Averting a Crisis. Our correspondent "Onlooker," whose letter was published on Wednesday last, is of opinion that Canada is paying too much for her Pacific railway. The amount to be paid for it, according to the original bargain of 1880-81, was in excess of what it will ever be worth to the country, but paying twenty-two and a half ministers and three sets of struggling ions more makes the whole business so much the worse. Like nearly all oppo nents of the present railway policy, "Onlooker" will have it that this fresh advance is not a loan, but a gift. There is a promise to pay, but no payment will ever be made. As far as any probability of payment is concerned, the twenty-two and a half millions might as well be thrown into the sea, or at all events set down as a gift to the company "free gratis for nothing," to use a popular and rather expressive bit of bad grammar.

The Intercelonial has not paid as a com mercial undertaking, and Canada's lien on the Grand Trunk for fifteen or twenty millions, with thirty years' interest thereon, is counted as so much waste paper merely; so says our correspondent. On which we may remark that the Intercolonial has

been "picking up" considerably of late, under careful management ; and now that we have it, we feel that we could not very well do without it. As for the loan to the Grand Trunk, we are candidly of opinion that the country has already had the worth of the money, in the shape of helping torward its development. Since the gobbling up of the Great Western and the Midland systems the Grand Trunk has become a gigantic monopoly ; and it is a melancholy fact that to the powerful aid given by the Globe and some leaders of the reform party, the success of the Grand Trunk's raid upon the two important systems named was largely owing.
