RESPECTING

THE MISSION WORK OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

BY THE GENERAL SECRETARY.

AT a meeting of the Missionary Committee of Finance, held on the 20th of February, 1885, the General Secretary asked for instructions in regard to visiting certain portions of the mission-field. The Committee, after consideration, directed as follows:—

"That in view of obtaining more direct and definite information regarding our North-West missions, and those in British Columbia, it be an instruction that the Missionary Secretary or a General Superintendent, or both, as they may arrange between themselves, visit those missions in the interests of the Society."

In accordance with these instructions, and with the concurrence of the General Superintendents, I left Toronto on the 6th of July, and, during an absence of two months, visited all the Indian and most of the white missions on the Pacific Coast. The results of my observations and enquiries are embodied in the present report.

I.—THE COUNTRY AND THE PEOPLE.

British Columbia, the most westerly Province of the Dominion, has a territory over 750 miles in length, from south to north, with an average width, including islands and water stretches, of nearly 500 miles from east to west. This gives an area of 375,000 square miles, though the last census measurement puts it at 341,305, probably excluding the principal water areas and outlying islands. In other words, taking the smaller figure, British Columbia has a territory nearly equal to that of Ontario and Quebec combined. Its southern boundary is the 49th parallel, its western the Pacific Ocean, its northern the 60th parallel, while its eastern boundary follows the irregular line of the Rocky Mountains in a north-westerly direction from the international boundary as far as the 54th parallel, and then due north along the 120th meridian to the 60th parallel. Nearly

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the whole country is mountainous, and comparatively little is fit for cultivation; but its fisheries and mineral treasures are practically inexhaustible, and its immense forests will be able to supply the markets of the North-West with building materials for generations to come. Add to this the fact that some one of its ports must yet become the depot of the vast trans-Pacific trade (inasmuch as the distance from Yokohama to Liverpool via the Canadian Pacific Railway is more than 1,000 miles shorter than by way of San Francisco), and it becomes clear that British Columbia will yet play an important part in the history, not only of the Dominion, but of the

Compared with the extent of territory, the population is very sparse. According to the census of 1881, it numbered less than 50,000 souls, of whom more than 25,000 were Indians. To these should be added some eight or ten thousand Chinese. With a population so scant and so widely scattered, the progress of mission work could not be otherwise than slow; but with the opening up of railway communication, and the consequent development of the country's resources, there is every reason to expect a rapid increase of population in the near future.

II.—MISSIONS TO THE WHITE POPULATION.

Over twenty-five years have elapsed since the first band of missionaries, headed by the Rev. Dr. Evans, went to British Columbia. At the very outset they were confronted by difficulties of no ordinary character. The population was sparse and scattered; facilities for travel were few and costly; rates of living were enormously high; while the cost of labor and building materials was such that only men of sublime faith and undaunted courage would have undertaken the task of building churches and parsonages. But they labored on, and the result of their labors is seen to-day. Persons converted under their preaching are still to be found all over the Province; and the names of Evans, and Robson, and Browning, and White, and Derrick, and Russ are still held in grateful remembrance by many who were benefited by their ministrations.

The entire white membership of the Methodist Church in British Columbia, as shown by the Minutes of 1885, is less than 600. This, considering the length of time that has elapsed since the mission was begun, and the vast amount of money expended, appears very small; but it should be borne in mind that in addition to the difficulties already referred to, there were others of a more serious character, growing out of the circumstances and habits of the people. Many of those who first emigrated to British Columbia were actuated mainly, if not solely, by a desire to make money, and hence they became regardless of methods if only the end could be secured. The Sabbath was dis regarded, and became a day of business or of pleasure; the house of God was shunned; old habits of prayer, and reverence for sacred things, were left east of the Mountains; saloons by the score and

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h was dis the house of for sacred score and places of ill-fame lent their aid to corrupt the morals of the people. Moreover, the bulk of the early emigrants were single men, or married men who had left their families behind them, and these coming in contact with the native tribes, who were without a moral code, and almost without a conscience in regard to social purity, the most deplorable results ensued. Because iniquity abounded, the love of many waxed cold, and not unfrequently the missionary found the chief hindrances to his work among some who had been members of the Church in the older Provinces. I am told there are men in British Columbia to-day, engaged in the liquor traffic in its lowest forms, or living in concubinage with Indian women, who were once members, and even official members, in the Methodist Church. Add to all this the fact that from the first the Methodist missionaries have had to stand almost alone in the fight against prevailing ungodliness, and the wonder is not that they have accomplished so little, but that they have accomplished so much. Laboring, as many of them do, in isolated places, among a scattered people, numbers of whom hate alike the missionary and his message, and uncheered by that frequent intercourse with fellow-workers which is enjoyed in older fields, is it any wonder if the toilers are sometimes discouraged by that "hope deferred" that "maketh the heart sick?" All honor to the faithful men who, in despite of such difficulties, stand manfully at their post, and wait patiently for the harvest that will yet come if their faith fail not.

The number of separate fields in the white work is fourteen, four of which are self-sustaining, namely, Victoria and Nanaimo on Vancouver Island, and New Westminster and Sumas on the mainland. Of dependent missions there are ten; two of these, Maple Bay and Wellington, being on Vancouver Island; four on the mainland, east of the Cascades; and four more on the great inland plateaus between the Cascades and the Rockies. These last I was unable to visit, because of insufficient time; but in regard to most of the others

my information was derived from personal visitation.

Of the missions on Vancouver Island I cannot speak in very hopeful terms. The Island itself is large—some 300 miles in length, by an average of 60 miles in width, comprising an area of some 20,000 square miles. The climate is all that the most exacting could desire, and what soil there is may be described as fairly productive; but it is to be found only in limited quantities, the general character of the Island being mountainous. SAANICH is a peninsula lying north of Victoria, having Haro Strait on the east and Saanich Inlet on the west. It contains good farming land, and a fairly well-to-do population. Taken in its entirety, it would form a good field, which, in the near future, might become self-sustaining; but the supply of Methodist ministrations in the past has been very intermittent, in consequence of which another denomination now occupies one-half the field, and there is not much ground to hope that the other half will ever become an independent charge. Nor is there any adjacent field with which it could be united. At present it does not appear

Maple Bay embraces a considerable extent of on the Minutes. territory, some parts being separated from the rest by wide water The population at present is sparse and scattered, and it will be a dependent mission for years to come; still, the field is worth cultivating, and may, in the end, repay expenditure. Wellington will never be other than it is to-day, a small coal-mining village, with no prospect of growth. If continued in its present relation it will be a dependent field for fifty years to come. It does not afford full work for an invalid, much less for a vigorous man, and yet for years past a missionary-married at that-has spent his time here among a handful of people, drawing the chief part of his support from the Mission Fund, and with very little to do.* The policy that cuts up the work into petty circuits and stations, that never can become self-sustaining, is most unwise, and has resulted disastrously in more than one place in British Columbia. Centralization in a country where there are no populous centres must always be a mistake, resulting in waste of effort and waste of funds. In my judgment, Wellington should at once be united with Nanaimo, from which it is distant only six miles, and a young man should be sent to aid the superintendent of the latter circuit. By this method several outlying settlements could be reached, and a large saving effected in

missionary expenditure.

Crossing to the mainland, the first mission is Delta and Alma, beginning at the mouth of the Fraser and extending up the river on the south side for some five and twenty miles. The population is not numerous as yet, but the land, which has been reclaimed from periodical overflow by a system of dykes, is of the richest quality, and when the large tracts now held by individuals are divided into smaller Within the next holdings the population will rapidly increase. decade this should become a strong, self-sustaining circuit. Between Delta mission and the Sumas circuit is Mount Lehman, as yet without a missionary, but a promising field for pioneer effort. At the District Meeting I strongly urged that this region should be visited regularly from Sumas on the east and Delta on the west, and the two brethren concerned promised it should be done. Perhaps the best plan another year would be to send a young man who would be under the superintendent of Sumas, and then Mount Lehman could be thoroughly worked. At Burrard Inlet, north of the Fraser, we have a small mission as regards appointments and membership-another illustration of the unwisdom of the "cutting-up" policy. The headquarters of the mission is Granville, a small village at Coal Harbor; but as this point has been selected by the Canadian Pacific Syndicate as the terminus of their road, it is quite within the possibilities that a large city will rapidly spring up, and become, if carefully worked, an important Methodist centre. 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of the river, is a good tract of country, where the people are steadily advancing in material prosperity, and where they should soon be able to support their own minister. This mission extends fifty miles up the river, as far as Yale, and the distance makes it difficult for one man to give it efficient oversight.

The remaining missions in the white work lie east of the Cascade

The remaining missions in the white work lie east of the Cascade Range. These, as already explained, I was unable to visit, and my information was derived from the testimony of others. Clinton is 100 miles north from Yale, on the route to Cariboo, and some 30 miles from Cache Creek, on the Thompson River, the nearest point on the Pacific Railway. It is adjacent to a good grazing country, but it is not likely ever to become a place of any importance, and the prospects, from a missionary point of view, are not very encouraging. Nicola and Spallumpcheen lie south of the Thompson River, and having a considerable amount of agricultural and grazing country, and being easily accessible from the railway, may yet have a large population; but it will be many years before either field becomes self-sustaining.

In regard to the support of our English Missions in British Columbia, I think the time has come when the appropriations should be made pro rata, as in other parts of the work; but in that case another basis should be adopted. The cost of living on the Pacific Coast is much higher than in Ontario or the Maritime Provinces; in the interior it is enormously higher. Market prices in Victoria for many of the staple articles of consumption are fully 50 per cent. higher than here. East of the Cascades they are fully 100 per cent. higher, except meat, which is cheaper there than at the coast.

III.—MISSIONS TO THE INDIANS.

As already stated, there are some 25,000 Indians in British Columbia. In the southern part of the country our missions have reached those on the Fraser, and latterly those in the Nicola country, east of the Cascade Range. Something, but not much, has also been done for those who visit Victoria, and in former years we had a mission at Nanaimo; but our chief work at present, apart from the Fraser, is on the west coast, in the Port Simpson District. The tribes reached by us in that region are the following:—

1. The Tsimpseans, found chiefly at Port Simpson and Metlakhatla, and on the Naas and Skeena Rivers. They are principally traders and fishermen.

2. The Hydahs, who inhabit Queen Charlotte's Island. In former times they were the warriors of the west coast. Their chief industries now are stone-carving, and the manufacture of gold and silver jewellery.

3. The Kittickshens, found on the head waters of the Naas and Skeena Rivers, are chiefly hunters and packers. Ponies are used to some extent in the far interior, but elsewhere the men are the burden-bearers. Their strength and endurance are great. An

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Indian will carry from 100 to 150 pounds on a day's march. have not, as yet, a permanent mission among this people.

