Her Money to Be Manipulated from Peter's CAIRO, Sept. 19 .- In accordance with the decision of Monday's conference regarding the Egyptian finances, in which Northbrook, Sir Evelyn Baring, Nubar Pacha and others took part, the ministry of finance yesterday gave orders that the revenues assigned to the Caisse de la Dette Publique for the redemption of the unified debt should be temporarily paid into the Egyptian treasury. The purpose is to enable the treasury to pay current expenses of government and the tribute to Turkey.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—The action of the Egyptian finance ministry in diverting therevenue assigned to the caises to the Egyptian treasury, has created a profound sensation. 




