OTTAWA, March 11.—(Special.)—Before the commons settled down to supply on the railway estimates today, Haughton Lennox (South Simcoe) gave details of a transaction of which Hon. Geo. P. Graham and Hon. A. D. Aylesworth will require explanations from two government agents.

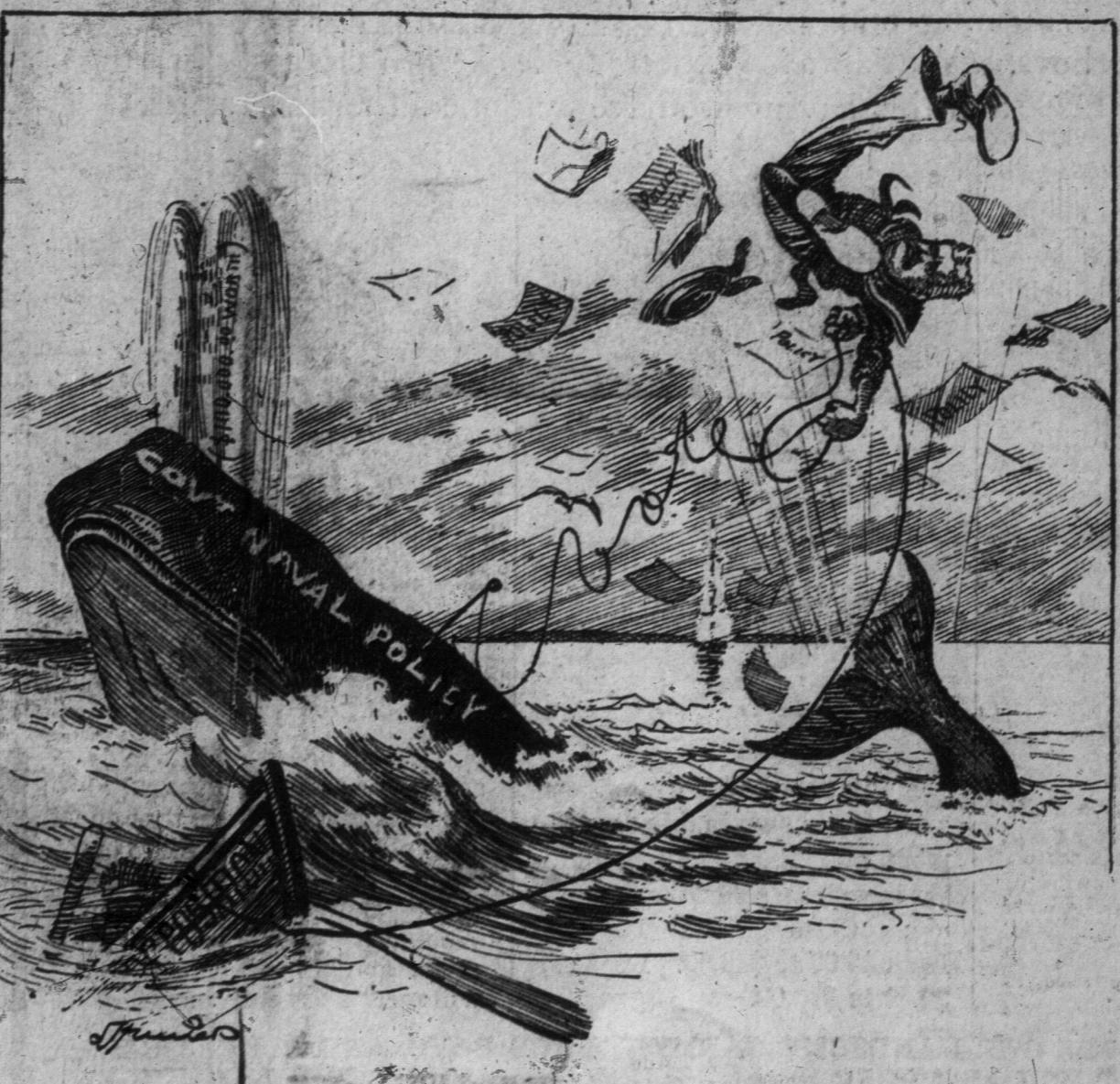
Manchester Mobs Patten For Squeeze in Cotton

AMENDMENTS TO THE LIQUOR LAW

May Allow New Vote on Local Option in One Year Where it Falls on the Three-fifths Clause—Open Seasons for Game Shortened.

