## City of Hamilton

### BOARD OF EDUCATION NOTES

School Attendance is Growing Less Month by Month in Mysterious Way.

MAJOR HENDRIE TOP ILL FOR PARADE

Workers Talk of Increasing Price of Bread-Labor Troubles Feared.

Hamilton, April 2.—The condition of Major John S. Hendrie, M.L.A., is causing his friends some uneasiness. He was not well enough to-night to attend the first spring parade of the Fourth Field Battery, of which he is the commanding officer. Major Hendrie well took his place, and put the boys through some of the new drill.

**School Matters.**  
The favorite topic at the meetings of the Board of Education appears to be the matter of increases in salaries. To-night the Internal Management Committee voted an increase of \$80 to caretaker McRide of the Central School, who has been getting \$500 a year. He will have one week to wait for it, as it will not take effect until Jan. 1, 1904. Several other janitors had similar requests to make, but the committee stood them all off until September. Samuel Garrity was appointed caretaker of the Sophia street school.

One thing that bothers the trustees is that the school population is growing less month by month, although the city appears to be growing as it never did before. In March last year the average attendance at the public schools was 6736, while last month it was 6414. An epidemic of mumps partly accounts for the decrease.

**Basement for a Church.**  
The Public Library Board want to make more money out of the part of their building which is let to tenants. But Rev. Dr. Lytle, one of the members, objects to raising cash by what he terms at the meeting this evening, going into the church business. Librarian Lytle informed the board that he believed that he had led a hall in the basement to a religious sect. The doctor said that he did not think they wanted to go into the church business, and some of his colleagues "jollied" him about being afraid of opposition. The board will likely raise the rents on the other tenants of the building to make up for the loss of the basement.

**Ladies' Aid Concert.**  
The Ladies Aid Society of the James street Baptist Church gave a concert to-night that packed the Sunday school room. Those who took part were: Misses, Lillian Campbell, Grace Aweary, Greening, Muriel, Esauchoie, Irene, Elder, and Letha, and Mrs. Graham, and Messrs. L. Sey and W. O. Dettie.

**Machinists Met.**  
The machinists held a successful meeting to-night, and were addressed by Samuel Landers and William Henry. Mr. Landers presented Robert Land, who had a pin on behalf of the machinists.

**Plaintiffs in Luck.**  
The Assize Court, presided over by Judge Ferguson, closed at noon to-day. Joseph Sharpe of Waterdown, who sued F. Cook for the seduction of his daughter, Annie, was awarded \$500. A. C. Henry also got a judgment for \$1000 against the Hamilton Brass Manufacturing Company for the loss of an eye.

**Magistrate's Customers.**  
Fred Kallow, a cheeky pedlar, who fooled people into taking trashy literature, was sent to jail for four months. The case of A. D. Galloway, the brewer's clerk, charged with the theft of \$207, was laid over till Saturday.

**Interest in Labor Circles.**  
The striking teamsters employed by the city will commence work again to-morrow. They have been promised a 10-hour day at 30 cents an hour. They will get an increase of one cent a day, and will have to work one hour a week longer. The modern standards employed in the Macpherson Shoe Factory, and the conductors and motormen of the H. O. and B. are all asking for more wages.

**Assistant Pastor Engaged.**  
Rev. J. D. Cunningham, B.A., a young man who has just graduated from Knox College, has been engaged to Rev. Dr. Fletcher's assistant at the Macpherson shoe factory. He will commence his duties at church, and will remain until September.

The western boom has attracted thousands of the farmers in this province to pull up stakes and seek their fortunes in Manitoba, Northwest, and the Saskatchewan District. In the last two months 2228 experienced farmers have left by the excursion trains to the west. They took with them 611 cars of effects.

James Hartney, Dominion Immigration Agent, Manitoba, states that this number of western farmers will be greatly added to by the next four excursion trains, which leave during April.

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### HARD HARMES THE HOUSE

Harmony Suddenly Broken by Free Criticism of Member Cowan of South Essex.

## MR. BORDEN OBJECTS TO LANGUAGE

Suggests that the Liberal Leader Call Offender to Trial.

Ottawa, April 2.—(Special.)—A break was made in the harmony of the House this afternoon thru the free criticism of Mahlon K. Cowan (South Essex). Dr. Sproule had just sat down after commenting on Mr. Charlton's election bill. He said that the system of political corruption that had grown up was a disgrace. So widespread had it become that he thought he was justified in believing it was having an influence even on judges. This led him to introduce a resolution in the House in North York.

The "boy orator of Windsor" thought the virtuous lecture came with bad grace from Dr. Sproule, for he was the man who had gone to South Ontario, called on the Conservatives at that time to rally around a self-confessed criminal in the person of William Smith.

Challenges the Statement.

W. H. Bennett (Simcoe) warmly re-echoed the speaker's gratuitous remarks. He declared William Smith, ex-M.P., stood in the hearts of the people of Ontario as an honest and truthful man.

But Hon. John Bryden had never dared to face a court in South Ontario. He had sworn on the witness stand that he knew nothing of the alleged corruption and threw up the sponge.

Mr. Bennett dealt at some length with his famous South Ontario election trial, and declared that Mr. Smith had been acquitted only by the desire to protect the reputation of the Liberal party with its own weapons. When he was put on the witness stand he should have said that he had no recollection that he still had the heart to defend Ontario as that he fell short of defending William Smith, who had been elected by only seventy votes.

**Gang Rule Evident.**  
For Mr. Bryden, Mr. Bennett had no further information obtained upon witness stand that he knew nothing of corrupt practices, that he must have known the truth, and that he had sworn to it.

**Warm Words Exchanged.**  
Later on in the discussion of Mr. Charlton's resolution, Mr. Cowan called to the fight by suggesting that an amendment be inserted so as to punish the House for the conduct of its members. Mr. Cowan's remarks were called him to mind.
