remember that all entries must be baked from "Windsor Patent" flour only, and that the competition will be held at Carbonar on April 7th.

Parade Rink will be open to-night.

The second Carnival will take place to-morrow night. It is expected that a large number of people will be present, and the evening will be a most successful one.

Fish Situation.

ELIZEN LAKE STILL IN PORT. So far as can be learned, nothing new has developed regarding the schooner Elizen, excepting that the vessel is detained in port to-day, and is in charge of a Customs official. What it is required that the master can sail his schooner, under the clearance given him by the Customs officials at Port Union, it is possible that he may be induced to remain for the present, so as to prevent open defiance of the regulations by all the fish exporters. The Brazilian market received the consideration of exporters at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, when it was decided to reduce the price of fish for that market to 80 shillings. The original price was 102 shillings, which was later reduced to 90 shillings. Whether the reduction to 80 shillings will induce the Brazilians to buy more of our produce is doubtful. It would seem that the conditions of sale would affect them more than price, and in this connection it was reported that a West Coast firm had negotiated a contract for 2000 tons of fish, but were not permitted to ship the cargo because the buyers were giving 90 day notes instead of paying cash. Documents are being prepared for the shipment, and the regulations provide. In Italy the outlook is hopeless and a cable received on Saturday that the Norwegian steamer Venus 2, which is likely to further depress the price there and exporters fear that the large quantity of fish now in Godhavn, Greenland, will realize very little more than will pay for freight, demurrage and other charges. The whole outlook is of the bleakest.

Hockey Notes.

A feature of the game which was absent from previous games of the season, was the fact that not a single penalty was awarded throughout.

THE START.

Last year we wrote—for any man who has eyes to see, can see if he wishes, and we claim to be neither a prophet nor son of a prophet—the effect that the Government of Mr. Squires, built as it was in sections, would disintegrate once the cohesion between the segments loosened. Strangely enough the Cashin party on the other hand is built more substantially and it is towards this more substantial structure that the disintegrated section of the Squires party seem to be working.

The silence of the St. John's Press, (The Sun cannot have seen the Special Edition of the Star and Advocate for perusal in Harbor Mail only) the passing of the Herald, the probable passing of still another daily, are the straws that show how the political wind is blowing.

The main difficulty is the fact that nobody wants to be the Government at the present time. The Country is faced with a shortage of over three million dollars in its revenue this year. The work of Mr. Coaker's Railway Commission has far exceeded the scope of the million and half dollar loan voted last year, and to add to that the Government has been unable to float a loan either in England or America. There is the increased cost of Members' Salaries, Departmental Heads, Fishery and Trade Inspectors, which will add another million or more. Thus the country is faced with a burden of between Five and Six million dollars over last year.

Further all extra taxation returns are reduced, and the Excess Profit Tax, for instance, will yield but a very small revenue this year.

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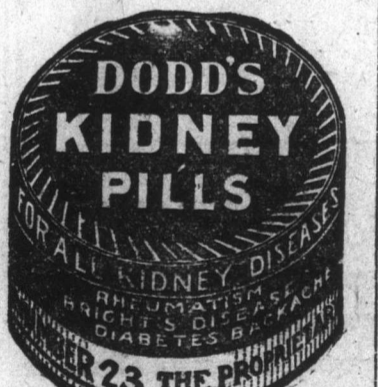
THE JOYOUS PAST.

Thought Signs.

Has the Earth a Tail?

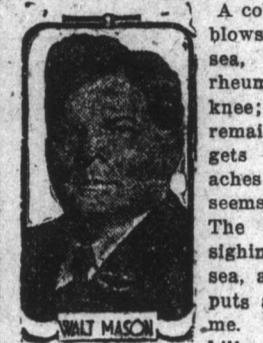

I sit and watch the sea-gulls wheel, and tell the world how tough I feel, describe the ache that racked my head last evening when I went to bed, detail the symptoms I possess, and analyze my soul's distress, and life seems weary and full to me, when dank winds come in from the sea. I might be freed from all my ills, they tell me, if I sought the hills, but then I'd have no good excuse for shedding tears to beat the deuce.

The Weight of Light.

It seems odd to talk of such an unsubstantial thing as light having weight.

Yet such has been proved to be the case, and the principal proof came from tests made during the famous eclipse of the sun, on May 29th, 1919. It was then shown that a ray of light had sufficient "body" in it to be acted upon by the sun to the extent of being displaced by a certain definite amount. The light, in short, might for all the world have been matter, but matter of an extremely "light" kind.

That being so, a facetious reader might ask how much of it goes to the ounce. But a brilliant astronomer has been able to calculate even that; it is an appalling amount.

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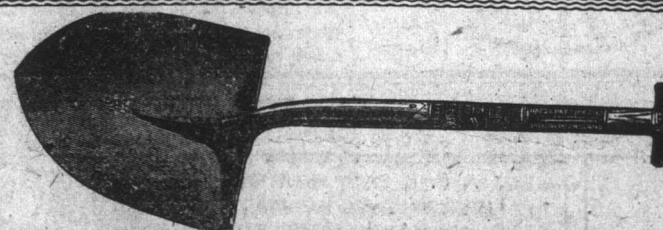