4. The Bella Coolas inhabit the banks of the Bella Coola River,

and are chiefly freighters and canoe men.

5. The Bella Bellas are to be found at Bella Bella, Kitamaat, Kitlope, Chinaman's Hat, and Rivers' Inlet. They are hunters, and earn a good deal in the spring months by hunting the fur seal.

The work among the Indians on the Pacific Coast furnishes one of the most interesting chapters in the whole history of Christian But the story must be reserved for another time and place. At present I must confine myself to a brief statement of the condition and needs of this department of the work as it now exists. Concerning the results of the work, suffice it now to say that when one considers the absolutely benighted condition of the people when first the Gospel came among them, and the fact that by contact with the white population whole tribes had sunk below the level of their original heathenism, he cannot but wonder at the marked change that The striking contrast between the habitations, has taken place. dress, appearance, and, in fact, the whole surroundings of those who have received the Gospel, and their still heathen neighbors, affords a most suggestive commentary upon the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to civilize and elevate a people; while the zeal displayed by many in carrying the Gospel to their countrymen, their fidelity in the face of temptation, no less than their consistency of life and conversation, proves that the Gospel has come to them, "not in word only, but in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance."

NANAIMO was our first Indian Mission on the Pacific Coast, although it no longer appears on the Minutes. It was here that Thos. Crosby first began his work as a teacher. It was here that the first converts were won, and the first separation of the Christian from the heathen Indians took place. It was here that David Salosselton, of saintly memory, found the Saviour, and from here he went up and down the coast and across to the mainland, as a flame of fire, urged on by a consuming desire for the salvation of his brethren, till the feeble body gave way beneath the ceaseless strain, and the ransomed spirit went home to God. It was here that the Indians first learned to prize the sacredness of home life, and a street of neat cottages was built, in striking contrast with the huge buildings in which the heathen herded together. But alas! after so much had been done, the mission was virtually abandoned; the missionary was sent to another field; a coal-mining village sprang up in the immediate neighborhood, and many of the poor, half-taught Indians, left as sheep

without a shepherd, became an easy prey to the destroyer.

During my brief stay at Nanaimo I visited the Indian village in company with the Rev. E. Robson, District Superintendent, whose heart is in cordial sympathy with the Indian work, and after consultation it was resolved to reorganize the school if possible. Lawrence, who has rendered such valuable and faithful service at Port Simpson and Kitamaat, will take charge, and it is hoped that a fair atten as a teach devotion. labors the that his canoe up many sou of the qu and self-s

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fair attendance will be secured. But a missionary is needed, as well as a teacher, and he must be a missionary of no ordinary courage and devotion. A man who will sit down at Nanaimo, and confine his labors there, will be worse than useless; but a man who will make that his headquarters, and from thence itinerate constantly in his canoe up and down the coast from Victoria to Comox, may win many souls for Christ. In a work like this romance must be left out of the question; mere sentiment will not do; only Pauline devotion and self-sacrifice will avail.

At Victoria we have a neat Indian church, and as large numbers are coming and going, especially at certain seasons of the year, someone should be on the spot to look after them. Some of our Church members are doing a good work for the Indians by means of a Sunday-school; but a good day-school, joined to watchful pastoral care, is what is needed at present. Victoria should not, I think, be made the headquarters of an Indian mission. The dangers and temptations are too many, and the Indians should be dissuaded as much as possible from going there at all; but as large numbers of them do go, on the way to or from other places in quest of work, the little church should be a haven of refuge to shield them from the dangers of the town. An earnest, faithful local preacher, competent to teach the school, would be a boon to the Indians of Victoria.

On the mainland the Rev. C. M. Tate ministers to the scattered bands up and down the Frazer, having his headquarters at Chilliwhack. This was a prosperous mission in Bro. Crosby's time, and also under his successor; but Bro. Tate was changed to Bella Bella, and for several years the people were without a missionary; but under the labors of Mr. Tate, who has again returned to this field, the mission is improving, and promises good results.

Two years ago an earnest request for a missionary came from the Indians in the NICOLA country. At first it seemed doubtful if a suitable man could be found for the work; but where a work needs to be done Providence never fails to find a workman. A young man from Ontario, named Pike, following in the footsteps of Thomas Crosby, went out to British Columbia at his own expense, for the express purpose of laboring for the spiritual welfare of the Indians. He carried letters to the Superintendent of the New Westminster District, and was sent at once as a teacher to the Nicola Indians. I was unable to reach his field, but reports go to show that he is developing special gifts for this work, and is reaching large numbers in various parts of the upper country.

Turning now to the coast region, Port Simpson, with which the name of Thomas Crosby and his devoted wife will ever be associated, at once arrests attention as the foremost Indian mission. Twelve years ago this spot was the site of a heathen village, with all the darkness, poverty, filth, cruelty and vice characteristic of such a condition. Now there is a Christian village of 800 inhabitants. All the old heathen houses have disappeared, and have been replaced by street after street of neat cottages of various designs. A rise of

ground in the rear of the village is crowned by a commodious church, capable of accommodating seven or eight hundred people. On one side is the school-house, large and well built; on the other the "Girls' Home," with about a dozen inmates, and room for more. Near by is the Mission House, neat, comfortable and attractive, with a reception room for the Indians, where they find ready access and welcome at all times. Here, in a word, where but twelve years ago all were heathens, we have now a civilized and well-ordered community, and a Church numbering 238 full members, and as many more on trial.

We can but look on and say, "What hath God wrought!"

No sooner had the power of the Gospel been felt at Port Simpson than the people longed to spread the good news. They carried it northward to the Naas. River, and to Fort Wrangel, in Alaska; westward to Queen Charlotte's Islands; eastward and southward to the Skeena River, to Kitamaat, to Bella Bella. This soon necessitated the appointment of other missionaries. The NAAS was put in charge of A. E. Green, who for the past six years has been doing good service in that region. Greenville, the headquarters of the mission, is on the bank of the river, some twenty two miles from its mouth, and from this centre a number of other villages are reached, embracing an aggregate population of 1,000 souls. In the fishing season, the Indians come from other places, and for several months in spring and summer vast numbers hear the Word. A new church is much needed at Greenville, and the present one will answer well for a school-house. Port Essington, on the Skeena, we have the commencement of a good cause, with a neat church and mission-house, also a school-house. Bro. Jennings is doing good service at this point. On Queen Charlotte's Island, a young man has been stationed for some time at SKIDEGATE, but we had to remove him to supply a vacancy on the mainland, and his place will be taken by a native agent. These islands lie 100 miles off the coast, and as there is no regular communication between them and the mainland, the regular supply of the work is very difficult.

At Bella Bella we have now a promising mission. This was one of the places to which the Tsimpseans of Port Simpson carried the Gospel; and for a time the work was carried on by occasional visits from Bro. Crosby and his native assistants. A call having come from the Forks of the Skeena for a missionary, Bro. Tate was sent; but before he could reach his assigned field it was occupied by an Anglican missionary, and Mr. Tate was sent to Bella Bella instead. Here he labored successfully for several years, and when he was sent back to the Indians of the Fraser he was succeeded at Bella Bella by Bro. Cuyler, who is still in charge, and working faithfully. At Bella Coola, Bro. W. H. Pierce, one of our native missionaries, has been doing a good work; but we found it necessary to send him to another very important point, of which I shall speak presently, and the Bella Coola work will now be taken up by Bro. Hopkins, who for

the past year has been at Skidegate.
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the Forks of the Skeena was forestalled by the sending in of an Anglican missionary. That mission, however, after an interval of five years, seems to have failed in effecting any permanent good, and an appeal, most touching in its earnestness, has been sent by the people for a missionary. Such an appeal, under such circumstances, we could not—dared not—refuse; and as no white missionary was available, it was decided to send W. H. Pierce for the present. This is one of the most hopeful openings in the interior that has yet occurred, and is so manifestly providential that Mr. and Mrs. Crosby have volunteered to go, after next Conference, and establish the mission, if the authorities so desire, leaving Port Simpson, and the superintendency of the District as well, in other hands. I sincerely trust the Board will see their way to respond to this new and pressing call.

I venture here to express the opinion that one problem in regard to the Indian work on the Pacific Coast will be solved by the staunch little mission steamer the Glad Tidings. The great problem has been how to reach the scattered thousands along the coast, with so few missionaries in the field, and no means of navigating the waters except the native canoe-a method very slow and very dangerous. A remarkable series of providences led to the building of the steam yacht above referred to; and a series of providences, equally wonderful, led to the conversion of the man who built her and is now her engineer. This man was indeed lifted out of "an horrible pit, and the miry clay," and from the hour of his deliverance his heart has been aflame with love to God and human souls. He thinks (and I quite agree with him) that the Glad Tidings should spend a good part of every year in cruising up and down the inlets and among the innumerable islands of the coast, with one or two missionaries on board, who would preach the Gospel to the scattered bands wherever the little vessel could penetrate, and thus convey the good news to multitudes who have not yet heard it. I think also that this man, Oliver, should be recognized in some way as a part of our regular missionary force. His whole soul is in the work, and his flaming zeal and devotion would make him a power for good.

IV.—MISSION TO THE CHINESE.

At the present time there are from 8,000 to 10,000 Chinamen in British Columbia, of whom upwards of 3,000 are in the city of Victoria. They are all from the Province of Canton, and all speak the same dialect. The majority belong to the laboring class, but some are merchants, and a few are mechanics. Very few have their families with them, and in some parts of "Chinatown" they swarm together in large numbers, overcrowding the tenements and neglecting sanitary regulations. As a rule, however, they are quiet, peaceable and industrious. Few of them patronize the whiskey saloons; but opium-smoking and gambling are common, especially the latter.

