Press.)-An immense loss of life is reported in give the death roll as between 30,000 Trades and Labor Council and paid and 40,000 as the result of a typhoon, combined with torrential rains and high tides which occurred on Aug. 29. Great floods followed and the upper Wenchow River overflowed its banks and swept over a vast area.

The Town of Esingtien, about 40 miles to the northwest of Wenchow, was overwhelmed and 10,000 of the inhabitante were drowned. Various other towns and villages were destroyed, and the prefecture at Chuchow, which is an important missionary station, was washed away.



Altho for the past number of years the growth of the population of Ontario has remained practically at a standstill, the turningpoint has been reached and from now on a steady rise in the population of this province is to be looked forward to.

be looked forward to.

This is the opinion of two of the leading immigration officials of Ontario, and from present indications is an undisputable fact. Up to this year the tide of migration from Ontario to the west has more than balanced the number of new arrivals coming in, and, while some of the cities of the province have grown, the decrease in rural population has been greater and the total population of Ontario, practically speaking, has remained stationary.

Tide Has Grown. The change, now being brought about is, that while during other years, the tide of immigration from the old country into Ontario has fallen away to nothing about midsummer, and remained "dead" until the following spring, immigration this year is now coming at as fast a rate or faster than it did during the spring, and

Murdoch of the immigration and colonization department of the C.N.R., stated to The World yesterday that under the new system, hundreds of families are coming over to Canada, who otherwise would have waited several years. These families are met at their starting point and conducted to Bristol by officials of the depart-ment. On board the C.N.R. steamships are placed in charge of a matron and on the arrival at the ship at Quebec they are again met by a repre-sentative of the department. By him they are personally conducted to their

Mr. Murdoch said that those intending leaving the old land for Canada find it necessary to book their passage two months in advance. 


