It is said that during the argument of the boundary question the lords on the committee showed a lamentable ignorance of Canadian geography, and an anxious desire that counsel would not "bore" them with long speeches. 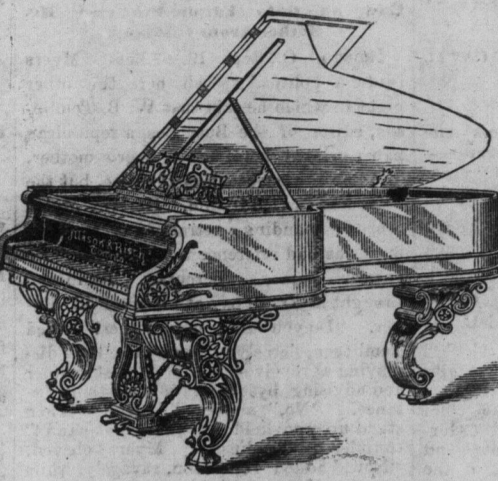
