Commercial Summary.

MR. W. C. ARCHIBALD, of the JOURNAL OF Commerce staff, is making a tour of inspection among the principal cities, towns and villages of the Dominion for the purpose of obtaining information as the state of trade and manufactures, general and particular. Any courtesies extended him in this respect will be duly reciprocated.

The receipts for Inland Revenue in Toronto during last March were \$108,315 against \$189,984 in March, 1886, and \$78,659 in the same month of 1885.

THE first consignment of British Columbia deer skins, about 200 in number, has been received in New York, and sold at 25c per lb. They are used by glove and moccasin makers.

THE stock of Lang & McPherson, dry goods merchants, of London, Ont., who advertised it for sale by auction, was put up and withdrawn, no better bid than 50 cents in the dollar being made for it.

Ir is reported that the newly-elected members for the Northwest Territories have pledged themselves to oppose the further exercise by the Dominion Government of the power of disallowance.



INTERSE excitement prevails at St. John's, Newfoundland, over the reported loss of the sealing steamer Eagle, with her crewl of 250 men, most of whom fived in St. John's. It is supposed that her boilers exploded.


- J. McKenzie, storekeeper, of Pine River, Ont., has assigned. He is a school teacher, and started this store to eke out his salary, putting his wife in charge to run it. Two years have been sufficient for her to run it into the ground.
- C. Kircaid, grocer, of Farmersville, Ont. who has just assigned, is another example of the fate of the farmer who starts storekeeping. After two years' trial his liabilities are \$1,500 and his assets about twenty-five per cent. less.

WM. KYLE, the wholesale liquor merchant of Toronto, who was convicted on February 4th, last year, of uttering forged paper and appealed on certain technical grounds, has been sentenced by Judge Armour to five years in the penitentiary.

The stock of John McKinnon, tailor, of this city, whose failure has been already recorded, has been sold, realizing 42 cents in the dollar. It was valued at \$4,100. The book debts amounting to \$1,200, only realized 17½ cents in the dollar.

Hats, Caps, Straw Goods, &c., Gentlemen's Furnishing Goods.

Human Phonovost, general storekeeper, of St. Felicien, Que., has assigned. The firm was formerly Menard & Pronovost, who dissolved in 1883, the latter continuing alone. He did only a moderate business, and his failure is not unexpected.

Mas. A. McLean, groceries, stationery, etc., of Bridgetown, N.S., has made an assignment. This was one of those forlorn, hand-to-mouth stores, with no capital and no credit, which form the most pitiful hangers-on to the great army of commerce.

Advices from Alaska state the gold fever is setting in early, notwithstanding a very severe winter. Petroleum beds are also rumored to have been found near Juneau. Gold prospectors are also preparing to scatter in all directions in the spring.

The London Free Press says the disappearance of Charles Smith, a livery man of Newbury, occasioned quite an excitement there, and account books were vigorously overhauled by anxious merchants and others to see how his "little bill" stood.

W. G. Boyes, books and stationery, of Woodstock, Ont., obtained an extension of nine months in the spring of 1885. He has not got on, and as a creditor, who holds a chattel mortgage for \$3,000, was about selling him out, has made an assignment.

FRESH Salmon from British Columbia has been in the market for several days past, retailing at 30 cents a pound. The New York article costs 40 cents a pound at the same

season. Here is another benefit to be credited to the Canadian Pacific Railway.

F. Sanagan, tailor, of London, Ont., has assigned. He compromised with his creditors at 75 cents in the dollar in 1884, payments spread over fifteen months. Since then he has neglected his business and has not been considered a desirable mark for credit.

REPORTS of the catch by the sealing fleet are as follows: Terra Nova, 40,000; Greenland, 16,000; Neptune, 0,000; Vanguard, 9,000; Ranger and Walrus, 2,000 each, and Falcon and Iceland, 10,000 each. At Bonavista and King's Cove large numbers were caught daily.

The list of arrivals for the London wool sales closed with a total for the series of 227,-000 bales, of which 51,000 were forwarded didirect. The quantity for auction, with 20,-000 brought forward from the last sale, made about 246,000, of which 147,800 remain unsold.

An astronomical observatory in connection with Dominion land surveys will be erected by the department of public works during the summer. Work on the building, which will probably be located at Nepean Point, will be commenced as soon as the ground is clear of snow.

Mr. Louis Hyman, of the well-known cigar importing house of Fish, Hyman & Co., returned to this city some weeks ago from a four months' visit to Havana, where he has been replenishing, under his own personal

GEO. Code, who rented a woollen mill at Kemptville, Ont., has assigned. He claims to have made some large sales of his fabrics in Ottawa, but has been hard pressed for some time past, so much so that his hands have at times found difficulty and delay in obtaining their wages.

It is reported that amendments to the Chinese bill will be proposed by the Government at the coming session, with a view to prevent the fraudulent use of resident certificates, by means of which new arrivals from China evade payment of the tax of fifty dollars per head.

The express trains between Boston and New York are now lighted with electricity and heated with steam. It is said all the passenger trains of the Boston & Albany road will be so lighted. This is a step in the right direction, and will be duly appreciated by the travelling public.

Reports from all parts of Manitoba say the weather is beautiful, the snow all gone, and that seeding operations are in full blast. A large party of American colonists from Illinois and other states passed through Winnipeg on their way to Washington Territory via the Canadian Pacific railway.

CABLES from China have been received advising little or no stock of anise remaining,

and London wires an advance to 6s 11d. This has influenced considerable demand in New York, with sales spot and to arrive of 150 cases at \$1.62\frac{1}{4} @ \$1.65. The market at the close was strong at \$1.75.

The Starr Manufacturing Company of Halifax and Dartmouth held its annual meeting on the 23rd ult., and the directors' report was considered satisfactory. The annual profits were \$13,923.74, a dividend of six per cent was declared and paid, and the former board of directors re-elected.

The general store stock of Mr. George Powell, of Brussels, Ont., valued at \$13,195, has been sold for 76 cents in the dollar to Mr. W. Nightingale, of that place.—The boot and shoe stock of H. Henderson, of Alliston, Ont., amounting to \$1,000, has been sold, realizing 60 cents in the dollar.

F. KAEMPF, who runs a sawmill at New Hamburg, Ont., came to that place from Berlin in February, 1885. He had very little money when he started and took what he had to build a dwelling house, so that he has been always hard up and, though he got some fair contracts, is compelled to assign.

It is charged that every spring thousands of calves from one hour to two days old are slaughtered and shipped to New York, where the veal is put up as "canned chicken." Such food is not only unwholesome but positively harmful, and public health demands that a stop should be put to the traffic.

It is stated that on May 1st a new French daily newspaper will be published in the city by a company of which Mr. Oscar McDonnell will be managing director. The name of the paper has not yet been decided upon. The company is said to have been already formed and to have plenty of capital subscribed.

A. T. Stewart, one of the principal engineers of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has completed a preliminary survey of the Boston & Quebec Air Line Railway route, to be built from Skowhegan to Moose River, and to connect with the Canadian Pacific line. He reports this a practical and desirable route.

EUTROPE ROUSSEAU, dry goods merchant, Quebec, has assigned. He has been in business eight or nine years, and was unsuccessful once before. His credit was confined to two or three local firms. Early last month liquidation proceedings were instituted by a relative which have culminated in an assignment.

Joseph Panneton, a small boot and shoe dealer, of this city, has assigned with liabilities of \$2,500 and assets estimated at \$1,500 only. He started some five years ago.—John Street, a small working jeweller, has also made an assignment. Liabilities are about \$1,400.—Ferdinand Jobin, a Quebec joiner, is in difficulties.

Alis industry and steadiness were his only security for credit, and these have not sufficed to make up for lack of capital, and he is now compelled to make an assignment.

The combination of steamship owners, which includes most of the European companies, has decided not to increase the Scandinavian rates for steerage passage from \$20 to \$23. The White Star line a few days ago advanced its rate to \$23 from all Scandinavian ports, and it was expected that the other lines would follow.