One of the most important bills of the present legislature, the long-looked-for amendment to the Liquor License Act, was introduced by Hon. W. J. Hanna yesterday afternoon.

Another bill was introduced by Mr. Hanna, to bring into operation the "Juvenile Delinquents' Act" of the Dominion of Canada, passed in 1908.

TUBES BLOCKED; MAYOR WILL PROTEST

Queen's Park as Hard as Ottawa to Get Square Deal From, Complain Controllers in Burst of Indignation.

"I am not going to stand for this kind of treatment from the private bills committee, but will protest." Mayor Geary spoke as above at the meeting of the board of control yesterday afternoon with reference to the committee's action in denying to the city the right to construct surface lines as necessary feeders for the tube system.

His worship's remarks were prompted by City Engineer Rust's request that he be authorized to engage an expert on underground railway construction to assist him in the preparation of the report he has been asked to make.

The mayor's indignation is fully shared by the other members of the board. The decision of the committee that the city is seeking to enter into unfair competition with the railway in the newer territory came as a rude awakening and the feeling was freely expressed around the city hall that the whole tube project lay in ruins unless the committee reconsiders, or the legislature undertakes to over-ride the committee.

Whole Scheme Blocked. Controller Ward said he considered the committee had given very poor reward to a city which has done so much for the party in power at Queen's Park.

Corporation Influence. No one is more exercised than Ald. Maguire, chairman of the legislation committee, who says he has had a larger array of corporation influences than appeared before the committee.

