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GOVERNMENT WILL BUILD INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS

Land and Money Grant to Pay for Boys Sent as Result of Reformatory Closing.

At the meeting of the Toronto Industrial School board yesterday, Hamilton Caldwell reported an interview with Hon. Mr. Stratton about the law passed in the legislature, but never proclaimed, to the effect that the Penitentiary Reformatory would be closed. The police magistrate throughout the country, however, have been acting on it and sending boys from the police courts to the Victoria Industrial School, thus giving the superintendent the care of boys over whom he has no legal control. In the industrial school now the government are only paying 70 cents a week for each boy's maintenance and the municipalities pay \$2.

WILL SAVE BRITAIN

The manufacturer and tradesman I have seen during 4000 miles of travel, while visiting the trade centres in this country, have to admit that the English tariff will be a detriment to the continued industrial prosperity of America."