Messas. Kennedy & Bunston, of the Walkerton Woollen Mills, have submitted a memorial to the Walkerton Council asking a bonus of \$4,000 to assist in the development of their business. They purpose to expend \$7,000 in additional machinery and building, and to employ from forty to fifty hands, guaranteeing a pay sheet of \$10,000 a year.

He rented the hotel but is understood to own a farm near Amberley.—A harness maker of Sackville, N. B., named Johnson is in difficulties. Liabilities are \$250 and assets only reach the modest figure of \$50.

The City Treasurer, at a meeting of the Finance Committe, was granted leave to effect a temporary loan of \$500,000 to meet \$250,000 interest on bonds in England on May 1st, and \$130,000 in Canada. The remainder is needed for current expenses. The treasurer was also instructed to ask for another permanent 4 per cent loan of \$500,000.

JAMES CUMBERLAND is a small harness maker of Rosemont, Ont., who, eked out his business by keeping the Post Office. He has always been hard up and now seeks relief in an assignment.—The stock of W. P. Fish, men's furnishings, of Winnipeg, whose business troubles have already been fully reported, has been sold at 60 cents in the dollar. It was valued at \$7,000.

In reply to a deputation from the Montreal bar which waited upon the Premier and the Minister of Justice to urge the necessity of increasing the salaries of the judiciary of Quebec, Mr. Thompson binted that a general scheme for readjusting the salaries of judges throughout the Dominion would possibly be introduced at the approaching session.

The striking silk dyers of Paterson, N. J., who have been "out" since 8th February last, resumed work on Monday of this week. It is estimated that they have lost \$150,000 in wages by the strike. The other silk operatives thrown out of work have lost \$900,000, and the loss to the business interests of Paterson will amount to fully as much more.

The orange industry of Florida has increased ten-fold in five years. In 1880 only 100,000 boxes were shipped out of the state, while in 1884 and 1885 the exports were 1,000,000 boxes, and their value \$1,500,000. The United States eats, it is estimated, 600,000,000 of oranges yearly, enough to give to each man, woman and child ten oranges.

Cooke Buos., general storekeepers, of Boissevain, Man., compromised with their creditors in June, last year, at 35 cents cash and 10 cents in twelve months. Last month they

THE Department of Agriculture have decided to exhibit specimens of Canadian grain throughout England and at all the county fairs this summer for the purpose of inducing English farmers to emigrate to Canada and especially the Northwest Territories. Captain Clark, who has been employed in the office of the Canadian High Commissioner, will have charge of the exhibits.

J. S. Johnston, dry goods, Truro, N. S., sold out in February, 1883, but resumed business some few months later. He had better have stayed out, as we now hear of his assignment. Liabilities will reach \$7,500 and assets are nominally worth \$7,600, but \$3,700 of the

He has assigned and his stock valued at \$1,000 sold out at 60 cents in the dollar.—Another shoemaker, George Smith, of Dunnville has called a meeting of creditors with the intention of offering a compromise. He does only a small business.

Perrsaura iron manufacturers say the card rate of iron will hardly go any higher, as representatives of Swedish and English firms have recently come in and are making efforts to place orders for foreign iron. Manufacturers fear that another advance will let in the foreign producers. The iron businesss is not as good as it was a few weeks ago. Pig iron declined 50 cents a ton and bar \$1.50.

The shareholders of the defunct Bank of Liverpool interviewed the Minister of Finance at Halifax last week to endeavor to effect a settlement with the Dominion Government, which is the only large creditor of the bank. A committee of shareholders are going to Ottawa to complete the settlement. The Dominion Government had only \$10,000 on deposit in the Maritime Bank of St. John.

Is a paragraph last week announcing the formation of the new firm of Elliott, Finlayson & Co., we stated that Mr. Finlayson bad been a long time with E. I., Furniss & Co. This was a mistake, the firm with which Mr Finlayson was connected was Green & Houston, in whose employ he has been for some ten years. We are also informed that the capital of the new firm far exceeds the figures given in the paragraph.

The various anthracite coal companies have agreed to an output of 2,500,000 tons for April, on the pro rata for each company as agreed upon last year. The total output for the year ending March next has not been fully decided upon, but is expected to be between 30,000,000 and 35,000,000 tons. A schedule of rates to be charged will be issued to the trade this week. The position of the Philadelphia & Reading and the Pennsylvania Coal Company is yet in absynace.

A CONTRACT has been entered into between the Burrill-Johnston Manufacturing Co., limited, of Yarmouth, and the Halifax & Dartmouth Steam Ferry Co. for the construction of a first-class ferry steamer to ply on Halifax harbor. The price is understood to be in the vicinity of \$32,000. All the old ferry steamers of the Halifax Company have been improved and modernized, and the travelling between the two cities has greatly increased.

A PROJECT is on foot to build a line of rail-way from Stratford via Embro and Ingersoll to some point on the Michigan Central, though the latter part of the proposed route is not settled upon. The original intention was to run to Tilsonburg or Point Burwell, but as Dereham township opposes bonus giving, the road may run in the direction of Bayham, Malahide and Aylmer. The promoters expect a \$5,200 per mile subsidy, and the road would cost to build about \$15,000 per mile. Bonuses to the amount of \$125,000 will probably be asked for. A large and representative meeting in Ingersoll has endorsed the scheme.

Our Mitchell correspondent favors us with a budget of news from his pushing town. W. H. Donnan had his woollen mill, fitted with the latest and best machinery, entirely gutted by fire on the 31st ulto. Insurance amounted to \$5,000, but a mortgage for \$4,000 existed

on the building, so that Mr. Donnan's loss will be very heavy. This is his second fire in seven years.—A new firm of undertakers and cabinetmakers has been started under the title of John Stoneman & Son.—McCosh Bros., who succeeded Duncan & Co., have left Mitchell for Lucan, as they were compelled to leave their premises and could not find other suitable accommodation.

TRANSACTIONS On the Montreal Stock Exchange during March were 37,606 shares of stocks and \$48,500 of bonds, against 33,857 shares of stocks and \$38,000 of bonds in February, 43,755 shares of stocks and \$190,800 of bonds in March, 1886, and 25,550 shares of stocks and \$23,000 in March 1885. The total transactions for the three months ended March 31, were 111,024 shares of stocks and \$102,500 of bonds, agoinst 176,929 shares of stocks and \$361,300 of bonds in 1886, and 53,318 shares of stocks and \$124,700 of bonds in 1885. The seven most active stocks this year were Telegraph, Gas, Canadian Pacific, Commerce, Montreal, Richelieu and Merchants in the order named.

ingenious all-round swindle this transaction appears fairly entitled to the record. The fact of his arrest though, seems to show that his American victims were more prompt in their resort to criminal proceedings than were his creditors in this city.

THE City Council of Halifax is considering the subjects of flour weighing and storage of oil, both of which are of great interest to the west. Formerly, under a municipal regulation, all flour was weighed in Halifax and two cents per barrel charged, but a year or two ago it was discovered that the exaction was illegal under the Dominion laws, so as the greater number of dealers refused to pay the fees the whole system collapsed. Now it is sought to revive it with permission of the Dominion Parliament. No regulations existed for storage of oil till a recent period, and it seems the municipal by-law passed a month or two ago has not been properly enforced owing to the unsuitability of the store or magazine in which the city insists the oil be stored. The Customs authorities are insisting on carrying out regulations in the interests of the Dominion treasury.

The mixing of prunes says the N. Y. Bulletin, has long been acknowledged, but dealers are probably not aware that the mixing of raisins has been introduced as a new industry. As we consider it a duty to keep our readers posted upon what new things develop in the market, it is well that attention should be called to this latest feature. The matter was brought to light by an inspection of two, three and four crown loose muscatel, London layer, and also layer Valencia, that were purchased for regular goods; but the inspection brought to light the fact that though new goods were in each case on top and bottom of box, the interior was composed of old crop that had been introduced for the purpose of deception. There is no sale for old stock, therefore, to work it off this method has been adopted, but the trade are not likely to lend their aid to such an unprincipled method of doing business. In endeavoring to find sale for this stock no inducements are offered in the way of low prices, the holders quoting them at the same value as straight goods.

