G. W. F. Johnson writes from Dawson City that the Hardships Are Somewhat Exaggerated—The Average Temperature in Winter is Twenty Degrees Below Zero; Says Mr. Wear of Chicago—The British Yukon Company Will Build a Railroad at Once in View of the Great Rush to the Klondike District—News About Canada's Wonderful Gold Strike.

Montreal, July 29.—Mr. C. H. Wilkinson, Canadian representative of the British Yukon Company, confirms the report that the White Pass pack trail over the mountain to the pass, was opened for travel on July 18. Not only was the pass opened for pack travel, he said, but the company had completed arrangements for placing a fleet of between 10 and 20 steamboats on the Yukon River as soon as the river opens next spring. The boats have already been contracted for and will be in readiness for the start of navigation.

VERY SEVERE FIGHTING

Situation in Northern India Has Become Serious. SECOND ATTACK MADE ON THE BRITISH. Thirteen Sepoys Were Killed and Thirty Wounded in an All-Night Battle.

Bombay, July 29.—The situation at Camp Malakand has become very serious. Word has been received that the natives in large force made a second attack on the fort yesterday. The fighting was very severe. Thirteen of the British were killed and 30 wounded, the latter including Lieut. Castello. The tribesmen lost 100. The worst feature of the situation now is that the garrison is short of ammunition, and it is feared the whole supply will be exhausted before reinforcements arrive.

Insulted the Queen. London, July 29.—A despatch from Lucknow, India, says that on Saturday Manvi Sidayat Rasool was arrested on a charge of having insulted Queen Victoria at a recent meeting of Mohammedans held to congratulate the Sultan upon his victories over Greece. It is alleged that at this meeting Rasool declared to the assemblage that "but for the Sultan's forbearance, the old woman's ribs would have been broken years ago." The case was adjourned.

An Editor Arrested. Bombay, July 29.—The editor of the newspaper Yaliba, published at Poonah, had been arrested and brought here on the charge of sedition. Sent out of Harm's Way. Sedar Balwantrao Nahu and Huro-pant Hantambhar, who were arrested yesterday on a charge of being implicated in a case outside the limits of the Poonah district, have been deported under a warrant for the arrest and detention of persons known to be engaged in seditious practices. The power of deportation has not been exercised for many years.

Details of the Attack. Simla, July 29.—The north camp at Malakand was abandoned yesterday afternoon, the troops concentrating on Kotal. The British were very severely wounded, of whom 13 Sepoys were killed and 42 wounded.

MAY MAKE YOUR OWN GOLD

If You Can Get Hold of Dr. Emmons' Secret.

OUT OF MEXICAN DOLLARS

The Doctor Produced Argentaurum, Meaning "Gold-Silver."

It is not a great amount for the time and labor expended, but it has not been "playing possum" with the assayers, there can be no doubt that he has made one of the greatest discoveries of the age.

It is not a transmutation or other alchemical process indicated in the story of the alchemist, but it is a process which will prevent expansion of the metal, and subjects the mass to heavy and continuous heating "under a condition of cold" such as to prevent even a temporary rise of temperature when the mass is struck. That is as much as he will make public.

He does not pretend that if the Mexican dollar were of pure silver he could produce gold, but says that with any silver dollar in which there is a trace of gold he can extract a metal which is equally as valuable as gold and which may be sold for gold. To any one who doubts this he points to the record at the Assay Office, where his son sold the metal.

Dr. Emmons asserts with great positiveness that within two years he will produce as much gold as will be found in any mines that may be worked.

He has recently put a force engine in his laboratory at West Brighton, S. I., which furnishes pressure, as required, exceeding 100 tons to the square inch. With his present machinery he insists that the yield of the metal from his works will be more than 50,000 ounces monthly.

View in Assay Office

The present attitude of scientists is best illustrated by the position taken by Mr. Mason, superintendent of the Assay Office, who says that as long as Dr. Emmons declines to disclose the process by which he has attained his results, all may feel at liberty to doubt his assertions. Mr. Mason said yesterday that the Doctor was a peculiar person, and his tale was interesting. A son of the Doctor had sold a certain quantity of the metal to the Assay Office, and he (Mason) knew, the office would continue to purchase anything which stood the test demanded by law.

Emmons himself, naturally, is enthusiastic. He insists there is some gratification in having the world that jested at him come to him serious and wonder how he did it, but he does not propose to disclose any of his secret that will injure him. He is a believer in the Mendeleef theory of periodicity, and the space, higher black, between silver and gold in the periodical table of the elements.

Had a Professor.

In last May a Chicagoan named Brice applied for a patent on a process for the making of gold out of baser metals. The Director of the Mint made an investigation and reported adversely on the Brice's use of antimony largely, but it was found that a certain amount of gold was in the antimony. That was not making gold out of antimony.

