

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

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## The Great American Rush.

OU remember what Sydney Smith called Daniel Webster,—"A steam-engine in trousers." That hits about nineteen out of twenty of us Americans. We're all steam-engines, and trying, for the most part, to do a mile a minute. To be sure this terrible vehemence has accomplished great things. While a hundred years ago this country was, generally speaking, a howling wilderness, it is now, from Atlantic to Pacific, a humming hive of industry. But this continual rush has made us, as a nation, a particularly feverish and nervous lot of people; and what we want above everything else—more than we want a new tariff, or a revised currency—is rest. The American nation should take a good square loaf. Of course it is not to be had anywhere in the country; the atmosphere of the United States is so saturated with bustle and hustle and lurry that to breathe it is to make one start upon the run. To get rest, relaxation and recuperation, you must get out of the country. Now, fortunately, Nature supplies a remedy for every disorder,

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noth the Anna our great and national fever of unrest is right at hand. Turn to the map, and see how Nova Scotia pushes her nose down towards "the State," as much as to say, "Come over here; here's what you want."

## Nature's Own Vacation Land.

The distance from Boston to Yarmouth, the nearest point of Nova Scotia, is only a matter of 222 miles; but what a differ-

ence! Instead of the mad haste of New England, you get into the peaceful serenity of the Land of Evangeline; and you feel a spirit of restfulness and content as delightful as it is new. Nova Scotia is a land of bright days, cool nights, and pure air. What else could the air be but

pure, when the peninsula, only 300 miles long and 100 at the broadest, is always fanned on every side by ocean breezes? And then the people,—the modern Acadians! The Nova Scotian is your true philosopher; he looks upon life as a thing to be enjoyed, instead of something, as we Americans think it, to be hurried through and got rid of. There is no mad rush there in business, and no giddy whirl in society; it is distinctly a land of rest, and its pleasures are of the wholesome, natural and recuperative kind.

# WHAT TO

One may do everything in Nova Scotia that can be done out of doors. The roads are DO THERE, excellent for cycling, if you are given to the wheel; and

nothing could be more exhilerating than a spin through the beautiful Acacia Valley, or up along the winding And as for boating, - that most delightful

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of summer occupations—Nova Scotia is full of it; for paradoxical as it may seem, this is a land of water. All the coast towns have excellent harbors, and most of the inland towns nestle upon the banks of lake or river. There is bathing, too, cool in some places, but surprisingly warm in others, by reason of local peculiarities; and as for fishing, Nova Scotia in early spring affords the finest fishing on this continent, while all through the summer, one may safely east his hook and line in almost any Nova Scotian water with abundant returns. And in the shooting

season, that is in the fall, any man who is on good terms with shot-gnn or rifle can use it here with gratifying results, not only on wild ducks, snipe, teal, woodcock, and the smaller game, but on moose and caribon.

### SURPASSING SCENERY.

A vacation is very much like a play, greatly improved by good scenery. And nowhere on this continent, surely, is there more beautiful scenery,

than may be found in this little peninsula. One may begin to enjoy it immediately upon landing; for from any high point and c ocean that o a viev to be to one him, l strete broad down itself, water tide a of Ca simpl Halifa

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point in Yarmouth there are fine views to be had, of city and country, of lake and river, of harbor and bay and ocean. At Digby, again, standing on the crown of the hill that overlooks the town and the broad blue basin, one geta a view of enchanting beauty. But perhaps the finest view to be had is the magnificent reach of vision that opens up to one that stands on the top of "Look-off." Here beneath him, hundreds of feet below, lies the Coruwallis Valley, stretching to the westward twenty or thirty miles, and so broad that six different rivers course their separate ways And then the Basin down to the red Basin of Minas. itself, reaching away to the south and to the east, with its waters always red from the constant struggle between the tide and the dykes that hold it back. As for the scenery of Cape Breton, if one may push on as far as that, it is simply transcendent; and all along the South Shore, from Halifax back to Yarmouth, there are scenes of surpassing boldness and grandeur.

### HOW TO GO.

When getting to Nova Scotia meant a long, circuitous, tedious and expensive railroad ride, it is not to be wondered

at that people turned their vacation steps in other directions. But this was all changed when the Yarmouth Steamship Co., a few years ago, opened a direct line from Boston to Yarmouth, putting on the handsome, staunch, Clyde-built steel steamer "Yarmouth." Then Americans began to go to Nova Scotia in earnest, and in such numbers that, two or three years later, it was found necessary to put on another boat; and the "Boston," a superb steel ship, some 245 feet in keel and 35 in beam, of 1,700 tons and 4,500 horse-power, was put on as a mate to the "Yar-These boats,—the finest coasters that put out from Boston—are as handsome and commodious as they are swift and safe; each accommodates 350 passengers, and is abundantly fitted for their comfort, having a large number of staterooms, ample cabins, smoking rooms for men, and reception rooms for ladies. This ocean voyage makes a delightful beginning of a vacation, particularly delightful to those who live inland, as it gives them a taste of salt, and serves as admirable seasoning for the vacation. These boats leave Lewis Wharf, Boston, at noon, getting into Yarmouth for an early breakfast next morning. Returning, they leave Yarmouth at supper time and are in Boston the next forenoon; giving the voyager about a seventeen hours' sail; and he will find this ocean voyage, brief though it is, one of the most delightful features of his outing.

# Railroads and Hotels.

Let no one hnagine, however, because Nova Scotla is a land of Acadlan simplicity, that the only means of getting from place to place is by paddling the

streams and following trails through the woods. As a matter of fact, the railroads of Nova Scotla are on a par with our best American roads. But if one wishes to linger any length of time in any of the pretty little Nova Scotian towns, he may find it agreeable,—especially in these days of financial depression,- to take up quarters in one of the modest little boarding houses everywhere to be found; where he is sure of the kindest welcome; a table where digestion waits on appetite and health on both; and a bed so fuii of sleep that he is likely to be late to breakfast, where, in fact, he may revel in all the wholesome and substantial joys of living, at the very modest figure of a dollar, or at the most a dollar and a quarter, a day.



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
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