Prejudice against the Chinese is strong and general, but for the

most part it is both unreasoning and unreasonable. It is said that they do not bring their families with them, and do not intend to stay in the country; but I am persuaded many of them would do so if they could have any assurance that their families would be protected. The treatment they have received gives them no encouragement to bring their families. It is complained that their mode of living makes it impossible for a white man to compete with them in the labor market, and yet not a few who make this complaint do not scruple to beat down the small wage which the Chinaman now receives, and thus make the competition still more unequal. Besides, there are very few white laborers in the country; and if the Chinese were banished to-morrow many industries would have to stop for want of hands to carry them on. The complaint that John underbids the Anglo-Saxon in the labor or other markets is true only in part. He does not willingly take smaller wages or sell at cheaper rates than others; but if he cannot obtain the price he wants, he wisely takes what he can get rather than waste his time in idleness; while his white competitor, if he cannot get all he demands, prefers to lounge about the saloons, grumbling at the country and cursing the unlucky Mongolian. And all this time John is quietly "pegging away," saving up his earnings (if he doesn't gamble them away), and waiting for the time when he may go back to his own country and enjoy in peace and quietness the fruits of his toil. It cannot be denied that the presence of so many Chinese on the Pacific Coast is a serious problem, but it is greatly complicated by the readiness with which political demagogues pander to the hoodlum class, and take up an unreasoning cry against these strangers on our shores. There is one thing to which our politicians may as well make up their minds—the Chinese cannot be got rid of by repressive measures; they cannot be boycotted out of the country, much less driven out by mob violence. They have come to stay, and the only wise policy is to transform them into useful citizens if we can. "Impossible! You cannot make citizens of them!" is the universal cry. I answer-It will be time enough to say that when we have fairly tried the experiment. Let the Chinaman learn English (which he is very eager to do), and let him accept the Christian religion (which as yet he is averse to do, and no wonder, considering the treatment he has received), and he will make a safer and better citizen than some whose support is now eagerly courted by the politicians. Then, to crown the whole, give him a vote, and my word for it, the outcry against him will subside as quickly as it arose.

It has been a standing reproach to the Churches that in all the years since Chinese emigrants first came to our shores nothing has been done to give them the Gospel. This reproach is now to be wiped away. The providence of God has opened a way to this hitherto neglected people, and the voice of the Master is heard, saying, "They need not depart; give ye them to eat." The leadings of Providence in this matter are worth recounting. More than a year ago, Mr. Dillon, of Montreal, was on the Pacific Coast, and his heart was

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estirred by the spiritually destitute condition of the Chinese in Victoria. On his return he wrote to the Hon. Senator Ferrier, a member of the General Missionary Board, asking if something could not be done, and offering, if a mission were begun, to give a donation of \$100 towards its support. The letter was laid by Mr. Ferrier before the General Board, and after due consideration it was resolved to open a school and mission among the Chinese of Victoria as soon as a suitable agent could be found.

At that time a young man named Vrooman, the son of a Presbyterian missionary who has spent 23 years in China, was living in San Francisco. The preceding part of his life had been spent in the Flowery Kingdom, and he spoke Cantonese like a native. Early last spring Mr. Vrooman received a letter from a Chinese firm in Victoria, asking him to come up to interpret for them in a suit which was shortly to be tried. He responded to the invitation, and while in Victoria saw how spiritually destitute was the condition of the Chinese in that city. He strove to enlist the co-operation of the local churches in behalf of a union mission, but without success. He then turned to the Methodists, from whom he received some encouragement. Enquiries were set on foot in regard to a suitable building for a school, the number who would be likely to attend, and the amount of support that would be given. Information on all these points was then sent to the Mission Rooms by Mr. Percival, our minister at Victoria. As authority had already been given by the General Board to begin a mission as soon as opportunity afforded, there was no cause for delay, and immediately a message was wired to Mr. Percival, "Organize school immediately. Delay mission till further information is obtained." Acting upon these instructions a room was rented from a Chinaman. \$80 were subscribed to furnish seats, lamps, etc., and the school was begun. The first week some 40 attended; in a few weeks the number increased to about 100, and had a sufficient number of teachers been available, it is believed that the number could easily have been kept up to that mark. Of course the number varies, as the men are constantly moving from place to place as the demands of labor require; but the school has averaged over 40 scholars, all of whom are learning English,—reading, writing, and speaking. Two lady teachers are employed, and are now assisted by two of the more advanced scholars. With a larger school-room and more teachers a much larger number of pupils could be secured.

Soon after the school was organized, word reached the Mission Rooms that large numbers were attending the religious services held by Mr. Vrooman, and that it was important they should be continued, but it was doubtful if he could remain much longer. Instructions were immediately sent to engage Mr. Vrooman for the time being, until some one else, able to speak the language, could be found. This was done, and Mr. Vrooman is still preaching the Gospel to the people, and overseeing the school. The results of his labors thus far are indicated in part by the fact that during my stay in Victoria I had the privilege of administering baptism to eleven Chinamen who

had been brought to Christ since the mission began.

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The annual cost of the school in its present shape is about \$860, made up as follows:—Rent of building, \$210; two lady teachers, \$480; two native assistants, \$120; lights and fuel, say \$50. In addition to this a grant should be made sufficient to buy 500 Bibles, as many hymn-books, and a supply of Gospel tracts. Increased room accommodation is much needed, and this, in the building now occupied, would cost about \$150 additional for rent, and \$150 more to make necessary changes and provide seats. As there is every probability that the Chinese will remain permanently in Victoria, we should regard this mission as a permanent one, and take steps accordingly. In the future we shall require a church to accommodate five or six hundred people, a school-room with several class-rooms attached, a reading-room, etc., etc., as much of our work among the Chinese must be done after the Y. M. C. A. fashion.

To sum up, I am glad to say that our entire mission work on the Pacific Coast is, on the whole, encouraging; and while it would be too much to say that all the men are equally well adapted to deal successfully with the peculiar phases of society in that country, yet I can affirm that all are working earnestly, and that the interests of our Church in British Columbia are, for the most part, in good and safe hands.

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INDIAN MISSIONS.

THIS branch of missionary work prosecuted by the Methodist Church furnishes ample testimony of the saving power of the Gospel, and to the records of former years may be added the encouraging reports upon the following pages, showing that faith in Christ and obedience to His commands are productive of peaceful tempers and habits, such as no system of civilization without the fear and love of God has ever brought into practical operation. Cultivating the ground must be subordinate to cultivating the heart, before any community can be reclaimed from pagan life, and brought into the safe position of law-abiding citizens.

Lamentable disturbances in the North-West Territories of Canada have interrupted the labors of the missionaries and teachers at several of these distant missions. Strong efforts were made by evil-disposed chiefs to draw the Indians under the religious care of the Methodist Church into their rebellious movement, but up to this time the General Board have not been informed of any of our adherents being implicated in the lamentable disorders which have stained the soil of the West with innocent blood. God be praised that the traditions of our Church for loyalty to the throne and constitutional government have not been tarnished, though the lives of some of our people were in fearful jeopardy.

The British Columbia Indian work is increasing in interest, and now that greater facility is obtained to visit the different missions by the use of the boat "Glad Tidings," we anticipate that her employment will promote both the comfort and usefulness of our brethren and their families in that truly missionary district.

FLATHEAD INDIANS.

After an absence of four years, spent amongst the Bella Bella Indians, on the north-west coast, we are brought again to labor among the Flathead tribes of this land.

It was a matter of great grief to us to find them so demoralized; and yet, surprising almost to find them so well as they were, considering that they had been neglected so long.

On the first Sabbath after our return, our hearts were cheered and blessed to see how the poor creatures rallied. The flowing tears and glowing testimonies in the fellowship meeting told of the heart-felt gratitude for the return of their missionary. Sabbath after Sabbath throughout the whole winter the services were all well attended, some of them trudging seven or eight miles, amid storm and sunshine alike. It is pleasing to see how the people rally, yet it will take a long time to regain what we have lost.

We have succeeded at five of the appointments in re-establishing the classes, and they are all doing well. We trust that our coming camp-meeting may be the means of thoroughly reviving the work. But whilst we are doing what we can for the people spiritually, we feel the great need of an educational institution for their mental improvement. We have kept up a day-school since last autumn at the village nearest to our home, with an attendance of from six to fifteen scholars; but as there are a dozen or more of such villages within a radius of fifty miles, and at distances too great for them to attend a day-school at any central point, we have come to the conclu-

which might eventually be turned into an industrial institution.

We have made several visits to the coast, and trust that our ministrations have not been in vain; but in order to do effective missionary work, we need teachers at some of the most important points.

sion that it is absolutely necessary to establish a boarding-school,

NANAIMO, with its 250 Indians, and where so much missionary labor has been expended, is in a most deplorable condition. Some of the brightest gems of Christianity have been gathered from that old camp, and laid as trophies at the Saviour's feet. They are now surrounded by every kind of vice, and with the exception of the Sabbath-school, conducted by Bros. Whitefield and Manson, from the city, nothing whatever is being done to educate them. We ought, by all means, to have a day-school there

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and its vicinity Indians in sufficient number to warrant the labors of a missionary. The white brethren have done nobly in keeping up the services; but they cannot devote their time to teaching and visiting, as they are business men and have their affairs to attend to. If we had a good, stirring male teacher who would live amongst the Indians, and in his spare moments visit and care for the strangers who flock here by hundreds at times, a very effective work could be carried on.

We had hoped to build a church at

NEW WESTMINSTER

this spring, but the recommended missionary grant not being forth-coming, we have had to defer it. In the summer season from 1 000 to 2,000 Indians congregate there to take part in the salmon fishing. Numbers of those people are members of our Church from different parts of the land, and it can be easily understood how they will get astray unless there is some place of worship, and some one to care for them while the season lasts. There are a few Indians who reside there permanently.

There are other places that ought to be visited and cared for, but until we can get help, will find it next to impossible to do anything. Members: Chilliwhack, 78; Nanaimo, 5; Victoria, 12. Total, 95.

NICOLA INDIANS.

We thankfully report that divine grace has enabled us to work among the Indians here during the past seven months. We began the mission on Oct. 1st, 1884, and, at a meeting held then, the Indians promised to assist in erecting a school-house, which is at present only partially built. During the cold weather we preached in the house of one of the natives. We now occupy a log church which is not furnished. We have six appointments where our services are cordially welcomed. We reside at Shorlosh (or Niack) reserve, which is about the middle of our field. We visit Shehan, twenty-five miles distant, on the Nicola River, and then go to Spence's Bridge, on the Thompson, fifteen miles further. Then in the opposite direction, we go as far as Douglas Lake, forty miles distant, calling at Nicola Lake and Quilshanna on the way; besides other bands which we occasionaly visit, when the Indians are at home. The desire of these people for the Word is encouraging, and the eagerness of their children to learn bids us to hope for the future. Although actual conversions have not occurred, so far as we know, yet the preparatory instruction will yet bear fruit, we trust, by the blessing of God. Thank God for His guidance so far, and for the ability which He gives us for this work. We have chosen this field as our life's work, and in the name of the Lord of Hosts expect to ROBERT GOSKIN PIKE. triumph, and win souls for Him.

PORT SIMPSON.

As the time of another District Meeting comes, and we are to report progress or otherwise, we are reminded how time is passing. As word just comes to us from the East that some of the old veterans of the Church have laid down the armour to take up the crown, we should be stirred to duty and a holier zeal for God and souls.

The last year has been one of great mercy. The work of God has progressed steadily on this mission during the past twelve months. The public services have been well attended when the people have been at home

Many of the old people have been greatly interested in committing to memory texts of Scripture in their own language; one old man repeated to me over thirty texts that he had learned on as many Sabbaths, while an old woman gave about sixty. These precious words are a great comfort to them.