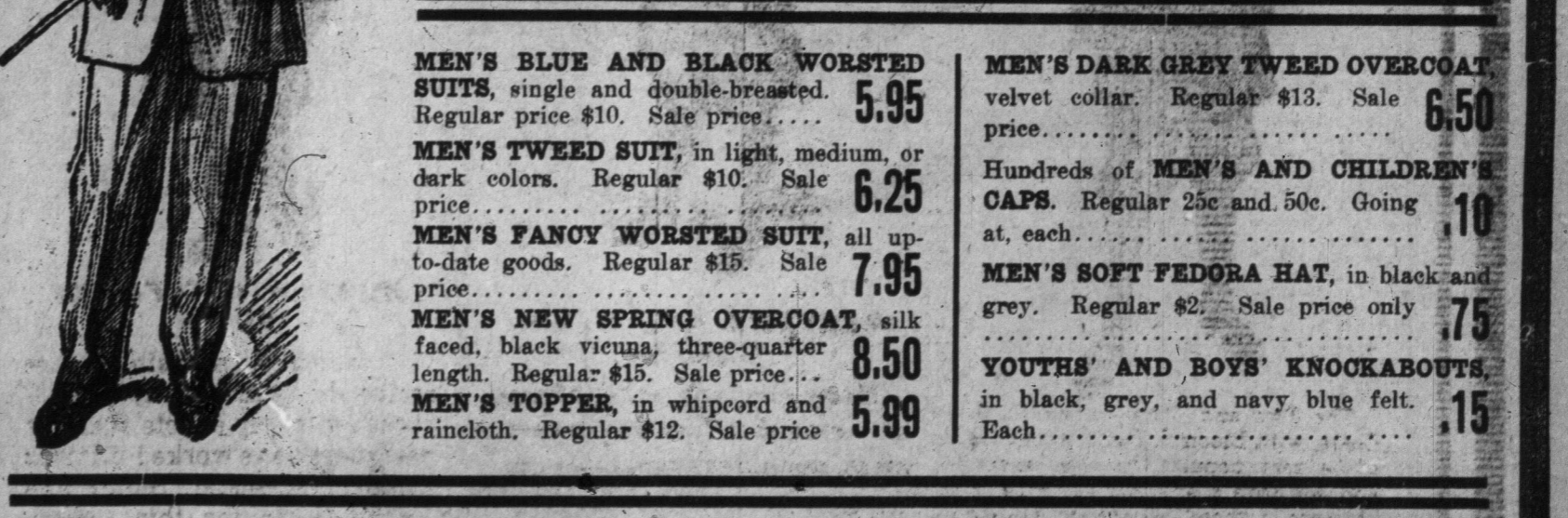
TRAIN ON TIME AGAIN

Output for Year so far Exceeds Previous Period. The annual meeting of the directors of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, held here yesterday afternoon, in his report, Mr. Borden, president, compared the tonnage of the mine last year with this, the figures being: 1909, 52,118, 1910, 54,492; Feb. 1910, 6,500, 1910, 22,977. He had just received a telegram stating that the output for the first six days was an average of 470 tons daily, an increase of 200 tons daily over the same period of last year.

NEW YORK CANALS OPEN To Canadian Vessels—Geo. Perley's Discovery.

OTTAWA, March 11.—(Special)—In the house to-day George H. Perley made a statement regarding the use of the Canadian canals. He stated that the canals are used freely by Americans, and some time ago Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, in reply to a question by Mr. Perley, confirmed the popular impression that while the State of New York nominally extended the use of its canals to Canadian vessels, the regulations imposed practically excluded them. Since then Mr. Perley has been conducting enquiries and he finds that while Canadian vessels were shut out after 1871, the New York canals have been open to Canadian vessels since 1895. He quoted authorities, much to the discomfiture of Mr. Aylesworth.

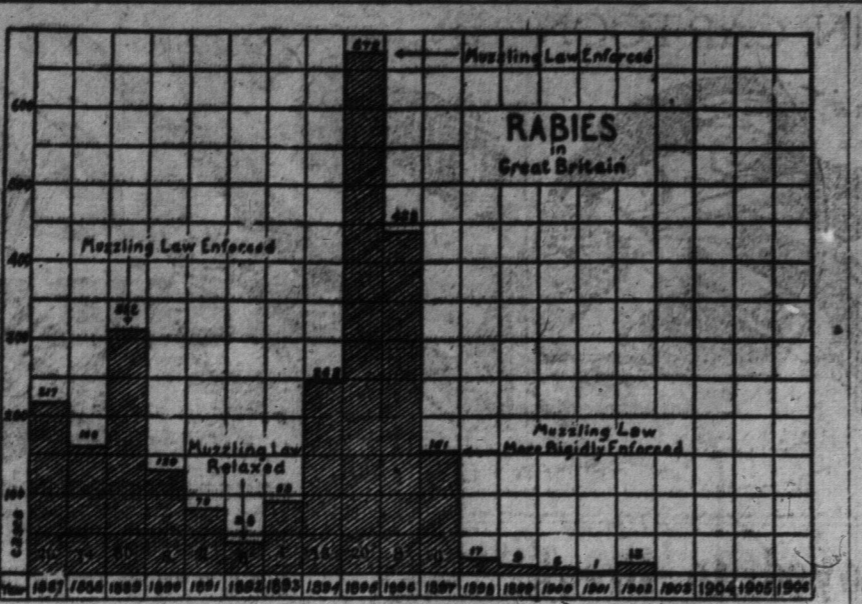

GREATER TORONTO AND TRANSPORTATION

Toronto has faced none too well at the hands of the private bill committee of the legislature, and redress must be sought from the government itself. The position in which the city is placed in connection with the extension of transportation service to and within the recently annexed districts requires adjustment to the new conditions, and that can only be secured by an extension of its powers.



The above chart shows the relation of the muzzling law to the prevalence of rabies in Great Britain. The figures in the cross-hatching indicate the number of persons who died of rabies in England. It will be noticed that after the enforcement of the muzzling law, in 1896, the number of cases grew less, until, in 1905, and since that year, there has not been a single case of rabies in England.

