



Largest Oil Tank Covers

TWENTY ACRES.

Covering an area of 20 acres and with a capacity of 1,750,000 barrels, the world's largest oil storage tank s nearing completion at Wilmington, The concrete tank rises only eight feet above the ground, half of it being below the surface. The roof will be supported by wooden poles set in concrete blocks in the bottom of the tank, also of concrete.

Winnipeg's

WINNIPEG, Oct. 8 .- A total of 1,074 men and women were committed by the courts of Manitoba to the custody of the provincial jail during the 12 month period which ended August 31 this year, according to the annual report issued by C. J. Downie, governor of the institution. Increases for the number of prisoners committed for immoral conduct, assault, drunk and disorderly, contempt of court, theft, and false pretences were recorded. Breaches of the Temperance Act, Narcotic Drugs Act, driving a car while drunk, and burglary increased. The report recommends the installation of a "locked" hospital for the care of drug addicts, so that friends of the prisoners may be prevented from smuggling dope to them. It recommends also that prisoners suffering from social diseases be retained in the ail until they are cured, even though their terms expire while they are undergoing treatment.

Ship Uses Suction to Catch Fish

Now being fitted out in New York a ship equipped with a recently invented mechanical fishing device, whereby the catching of large quanninimum expense can be accomplish

How The Catcher Operates. The mechanical fish catcher consists essentially of a tube extending from the bow to the stern of the boat, emptying into a trap. An adjustable elescopic net is situated at the bow if the boat. This net leads to openfigs that are connected with the tube at either side of the bow. Within the tube an artifical current carries the fish and water into the trap. The current is created by an eight-inch centrifugal pump driven by a motor, causing a suction force at the forward end that helps pull in the fish. The equipment delivers approximately 66,000 pounds of fish and water a minute into the trap. Of this amount from 10 to 20 per cent should be fish, according to the inventors. Assuming a mean of 15 per cent., the tube will deliver 9,900 pounds of fish a minute when in a school. The water flows overboard, while the fish are retained in the netting of the trap. Going through a school with the equipment working, a tremendous amount of fish can be caught in a short time, its inventors say. The matter of getting into a school is considered simple, as the fish are not easily stampeded when travelling in very large numbers.

Big Increase in Welland Canal Tonnage

An increase of 115,444 tons of freight during the month of June over June, 1922, is recorded in the statistical report of navigation through the Weland Canal from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa. On the season's navigation a decrease of 26,920 tons to June 30 is shown over last year, but navigation opened this year on April 25, whereas it opened on April 17, 1922.

During the month the total tonnage of vessels passing through the canal was 550,471, an increase of 115,928 over June last year. Of this tonnage 149,768 tons was represented by Canadian steam vessels, an increase of 138,874 over last year. Canadian sail ing vessels represented 36,040 tons, a ecrease of 14,279 tons over last year Jnited States steam vessels using the canal had a tonnage of 59,758, while United States sailing vessels had onnage of only 4,905.



The industry would in part relieve the distress caused by the disappear-ing markets for salt fish; but the fishormen are in a very bad way owing to the heavy taxation on fish. The doc-tor, pointed out that he was always iticized for his propaganda against this heavy taxation, but that the handicap imposed upon the fishermen by it had created a very critical situation along the Labrador coast and was causing much distress.

Speaking of the humanitarian work of the mission, Dr. Grenfell said he was highly pleased with what had been accomplished by the various institutions during the season. The hospital work had been particularly valuable on account of the hardships, which the long lasting winter had imposed upon the country and the incount of abnormal storm and ice conditions. He expressed particular pleasure over the success of the new orphanages, one in the north and the other in the south of the Labrador. Sixty children had been given homes in these institutions and were making remarkable advancement in various branches of study.

Volunteer nurses and general staff had been left in the Labrador to carry on the work during the winter and the doctor is taking eight young men of the country to the United States, where they will take university courses and specialize in branches which will enable them to carry on the work of the mission at various points in their native land when their studies are completed.—North Syd-

The Japanese Disaster

It is probable that every marine insurance company in the world will lose something in the Japanese disaster. It is also likely that a year; er more may clapse before satisfactory proof of loss can be presented to the respective companies. To the foreign company the difficulties of language are well nigh insurmountable, as but few of the foreign staffs in Japan are able to do more than speak a few words of the Japanese language, and it is almost unheard of for anyone to read it.

A very delicate piece of apparatus which gravity varies from point to sel, but it is powerless to enforce a

point, at or near the earth's surface. mandate. A mass of heavy ore, even if buried in the ground, affects the pull of gravity on the instrument if this is placed near it, and affects two plumb bobs differently. One of these is at a lower level than the other, The two are connected and the system is ung up by a long, fine metal wire. The whole arrangement forms what known as a torsion balance.

The twist in the wire measures the rregularity in the action of gravity aused by the ore bed, by a neighoring hill, a cave beneath the surface, and so forth. By a careful study of the readings of the instrugent it is possible to find the best osition for sinking a mine shaft to ap the ore bed.

The water supply being of primary apportance is studied in respect to its size, source, its reservoirs, flow, sure, size and arrangement of the mains, the position of the hydmis, the possibility of their freezing, and every other essential matter. For example, in New York, it was found that the water supply was indequate to cope with the skyscraper afion, and likewise the conflagation hazard. In view of this they recommended an unlimited high pressure water system with the result that the City authorities installed a 72 inch salt water main in the congested part of the city, having as its source of supply the Hudson River. Several high powered pumping sta-tions' were placed along the water front, and it enables the authorities

to work a high pressure of no less-than 300 los, at all times.

Next, they consider the question of inadequate fire apparatus. Thanks to our Inspector General, the city of St. John's can now be said to pos ve apparatus for fighting fires, ust what this apparatus has saved