It is hard to get a good attendance on class, on account of the

Constant change, they are away so much.

Our people have been somewhat disturbed owing to the unsettled state of the land question, but with all that has been said, they are loyal to the Queen and the Government. We are hoping that some

satisfactory settlement of the matter may soon be arrived at.

The Girls' Home is going on as usual; we have some promising

girls, to whom I trust it will be a life-long blessing.

The mission steamer has been completed, which took me away from home for some time during the year. She is a staunch little vessel, and we have great hopes in her future as a means by which we can help distant villages in getting their lumber, etc., as well as in taking your missionaries to the different posts. Mr. Oliver, who built her and has charge of her, does good wherever he goes.

We are about to build a small church at Georgetown Mills, five miles from here—brought about chiefly through Mr. Oliver's efforts.

KIT-A-MAAT is doing well; I think the heathenism has been given up; and, on a recent visit, I baptized thirty children. A letter from a young man says, "All the old people come to church now, and we

are all p weak-hea cut down cutting.

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n Mills, five ver's efforts. s been given letter from now, and we are all pulling one rope and speaking one language; so do not be weak-hearted; go on telling about Jesus; knotty trees are hard to cut down, but the Gospel is a good, sharp axe; go on slashing and The ground will soon become a nice garden."

A number have passed away to the Church above. One old man dying heard the angels sing, and the music of heaven, and longed to

We have also lost one of our most influential chiefs, whose voice was generally on the right side. His illness was a long one, and he went to another mission village for medical advice. I visited him there shortly before his death, when he said to me, "If I do not see you again you may know all is well with me. I am just waiting for My love to all my friends; tell them to meet me in heaven."

At the time of the first great revival, a young man, David Ryan, was converted, and with much zeal laboured for the conversion of others, but after a time wandered. Then affliction came, David was at death's door, which brought him to repentance. He suffered months of despondency of mind, and gradually failing strength, but at last he was enabled to triumph, and died very happy, rejoicing in the Saviour.

A young man, who but a few weeks before was strong and healthy, was brought home. On my visit to him he said, "Tell the young men, my friends, to listen to the Word, and to take warning from what I say to them."

We long to see a blessed revival on all our work in this land.

PORT ESSINGTON.

On this mission the Lord has been with us this year, encouraging

His servants by many new accessions to His Church.

During the fishing season the village is the centre of immense trade and labor, and many hundreds of Indians flock hither from outlying villages-heathen and Christian. The good seed sown at this season is, I trust, as bread cast upon the waters, to be found after many days. A revival spirit has been manifest one-half the year at least. Our people are beginning to feel the blessedness of Christian labour.

There have been nineteen adult baptisms and eight marriages, and many more candidates are awaiting baptism. All our services are better attended than last year. The class-meetings are not forgotten. As we speak through an interpreter, many white people attend our services on the Sabbath day. Our numbers have been decreased by two deaths, one of whom was baptised about one year before his During his illness he frequently told me that he ever trusted in the Lord Jesus; to him death was no terror. The other was one whose life was a pattern to show how a Christian should live, and his death to show how a Christian could die.

We have a Sunday-school of over forty scholars, and a Christian Woman's Improvement Society, which aims at the moral and social advancement of Indian women.

The mission-house has been made more comfortable, and a small school-house has been built. This was a necessity; without such accommodation our mission work must fall behind.

At Aberdeen our church is completed, and will soon be formally Last summer, though dedicated to the public worship of God. unfinished, services were held in it every Sabbath.

There will be but few Chinese on the river this year, owing to the closing of so many canneries from the depressed state of the salmon market. The means provided for Christian labor among the Chinese must be reserved for another year.

Our Society is in a healthy state. The people are praying for clean hearts, for purity of life, and a constant nearness to the Divine. The outlook is encouraging, causing gratitude to well up in the missionary's heart that he has a part in this glorious work.

SKIDEGATE.

It was thought best by the brethren, that I go to Skidegate, rather than to Kit-a-Maat, the latter being the Conference appointment.

During the eight months spent here, the Lord has been with us. The attention at Our meetings were all seasons of great blessing. the preaching services was marked throughout. One of the young men sat talking on spiritual things just before the Sunday morning preaching. Presently he said: "We are astonished. We often try to hide some wrong deed, or our hearts have not been right; but when we come to the church, the Bible is opened to us; then just what we tried to hide is brought to light. The Bible is a most wonderful book." The class, prayer, and fellowship meetings were well attended.

Throughout the time there has been great cause for thankfulness The power of Jesus' name was The Spirit was present. About eighteen professed Christ. A few were led made manifest. back who had wandered into by-paths.

The church building, which had been used for several months, was not lined; but the men came together and in a few days the inside was fitted up. This has been done without any expense to the Society.

It was important that a room be built for the missionary, rather than pay so high a rate of rent as had been given hitherto. which, a place was erected that will serve as a kitchen and one room for a mission house.

GOLD HARBOR.—This village is situated about five miles from here. A few visits were paid to these people. They are still in gross ignorance and intense darkness. The visits were productive of some good. A few of the young people say they should like to be taught the truth.

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Fis ground camp s that th good n Four other villages should be visited as often as possible. All of these are within a distance of one hundred miles. Once populous places, filled with a hardy, war-like people, are now nearly depopulated. Sickness, and evil practices coming among them, they are being swept from the face of the earth. So the urgent need of the early preaching of the Gospel among them. The Word of Life alone can preserve them as a people, as well as to give them a hope of eternal life. Truly, "the field is white already to harvest" Let us pray "the Lord of the harvest" to aid these benighted ones to come to the "day-star of peace."

NAAS RIVER.

I am thankful to report that we have been favored with the manifest presence of God during the year. Improvements have taken place, and the mission is in a prosperous condition. Congregations good-class and prayer-meetings much appreciated. Our members show an increasing interest in the Bible, and possess good knowledge of its truths. Some have publicly renounced paganism and embraced Christ. One of them, a fine, manly fellow of good ability, has given us much joy and satisfaction as to his spiritual state. He has been greatly persecuted since his conversion; he desired to return to his native village, thinking he could assist our native preacher there, and hoped to win his father and mother to Jesus. With much disappointment and grief he found himself obliged to leave, as the heathens had threatened to take his life. But flattery, and bribes, and abuse all failed to move him from his faith. He has made his home in our mission village, and we trust a useful future is opening out to him.

Among those who died triumphantly during the year was Sarah Russ, wife of one of our native teachers. She had long lived a consistent Christian life, and her departure was a glorious one.

Boy's Home.—Our home for destitute boys, commenced some years ago, has grown upon us; lacking sufficient accommodation, I have enlarged the mission house at my own cost. We hope much from these boys. Hitherto—with the exception of one friend—we have defrayed all expenses ourselves; but find it impossible to clothe them as nicely as we wish to, or indeed to properly provide for them. We sincerely hope that the Woman's Missionary Society may see their way to help us.

DAY School.—A larger attendance and greater progress have marked the school during the past winter. Many of the scholars can compose and write very fair letters. It is very encouraging to see how nicely they are getting on with the English language. Two concerts were given by them during the year with great satisfaction.

FISHERY BAY.—Our church—situated in the centre of the fishing ground, surrounded by hundreds of heathens from the interior, who camp side by side with Christian Indians—is a great help. We trust that those from distant tribes who heard of Jesus there, will carry the good news to their homes.

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miles from till in gross we of some be taught Kit-wan-Silth.—A native teacher has resided here, visited by your missionary. The efforts made have been owned by God. A few have renounced heathen practices, and others are inclining to do so. The church just erected here will give a greater impetus to the work.

KIT-LACH-TAMUX.—Earnest work has been done in this stronghold of heathenism. The children have been taught in the day-school, the sick ministered to the dying have been pointed to Jesus, and the gospel has been carried to every house. Here also we have had tokens for good. One family wishing to become Christians moved down to Greenville.

INTERIOR.—In company with Bro. Jennings I visited the interior and Skeena tribes. We found them in great trouble, but have evidence that God guided us to them, and trust that His word was a blessing to some. These poor people from Kish-fil-axe and Skeena Forks are now on the Naas, preparing food. They have been to me several times the past quarter asking for a missionary to be sent to them. The Indians, not being able to obtain any labor the past six months, are very poor, and will be obliged to scatter to seek work farther from home. Received during the year, 37; baptized, 34; removed, 6; deaths, 9; membership, 268; increase, 22. Alfred E. Green.

BELLA BELLA.

We are grateful to the Giver of all mercies for the help afforded during the year. The people are learning the way of salvation, and we believe many know Jesus, the Saviour from sin. The young men have been stirred to greater earnestness in the cause of Christ, and many have wondered, as their hearts have become strangely warmed. This led them to devise means for the Christ-like work of reconciling their brothers who had long divided the people and hindered the work. Interest has been shown in all our services. Our day-school has been kept open and great progress has been made by some, especially in the study of English.

KOKITE is a small village which we visited several times. The people wished me not to return. I asked them "should I leave them to die in their darkness?" Since that time their chief came asking me to send them a teacher next winter, for said he, "I have long wanted to be a Christian."

Weekeno, we visited early in the year, and found the people feasting and dancing. The night previous to our coming they had the Bella Bella missionary in effigy, and the cry was "Put him out." This they intended doing. Hearing of their intention we bowed at

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the people ey had the him out." the Master's feet, and took hold of the precious promise, "Lo, I am with you alway." On our reaching the village their hearts failed them, and they listened to the story of the Cross. However, the chiefs told me they considered themselves better as they were, but knowing this was not the sentiment of the people, a teacher (Bro. Patrick Russ) was sent, and now we understand he has been invited to live with the chief. May the Lord open the eyes of these dark people to behold the light. We are looking for greater blessings. O that the Spirit of power may rest upon us! W. B. Cuyler.

BELLA COOLA.