LAND TRANSFER REFORM.

The Province of Quebec is clearly failing to keep abreast of the times in the matter of dealing with real estate. To an ordinary mind it does appear remarkable that while great sums invested in any other security than land can be effectively transferred in a few minutes, the most trifling amounts involving dealings in land can only be realized by the aid of notaries and lawyers and the expenditure of time and money to an extent that is not creditable to the existing system. Even after all the cost and trouble has been faced, there is a degree of unsecurity in regard to the title which is productive of serious mischief.

It can only be necessary to refer to cases such as Carter rs. Molson and Burland rs. Judah to illustrate the perils to which investors upon the security of real estate are exposed. There, neither the learning of the lawyers nor of the notaries employed availed aught in the way of protecting the lender from loss. And it is not to be supposed that these are solitary cases, or that the particular kind of danger disclosed in them is all an investor has to face; the power wielded by a dishonest notary is a perpetual menace to the unwary capitalist. What practice could well be more unjustifiable than that whereby the mere signature of a notary to a document, purporting to be a copy of an original in his possession, suffices to procure the registration of the document? One would suppose that the veriest dolt would appreciate the dangerous character of the power handed over to a class of men who are neither better nor worse than their fellows. That the opportunity has been taken advantage of and spurious documents used to extract money from investors, is well known, and so it will continue, no proprietor being safe from the risk of a fraudulent document being registered against his property at any time that it may suit the interest of a dishonest notary to sign a pretended copy of an instrument which never existed. Of the labyrinth of difficulties arising out of the rights of wives, minors, substitutes, descendants of widows by previous marriages, and the multitudes of contingent claims affecting titles, it is unnecessary to treat in detail; the pitfalls are sufficiently numerous and dangerous to alarm buyers and lenders. If their existence were a necessity it would stand in the position of an affliction to which submission was the only attitude to be taken, but the perils and costs being altogether unnecessary and easily removed, the surprising thing is that so widespread a grievance should have been submitted to so long.

In what is known as the "Torrens" system, an efficient remedy for the evils referred to lies ready at hand. That system has been in use in some of the Australian colonies for nearly thirty years, in Vancouver Island for about twenty-five years; it is in force over the whole of Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and British Columbia, and has been in operation in the County of York, Ontario, for some time, with so much success that a bill is now before the Legislature in Ontario giving to city, town and county councils the right to pass a by-law in favor

of the adoption of the system, whereupon the lieutenant-governor may, by proclamation, extend the operation of the Act to such municipality. In bringing about this much needed reform Ontario has been greatly indebted to the efforts of the Canada Land Law Amendment Association. formed in Toronto in April, 1883. The difficulties attendant upon an attempt to improve an established routine have been successfully overcome; and now it is in order to inquire whether Quebec can afford to submit to an antiquated mode of dealing with real estate, involving great risk to the investor and astounding charges under the notarial tariff? Under that tariff he who takes over a title to a piece of property so heavily mortgaged that it cannot be sold for one dollar, may find himself in the position of a holder of just such a property, with a bill of over \$700 to pay for a transfer that could have been effected for \$7, while a similar experience will probably await him when he comes to pay off the mortgages and get notarial discharges therefor. A powerful recommendation in favor of the Torrens system is, that under it no such extortions are possible, in fact the transfer of land by that process will cost little if anything more than the cost of registering a deed under the existing practice. The great features of the Torrens system are rapidity and facility in transfering or hypothecating land, low fees, and the guarantee of every title by the Government; long and expensive searches by the registrar, voluminous and numerous documents bearing on the title, attorneys' fees for their investigation, and heavy imposts for conveyancing by notaries, are abolished. Upon a property being entered under the Act, the registrar has the title investigated once for all, and upon its being satisfactorily made out, issues a certificate of title to the owner in lieu of the original documents, which remain on rec-Upon any subsequent change of ownership the certificate is delivered up and a new certificate issued to the purchaser, so that every owner holds his title direct from the Crown; in the event of land being mortgaged, the owner and mortgagee attend before the registrar, who endorses the mortgage on the certificate. the time necessary being about fifteen minutes, and the cost a dollar and a quarter. The discharge is equally simple, rapid and unexpensive. The initial expense of bringing land under the operation of the Act has been from fifteen dollars-the lowest-to one hundred dollars the highest cost;-lands worth all the way to half a million dollars having been dealt with. On entering the land under the Act, Government exacts a payment of onefifth of one per cent, or in cases where the value is over \$5,000, one-tenth of one per cent, to go to the assurance fund, by

which titles are guaranteed; in practice this charge has proved to be more than sufficient for the purpose. Subsequent transactions are effected merely by payment of the prescribed fees.

The laws of the Province of Quebec are more favorable to the introduction of the Torreps system than those of Ontario, and it will not be creditable to us if we continue to adhere to the existing system in the face of a tried and undoubted improvement. The broad distinctive feature of the law is that land is treated as chattels real, and goes to the executor as other personal estate vests in the personal representatives. This move in the direction of modern progress is an improvement that will hardly admit of question; that being conceded, all the rest is easy. The attempt to get an improvement adopted is often disheartening, such is apt to be the anathy and indifference of governments. In this matter the Ontario Government has acted in a most praiseworthy spirit, and it remains to be seen whether the Government of Quebec will be equally disposed to consult the interests of the people in removing a heavy burden and a formidable risk from every member of the community who has dealings with real estate.

THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The bank statements for February, due about March 20th, have only just arrived. This lateness is accounted for by the interruption to railway traffic caused by the unusually severe storms of last month, which delayed the returns of one of the remote banks on their way to the capital It may be a question how far the department is justified in withholding the statement of what may be termed the financial position of the country for the sake of a single small bank which, whatever its importance locally, could have but little effect upon the aggregate returns-and whose previous monthly report would have served the purpose almost as well. The returns as they stand are of value little enow, as we have repeatedly pointed outthe Maritime Bank failure being the latest example-but such as they are, they should be served hot.

We are tempted to repeat here one of the suggestions for improvement made on a former occasion. There are two or three columns in the returns as they are now prepared which are of little or no use, and for these there might be substituted columns showing the rates of interest paid for deposits, general or special. For a considerable time before the collapse of the Exchange Bank, and he troubles which led to the halving of the Montreal Loan & Mortgage Company's capital, these institutions were paying ab-

normally high rates of interest for deposits and loans; and it was likewise through this system of banking that the manager of a western bank was enabled to lend a sum nearly equal to the whole capital of the concern to one lumber speculator, with the consequences usual in such a case. Such an addition to the monthly statements would furnish a more reliable index to the condition of a bank than the amount of "Overdue notes, not specially secured," or the column of "Loans from or deposits by other banks in Canada secured," which is now always empty, notwithstanding that the corresponding column in the "Assets" usually contains an amount, not large it is true, but signifying something. Will some not-dyed-in-thewool politician make a study of this and the question of our gold standard for the approaching session of parliament and bring about the necessary reform-and security to the public? We are hoping much from the presence of such men as Sir Donald Smith in the House, and this is a subject with which his long experience should enable him effectively to grapple. Or has Sir Richard Cartwright so given up to party "what was meant for mankind" that we cannot look for some assistance in that quarter?

