





The foxes stayed on board until the steamer reached Curling, Newfoundland, and then deserted. A reward was offered by the Commander and one of the foxes was recaptured six miles from Curling by a Sergeant of Police. The other is still roaming in the woods at Curling. It is less than four months since