I am very happy to say that the Lord Jesus has been with us during the hard winter. Often your native missionary felt very much encouraged while trying, by God's help, to lead these perishing souls to the foot of the Cross, and when I recommend Jesus as the great and good physician, able and willing to take away their blindness and restore the light of truth upon them. The starting of this new mission field is in a hopeful state. Amid the storms of heathenism and darkness of sin, the power of the Gospel of Christ has got hold of the hearts of some. Tom Looncumbeux, one of the heathen chiefs, and his tribe are willing to suffer with the people of God. Notwithstanding persecution, like in the days of Mr. Wesley, is very trying to those that have accepted the invitation of King Jesus. The surrounding tribes-Kimquite, Till-o-man and Weckemos-have been here during the winter months attending potlatches and dances. The wild dances are getting smaller, such as dog-eater and man-eater. Our visit among our Bella Bella Christian friends has done us good. Since we returned, Chief Tom has burnt all his vain idols, such as the gods of their own hands, and is now learning about the Great Spirit. When his heathen friends heard what he had done to the idols, his friends invited him to the dance-house, but Tom would not go. The next day several of the old chiefs came in and said, "You a chief and now you turn to be Christian?" "Yes," he replied, "my being a chief won't save me from death, Christ alone can save me." I spent two weeks with my little flock at the canoe camp. We had a blessed time both in prayer and reading the Bible under the trees on Sunday. Six of the young men are doing very well, the Lord has helped them. Parents have turned their own children out of doors because they want to attend our service. . One of them, named Harry, is now acting interpreter to your missionary, others are getting on nicely with the alphabet, which is no small matter to the children in Bella Coola. The steamer "Glad Tidings" has already made her first trip to Bella Coola, with lumber for building a mission-house, which we need very much. We trust the Missionary Committee will give us a little grant. During the short stay of the steamer "Glad Tidings," seven of the heathen came on board in the evening, and we invited them down into the cabin. After praying together, they asked Mr. Crosby to put their names down, as they desired to be on the new way that leads to eternal life. We know it is "not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord."

Amid the wildest of the people, the only way to reach them is to go from house to house, as we have no church. Our hope is to build one soon. Many of the young people from the other tribes promise to come on this mission as soon as we have the church built. We have received ten on trial during the six months. Our prayer and effort is the winning of this lost tribe to the faith of Christ.

Portions of this district have been disorganized by the rebel movements of the past year; and the White Fish Lake mission has been unexpectedly deprived by death of its founder, and for many years its devoted and successful pastor. The scanty information received by the General Board is a subject of deep regret, as there are but three reports to place upon record from a purely missionary district, where there is a large outlay of the Society's funds.

WOODVILLE.

The school was opened as soon as it was possible with a good average attendance considering the number of families at the mission.

The parents appear to appreciate the advantages of the school, as they are anxious for their children to learn the English language.

We have arranged the Cree syllabic with a few additional characters, so that we can apply it to the Stoney, and are teaching the children to read and write their own language.

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We organized a class of thirty members, many of them, I believe, are trying to serve the Lord in His own appointed way.

We were only fairly settled down to work amongst our people

when the news came of the rising of the Crees below.

Tobacco was sent them to join at once and strike for their rights. You must be for or against us. The tobacco was refused. I advised

them to pitch off on a hunt for a short time.

They did so immediately, and while the tents were being pulled down and the horses packed, the representative men met at the mission house, unsolicited, and asked me to write a letter to Gov. Dewdney, assuring him of their loyalty to the Government. Some of them expressed deep regret at leaving. One man said, "My heart is sore leaving our church and school. I tell you this from my heart not with my lips only." In times like the present, we feel the safest place is with those with whom we have been laboring. Methodist Indians have shown themselves true Britons. believe, have taken any active part in the insurrection.

BLOOD INDIANS.

Our work has progressed amidst much difficulty and opposition. By visits made to the Indian lodges and by public services we have sought to instruct the people in the truths of God with a measure of Attention has been given to the lessons of the Gospel, and Our medical work has been a some are thinking on these things. means of great blessing, and has extended our influence. Clothes were

given to the children, the aged, and widows.

Improvements amounting to over two hundred dollars have been made on the mission property. During the rebellion our people were loyal, and listened to our counsels for peace with deep attention. The principles of our religion have exercised a very beneficial influence during the trouble in our country. The school has prospered much, considering the many difficulties in securing regular attendance. The vicious influences by which our people are surrounded have materially hindered our progress. A little has been done in the matter of translations.

Our sewing school was continued for several months during the year, but had to be closed through lack of materials, and was not reopened owing to the exciting influences of the rebellion. Slowly but surely the truth is winning its way, and we hope soon to welcome some who are on the threshold of life, and light, and truth.

BATTLE RIVER.

Day-school opened in October again, and closed on the 7th of April, when the uprising of Indians commenced. On the register I had about twenty-five names. The average was less than half. Winter

For some weeks before the raids at this place the house was crowded on Sabbath. Couriers from Battleford were exciting them. I preached loyalty and gospel in the trying moment. It is to be remembered that the people here are divided—200 Protestant and 300 Catholics, according to priest Scollen's census. The members of our church opposed the rebel movement—they are but a fraction of the population. We need Christian Indians or we cannot have a trustworthy people in such crises. Members, 9. E. B. NORWAY HOUSE-ROSSVILLE.

As the oldest station in the work it embraces a very large area; it supplies the ordinances of religion to a great number of people. Its congregations are many—the majority of them large. The membership is counted by hundreds, and is steadily on the increase. All the people have Bibles and can read them. The voice of devotion is as constant as the rise and fall of day. We have no police force and no lawlessness. Contentment and cheerfulness prevail on all sides.

From all around us come Macedonian cries, which for lack of facilities we cannot heed. Our hearts ache for the many who hunger but are still unfed. The work of this field is not accomplished, it has but just begun. Our patience, endurance, and faith are often severely tested, but again we are comforted and encouraged; God knows how much we can do, and hems the limits of our endurance around with His constant and tender care.

The outposts are more satisfying as to the results of our work than are the older centres. At home the prayer-meeting languishes; formality flourishes; profession outruns practice; obedience follows knowledge afar off; truth has more of glitter than of gold; wisdom crieth in the streets, but there are few who care to buy her costly merchandise. We need reviving. Our hope is in the God of Jacob who only has power to purify and beautify the fine gold which has become dim. Members, Norway House, 160; Cross Lake, 50; Oxford House, 50; Nelson River, 75. Total, 335.

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BEREN'S RIVER.

This field has been without a regular minister for nearly four years. During that time the Rev. A. W. Ross, of Fisher River, visited this mission occasionally. The Indians felt deeply the removal of their missionary, and were constantly asking for another. Last June your missionary was appointed to take charge of the field. We were welcomed by the Indians, who said their prayers had been answered. They appeared ready to co-operate with us in every good work. We had great hopes of a successful year. But through counter influences the poor Indians were sadly perplexed, and unnecessarily disturbed. We were greatly disappointed ourselves, for we had not anticipated opposition from any one, but had fully expected the aid and sympathies of all, Indians and whites. Better prospect at time of writing.

Our congregations, however, have always been good. Close attention has been paid to the teaching of the Word, and a deep interest taken in every effort put forth for their spiritual good Class meetings have been arranged, and a Sabbath-school organized, which Mrs. Langford superintends. The day-school under Miss Parkinson's efficient supervision has been wonderfully successful, notwithstanding the opposition and difficulties met with in the outset.

POPLAR RIVER Indians have greatly improved. The native assistant there is much in earnest.

Grand Rapid Indians should have greater attention paid to their spiritual wants. They should have a teacher among them for the summer months at least. Members, 64. E. Langford.

FISHER RIVER.

The work on this mission has given more encouragement to your missionary during the past year than at any former period during his Indian labors.

All our services are well attended. There are six classes, all well attended. A manifest spiritual growth among the members, and some of the young are entering the church on trial. Some have died. Of the Christian Indians it may be truly said, "they die well."

Sabbath and day-schools are both well attended and doing good

work.

During the "rebellion" our Indians manifested a truly loyal

NEW CREDIT.

God has been graciously present with us on this mission throughout the year. Scarcely a week has passed without seeing some soul brought to a knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus.

We have seen God's words verified more than once, "My Word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I

please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

At the New Credit mission church good meetings and marked signs of progresss; at the Delaware Line same can be said too. The missionary always receives a hearty welcome. Owing to poverty they cannot contribute much toward the funds of the Church. Good Sabbath-schools too, with a fair attendance. All these make us "thank God and take courage." Alterations and improvements to the amount of fifty dollars have been made on the mission premises, chiefly the parsonage. The day-school is doing fair work. Members, 163; increase, 37.

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GRAND RIVER.

God is graciously reviving His work in the use of the ordinary means of grace. It was our pleasant duty at the last Quarterly Meeting to receive into Church fellowship an Oneida chief.

Since then, a few young men have joined the Church giving clear testimony of a change of heart. There is a general feeling of revival on the mission. We are looking for showers of blessings. Our people are working much and well to improve the mission premises by building a substantial church, driving shed, and a picket fence, with two large and two small gates—all the work of their own hands.

After filling up the place of removals by deaths, etc., we report an increase. Present membership, 83. WILLIAM CROSS.

MUNCEY.

We have made steady advancement on this mission during the last year. In our new church, the morning congregation has doubled, and in the evening there are at least four times as many hearers as there were before the church was built.

At the Bear Creek appointment the revival services held in September, 1884, gave a membership (after sifting) of about 35. The revival is still going on under the influence of the class-leader, Bro. Wm. Whitdoon, himself one of the converts.

Of this band of about fourteen families, only one couple, seven years ago, were living in legal marriage, now all except one or two couples have been lawfully married.

We have been able to almost entirely suppress the coming to the reserve of white men with whiskey, who make the Sabbath evening hideous with their drunken brawls and vices. The advance of the religious families in civilization is marked in its growing influence for good on the band.

The religious state of the societies is seen in the joyous class-meetings and happy deaths. One young girl, now in a dying condition, in her testimony, gives very strong proof of the power of faith that works by love, in overcoming the fear of death.

We are considerably in advance of last year in missionary contributions. The seeming decrease in membership is not a real decrease, as it arises from the loss of the Institution and the village of Middlemiss by change of boundary. Membership, 125.

ONEIDA.

Our work on this interesting mission, we are thankful to say, is progressing. We are now closing up our fifth year on the Oneida mission. To the glory of God let it be recorded the last year has been the most prosperous of the five.

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The misverty they Good Sabus "thank the amount chiefly the bers, 163; VEAVER. We have received seventy members on trial; baptized sixteen; married six; buried ten. We have now two churches, where before we only had one. One of these churches, formerly held by the Baptists, was during the past year voluntarily handed over and secured

to the Methodist body.

On the mission there are two day-schools. One taught by Miss Beatty, the other by Elijah Sickles, an educated and pious Indian. Both schools are doing a good work among the Indian children. We have two Bible classes, and two Sabbath-schools. Our last Quarterly Meeting, the people say, was the best of the whole year. It was a very remarkable love-feast. We report an increase in the missionary money raised on the mission. We return 116 members. Increase of 50 over last year.

MORAVIANTOWN.

The work on this mission has been hindered through lack of a comfortable place in which to worship. Sufficient money is now in hand to warrant proceeding with the building of a church, which would have been done ere this, had we been able to get a satisfactory permit from the Indian Department. The preaching service and class-meeting are as well attended in proportion to the membership as among the whites. Members, 35.