The fluctuations, as compared with the January statement, are of little significance. The principal change is in "Discounts," which have increased about a million and three-quarters. We do not attribute this usually favorable omen to any great extent to the fact referred to in our "At Home and Abroad" last week, that, owing to the backwardness of collections lately, some houses who, for many years, have not been accustomed to discount their customers' paper, have found it necessary to do so during the present winter; but the fact is in itself significant, although occurring in the midst of plenty. The value is still in the country, in produce if not in cash, and there is needed but the factor of facility of exchange to set the wheels of business prosperity again in motion. The weather has been unusually severe, and every business concern in the country, from the village storekeeper to the largest railway company, has felt its influence more or less. The farmer in many sections has not been able to market his produce-his grain where held over, or the little odds and ends current at the country store. He has been obliged to deprive himself and family of many creature comforts; but there is the more reason for anticipating a spring movement considerably above the average of former years.

A comparison with the columns for February, 1886, and February, 1877, subjoined, is as gratifying to the people at large as they could well expect under any circumstances political or national:—

THE FISHERIES DISPUTE.

So much has been already written on the subject of the fisheries embroglio that the subject may almost be considered threadbare, yet hardly a week passes that some new argument is not advanced or some novel and striking phase of this painful dispute between two friendly nations, brought to light by partizans of one or the other sides to the question. The latest, but from the high position of the writer probably most important, comes from the pen of the Marquis of Lorne, who in his capacity of Governor General enjoyed exceptional facilities for arriving at a correct estimation of this much vexed question. It is, therefore gratifying to find in the course of an able and impartial review of the subject, written for the columns of the Fortnightly Review, (The Leonard-Scott Publication Co., Philadelphia), conclusive evidence of the justice and moderation of the Canadian claims.

Some of Lord Lorne's remarks are very apposite and place the subject in a novel and striking light. Alluding to the charge of unfriendly and harsh conduct brought by the energetic, but we regret to say, somewhat unscrupulous fishermen of the thriving little seaport of Gloucester, he points out in a few terse sentences the absurdity and tenuity of foundation upon which the charge is based. The privileges to which the Gloucester fishermen were admitted, before their abrogation at the desire of their own representatives, were not matters of international right but privileges granted in return for certain conces

sions made by themselves and their inand co-citizens. When these concessions were not only withdrawn but an almost prohibitive duty placed upon all Canadian caught fish, is it fair, is it honest, to expect to continue in enjoyment of a privilege for which the recompensing concession has been abruptly denied? Even now they are left in possession of far more of the inshore fishery than any European nation would allow them, and permitted to embarrass and injure our fishing interests in a manner that few other peoples would submit to, simply on account of the friendly liking between the bulk of the Canadian and United States population, who would regret the initiation of harsh measures as savoring of an incipient hostility that could not fail to be injurious to both. The political partizans of the Gloucester fishermen accuse us of lack of friendliness. but can they consider their own action, that of a wealthy people imposing a heavy and prohibitive tax on the products of a weaker and poorer ally, a convincing sign of amity?

"How many times," quotes Lord Lorne, "have not our own Canadians been mol--ested? Have they not been excluded from their own banks at Notamquan because the American fishing fleet arrived first and blocked the harbor? How often have numbers of them anchored inside the moorings of Canadians, in their own harbors, preventing the setting of nets for bait, and how many of these nets have their vessels not torn and destroyed running in and out of harbor?" These are samples of the complaints made by Canadian fishermen who spoke the naked truth and yet no accusation of unfriendliness has been made against these bold, pertinacious and unscrupulous Gloucestermen. Were Canadians to act similarly in American harbors what a how of indignation would go up to heaven? What scathing denunciations would be made by the press! and what a glorious state of vindictive excitement the politicians would lash themselves into!

No country is better aware of the scope of fishery rights and regulations or puts them in force with greater strictness than the United States. Each separate state in the Union is at liberty to make and enforce its own regulations in regard to fishery rights, providing that the free use of the waters for purposes of navigation and commercial intercourse, be not interrupted. The Federal Government has again and again exercised its rights in regard to the whole coast by giving and withdrawing permission to fish within the three mile limit. Maryland's armed cruisers have more than once used violence to protect her oyster beds, visiting trespassers with fine and forfeit, and yet, because Canada, after a forbearance for a cautionary period

of six months, feels herself called upon to exercise the same protective rights as are freely granted to themselves, retaliation, non-intercourse, war, and all kinds of dreadful things are threatened. Neither the deep sea fishermen nor trading vessels are injured or deprived of their ordinary facilities as is the case with the Retaliatory Bill. Any coasting vessel can call at customs ports where she may trade, transfer cargo or purchase bait for her fishing consorts at sea, Fishing boats must also call at customs ports where they can repair, get wood and water but not bait, since it would be hard to prevent their using the bait inside the three mile limit. Surely these regulations are neither harsh nor unfair and certainly do not call for the wild talk and unfriendly legislation which the United States Congress has seen fit to

The bait question is naturally inextricably mixed up in the fishery muddle. The exclusive right of the nation owning the shore to sell bait and obtain it, has always been regarded as indefeasible. This right has been guarded and recognized in every treaty. Even in this respect Canada shows herself more generous than other nations since the Magdalen Islands and the Labrader coast are free to be used by all for bait or fish. To concede any more than this without compensation in reciprocal friendliness in tariff arrangements would be simply foolish on our part, and would call forth the quiet contempt even of those who would benefit by our laxity.

Lord Lorne enters fully into a description of the various bait fishes in which he is most minute and exact, giving even the prices ruling and the methods of preparation for sale or use. Clams, fresh and frozen herring, squid, sporling, capeling alewives, menhaden, all are specifically described and the separate advantages of each particular kind of bait skillfully enlarged upon. The fact that the bait fishes of the American coast are becoming exterminated lends additional importance to the necessity of conserving the Canadian supply, and forms an additional and most cogent reason for the strict enforcement of the bait regulations; so that Lord Lorne's intimation that it might be wise, in view the depletion of southern bait grounds, to ascertain by what means-whether by restriction in the appliances used or by the institution of close times-the bait harvest can best be preserved, is full of practical significance.

The article cannot fail to be of great value to the Canadian side of the question. It appears in a magazine which has a far larger circulation among the better class of American readers than is enjoyed even by the most influential of our daily press. It is written in a calm clear logical style that cannot fail to carry great weight,

and while pointing out the justice of the Canadian view of the question, it does so in so temperate and impartial manner as to convince the reader that the conclusions arrived at are the result of painstaking enquiry and deliberate conviction. It draws attention to points which appear hitherto to have escaped the notice of the press; and explodes the fallacy that the sale of Canadian bait is absolutely refused. The undecurrent of sympathy and support which runs through it cannot fail to be grateful to the Canadian Government, while the value of its statistics and the exactitude of its detail lift it above the rank of an ordinary magazine article.

ASSIGNMENTS IN ONTARIO.

At the quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade held in this city on the 5th instant, the following resolution was passed unanimously:

Mr. J. P. Cleghorn moved, seconded by Mr. Hugh Mackay,

Whereas by section 6 of "An act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors," now in force in Ontario, the assignce, substituted for the sheriff, must reside in the same county as the debtor,

And whereas, under the provisions of bill No. 124 now before the Legislature in Ontario, the assignce must in every case be a resident of Ontario,

And whereas such restrictions have the effect of discriminating against the interests and legitimate influence of creditors in this province, in the liquidation of estates in Ontario, and it is undesirable that any restriction in the choice of any assignee should exist, provided he is elected by the majority required by section 18 of the said act,

And whereas no such discrimination against creditors in Ontario exists in the appointment of assignces in this province, and it is important that the harmony now existing between the mercantile bodies of the several provinces in regard to insolvency and other matters should not be disturbed;

It is therefore resolved that a copy of the present resolution be forthwith forwarded by the board to the Attorney-General of Ontario with a request that the restriction complained of in section 6, and the further restrictions provided by bill 124, be both removed, so that creditors may be vested with full control of the estates whose assets are in effect the property of creditors.

