ECLIPSES for the Year 1787.

There will be Six Eclipses this Year, three of the Sun and three of the Moon, in the following Order, viz.

- I. The first will be of the Moon, January 3^d, Visible and Total, by Calculation as follows.

Beginning of the Eclipse	5.	46.	} Apparent. time After- noon.
Beginning of Total Darkness,	6.	44.	
Middle of the Eclipse,	7.	33 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Digits Eclipsed 20 $^{\circ}$. 54'. from N. side of $\odot$'s Shadow.			

- II. The second will be of the Sun January 19th, invisible in these Parts The Eclipse ending some time before Sunrise. This Eclipse will be Visible in London, greatest Observation, 1 $^{\circ}$. 17' on Sun's Northern Limb, at 6h. 19m. in the Morning.

- III. The Third will be of the Sun, June 15th, invisible, by reason of the Moon's great North Latitude: By a Spherical Projection, I find this Eclipse will be Visible in London; greatest Obscuration 5 Digits and 25 Minutes, at 39 Minutes after our Noon. Near the North Pole, the Eclipse will be Central and Total, about half an hour after 11 o'Clock, A. M.

- IV. The fourth will be of the Moon, June 30th. at 10h. 21m. in the Forenoon, consequently invisible here.

- V. The fifth will be of the Sun December 9th, invisible. $\odot$ at 11h 56m. in 8s. 17 $^{\circ}$ 36'. $\oslash$ s. Lat. 47' 30" South $\odot$ will be centrally Eclipsed on the Meridian at oh. 5m. Afternoon, in Long. 65 $^{\circ}$. West, and Lat. 84 $^{\circ}$ South.

- VI. The Sixth will be of the Moon December 24th at 11h. 53m. in the Forenoon, consequently invisible in these Parts.

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The SHEPHERD of BANBURY's Rules to judge of the Changes of the Weather.

1. If the Sun rise red and fiery, — *wind and rain.*
2. If clearly, and it soon decrease, — *certain fair weather.*

CLOUDS.

1. Small and round, like a dapple-grey, with a north wind, — *fair weather for two or three days.*
2. Large like rooks, — *great showers.*
3. If small Clouds encrease, — *much rains.*
4. If large Clouds decrease, — *fair weather.*

MISTS.

1. If they rise in low grounds, and soon vanish, — *fair weather.*
2. If they rise to the hill tops, — *rain in a day or two.*
3. A general Mist before the Sun rises, near the full Moon, — *fair weather.*
4. If in the new Moon, — *rain in the Old.*
5. If in the old, — *rain in the new.*

WINDS,

1. Observe, that in eight years time there is as much south-west wind, as north-east; and consequently as many wet years, as dry
2. When the Wind turns to north-east, and it continues two days without rain, and does not turn south on the third day, it is likely to continue north-east for eight or nine days, — *all fair*; and then come to the south again.
3. If it turns again out of the south to the north-east with rain and continues in the north-east two days without rain, and neither turns south, nor rains the third day, — *it is like to continue north-east for two or three months.* — The Wind will finish these turns in three weeks

SOUTH-WEST WINDS.

1. After a northerly Wind, for the most part two months or more, and then coming south, there are usually *three or four fair days at first, and then on the fourth or fifth day comes rain*, or else the wind turns north again, and continues dry.
2. If it returns to the south within a day or two without rain, and northward with rain, and returns to the south in one or two days as before, two or three times together after this sort, — then it is likely to be in the south or south-west two or three months together, as it was in the north before. — The Winds will finish these turns in a fortnight.

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3. Fair weather for a week with a southerly Wind, is like to produce a great draught, If there has been much rain out of the south before. The Wind usually turns from north to south with a quiet wind without rain, but returns to the north with strong winds and rain; The strongest Winds are when it turns from south to north by west.

N. B. When the north Wind first clears the air, (which is usually once a week) be sure of a fair day or two.

C L O U D S.

1. In Summer or Harvest, when the wind has been south two or three days, and it grows very hot, and you see Clouds, rise with great white tops like towers, as if one were upon the top of another, and joined together with black on the neither side—there will be thunder and rain suddenly.

2. If two such Cloud rise, one on either hand,—it is time to make haste to shelter.

3. If you see a Cloud rise against the wind, or side wind, when that Cloud comes up to you, the wind will blow the same way that the Cloud came. And the same rule holds of a clear place, when all the sky is equally thick, except one clear edge.

4. Sudden rains never last long: but when the air grows thick by degrees, and the Sun, Moon, and Stars, shine dimmer and dimmer then it is like to rain six hours usually.

5. If it begin to rain from the south, with a high wind for two or three hours, and the wind falls, but the rain continues,—it is like to rain twelve hours or more; and does usually rain till a strong north wind clears the air.—These long rains seldom hold above twelve hours, or happen above once a year.

6. If it begins to rain an hour or two before Sun rising, it is like to be fair before noon, and so continue that day: but if the rain begin an hour or two after Sun rising, it is like to rain all that day, except the Rainbow be seen before it rains.

S P R I N G and S U M M E R,

If the last eighteen days of February, and ten days of March, be for the most part rainy, then the Spring and Summer quarters are like to be so too. I never knew a great draught, but it entered in that season.

W I N T E R.

1. If the latter end of October, and beginning of November be for the most part warm and rainy, then January and February are like to be frosty and cold except after a very dry summer.

2. If October and November be snow and frost; then January and February are like to be open and mild.

BEGINNING at the Center of the Bridge called Seven Mile Bridge on the Road leading through *Wilmot* to *Annapolis*, being the Bounds fixed between the County of *Annapolis* and *King's County* Thence to run South Ten Degrees East Five Hundred and Twenty Six Chains Thence North Eighty Degrees East, Eight Hundred and Eighty Chains to the Western Limits of *Horton* Township, and bounded on the North East Side by *Horton* and *Cornwallis*, and on the North by the Bay of Fundy, and from the Bound first mentioned to run North Ten Degrees West to the said Bay, which includes all the Land lying between the Western Limits of *Cornwallis* and *Horton*, and the Lines that divide *Annapolis* and *King's County* containing Eighty Six Thousand Acres.