GEORGINA ISLAND.

In this part of the work there has been some success. The new school-house has been completed, which gives ample and comfortable accommodation for school purposes. The school generally is doing well, but owing to considerable sickness during the winter the average attendance is not as large as it would have been. Bro. Robt. Mayes, the teacher, is highly esteemed by the band and appears to be the right man in the right place. If at all possible to increase his salary I would heartily recommend that such be done, as his 'labors on Sabbath are most excessive and arduous. On trial, 15; members, 19. W. H. Madden.

RAMA.

There have been four deaths, two dropped, one removed, and one received—a decrease of six. Eighty-two names remain on the class-books. The spirituality of the members is in many very low, and in none very high. The partially nomadic habits of the people, depriving them of the regular means of grace, has doubtless much to do in this matter. Another cause may be found in the lack of responsibility in any of the industries of the Church. They have evidently never been taught to support, as they were able, the ministry of the Word among them. They are all able to do something. Even to the Missionary Society their givings are not up to their ability. The best Christians are those who do most to support the Gospel. Much

Much evil is done by the persistent illegal selling of liquor to those who will keep their mouths shut, by some in Orillia and other places. The school is in a very unsatisfactory state, and in this respect is no exception to Indian schools generally. The teacher has done her utmost, but the children will not come, and the parents will not send them. Compulsion is the only thing that will be effective. It is more needed here than in English schools. They have good land, and numbers of them are doing pretty well in the cultivation of their small farms of 25 acres. But they are hampered by not being able to keep a team on so small an acreage. The women, many of them, are quite industrious, and earn considerable money during the year by making and selling baskets and porcupine-quill work. I pray for their prosperity in all good.

ALDERVILLE.

The Fenella part of this work was for many years self sustaining. The Alderville part is an Indian mission. Three years ago the two were united. That union has certainly effected a great saving in the outlay of missionary money. Apart from that, the results have not been of the most happy character. A religious awakening prevailed among the Indians during the winter, resulting in several accessions to the membership upon profession of faith. About sixty per cent. of the Indian members attend class.

In addition to the regular weekly prayer-meeting, cottage meetings for prayer and testimony were maintained until the muskrat season set in. After that the gun and the trap seemed to possess greater charms for the Indians than the means of grace. Members, 48.

MUD LAKE.

A week of revival service among the Indians at Chemong Village produced some beneficial effects. A special feature of the work among the Indians has been the temperance work. If this people are to be advanced temporally and spiritually, they must be kept away from intoxicating liquors. The Band of Hope for the juveniles, and regular monthly meetings for the grown-up people, have done much to instil sound temperance principles among them. Members, 21.

HIAWATHA.

The year now closing has been one of peculiar care and toil. The people, so prone to evil, require constant care and faithful nursing. Sometimes it requires all the ingenuity and energy of the resident missionary to meet and control the various tendencies to evil peculiar to the Indian character. It is, in my opinion, absclutely necessary that a missionary should live amongst them. During the month of February we conducted special services, which were owned and blessed

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of God. A goodly number were converted and added to the Church. Our Sabbath-school has not been as flourishing as we would desire, owing to the lack of suitable and efficient officers. Our connexional funds have been fairly sustained, and our congregations largely increased. Our membership has suffered very much from removals, deaths, and other causes. Bro. James Spaniard, our local preacher, was accidently shot while hunting in the back townships. He was a devoted servant of God. The spiritual tone of the Church has been much improved, and all our services have been seasons of grace and delight. Present membership: Received, 13; on trial, 12; full members, 21; total, 33; increase, 4.

ST. CLAIR.

Your missionary renders thanks for the mercies of another year. Our congregations have been good, our class-meetings, prayer-meetings, and quarterly meetings have been times of refreshing. Believers have been quickened, backsliders reclaimed, and sinners have been converted to God.

Our Sunday-school has been kept open the whole year by your missionary, assisted by the teacher and several young people, who take an interest in our school. Our day-school is doing well, under

the care of our present teacher.

Eleven have died during the year, some of whom witnessed a good confession; one, a young man who died of consumption, obtained a clear evidence of pardon a few days before he died, and, rejoicing in the hope of heaven, called all his relations around his dying bed, and exhorted them to forsake all their sins, to trust in Jesus, and try to meet him in heaven.

We would make grateful mention of the kindness of our missionary authorities, who, at the solicitation and under the direction of our Chairman, granted the means for repairing, painting, and papering the mission house, making it very comfortable and respectable for the

missionary and his family.

We were favored at our missionary meeting with a visit from Dr. Meacham, of Japan, who encouraged our people with kind words to give of their means to the cause of God. Our District Superintendent and Brother Fallis accompanied him, and also spoke kind words to the people.

Our members are: Whites, 2; Indians, 176; total, 178.

STONEY AND KETTLE POINTS.

There is nothing very special to note on this mission field, owing to an order from Government preventing the Indians from selling posts. They were placed in very trying circumstances, for they generally depended on them for their living. We petitioned the Minister of the Interior, and after a considerable time succeeded in getting

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eld, owing om selling , for they d the Minin getting the order cancelled, but the great storms of snow coming shortly after prevented them getting out as many as they otherwise would have done. Consequently our missionary money will fall a little short this year. The Kettle Point church stands in great need of repairs; they are talking of building a new one. Deaths, 4; removals, 8; present membership, 88.

WALPOLE ISLAND.

By the help of the great Head of the Church we are trying to promote the temporal and spiritual welfare of this people. Our congregations, on the whole, are large, though affected by the occasional, and in some instances, lengthy, absence of many of the Indians from the island, who by honest industry endeavor to provide for themselves and families the necessaries of life.

We confidently expect to have our new church finished this summer. During the year over \$260 have been collected from the Indians to assist in this direction. This, as well as the general scarcity of money, has prevented us from realizing as much as formerly for the mission fund. Seven of our friends have died during the year in great peace, two of whom were in the bloom of youth. We have witnessed several conversions, though deaths, defections and removals leave but an increase of five.

Our Sabbath-school is kept up during the year, and the day-school appears to be giving general satisfaction. We ask the prayers of God's people. Members, 184.

SAUGEEN.

There is nothing specially new to report from this mission. has been with us in our public and social means of grace. precious souls have sought and found salvation through the blood of Jesus. A goodly number continue steadfast in serving the Lord. It is a cause of great thankfulness to God, and encouragement to us, that we have good help in sustaining the prayer-meetings, and in holding special services. Two of our members have died during the year. Both died well. Two or three weeks of protracted meetings were held near the close of the year. They resulted in much good to believers, and the conversion of some souls to God. The meetings were seasons Our last Quarterly of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. The attendance was large, the Meeting was a most excellent one. speaking and singing good. God most graciously manifested Himself, enabling us to feel and say, "Lord, it is good to be here." In the prayer-meeting in the evening we had a truly delightful time in waiting upon God. Several presented themselves as seekers of religion. May God continue to bless His people, and save souls on this field of missionary labor; and to His great name we will give all the glory. THOMAS CULBERT. Members, 114.

CAPE CROKER.

We are progressing slowly but surely on this mission. The means of grace are well attended. Forty members of this band have died since Conference; six of these were members of our Church, but they all died well, confirming the Methodist adage, "our people die well." If we had a comfortable, roomy house to live in, this would be an inviting field of labor for any minister who feels called to the Indian work. Our Indians are loyal subjects of their Queen, and have no sympathy with Riel or his followers in their insurrection. Bless God for what the Gospel has done for them. Members, 95; on trial, 11; total, 106.

CHRISTIAN AND BEAUSOLIEL ISLANDS.

We are thankful to God to report once more that the work of this mission is still prospering. The services have been well attended, both the preaching, class-meetings, and the weekly prayer-meetings. We held special prayer-meetings last winter in which some once desponding hearts were heard praying and hopeful as the children of God. Three have turned from paganism to Christianity, and have been proving themselves obedient to the blessed commands of their newly adopted Saviour. Our people suffered much during the winter, and many deaths have taken place among the children, which the Almighty Father ruled for a wise purpose.

We have not been without tribulation, but never given to despair, we having learned to have implicit confidence in God, and therefore greatly encouraged to labor on for our common Master.

We have as often as we could visited our Beausoliel appointment; they are doing well in the service of the Lord. We have in this entire mission: Members, 92; on trial, 6; total, 98. May God increase the number.

PARRY ISLAND.

We moved into the new mission house on the 10th of last December. I am thankful to say that we are well. During the year the head chief of the Parry Island band of Ojebways was baptized at the Parry Sound camp-meeting by Dr. Sutherland. The chief is a faithful attendant to our meetings and to our Bible class.

In class meetings the Indians and women have said, "The word of the Lord does me good," and their regular attendance on the means of grace seems to verify their sayings.

We are glad to say that since the latter part of the past winter those few who were in the habit of taking fire water have given it up.

Since we attended to the finishing of our little church, which was dedicated last August, we have collected and paid \$231.20, and it is

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free of debt. It is very desirable that it should be painted, and we might suggest that as these Indians are new beginners compared with others in Ontario, it would be well for the General Missionary Board to complete it. We have worshipped in it during the past winter, and we hope that the few pagans who have attended a few times this spring may be converted.

Shawanaga has been visited four times during the year. On this reserve we have three exhorters who conduct religious meetings every Sabbath. One of them is Chief Solomon James, who in former years was a school teacher in Beausoliel Island.

French River has been visited twice in an open small sail boat. We have on this reserve two native brethren, who try to keep up class and prayer-meetings. One reads the Ojehway Testament and the other exhorts.

Kechenayahshing reserve, which lies about west from French River, was visited last fall. By its class book we learned that the two leaders kept up their meetings when they were together on their reserve. One is also able to read the Scriptures in the Ojebway language, and promised to read for the few members on Sundays. Our purpose was to visit the two latter places this spring, but the ice did not break up the usual time, and it prevented us.

Our present membership is 132; increase, 12. Missionary sub-ALLEN SALT. scriptions paid, \$60.54.

GIBSON RESERVE.

During the early part of the year the mission suffered considerably from not having a missionary. But in November last we secured the services of Chief Angus Cooke. He entered upon his work with zeal, and with fidelity discharged the duties of his office. The result is that the mission has never been in a more flourishing condition than at the present time. The last sacramental occasion, in which I was assisted by the Rev. A. Brown, Gravenhurst, was a "season of refresh-At the same time we held a missionary ing" never to be forgotten. meeting, at which \$10.50 was subscribed, and arrangements made for building a church. The past year has been successful; the prospects for the ensuing one are bright. Members, 36.

OKA.