The ground of complaint here is that creditors in the Province of Quebec would be restricted in their choice of an assignee to residents in Ontario were the provisions of Bill No. 124 to be adopted as they stand, while the practice has been since long before the Insolvent Act of 1864 was enacted, to permit perfect freedom in regard to the domicile of the assignee; that it should be so is clearly to the advantage of creditors at large, by committing freely to the creditors having the principal interest at stake the management of the estate and the immediate supervision of the assignee. In appointing an assignee several motives actuate creditors; there is first the question of fitness and reliability of the man, then the opportunities for

satisfying the inspectors and through them the creditors that the liquidation of the estate has been judiciously accomplished; one of the requisites therefore is that the assigneee shall be within easy reach of the principal creditors, because from among them the practice is to select the inspectors; and justly so, for who else have equal-cause for solicitude regarding the conduct of the assignee? It is invariably of the utmost importance to be in a position to hold meetings of inspectors and assignee on short notice; the existing reunirement, therefore, rendering it necessary that in certain cases the assignee must reside in the county where the debtor resides, and the further requirement sought to be enacted, restricting the domicile of assignees to Ontario, are subversive of the conditions necessary to promote the interests of creditors generally and particularly of creditors out of Ontario. That merchants in Montreal would be the chief sufferers by the change there can be no doubt; the immediate supervision of the man who in numerous instances would in effect be paid for his services with their money would be rendered impossible, and they would be coerced into sending the person they might desire to employ to reside in Ontario while performing the duties necessary for the protection of their interests, the only effect of that being a further loss to one already sufficiently great. That the mercantile community of Ontario can be favorable to this innovation is scarcely to be supposed; it is contrary to the principles of co-operation which ought to prevail in the management of insolvent estates, the creditors of which are, properly speaking, the joint proprietors of the assets; that being admitted they may very well be left to the freedom of their own will in the selection of a manager in succession to the bankrupt. Affairs of that sort can only be managed by the consideration and forbearance of the parties. An efficient safeguard to creditors for small amounts has been provided by the mode of computing majorities, and having done that, why should the choice of the majority be restricted? not in their own interest surely; they may safely be left to take care of that; not in the interest of the minority for that is synonymous with the interest of the larger creditors. Then in whose interest? Can it be that the assignees in Ontario are at the bottom of the attempt to wrest from merchants here the management of their own affairs? There is certainly room for suspicion that such is the fact; and at the meeting it was pretty plainly hinted, that the assignees had been instrumental in procuring the insertion of the objectionable clauses. The cordial relations existing between the mercantile bodies east and west are not, it is to be

and unjust discrimination of this sort, and unless the esprit de corps among the members of the Board of Trade in Toronto is something very different from what members of the Board in Montreal believe it to be, the merchants of Ontario will look quite as unfavorably upon the objectionable discrimination as the merchants of this Province do. Were it otherwise one could searcely be hopeful for the prospect of that cordial co-operation which is necessary for their mutual benefit and protection. The day for sectional legislation of this sort has, it is to be hoped, passed away, to be replaced by a broad unselfish and considerate mode of dealing with each other in which petty jealousies and invidious discriminations shall have no place. There is much reason therefore to expect favorable consideration on the part of the Attorney-General of Ontario, to the request contained in the resolution which heads this article.

THE ENCYCLOPZEDIA BRITANNICA.

Volume XXI of the Encyclopedia Britannica, 9th edition (Chas. Scribner's Sons, New York), just issued centains the usual number of good things, interesting to the scientist, the economist and the man of letters. It comprises articles on all subjects of any importance from the syllables "Rot." to "Sia." Among those on subjects of a commercial bearing three are by James Paton, of Glasgow, on Sewing-Machines, Shoemaking and Safes; that on Savings Banks is by E. W. Brabrook, Registrar of Friendly Societies, London; the article on Shipbuilding is from the pen of Sir N. Barnaby, late Director of Naval Construction at Whitehall, England; the treatise on Sewerage, is by Prof. J. A. Ewing, and that on the Seal-Fisheries, by Rev. M. Harvey of St. John's Neld. Saw making is treated by G. N. Hotchkiss of Chicago, and Shorthand by Hon. John G. N. Keith-Falconer. The subjects are illustrated where necessary by woodcuts and maps, the work being a complete reprint from the plates of the original Edinburgh edition of A. & C. Black. The article on the St. Lawrence, will probably possess most interest for the Canadians. It contains, however, little information beyond what has from time to time appeared in these columns, its value consisting chiefly in its usefulness for reference. The article on Salt contains engravings of some of the most approved modern apparatus employed in the preparation of this staple. Goderich is spelled "Gooderich," probably the only error in the article, unless the omission of any mention of Seaforth deserve the name. SPRING WRAPS.

The unusual lateness of the season has had naturally a very unfavorable effect on the sale of spring wraps. The continued cold weather has enabled ladies to continue wearing their winter wraps, and as the probabilities are that, owing to the lateness of the season, the warm weather will follow almost immediately on the heels of the old, many ladies will this year postpone purchasing any wrap for the intermediate half season until the fall.

Still a very fair sale of wraps for the demi-saison has been had, although certainly not so much as in former years. The mantle now preferred as a medium between the heavy winter cloak and the light spring garment is the kangaroo mantelet, well fitted to the waist at the back, with the sleeve rounded off over the shoulder and doubled up over itself over the arm. This is certainly not so graceful as the visite, but it is more convenient and less trying to a prettily trimmed bodice than a clinging jacket. Plush, either of a tint to match the costume or of a warm seal brown, is the favorite material for these garments. The lining is either of self color or may be crimson, old gold or heliotrope. Some early spring mantles are also made with shoulder pieces, and are gathered round the waist under a belt. Beige cloth is the favorite fabric for these and when gathered on to a shoulder piece of brown velvet with a belt of the same and having full sleeves gathered on to wristbands to match, it forms a very stylish and becoming wrap. This same style is visi-

and gathered under a belt at the waist. In this case the shoulder piece is of the same material and is embroidered with russia braid or with velvet appliqué work outlined with the Bonnaz stitch.

There is a new fabric called Geneva plush, of which the pile is so short that it resembles a thick close velvet. makes of this plush have a peculiarly rich deep black dye, are far handsomer than velvet, and have the important distinction of being comparatively uninjured by rain. It makes up into a very stylish wrap, and bids fair to become a popular favorite.

Waistcoats continue to be fashionable, and many, if not most, of the new coat jackets are made with a waistcoat of a contrasting color often decorated with braid or fringe. Others have an imitation lacing up the centre, finished with tassels. Both fancy cloths and corded silks are used for this purpose.

Among carriage mantles was an example in a corded silk of a dark tan shade which was molded to the form as closely as a bodice. It ended in front with a sharp basque point edged with tinted beads to match the multi-colored passementerie that covered the shoulders both back and front and fell in iridescent fringes to the waist. The inverted waistcoat of lace was finished fan-shape at the neck and descended almost to the knees. It was drawn into points and finished with tassels corresponding with those on the sleeves of the square-cut basque at the back. A wrap of scarf-shape, having points of plush at the sides and jet ornaments mixed with frosted bells of the same material, was much admired. Jetted grenadines seem to have again found purchasers in spite of their perishability. They appear again in spring wraps, having large bell sleeves and braces of jet over the shoulders. Jet also appears very largely on all spring wraps, and extremely rich decorations of jet lace and beads are shown. Some of these jet beads are beautifully made, and are as carefully made and delicately carved as if for jewellery purposes, aed in some cases cost nearly as much. One line of wraps shown had a high medici collar of jet, having the corners turned down to show the velvet lining. The lace front as well as the basque sides were held in place by jet ornaments, which were also scattered profusely over the sleeves. Another style had a lace fichu, showing in a double fan at the back of the neck, with handsome jet embroidery at each side. The scarf ends and lace front were also heavily ornamented with jet.

AT HOME AND ABROAD.

