Ottawa, April 2. — (Special World) Staff Correspondence.)-An important announcement was made late this afternoon in the House, when Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick stated that the cabinet was considering the advisability of appointing a select committee of the House considering the advisability of appointing a select committee of the House to amend the election law in order to get rid of the evils that are so loudly complained of. The statement was the result of a speech made by Mr. Fielding in answer to Mr. Borden. The Finate Minister took very advanced grounds. He said he personally thought a select committee of the House might get together in no partisan spirit and remedy the Election Act, so that it would put a stop to corruption.

Wrong in Principle.