Muzzling in England HAS ERADICATED RABIES Not a Single Case Since 1903 Owing to Strict Enforcement of Dog Law.

In the American Medical Journal, Dr. Langdon Frothingham, instructor in bacteriology of Harvard Medical School, discusses the history, prevalence and prevention of rabies and its relation to animal experimentation. The article is a strong argument in favor of the muzzling of dogs, and valuable statistics are given to show the effect of muzzling orders in eradicating the disease.

There must shortly be a clear understanding on this point. The Dominion Government must have its position defined and its power to grant local rights over the heads of local authorities determined. At present the demands are only limited by the strength of the fight that the aggrieved party can make.

THE BRITISH POLITICAL STRUGGLE

According to the latest cables, the British Government is asking parliament to vote supplies for six weeks only, instead of a period from four to six months, as has been the practice for the last fifteen years. The object, which is reported as not concealed, is to secure that financial control will remain in the hands of the house of commons, when the political crisis is renewed thru the expected refusal of the house of lords to consent to any curtailment of its veto power.

The deadlock that will thus be created can only be resolved by another appeal to the country. That the action of the government is recognized as a good move on the political board is evident from the extreme resentment it has created among the opposition. But in politics, as in war, a contestant is not bound to play the enemy's game or to make his path smooth. It was not the Liberal Government that brought the house of lords into the political field, but the Conservative majority in it who claimed and exercised power to compel submission of the budget to the people and with that, power to control the political situation at all times in defence of their privileges and the interests of their own party.

This constant encroachment on provincial rights by the federal parliament will not cease until the provinces get together and act in dead earnest. The situation is grave and will soon become critical. The best interests of the Dominion require the continuance of provincial autonomy, and unless the tendency is curbed, a constitutional amendment protecting it should be demanded and carried. The general advantage of Canada now-a-days means nothing else than the particular advantage of franchise grabbers.

**CONTROLLERS AT ODDS
ON "DAY OFF" FOR POLICE**

Mayor and Controller Foster Oppose Move—Will Settle Mrs. Ward's Claim.

By a vote of three to two, Mayor Geary and Controller Foster being the dissenters, the board of control yesterday afternoon decided to recommend to the city council that the police department be given power to increase the strength of the force so as to permit of the city being a day off each week.

The mayor said he did not wish to deny the men the privilege, but he thought the city had done as much for the department as could reasonably be expected. It had been given all it asked. An effort was being made to improve the protection, as many parts of the city were under police, and instead of weakening the department by taking men off the daily strength, it should be strengthened.

Controller Ward believed that more plain-clothes-men were needed for the suppression of petty crimes, but Controller Spence considered the uniformed officers more effective.

As the police department regulates stand members can only retire after 2 1/2 years' service with the approval of the police commissioner. The board agreed that there should be an amendment whereby men, after serving 2 1/2 years, can retire without seeking consent.

Should Rust Pay?
The city solicitor will report on whether Arthur Rust, of the work department, who was driving the city car which knocked down Mrs. Williams, 94 West Rensselaer-street last June, should be held liable. In the meantime, Mrs. Williams' claim for \$800 will be settled.

May Clean Out Reservoir.
Waterworks Engineers' Fellows was asked to report on the advisability of having the reservoir cleaned out in view of the fact that this has not been done for four years, and an analysis shows that the water in it has a high percentage of bacteria.

Varying Opinions as to Net Result of Fight Against Hamilton Radial Bill.

Opinions are divided as to the net result of the city's fight at Ottawa to prevent the Hamilton Radial Railway from doing a local business in Toronto. H. H. Dewar, K.C., the city's legal representative, has returned from the fray, apparently satisfied that the city's interests are protected by a clause which he succeeded in getting inserted. This clause provides that the company's rights within the limits of Toronto shall only extend to include the receiving, forwarding and delivering of thru passenger traffic originating outside the limits of the said city for delivery within the limits of the said city, or originating within the limits of the said city for delivery outside the limits of the said city. He declares that this prevents the radials doing any local business.

