



The Martyrdom of St. Alban.

On June 18, A.D., 303, Alban, an ear-

ly Christian, suffered martyrdom at the site now occupied by the Cathedral of St. Alban's in Hertfordshire. When the Romans first came to Britain they found a town (now called St Albans) which was named Verulanium. A great battle was fought here in B.C., 54 in which the Romans were victor ious. In A.D., 43 the Romans again came to Britain and Verulanium was chosen by them as their headquarters and military centre. Verulanium was the first Roman city built in Britain and it was fortified by means of walls and towers. The walls, parts of which still remain, were 12 feet thick and 20 feet in height. Verulanium and Pompeli were built almost exactly as regard shape, dimensions, arrangements of streets and positions of build ings. In A. D. 61 the insurrection unhowever, the persecution ceased, and church upon the site of the martyrdom in 313-and this is the origin of the well-known Cathedral of St. Albans, which attracts many sightseers from







FRENCH POLICE GET DESERTER

GENEVA. (Associated Press.)wealthy Frenchman, F. Bertrand, described as a deserter, has been arrested here at a moment when he had practically one foot on either side of the Swiss and French frontier line, in a cafe that straddles the border. The cafe is in the village of Saint Julien on the international boundary. Part of the building is in Switzreland and seeking visitors from other countries part in France. Early in the war Bertrand settled in Geneva where his accusers aver, he made a large fortune trading with Germany. He bought a villa and several automobiles and led a life of pleasure. He said he was more German than French, and took pleasure in speaking against France, particularly in the cafe at Saint Julien where, safe on Swiss territory in one of the drinking rooms, he could be overheard and even seen by the French police in th rooms on the French side. There the French listened to his annoying tall but, unable to catch him on the French side, they could not arrest him. Bertrand boasted that-when there was no police about—he could enter France and return without a passport.