We have had considerable sickness and death among our people during the past winter; but, thank God, times are somewhat better since the opening of the spring. Moreover, we have great reason for thankfulness to Almighty God that we have been able to prosecute our missionary labor with success; and this winter we held a series of protracted meetings which proved to be a great spiritual blessing to our mission.

We lost three of our Church members by death, who have left a good testimony that they were going to the temple of God above, where the saints are at rest for ever; and also we had the pleasure to receive in our Society two families who left the teachings of the Church of Rome in order to embrace the doctrines of Jesus Christ and of His holy apostles and prophets.

Our Sunday-school, as well as our two mission day-schools, has

been better attended during the year than heretofore.

I have had during the year 22 baptism; 3 marriages, and 13 burials. Membership, 140; on trial, 3; total, 143.

MOUNT ELGIN INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTION.

We are grateful to the great Head of the Church for steady growth and prosperity in every part of our work, industrial, educational, and religious. We have rejoiced during the year in the hopeful conversion of more than one-third of all the pupils attending the Institution from different parts of the province, while others, who were previously members of the Church, have been built up and established.

Within a year five pupils have obtained certificates to teach on any reserve in the province. At present two of the five are teaching, and the other three are still at school.

The play-house referred to in my last as being much needed is now so far completed that the first flat is used for a lavatory and playroom, while the second story makes an excellent reading and study room for the boys.

The re-flooring and fitting up anew of the pupils' dining-hall, together with an outside entrance from the play-ground, adds much to its comfort.

The school-room is enlarged and much improved by the removal of the lavatory, and by new and improved modern desks, made by Bennett Manufacturing Company, London, and is heated by hot air.

The extension of the south end of the main building, now in progress, will, when completed, supply a much-felt want, by furnishing a play-room and lavatory on the first flat for the girls, and on the second flat enlarged accommodation in the tailoring department, and in the third story additional dormitories.

The producing capacity of the farm has been greatly increased by extensive tiling, while the drains have been so arranged as to give flowing water for the stock in most of the fields.

TOKIO (USHIGOME).

The report of Ushigome church. During this year our church in Ushigome has lost many people by their removal to other circuits. For this reason our members decreased, though we have received 13 souls. Now we have 41—men, 21; women, 17; children, 3—and many among them are not present, for they have gone to their native countries. We are earnestly praying the Lord that He will raise many good fruits in this Gospel field.

TOKIO (SHITAYA).

During this ecclesiastical year this mission presents no special feature. We have baptized seventeen persons, but there have been several removals and other losses, so that we are compelled to report a decrease of two. Present membership is, adults, 43; children, 16; on trial, 3; total, 62.

Yemu Yamanaka.

TOKIO (TSUKIJI).

We are very thankful that, by the blessing of God upon our labors, we are able to report some degree of prosperity for the past year. Some of the lambs of the flock have grown considerably, and a number have been brought in from the desert of sin. Hence the Church is stronger in numbers, financially and spiritually. Peace and harmony prevail. All the means of grace have been well attended. The Sunday-school is flourishing. The future of this charge is very promising. The present situation of this chapel is unsuitable, because it is too secluded, and it has already become too narrow. Therefore we are preparing plans for a new building, and are seeking a more favorable site, in a more thickly populated part of Tokio. Present membership, 69; increase, 17.

SHIDZUOKA.

The pastor was changed in the person of myself by the arrangement of the District Meeting at the beginning of the ecclesiastical year, and I came here in the middle of last May. The Church has been, during the year, making progress upon the whole, though we have not been much blessed in the way of numerical additions. the contrary, there has been some decrease, on account of a large removal which was caused by the separation of Hammatsu church, form ng a separate circuit during the year. As the membership schedule shows, there has been an addition of twenty-two souls; but there has been also a removal of twenty-nine against that, and the result is the decrease of seven. Almost the whole of the pastor's attention and energy were compelled to be directed toward the improvement of the internal and spiritual condition of the Church, and the setting of things in order, and he could not do much in aggressive work. The spiritual tone of the Church has been raised very much higher; the Bible is more highly prized and more widely read; better and more general observance of the Sabbath has been secured.

Some influence of the work of the Church began to be felt by the public, so that the Buddhist priests and other religious advocates roused themselves to oppose Christianity, with the intention of preventing its further progress, and at the same time many inquirers after the truth were raised up. Any religious meeting, therefore, is well attended now; intelligent persons are generally in favor of Christianity, but the vast majority of common people are yet prejudiced against it, though they do not show any hostile act any more.

1. Attendance of People at the Church.—There have been 4,555 persons who attended the church during the year, the number of the services having been 146, so that the average attendance at each service has been a little more than 31; while during the last ecclesiastical year there were 4,176, the number of services 157, so that the average attendance at each service was 27. Besides the above 4,555 who heard the Gospel preached, about 4,000 people gathered in two evenings to listen to Christian discourses at the theatre where we held the meetings in the latter part of last autumn. This meeting was the grandest one ever held in Shidzuoka, not only of our meeting, but of any meeting, and was a very significant event of the Church. Dr. McDonald, Mr. Eby and myself were the speakers. We do not see the result in any definite shape yet, but the general influence was very great. About 320 people were out at the special meetings for two evenings last February; so that about 8,875 people listened more or less to the teaching of Christianity during the year; and also many hundreds listened to the street-preaching, which I did almost every evening in week days during the last summer. A great deal of the seed has been sown, which will grow up some day.

2. Sabbath-schools.—Two Sabbath-schools were organized on a regular system last fall. They are young yet, of course. There are forty-five scholars, who regularly attend on the Sabbath afternoons.

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3. Financial Account.—The duty and privilege of members of giving something for the support of the Gospel were clearly explained, and a general and regular monthly giving was strongly urged upon, and the result is that they now are willing to give regularly what they can. And not only the monthly collections were increased and are increasing, but also contributions for church enterprises, etc., were much increased. The whole giving during the year has been 95.45 yen, while that of the last ecclesiastical year was 30.99 yen.

4. Death and Burial.—A member by the name of Hayashi died of consumption on the 23rd of last January, to join with his first wife in heaven, who slept in the arms of Jesus seven years ago. Hayashi was baptized by Dr. McDonald, together with his first wife, mother, and two children, and received into the Church eight years He lived at a place called Shimidsu, eight miles from Shidzuoka. A week before he died, as his illness became serious, I and one Mr. Yoneyama, a valuable steward of the Church, called upon him. He was then much cast down, as he was deeply concerned with the members of his family and his family affairs. But as we called upon him frequently since then, read some suitable portions of the Scriptures to him, sang hymns, and prayed for him, his faith became stronger and hope brighter. Two days before he died, I administered the Lord's Supper to him and his family, when he exclaimed, with very much brightened face, "What peace! what joy!" He slept at last peacefully in the arms of Him who conquered and destroyed death. It is interesting and thankful to note that his remains were buried according to Christian burial rites (our ritual) from the beginning to This was the first time for Shidzuoka Church to do so, as hitherto the Buddhist priests always interfered and prevented from Before we parted we sang "Sweet by-and-bye" in Japanese over the grave. The scene was affecting.

5. The Future Prospect.—Our future is bright enough. Workers are wanted very much, as I am the only worker in this large field of labor. Some plan shall be devised to provide men, and we expect great things of the Lord in the coming years.

NUMADZU.

A house and ground were bought at the best place in the town in the beginning of the year, and the church was removed there. As the new chapel is in great contrast with the old in every respect, the latter being surrounded with infamous houses, and bad people in evenings going and coming in the front street, women and girls are now free to come to the services without dread, and sincere inquirers are willing to come too, so that the attendance at the services has been considerably increased.

There have been 4,875 persons who attended the services during the year, the number of which having been 159, so that the average attendance has been a little over thirty at each service; while the total attendance during the last ecclesiastical year was 3,659

persons, and the number of services 136, so that the average attendance had been a little over twenty-six. There was an increase of 1,216 hearers over the last year.

The monthly collection of the people for support of the Gospel has been somewhat increased too. It amounted to the sum of 17.78 yen, while that of the last year had been 5.14 yen, so that there was an increase of 12.54 yen over the last year. They also gave the aggregate sum of 16.52 yen for the poor, for the Sabbath-school, etc., during the year, besides missionary contributions, which are not counted here.

The Sabbath-school retrograded somewhat, on account of the loss of five good teachers at once by removal to other places. The present number of scholars who regularly attend the school is twenty-five. To make it prosper new teachers must be procured.

A zealous and influential local preacher was raised in the person He had been very ill in the last spring from an of Mr. S. Ebara. affection of his lungs, and the illness became so serious at last that the doctors almost gave up the hope of his recovery, when he was almost miraculously cured, and became an object of wonder among those who knew him. It was surely in answer to the prayers of brethren and sisters who had prayed for his recovery, and for the Lord's granting him the honor of working for Him and glorifying His holy name after his recovery, whenever they met together. Soon after his complete recovery, and when he was able to walk out, he was appointed local preacher by the superintendent of the circuit at the first quarterly official meeting, which was held on the 9th July. He had held once the local preachership some years ago, and this was a reappoint-Since then he has been working for the Church and Lord very faithfully. He preaches once on every Sabbath regularly. a very influential man in the whole "ken," the benefit of his devoted life in the new sphere is not confined to Numadzu alone.

We held enzetsu, or public discourses on the teachings of Christianity, at one of the story-teller's halls in the town, on the tenth and eleventh evenings of February. The speakers were Mr. Hiraiwa, the superintendent of the circuit, Mr. Ebara, and myself; and also a preacher of the Presbyterian Church in the neighborhood came and helped us on one evening. These two evenings' meetings were a grand success, and the audience was altogether more than six hundred people. The occasion is never to be forgotten. All those who were present reported well after they went; and the effects of the discourses were felt widely. The people of the town in general began to recognize that Christianity is the best religion, and they speak well of it now. The attendance at the chapel has been, since then, much increased. Some day the harvest will come.

Two members died during the year, both in peace and triumph, especially so with one, whose name is Tsukumu Tamura, a lad of seventeen years of age. He lived in a neighboring village, and he expressed his wish to hear of the Gospel on his sick bed, and he for the first time heard it talked on the 8th of last October. As he could not bear to hear one talk even for an hour continually, from his weakness,

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being worn out by long illness, we talked to him a little at a time; and also, as he could not raise his voice, whenever answers were required of him, they were done by signs with his head. The members of the Church helped me in talking and praying for him. After a few days he was enabled to see the Gospel light clearly, and found his Saviour, and embraced Him dearly, and fully trusted in Him. He was baptized on his bed on the 29th Oct., by Dr. McDonald, who was then passing by on his official trip round the stations. He slept most peacefully, with face full of joy and smile, on the 3rd of November. The bystanders were greatly affected at the scene. His remains were buried according to our burial rite, by Rev. C. S. Eby, who also then passed by on his homeward way in his missionary trip round Kofu

Eleven persons were baptized and received into the Church during the year, and the present membership is in all forty-five.

