TELESCOPES OBSERVATION CAR.

Montreal, Jan. 25.—Vice-President A. D. It is feared that the list of casualties received by the company is not com-plete, as the engine of the second train ploughed clear thru the observation car of the train ahead and then smashed the sleeping car next and, partly demoi-ished the sleeping car ahead of that one. by which time the engine left the rails and fell down the embankment. 





I have always been a strong believer in vaccination, and was myself vaccinated some weeks ago after my recent illness. Yours truly,



The United States health authorities at Washington, in reply to a query from the health department here, re-port no general epidemic of influenza, across the line. They state that there are a number of cases in the middle west.




