The population of the Province is 193,425, an increase in the decade of \$4,785, or 78.04 per cent. In the five years from 1886 to 1891 the increase was 43,866, and from 1891 to 1896 it was 40,919. The census was taken for the purpose of determining the per capita subsidy to be paid the Province. It will now be \$154,740, an increase of \$32,345 over what it was five years ago.

The exports, it is stated, consisted to a noteworthy extent of the new British dollars, shipped to Hong Kong and the Straits Settlements. The millers are agitating among the farmers for more white wheat and less of red wheat than is grown nowadays. Very little white wheat, which makes the best flour for pastry baking, is offered on the market these days, and the millers would like to get it. like to get it.

A Grand Manan letter says: "Plenty of herring reported all around the island now. They are of a mixed quality, being very large and some medium herrings, with britt or spurling in abundance. Good line fishing still continues and the dogfish, which struck in a few days ago, have taken their departure, much to the fishermen's delight. Weirbuilding is completed now. A number of herring presses will be put in operation to dispose of the small herrnigs for oil and pomace."

The U.S. customs revenue in July was larger than any previous month since March, and the internal revenue was larger than in any month since the present revenue law went into effect. This is about the first time in two years that the in-ternal revenue figures have looked normal. ternal revenue figures have looked normal. And yet the fiscal year starts off with an excess of \$15,000,000 in the expenditures over the receipts. Of course, the first month of a fiscal year is exceptional. The disbursements are particularly heavy. Expenditures are staved off in May and June until the beginning of the fiscal year and the availability of the new appropriations. The civil and miscellaneous expenses in

July were over \$12,000,000; of course ther will not amount to anything like \$150,000. 000 a year. Indeed, the appropriations for this year under this head are about \$0.000,000. The military expenditures in July were at the rate of more than \$0.000,000 a year and yet the appropriation for the year including river and harbs work, is only \$45,000,000 in round figure.

Owing to the heavy growth of grass on the prairies this year, prairie fires we likely be more severe than usual this fall, particularly if the season should be a di-one. Last year there were enormousless; from prairie fires. Those interested should be early on their guard and make proper obstructions to the spread of fires. In a very short time now the prairie fire season will be on. From the western range country where the season is drier, fire have already been reported.

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A PRACTICAL MAN'S VIEWS.

The free coinage of silver will not bring about an increase in the price of farm products, as is claimed by the professional politicians who are agitthing the free silver side of the quesnon," said Charles Neilson, Second Assistant Postmaster General, while discussing in an informal way the financial situation. Mr. Neilson does not claim to be a politician, but he is a thoroughly practical railroad man of wide experience. "In my official capacity," said Mr. Neilson, "I have havelled in every section of the Unitd States where the mails are delivered, and I have observed that the principal cause of the distress among the farmers is overproduction. They blame the gold standard for all of their ills, but it has never occurred to many of them that the real reason for the decline in the price of their products is the lack of a market for the crops they raise. RUSSIA'S WHEAT CROP.

The official organ of Trade and Industry gives the following account of several concerns which had previously the crops down to the middle of August: The wheat from autumn-August: sown seed has now for the most part been gathered in, and there can be no longer any doubt as to the poor quality of the harvest. The best results were obtained over the extensive area stretching from the Baltic to the Caspian, through Paskoff, Smolensk, Novgorod, and the basm of the Volga. The crops are comparatively good in gradually gradually deteriorate toward the south, until the harvest is almost a complete failure in the lower region of the river.

The bad harvest of autumn-sown wheat extends over the Steppe region satisfactory results in the southern Caucasus, with the exception of the northern part of the latter, from which the latest, owing to the rain.

The crops of spring-sown wheat are many instances the farmers have not lare in the basin of the Volga and over the area stretching from the upper parts of that region westward to the Baltic Sca. The eastern provinces and the country bordering on the lower course of the Volga have pro-

quite had in the province of Kherson. The unsatisfactory harvest of springsown wheat extends over nearly the whole area afflicted by the failure of the crops of autumn-sown corn, a slight exception being observed only in the north of the Province of Taurida along the coast of the Sea of Azoif. In the basin of the Don and the greater part of the black-soil region the yield from spring-sowing is below the average. In the Crimea it is only middling, in the Carcasus very unequal, and in general less satisfactory than

This confirms previous reports of famine in the Southern provinces, which are also corroboasted by the fact that the local authorities of Kherson have resolved to ask the Central Government for a grant of a large sum of money for the purpose of victualling the population.





THE OYSTER CROP.