- The news from Europe is absolutely uninteresting, and with the exception of one item,

measures adopted by Germany in Alsace-Lorraine and the irritation displayed by her Government at some portions of an after-dinner speech by the Spanish Consul at Hong Kong, alone reveal the tension of affairs, when incidents of so trivial a character can menace the diplomatic relations of two governments. The statement of General Komaroff, who is certainly the coming general of Russia, that the work of the Anglo-Russian frontier commission is not likely to lead to any useful result, and that the force of circumstances will inevitably impel Russia sooner or later to move forward into the oasis left to the Afghans, until she reaches her only natural and proper frontier, the Hindoo Koosh mountains, will produce an uneasy feeling in Anglo-Indian circles, where the belief that the coming struggle will be held on the Afghan frontier, has only been partially disproved. General Komaroff is a man who fully understands the subject, and consequently the prospect that the frontiers of England and Russia in the East will touch before long, will gain additional probability.

As was expected, the payments maturing during the past week were poorly provided for. It was known that bad weather and worse roads had interfered with country collections, and consequently renewals were the order of the day and were granted with as good a grace as possible, no financial embarrassment on this account being apparent. Still, in view of the possible continuance of this state of affairs, the banks have not been free lenders. Money is ample, but is carefully conserved for customers needs, and consequently, although the market has certainly an easier look and reports are current that loans have been effected at 6 and even 51 per cent., the rate of leading lenders still remains at 7 per cent, and will probably remain high for some time to come. In the States, money has become a little more active, and the range for call loans on the stock exchange is now from 43 to 8 per cent. with the ordinary rate at 6 per cent. It was believed that the Government disbursements on the 1st ulto, would render the market easier, but their effects were rendered nugatory by the steady movement of currency to interior points, and the probability that its return will be a slow one. In London the tendency is still towards greater case. The street rate is now at 13 per cent. with the bank rate unchanged. Consols are firm and higher at 102 3-16 and 102 5-16, but silver still drags, and is quoted weak and lower at 431d.

The quarterly general meeting of the Board of Trade, which took place this week, was unusually interesting to business men. The address of the president was clear and comprehensive, and the usual number of trade grievances discussed and suggestions adopted. Attention was drawn to the unfair and anomdecidedly pacific. The vigorous coercive alous position of Montreal as regards harbor

improvements, since while a large appropriation is yearly made out of the general revenue for the improvement of harbors in all the other provinces, that of Montreal is maintained by local taxation, to the direct detriment of the trade of the Dominion which passes through it. Last year the Dominion Government received out of the revenues of this port \$91.384, the interest on the expenditure on the channel, a drain that seriously cripples the ability of the Harbor Commission to enlarge the wharfage accommodation, and renders it impossible to reduce the dues. The action of the Board of Trade in instructing its council to continue to press upon the Government the assumption of the Lake St. Peter debt, shows that they are fully aware of the injustice of the present condition of affairs, and so far as lies in their power are determined to end it.

THE CITY PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

Readers of this journal had little to learn anent this much-vexed question from the first open meeting of the sub-committee, appointed to report on the subject, held on Tuesday last. It was believed, owing to the presence of two or three experts on the committee, that the contract would be awarded the lowest tender, and those who were determined to secure the job or, perhaps, to prevent a doughty rival obtaining it, felt that they had only to make their tender low enough. The tender of the proprietor of this journal was calculated on a minimum profit based on cash discounts for all purchases, improved labor-saving machinery and the most economical because the most skilled labor in the market. What the profit can be on a tender 25 per cent. still lower remains to be seen. Some of those tendering have known what inprofitable work was in former years, and if they choose to learn it again it is simply their own concern. The city, at all events, will get its work done at about 50 cents in the dollar of what it cost last quinquennial, and as he has taken it so low it is to be hoped Mr. Lovell will be afforded every reasonable opportunity to make some profit out of the work. It was recommended that, as the ex-mayor was lowest on stationery and John Lovell & Son on printing, their tenders be accepted, and the matter will come before the Council on the 18th inst. for final adjudication. Although the specifications were not over accurate or clear they were probably as fair for one as for another; nevertheless there appears to be a determined effort afoot to prove that they were not understood by all alike. Mr. Perrault was at somewhat of a disadvantage in his tenders; a tender low enough to secure the contract would have been simply an acknowledgement of overcharging in the previous years. His average for the last five years was about \$10,000, or \$50,000 in all. The public will wonder why the city contract is so eagerly sought after, and why men are willing to do the work at cost or thereabout. For instance, in one of the largest items, that of composition (type-setting), one or two of the tenderers offer to do the work at thirty cents per thousand "ems," the price paid in wages to workmen. Another entered paper at from 1 to 4 cents per pound, for the outside figure of which it can not possibly be purchased. The explanation lies in the fact, well known among habitues of the civic halls, that the articles for which tenders are asked are only a portion of what is likely to be required—the evidence of things unseen-and that the advantage of profit lies in knowing how to charge for the extras. There is a probability in the present case that to whomever the contract is awarded, the extras will go where they have gone of late years. The officers who have to do with the matter know too well the powers that lie behind the throne, and their situations are of too much importance to them to permit of any concern for the profits of rival printers.

We are favored with a copy of Mr. Penny's poem, "The Sorrows of Smythe de Smythe," recently referred to, which has been republished in neat pamphlet form, with a number of engravings on wood, illustrating the series of mishaps that befell the hero of the tale. The author has been fortunate in procuring an artist who can "catch the manners living as they rise" with scarcely less effect than himself. We may be pardoned for guessing that the satirically humorous pencil to which the Montreal Diogenes owed much of its popularity in former years is one and the same with the illustrator of Mr. Penny's metrical historictte, whose initials are J. H. W.

The Board of Trade.—The quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade was held last Tuesday in the Exchange Hall, the president, Mr. teo. A. Drummond, in the chair. As the proceedings were of more than usual interest, we purpose devoting a separate article to each subject. Two of them are treated of in our editorial columns this week; others will follow in due course. The deliberations and endeavors of a body including the ablest and most experienced business men of the community, should have all the publicity and co-operation that the press can give.

Tr is stated that the total number of failures throughout the Dominion for the first three months of the present year is 369, against 365 in 1886. The assets were \$2,120,000 in 1887, against \$2,780,000 in 1886. The liabilities were \$5,538,000 in 1887, against \$4,825,000 for 1886. This cannot be looked upon as a

favorable beginning for 1887. Another and probably more reliable statement is that of Messrs. Dun, Wiman & Co., who give the following as the number of failures for the first quarter, as 385 failures, with liabilities of \$3,387,247.

The traffic returns of the Grand Trunk Railway Company for the week ending 2nd April, 1887, show an increase of \$64,089 over the corresponding week in 1886.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY Evo., April 7, 1887.

The weather has been brighter and more settled but we can note no material change in business matters and until the roads improve and water traffic is resumed there is little possibility of a brisker trade movement. Although the water in the river is reported to have receded from the highest point the dread of an inundation does not seem to have abated and many wholesale houses are concerned about preparations to prevent stocks being damaged. Remittances are usually backward at this season.

CANNED GOODS .- The market is fairly active and steady to firm. Salmon and tomatoes are higher. The former is said to have advanced to \$1.271 in first hands and freight rates are advancing. The Canadian Packer's Association has condemned the practice of soaking dried or evaporated corn and peas and putting them up in cans. It suggests that the word "soaked" be printed in large letters across the face of the labels. Jobbing prices are as follows: salmon, per dozen, \$1.65; mackerel, per dozen, \$1.10, and lobsters, \$1.371. Aylmer or Eric corn, \$1.35; 3lb tomatoes, \$1.55@ \$1.60; 2lb. Mar. peas, \$1.65; Lima beans, \$1.80; string beans, \$1.30; I b. cove oysters, full weights, \$1.30, 2lb. \$2.20; French sardines boxes, \$8.50@\$0.50; 2lb. corned beef, \$2.50 14lb. \$18.50; 1lb. lunch tongue, \$2.60; 3lb. peaches, yellow heavy syrup, \$3.25 @ \$3.75; 21b. \$2.25; 21b. strawberries, \$1.90@\$2; 21b. Bart, pears, \$1.90; 21b, pine apples, \$2.25 21b, greengages, \$2.