Controller Ward, who took a prominent part in the Ottawa battle, fears, however, that this is not a sufficient safeguard. If the company is to have the right to stop at stations within the limits of the city, he does not see how passengers are to be prevented from getting off before reaching points outside the city.

MEDELSSOHN CHORUS PLANS FOR NEXT YEAR

Children's Crusade and Performance in Original Latin of Verdi's Requiem.

As the annual meeting of the Mendelssohn Choir executive committee was completed for next season's work which it is proposed to undertake more actively and comprehensively than has yet been undertaken by the society, Mr. Vogt outlined his program, which includes as its prominent features the Children's Crusade, a performance in its entirety and in the original Latin of Verdi's Requiem, besides a number of other novelties of rare beauty and musical interest. Dr. Vogt also announced his intention of developing the choir's efforts in the direction of the greatest of greater significance in the musical life of this growing country, and in order to give particular importance to this feature, has decided to produce at the matinee performance of next season a series of chorale and organ anthems for children's choirs and organ, which will be the first of these five concert, the superb Theodore Thomas Orchestra has already been engaged.

The report of Mr. Mason, treasurer of the society, revealed the fact that notwithstanding the enormous expense of the past season's productions, there was added to the surplus the sum of several hundred dollars. As pointed out by the treasurer in his annual report, there is a reason for including in the existing books of any who resumes their annual responsibility financially such as the Mendelssohn Choir has been assuming for several seasons past. One of two of the great triennial festivals of England and the Cincinnati Festival are believed to be the only ones requiring equal or larger outlays. In these cases, however, the festivals named are, without exception, strongly supported by large lists of influential guarantors.

In view of the gradually increasing importance of the work, Dr. Vogt announced his intention of reserving still a larger portion of his time exclusively for the choir, an announcement which was enthusiastically greeted by the members of the executive.

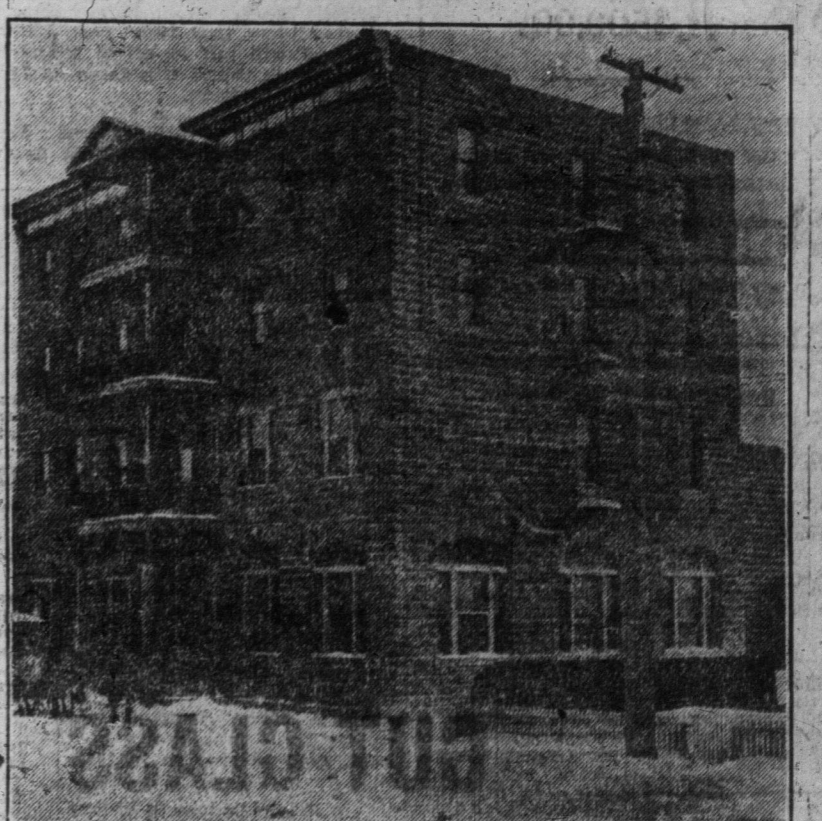
