THE SINS OF THE MOTHER

Visited Upon the Daughter, Who Shot Herself.

TRAGIC DEATH OF A NEW YORK GIRL.

A Canadian Woman Arrested For Complicity.

Fate of Lilly Low, the Daughter of a Gotham Millionaire, Her Mother Had Previously Murdered All of Her Offspring Excepting This Girl, and She Left Her Father and Her Death at the Hands of the Police.

New York, July 25.—Two little boys, picking black berries in the woods on Washington Heights, near Two Hundred-dred-street and Fort Washington, were found at about 10 a. m. yesterday.

As soon as the girl's father learned of her whereabouts he began to make inquiries, and Miss Hansen put it. He persisted in the idea that Lillian was being detained forcibly.

Finally, about 10 days ago, he sent Lillian home. He was informed that Lillian had intended to take legal means to secure her daughter, she explained that she had been found by the police.

At this time Miss Hansen and Lillian were arranging for a six weeks' trip to the mountains in New Hampshire, and the lawyer came to know that things should remain in abeyance until after the girl's return.

The visitor proved to be Dr. T. J. Biggs, who, when he had been told that Hansen was in the city, had come to the city to see her.

Dr. Biggs had Lillian with him, and although Miss Hansen did not know that the girl had been out of the house, he explained that she had been found by a policeman between 12 and 1 o'clock.

Lillian remained at home the greater part of the day, but she acted strangely, and Miss Hansen remembers many questions which were asked her.

From the publication of this letter in the morning paper, the identification of the woman was brought about. She is the daughter of James Low, jr., of 141 West Forty-fourth-st., New York.

Mr. Low subsequently identified her as the morgue. He told the story of the girl's life. Twenty-five years ago, he said, he went to France, where he fell in love with a French woman, who, he thought, was not married.

He found that the woman had taken up with another man and had given birth to a child. She was in a destitute condition, and he returned to New York.

He suspected that Miss Hansen's company was not beneficial to his child, and he decided to move her to a boarding house. He lived happily together, the father said, until March last, when the girl left him, while he was suffering from a severe attack of grip.

During the time they lived in Miss Hansen's house, his daughter had formed a close friendship with the boarding-house keeper. Their associations continued on intimate terms, even after the father had moved away from the house.

Mr. Low declared that Miss Hansen had induced the girl from her home. Before she had succeeded he had offered to provide everything for her comfort, and she had refused to leave the house.

TORONTO MAY GET HOLMES

May Be Tried at the Same Assizes as the Hyams Twins.

THIS CITY HAS THE BEST CASE.

Yesterday's Developments in the Chicago Castle.

A Letter From the Friend in Which He Joked About the Fate of the Williams Girls—A Furnace Which It is Thought May Have Served to Cremate the Two Victims—Holmes' Wife Thinks to Know More Concerning His Crimes Than She Has Told the Police.

Crown Attorneys Dewart and Curry held a consultation yesterday in reference to the charges of murder against H. H. Holmes. As a result of their conclusions, Detective Cuddy has sworn out two separate warrants, charging Holmes with the murder of Etta Alice Pitzeal and of Nellie Pitzeal. The authorities of Philadelphia were notified by wire of the issuance of the warrants and of the intention to ask for his extradition. The Attorney-General's Department will take the matter up and spare no effort to have Holmes extradited and placed upon trial here.

The latest information received by the detective department here from District Attorney Graham of the Quaker City intimates that, should Holmes' extradition be asked for, he would in all probability be surrendered.

The charge of having murdered B. F. Pitzeal has been formulated in Philadelphia, but has not been presented to the grand jury, pending the action of the Canadian officials and the return of the body of the victim. It is understood that the city presenting the strongest case against Holmes would have the privilege of trying him. For his decision on this point, District Attorney Cuddy is waiting. The final report of Detective Geyer to be made when he reaches Philadelphia. While in this city, Geyer expressed to a World reporter his opinion that the case against Holmes was much stronger here than in either Philadelphia or Chicago, and that it was his intention to report to the district attorney. Strong evidence is being made by the Chicago police to put together a strong case of murder, but the Philadelphia district attorney is anxious that his prisoner should be disposed of as quickly as possible. He is waiting for the report of Detective Geyer to be made when he reaches Philadelphia. While in this city, Geyer expressed to a World reporter his opinion that the case against Holmes was much stronger here than in either Philadelphia or Chicago, and that it was his intention to report to the district attorney.

Why Canada Should Have Holmes. New York, July 25.—The Evening Post says: "The number of states and countries where the man Holmes is wanted to be tried for murdering people in order to defraud life insurance companies is increasing from day to day. The question which state or country wants him most will perhaps never be decided, but the first which one ought to have him tried is already decided in favor of Canada. The reason for yielding our claims is that if Holmes were tried in this country and convicted it would take several years to execute him. With the Buchanan case freshly in mind, we should expect a series of delays, new trials and appeals to higher state courts, lasting a couple of years. By all means let Canada try him first."

Philadelphians Don't Wish to Face Canadian. Philadelphia, July 25.—The verdict arrived at by the Toronto coroner's jury last night, charging H. H. Holmes with the murder of the two Pitzeal children, whose bodies were found in that city, has eliminated from the mysterious case one of the uncertainties that stood in the way of the Philadelphia authorities.

The chances are now almost beyond count that Holmes will be taken to Canada to stand trial for the murders. It is not afraid to face any charge against him. "The district attorney," said he, "should proceed slowly in this matter, or the result will be that he will not have Holmes on even the charge of conspiracy, to which he pleaded guilty and is now awaiting sentence. It must be remembered that the process of extradition is just as difficult from the Canadian jurisdiction as it is to get a man from the United States, and if the Toronto authorities fail to convict Holmes, which I am certain they will, there may be a fight before the man is returned to this city."



ATTACK ON THE MISSIONARIES.

Methodist and Catholic Missions in China Destroyed by Rioters. Vancouver, B.C., July 25.-The Empress of India, from Hong Kong, brings news of the attack made on the foreign mis-

tion in China for two weeks ago. The Chung King correspondent of the North China Daily News tells the story as follows: A riot occurred at the premises of the Protestant Mission, their hospital, dispensary and chapel being looted and burned.

Although the mob was kept at bay for an hour or two, and although the soldiers' barracks were about five minutes' walk away, no attention was paid to the

looting and burning. After resting for the night the mob began again the next day, and when the day was ending nothing remained of 11 of the premises of the Protestant and Roman Catholic missions.

All took the cue from the rioters, who had been degraded and seemed to think nothing would come of them.

Mothers with their infants climbed over the back walls and for hours hid in the dirty holes. When discovered there were cases where ransoms were paid by both foreigners and Christians.