Drugs and Chemicals.—Business has continued quiet. Advices from Smyrna state that frost has damaged the opium crop. Opium is firm here at \$4.50 @ \$4.75 and morphia is quoted higher at \$1.90@\$2. There are no other important changes either in drugs, heavy chemicals or dyestuffs. An English letter says: Chemicals steady. Caustic soda rather stiffer. Bi-carb soda—The favorite brand in drums is £6 10s, other brands £6 7s 6d per ton in 1 cwt. kegs, £6 in barrels of 2 cwts., and £5 17s 6d in casks of 3 to 10 cwts. each. At Newcastle sal soda is lower, £2 2s 6d per ton gross weight, and freight likely to be low, perhaps 10s to 17s 6d in full to Canada and Canada West respectively.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.—Business in products of the dairy has been quiet but the Easter local demand is promising. The market for butter was steady, although the actual movement was moderate. The exports from Portland for the week ended April 2

were 100 packages. The exports from Mont-real and Portland from May 1 to date were 76,378 packages. Cheese unchanged. The cable remained at 65s. Receipts at Liverpool from October 1 to March 23, were 479,000, against 655,000 for the same time last year. For eggs there was a fair enquiry and the market was steady although the receipts were large. Sales were made more freely at 131c @14c per dozen. Maple Syrup-The demand for new maple syrup was fair, although the offerings were not large, and the quality not quite up to the mark, but a few sales were made at 90c@\$1 per tin. Provisions.—In Liverpool lard was 3d lower at 37s and bacon a shade firmer at 39s. Pork was unchanged at 67s 6d and tallow at 22s 9d. Provisions in this market remained very quist. There is no Western pork here. Canada pork has sold at \$18@\$18,25 in jobbing lots. Canada lard has become somewhat scarce and offerings of it light. Sales have been made at 91c, including 200 pails at that. Western lard has sold at 104c in small lots

Day Goods.—The fourth of the month has come and gone, and whilst some are complaining that remittances for due paper on that date were less even than expected, it appears that as the week wears on payments on account of past due notes keep rolling in. Travellers who are now out on the sorting trip are not sending in large orders, but report a cheerful feeling throughout the country. Prospects seem favourable to trade so soon as open weather is permament, and the firmness with which cotton goods are held is contributing its share towards improving matters; we already hear of an advance being seriously entertained. City traders state they have little reason to gramble and those doing business in the outlying districts continue to report a satisfactory run of custom.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- There has been little doing in flour except for local wants, enquiries for future delivery being at lower prices than holders were willing to accept, Low grades of flour were steadily held and of late the tendency has been upward. late sales were 125 barrels superior at \$3,95, six cars Manitoba strong bakers' at \$4.30, three cars medium do. at \$4.15 and one car bran at \$16. Grain dull and without change. Prices unchanged. American markets quiet and in main easy without much feature. A recent cable says: The British grain markets were easier and generally lower. California wheat declined 6d @ 9d per quarter to 39s just shipped and 37s od nearly due. Cargoes of wheat and corn off coast were easier. Wheat on passage was neglected and corn easier. Mixed maize for prompt shipment was 9d lower at 18s 9d @ 19s. At Liverpool wheat was easier and spring declined 1d to 6s 10d @ 7s. At Mark Lane No. 2 club Calcutta wheat was 3d lower at 33s ex ship. Wheat and flour in Paris were steady. The shipments of wheat from Calcutta, Bombay and Kurrachee for the week were 10,000 quarters to the United Kingdom and 35,000 to the continent. Receipts of wheat to Liver-pool for the past three days were 143,000 centals of which 133,000 were from America.

FISH AND OILS.—The Lenten demand for fish is now over and prices are purely nominal as most sellers would make a cut rather than carry stocks. It is believed that supplies still on hand are considerable. Oils are about steady. News to the 19th ult. still spoke of the Norway cod fishing as 400,000 quintals short. The effect will be to advance cod fish and cod and cod liver oil in foreign countries to the advantage of Newfoundland.

FREIGHTS .- Rates are steady. The first St. Lawrence steamers will sail from Liverpool 21st inst., from London 14th, from Tyne 15th and from Clyde 20th From Liverpool present figures are as follows : Rice, soda, etc., per ton, 10s @ 15s Quebec and Montreal; 17s 6d @ 22s 6d to Canada West; raisins, figs, currants, etc., 15s @ 25s and 25s @ 30s. From Tyne-chemicals, 10s @ 12s and 15s @ 17s 6d. From London-Groceries generally, 10s to 158 and 15s @ 22s 6d. From Clyde-Spgar, 12s 6d @ 15s and 20s @ 22s 6d. All per 20 ewt. and with 10 p. c. primage. There is some prospect of an outside line of steamers from Liverpool to Montreal this season, in addition to the Oxenholme. The steamers from Medi-terranean ports to Montreal direct are now loading. Salt freights from Liverpool by direct steamers 7s 6d to Montreal, 15s @ 17s 6d Canada West; by sail to Quebec, 4s @ 5s and to St. John 3s @ 4s.

Green Fruits, Etc.—The total exports of apples for the week were 3,312 brls.; total for season 792,153, against 839,167 last year. About 3,000 brls. go to London from Halifax this week. Stock in Nova Scotia for export about 9,000 barrels, which will all go during April. Good fruit is in demand in England. Baldwins, 20s@22s; greenings 18s@20s; Russets, 17s@19s; others 14s@20s. We quote apples, ex-store, \$3@\$4.50. Oranges: Valencias, \$5.75@\$6; Lemons, \$3.75@\$4.50 box; Palermos, \$5@\$5.50 case. Granberries, fair to good, \$7@\$9; fancy, \$10@\$11. Almeria grapes, \$4.50 keg. Coccanuts, \$6 per 100. Onions native, \$3@\$3.50 brl. New York onions, \$2.50; Spanish in crates, \$1.25. Figs in boxes, 7½c@10c; Turkish figs, 6c per 1b in bags. Aspinwall banauns, \$5.00 bunch. Baracoa, \$1.50. Januaicas, \$3.00 @\$3.50. Dates, 5½c@6c. Kaporated apples, 14c@15c; dried, 6c. Maple syrup, old, 80c@90c per tin; sugar, 7½c@9c.

GROCERIES -- Orders and remittances have shown little or no improvement over last week but the Easter trade has caused some stir in a small way. Business in sugar moderate but market firm. Refiners seem resolved to maintain prices. Granulated is quoted at 64cm64c with some business we believe at 63-16c. Yellows are firm and it was said there was none obtainable under 5c, the best grade being worth 53c. Syrups and molasses quiet and unchanged. The tea trade has been lifeless, only small jobbing parcels selling. Coffee is steady to firm. It is stated that 161c was refused for Maracaibo and 17c @171c is quoted. Since writing elsewhere about canned goods we learn that considerable corn has been sold ahead and 500 cases mackerel of '87 pack have been placed by the case at \$3.40, usual risk. There is still excitement about salmon and speculation is rife as to the advance in the freight rate. Some say it will be \$1.35 and others \$1.45 per case. Evaporated and dried apples and prunes keep firm at former prices. English sugar market is firm, most descriptions of raw being held for 3d per cwt. more money and beet for June is now 11s 3d per ewt. Refined is 14d per cwt. dearer. Recent advices report: Tea has ruled dull, Common Blacks going easier. Low Common Shantam sold down to 4146643d, but quality is lowest yet offered. Low to clean Common Kaisow, with fair even leaf, 5 to 51d per lb. Common to good Common Paklin 5½dm7½d per lb. Greens sold rather irregularly. Gunpowder and No. 1 Young Hyson being a turn easier. Coffee— A parcel of St. Domingo from New York realized 67s 6d @ 68s per cwt. Fruit .-- No change to report. Currants 15s@15s 6d f.o.b. Patras for common Provincial, and 16s@16s 6d for prime, or 17s 6d c.i.f. Montreal. Walnuts, "Cornes" offer at 12s 6d per bag f.o.b. Bordeaux, but quality is poor. Barcelona nuts 21s 6d per bag f.o.b. Tarragona. Softshell Almonds have suddenly risen to 42s per bag f.o.b Tarragona, owing to speculators buying up everything they can, in consequence of a severe frost having occurred. Rice is quiet with a declining tendency, 8s 6d common, 8s ad per cwt, for good. Spices are less active, Nutnegs selling 4d to 1d per lb. cheaper, and Tapioca slightly easier. Arrowroot 24d@3d per lb. in barrels. Senna very firm at 5d@6d per lb. for anything of fair quality. Cochin Ginger in larger supply at public sales of new crop, which went irregularly and lower for rough description.