Brice, it was thought, deceived himself, but Emmons is too good a scientist to be deluded. He is a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers and of the Societe Internationale des Electriciens. He is the inventor of Emmons' process, which is a combination of gold and silver and for which he has received \$20,000.

And all this, he declares, he made out of a few Mexican silver dollars.

INTERESTING TO DOCTORS.

Mitkowski, or Lewis, was born in the village of Warsaw in the Kingdom of Russia for this, and how they have been sent to Siberia for a crime of which he was innocent. He was purchasing a book at a second-hand store for which he was arrested on suspicion, tried and sent to Siberia for a year. He then joined a circus, and while in a circus he was attacked and badly hurt by a large Russian bear from which he was held up in Bellevue Hospital and lingered between life and death for several weeks. The Connecticut Telephone and Electric Company, Chicago, is making an application in reference to a telephone franchise in this city.

Grand Trunk Shops.

A deputation of Grand Trunk Railway employees waited upon the Mayor yesterday to request that he should take steps to prevent the removal of the company's shops to London. The men stated that the shops had been in operation for many years, and that they were a source of employment for many of the city's poor. They said that the company had offered to buy the shops, but that the price offered was very low, and that they were unwilling to sell at that price.

Bank of England Statement.

London, July 29.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes as compared with the previous account: Total reserve, decreased £2,940,000; bullion, decreased £224,357; other securities, decreased £550,000; other deposits, decreased £185,000. Notes, reserve, decreased £235,000. Government securities, unchanged. The proportion of the Bank of England's reserve to liability, which last week was 50.50 per cent, is now 50.00 per cent. The Bank of England's rate of discount remains unchanged at 2 per cent.

Every Belgian to be a Soldier.

Brussels, July 29.—The Chamber of Deputies has passed a bill compelling all Belgians who have had a year's residence to enroll themselves in the civic guard.

Will the Irishmen be Released?

London, July 29.—As a result of the effort of John Redmond, the Parliamenter, and other members of the Government, it will soon release the five remaining Irish prisoners, Wilson, Burton, Dalton, Flanagan and O'Connell, now undergoing sentences of penal servitude for life in Portland Prison.

It is thought probable that the forthcoming visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Ireland will be signalled by the release of all Irish political prisoners.

Establishes a Protectorate Over Jarvis Island and the Phoenix Group.

London, July 29.—According to the official colonial list Great Britain has established a protectorate over Jarvis Island and the Phoenix group comprising Phoenix, Birnie, Hull, Gardner and Sidney Islands, and over Washington (New York) Island, and Palmyra and Johnson Islands. After the words "Johnson Island" is an asterisk, referring to a footnote, which reads as follows: "Signed withdrawn and acceded to by the Dominion of Hawaii, on condition that the right to land a cable is conceded if desired."

It is thought, however, does not clearly indicate whether the footnote refers to the last named Island (Johnson) only, or to all.

THE CARMONA ALSO AGROUND.

Sister Steamer of the Cambria Went on in St. Clair River—Camberia Not Much Damaged.

St. Clair, Mich., July 29.—The steamer Carmona, sister steamer to the ill-fated Cambria of the Windsor, Detroit & Soo Line, reached Detroit this noon, having returned from the St. Clair River opposite the city during a thick fog this morning. She was bound down. She had been drifting because of thick weather, but started her engines to get out of the way of a barge on ground. She was released by the tug Vigilant, which towed her to the pier. She suffered no damage. Some of the passengers from the Cambria were aboard.

To Release the Cambria.

Port Huron, July 29.—The tug C. O. Thompson has taken the contract to release the stranded passenger steamer Cambria, and the wreckers Saginaw and Wales have returned to Detroit. The wind continues to blow from the north, and there is a big sea running down the lake.

The Vessel Not Much Damaged.

Detroit, July 29.—W. J. Brown, general manager of the Windsor & Detroit Soo Line, reached Detroit this noon, having carefully inspected the Cambria. He says: "The Cambria is in good condition. We will have her in commission again by next Tuesday, or at the farthest by the Tuesday following. D. C. Thompson took the contract for releasing her for \$500, and expects to get her in Port Huron to-night. Her wreckers are not broken down, as is her machinery or hull damaged. Captain Charles Hill certainly handled the boat very creditably in her distress. He made the vessel, and let the women go first, giving preference to those women having children."

The Fisheries Appeal.

The argument in the appeal of the Dominion Government in the fisheries case was continued to-day. The judges seem to favor the case as presented by counsel for the Dominion. The appeal is against the judgment of the Supreme Court, delivered in October, 1895, which was mainly in favor of the provinces, holding that they have jurisdiction over the waters within the limits of the provinces. This is the chief question in dispute.
