> The introduction of smokeless powders has had considerable to do with a change of tactics on the field of battle. In the absence of the smoke screen on both sides, the company officers not only find it easier to work ogether, but can control their men and dge the effect of their fire on the enemy

to a far greater degree than was formerly possible. From their point of view this increased power of control more than compensates the attack for the increased facility of concealment smokeless powder confers on the defence. It is true that the latter also profits by the same increased power of con-trol, but they argue that from the nature of things the defence, striving only to prevent

being beaten, whereas the attack fights with the determination to win, the latter is in a position to make far better use of this new powder than the former. Put in another form, it comes to this: The heavier and more accurate the fire whistling over a trench, the harder it is to make men raise

their heads over it to take aim. Smokeless powder makes it easier for the attack to deliver such a fire; hence the difficulties of the defence will be increased.
