

CAN THE SECTS UNITE?

Interesting Discussion at the Toronto Ministerial Association's Meeting. The subject of discussion at yesterday's meeting of the Toronto Ministerial Association was "Denominational Unity; Can We Secure it for Canada?"

The debate was participated in by Bishop Campbell, Rev. O. Wallace, Rev. J. F. German, Rev. H. R. Keats, Rev. Stuart Acheson and Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, all of whom were hopeful of spiritual unity, but pessimistic as to uniformity of creed. It was their opinion that Cauada enjoyed a larger share of unity and Christian tolerance than any other country.