HIDES AND TALLOW .-- A good demand is experienced for hides, and receipts which have been light are now on the increase, owing to the briskness of the Easter trade in cattle. The market for packer and buff hides in Chicago declined about ic under a quiet market and small sales. Tanners in a position to do so have been holding off for a better quality of stock which may be expected from now forward. Tallow quiet and unchanged, About 3,500 lbs. of mixed was recently sold

IRON AND HARDWARE.-There is no change of consequence to note in the position of the iron market since last report. Small lots have continued to be sold from stock here in the vicinity of \$19 ex-yard. For spring delivery sales of good sized lots of Summerlee, Calder, etc., are reported at prices based on \$18.25 @ \$18.50 in Montreal. The British warrant market does not show much change, although it has been slightly lower on account of some speculative holders realizing. Bar iron has been selling freely ex-stock at about \$1.60, but we have not heard of any large transactions for spring delivery. Canada plates are now being offered at about £7 128 6d @7 15s f. o. b. South Wales and timplates are also keeping at fairly low prices. The general tone of the market is rather quiet at present. Warrants in Glasgow are cabled weak and lower at 42s 1d. No. 3 Foundry in Middlesborough is at 34s 9d, and hematite pig in Workington at 44s 6d. London, April 2. — Tin, spot, £102 10s; three months' futures, £102 17s 6d. Market firm. G. O. B. Chili bars, £39 12s 6d; soft Spanish lead, £12 10s; best selected copper, £44 10s; soft English lead, £12 15s ; Silesian spelter, £14 2s 6d; Star antimony, £20 10s; tin plates, 12s 9d.

LEATHER AND SHOES .- So far a fair business has been put through this month in leather. but the tone of the market is now quiet as usual at the approach of Easter. The shoe factories are in receipt of a good many small orders, but the boot and shoe trade has not recovered as yet from the over plus of stock

sorting trade will show up well and compensate in a great measure for the deficiency in the regular trade. Another point is that the various bankrupt estates having been sold and the stocks cleared out of the market, country buyers will have no more bargains to anticipate and consequently can have no further reason to delay their orders. All that can be said is, that trade of late has been as good as possible under the circumstances. Advices from England report a quiet market and there is not much going forward at the moment from this side. English imported oak sole is firm and quoted here at 44c@47c.

RAW FURS .- Full advices of the London March auctions, including the Hudson Bay, Lampson and other sales, have been received. Otters show an advance, firsts and seconds of 15 p. c.; thirds and fourths were about 10 p. c. lower than last march; dark skins sold from 50s @ 60s per skin, and large pale skins from 52s @ 55s. Fisher about 7½ p. c. lower. Silver for 10 p. c. lower, the decline principally in pale skins. Gross fox 15 p. c. lower, Lynx

The extreme prices of last March for the American market proved unprofitable to the buyers and resulted in a severe re-action. Firsts and seconds dropped from 45 @ 50 p.c., and thirds 25 p.c. Buyers of this article will have to be careful as the high prices are not likely to be again realized. Red fox, firsts, are about stationary at last March prices, but the commoner grades, seconds and thirds are about 25 p.c. higher, and the fourths almost double last year's prices. The advance in the commoner sorts is due to the demand for tails which are used to manufacture boas. White fox are in great favor for dyeing purposes, and as this article is very limited in quantity they advanced about 50 p c. Skunk 121 p.c. less than last year. Marten, firsts, have receded 10 p.c., chiefly in good colored skins; pale skins declined about 5 p.c.; seconds from 15 @ 25 p. c., according to their marks, the better grades showing the largest fall. Mink have not maintained last year's prices. The best fell off about 5 p.c., while the lower grades advanced about 20 p.c. Beaver sold at an average decline of 10 p.c. Wolves proved to be in great demand and advanced fully 60 p.c. The collection of this article is now very small, probably not more than 5 p.c. in quantity compared with ten or fifteen years ago, Wolverine 15 p.c. higher, Bear in favor and about 30 p.e. higher for good skins; balanced by a decline of 15 p.c. in seconds and 25 p.c. in thirds. At "various sales," not Lampsons, we note the following :- Australian opossum. —The small supply caused the demand to remain steady at last year's rates. Muskrat remained at about January prices. Sea offer show an advance of about 20 p.c. on the very high prices of last year. Common skins and cuts about 15 p.c. higher. Coming to Lampson's sales, we find much the same advance and decline as at the Hudson Bay. Racoon, a somewhat smaller collection than last year, were sold at a ready advance of 25 p.c. over March prices. Grey fox, 17,600 skins against 2,000 last year. In spite of the large quantity offered, this article realized 10 p. c. over last year's prices, and were bought exclusively for England. Muskrat at Lampson's sold at a decline of 10 p.c. compared with January. The sales were quite active and the goods sold freely. The particulars will soon follow of the sale of 54,674 salted Copper Island seals which, however, have been placed at an advance over last year's prices. Following recovered as yet from the over plus of stock made last fall and pushed forward, and in consequence, orders have been in considerably smaller compass this year. 
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
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
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
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SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned, and endorsed "Tender for Indian Supplies," will be received at this office up to noon of SATURDAY, 30th April, 1887, for the delivery of Indian Supplies during the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1888, consisting of Flour, Bacon, Groceries, Ammunition, Twine, Oxen, Cows, Bulls, Agricultural Implements, Tools, &c., duty paid, at various points in Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

Forms of tender containing full particulars relative to the Supplies required, dates of delivery, &c., may be had by applying to the undersigned, or to the Indian Commissioner at Regina, or to the Indian Office, Winnipeg.

Parties may tender for each description of goods (or for any portion of each description of goods) separately, or for all the goods called for in the Schedules, and the Department reserves to itself the right to reject the whole or any part of a tender.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted Cheque on a Canadian Bank in favor of the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs for at least five per cent. of the amount of the tender, which will be forfeited if the party tendering declines to enter into a contract based on such tender when called upon to do so, or if he fails to complete the work contracted for. If the tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned.

Tenderers must make up in the Money colunins of the Schedule the total money value of the goods they offer to supply, or their tender will not be entertained.

Each tender must, in addition to the signa-ture of the tenderer, be signed by two sureties acceptable to the Department, for the proper performance of the contract.

When implements of a particular make are mentioned it is because the articles so designated suit the Department for the purpose required better than others; in such cases the competition between tenderers must, of course, be in the transportation to the place of delivery.

In all cases where transportation may be only partial by rail, contractors must make proper arrangements for supplies to be forwarded at once from railway stations to their destination in the Government Warehouse at the point of delivery.

Tenderers will please note carefully the following conditions:-

Supplies will not be paid for until the Department has been assured of the satisfactory delivery of each article for which. payment is claimed.

2. No tender for supplies of a description different to that given in the index will be considered, and supplies which are found, on delivery, to be of a kind or quality different to those described, will be rejected by the agents of the Department; and the contractor and his sureties will be held responsible for any loss entailed on the Department through failure to deliver in accordance with terms of contract.

3. It must be distinctly understood that supplies are to be delivered at the various points for the prices named in the tender; that no additional charge for packing or any other account will be entertained, and that an invoice must accompany each separate delivery of supplies. An invoice for each separate delivery must also be sent to the
