New York, July 30.-The be threshine machine engine exploded yes-terday near Upper Sandusky, Ohio. One man was killed and three others badly in-

Fighting was resumed and still centinued on Sunday. The losses were heavy, 160 men being dead already. It is reported that over 300 barricades are erected in the heart of the city.

All honest loyal Canadians desire that the scandal should be immediately and thoroughly investigated; let every one, therefore, whatever his politics, sign the petitions. gust, but that the investigation into the Pacific fraud be prosecuted with-out delay. The gathering was large and influential, and on Tuesday the number of names attached to the petition exceeded all expectations.

### The Credit Valley Railway.

To-morrow the voting takes place upon the Credit Valley By-law in the townships of Erin, East and West Garafraxa, Pilkington, Nichol, and the villages of Orangeville, Fergus and Elora. The inhabitants of that sec tion have had the question placed before them most fully in all its aspects, and no doubt have thoroughly considered the question and made up their minds whether or not it is de their minds whether or not it is de-sirable to adopt the scheme proposed by the Credit Valley interest. Their decision has only now to be placed on record, and it is to be hoped that there will be a good majority either on one side or the other, so that the wish of the municipalities be unmis-takeably expressed, and the question be set at rest.