HASHIMOTO.

HAMAMATSU.

Some members moved to Hamamatsu from Shidzuoka, and have become the seed of the Church. This was done through the conference at seventeen years of Meiji.

At first baptized members were eighteen in number, among whom, men, three; women, six; children, nine; and two applications for baptism (men). Three were baptized this year, among whom, men, two; woman, one; and four applicants (men, three; woman, one). All members, old and new, are twenty-seven. Their spiritual state is progressive, and they are very willing to keep God's law. They come to the church every Sabbath and read the Bible, and are seeking the salvation of their souls with burning hearts. They give their

money willingly according to their condition. Although it is the lack of our power that the progress of the Church is very slow, still there are some other causes. I will write to you one or two: Hamamatsu contains three thousand houses, and are full of false gods' temples, among these Shinshu and Nichirenshu each has six temples, their believers numbering one-fourth of the Three great churches were called Maruyama whole population. Kiokuai, Shinto Sakaki Kioknao, and Hansobō Kiomusho. Besides these there are four great temples in fifteen miles (Akihajinsha, Toyokawa Inari, Sanjakubō, Hanzohō). These gods are believed throughout Japan, and pilgrims are usually going or returning through Hamamatsu. If these pilgrims will not come continually the people of Hamamatsu will suffer poverty, because they can't get money that pilgrims spend on their journey. By this reason the people of Hamamatsu feel very thankful to the false gods that they call these pilgrims to come and spend their money on the way.

Christianity has received a very bad reputation here by the errors of Roman Catholicism that was preached and practised here more than ten years. By these hindrances it is very difficult to let the people know the true meaning of Christianity. God knows these difficulties, and He retained a company of learned men to be united against Christianity, and produced two converts from the same company. Moreover, He made other two men earnest students of the Bible from the same company. Beside the converts, there are many who well understand the goodness of the Christian religion, and take its teachings into daily practice, though they hold in public hypocritic, heathen-like behaviour, afraid of their belonging to that company. If we consider these mercies of our Lord, we shall have a great hope for the future.

The lecture, which was delivered on the third and fourth of March, gave a good influence to the people, especially to the higher class. From that time a spirit was aroused to examine the Way, and some of them came to ask questions about Christianity. It is said that some difficulty and quarrel arose between Roman Catholic believers, and those who have good influence among Romanists come often to our meetings to read the Bible, others come to argue with us. These are two or three of the lecture results.

This is the present state of our Church, and I think this place is worthy to put a great hope for the future. Yuki Munizo.

KOFU.

Though I cannot report as much numerical increase as I could desire, yet I am very thankful to say that the spiritual state of this circuit is very satisfactory. All the means of grace have been well attended. The Sabbath-schools are becoming very interesting and increasing.

Notwithstanding general commercial detriment, financially the members did well, although the missionary contributions are smaller than the last year, because they subscribed more than one hundred yen towards the building of Kofu church at the same time.

The members are not only working out their own salvation with fear and trembling, and striving to love and edify each other, but also are in earnest to save others. They dedicate every Sunday afternoon specially to the work. One time I could know that more than fifty sinners, at their own houses, heard glad tidings from them at the same time.

The young women formed themselves into a Young Women's Christian Association in Kofu church, for the purpose of studying the Word of God, promoting their own spiritual and moral culture, and diffusing the knowledge and salvation of our Lord among their sex.

The Young Men's Christian Association, which was previously formed, is also very prosperous. Their Bible-class is very interesting, and their conversations are not resting in the letter only, but paying good attention deep into the Spirit.

During the year I received invitations from every quarter of this ken, requesting our work; but I am sorry to say that I could not

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supply all their demands, simply because of the want of workers. Dear brethren, sympathize with us, and join us in prayer to the Lord of the harvest to send many more faithful workers.

In previous years three excellent workers, Messrs. Hiraiwa, Toyama, and Miyagawa occupied this station, still they claimed many more workers. This year I took myself their place alone. Of course I could not expect to enlarge our field more than they left it, but soon after I came here I was obliged to open a new place at Inadzumi (nearly seven miles south of Kofu), with an assistant exhorter, and thank God that He brought forth twenty-five adult converts in the desert in a few months.

INADZUMI.—We began our first service here at Mr. T. Otoguro's house, according to his request, on May 30th, 1884. After his conversion the number was rapidly increased. They learned to pay several expenses of the church from the beginning. They are contributing once in a week, having the prospect of erecting a chapel there. Mr. Otoguro already offered a part of his land for the church ground; moreover they paid some amount of money for the building expenses of the sister church of Kofu. Both men and women are very earnest to bring their friends and neighbors, under divers trials and disadvantages, not simply telling about the historic Jesus, but testifying to their experiences. This perhaps provoked Satan and his conspiracy to bring the hindrances that armed with bamboo spears, stones, and wooden blocks, on the last month.

I should write minutely the details about Mr. S. Otoguro's happy death, his burial, and the strong obstruction of it by the monks and the barbarous people, but I am rather afraid to make it quite a history, so I will stop.

OTHER PREACHING PLACES.—Katsunuma was not so favorable as in Kofu and Inadzumi, until we sent Mr. Idsuka (now he is our hired local preacher) there to take care of it, on the last December; but now the work is reviving. The attendance is very much increasing. We are hopeful for the next year in this place.

We have begun our work already at Miyadzake, about three miles south of Katsunuma, where one of the Katsunuma members lives. I expect to continue here the next year.

And we have already begun our work at other places: Terao, Koi-kawa, Shimodzone, Kamidzone, Futagawa, Sumiyashi, etc. But I am sorry that we cannot continue, because the laborers are few.

During the year in this circuit we have received on trial, 46; removed, 3; died, 1; dropped, 5. Our present membership is 21 on trial; 90 full members. Total, 111; increase, 40.

WE are happy to call attention to a few indications of progress in the district during the year. They are as follows:—

- 1. At Danville, Bro. Thomas A. Dorion, who is a practical printer, has commenced the publication of a monthly periodical entitled *Le Fidèle Messager*, which is destined, we trust, to do much good work for our French Missions in particular, and to the Church in general.
- 2. Bro. Edward de Gruchy, at Actonvale, is now living in fine mission premises, used as church and parsonage, which were purchased during the year. At St. Theodore, a beautiful church, erected mostly by the generous contributions of the recently converted friends of the mission, was dedicated in midwinter. Also, on the same mission, the friends have erected a substantial school-house.
- 3. In Montreal a Girls' Institute has been founded, mostly by the generous efforts of the "Woman's Missionary Society," and plans have been adopted for a marked improvement, especially in our educational work.
- 4. At Berea, on Bro. Parent's mission, a blessed work of grace has been realized in connection with a gracious temperance movement. The principal promoters of this revival were young men from our Institutes.

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MONTREAL CENTRE.

This is emphatically the missionary age of the world. Every branch of the Christian Church has felt the mighty impulse of the tidal wave from heaven, and all lands have realized the powerful overflow of this pentecostal outpouring.

Of all Roman Catholic nations none have attracted more deserved attention than the French. This is right. For what the Japanese are to the Asiatics, the French, at least in many particulars, are to the Europeans. This doubtless accounts, at least in part, for the special interest awakened in favor of our French-Canadian missions.

This mission in Montreal was undertaken in 1876. Words can never tell the story of the toils, anxieties and fatigues to hands, head, and heart, which these years have known; nor can figures ever adequately tabulate the results of such pioneer labors.

The general work done may be briefly set forth as follows: --Collecting funds in favor of the mission premises and operations; gathering a congregation, which, on account of emigration, is like a flowing stream; organizing a church with its official board, its literary, temperance, and benevolent societies; also a Sunday-school, which has become the largest of any French mission school in the city; establishing a successful day-school; founding an educational institute, securing subscriptions therefor and teaching therein; writing and receiving up to the first of January, 1885, 10,368 letters and postals; issuing several thousands of circulars and reports; preaching 1,374 times, besides making addresses; attending at least four prayer and other social meetings per week; translating and publishing the doctrines of the Methodist Church, its General Rules, and distributing the same; translating and publishing hymns for the use of all the missions; distributing on the streets, public squares and in private houses thousands of pamphlets and tracts; visiting scores of families and supplying many of them with the Holy Scriptures; receiving at the parsonage hundreds of callers for information on almost every conceivable subject; also securing, nearly all gratuitously, a library of 400 volumes in French and English, for the Sunday-school and Society, and superintending its preparation for use.

Time would fail us to tell of persecutions by "cruel mockings" and stonings; of blasphemous threatenings, and summons before tribunals to answer for the sin of doing our Gospel work; of vituperative attacks on personal character and work from pulpits and the press; also to tell of toil in establishing two other missions in the city, and another at Longueuil; of efforts to systematize the work of the French District, such as securing a uniform course of studies for probationers in our ministry; also of increasing and extending the usefulness of our general educational operations.

This mission has already paid into the treasury of the Missionary Society, including its contribution to the Relief and Extension Fund, the generous sum of \$2,068.45. This is an average of \$229.82 per annum, besides an average of at least \$120 annually for home expenses, making a grand total of about \$3,048.45.

This mission has the distinguishing honor of bearing on its roll of members ten young men, all converted from Popery, who have entered the ministry either among ourselves or in the United States. Most of them were converted here. One of these has finished his work, and, from his post of duty, has gone to his reward—the lamented Joseph L. A. Maher. A few others on our registers give promise of entering

the evangelistic field in the not distant future.

Our Church register gives the following interesting statistics for the nine years:—Marriages, 98; burials, 25; baptisms, 211; received on profession of faith, 260; by certificates, 31; total received, 291. More than one-half of these have emigrated to the United States. Several have aided in forming the nuclei of the Montreal West and Montreal East missions. This year we have received 35, but have lost 58, leaving our aggregate membership 96. There have been 22 baptisms; 15 marriages and one burial. Contribution to the Missionary Society \$243.30.

MONTREAL WEST.

It is with much gratitude to the God of all grace that I can say that this mission is growing in numbers and spirituality, and your missionary is encouraged by seeing the work prosper on the right hand and on the left. Many are reading the Holy Scriptures which are able to make them wise unto salvation, consequently the scales are falling from their eyes, and many are leaving the house of bondage to embrace the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. I have organized a Sabbath-school of French children, many of whom were taken from running the streets and from the contaminating influence of corner loafers, and are now brought under the benign and happy influence of the blessed Gospel, to which they listen with great interest and emotion. There are now about thirty children, and many of their parents have been induced by the children to come with them to the Sabbath-school, and they are greatly delighted, yea, and blessed. I very much need a day-school.

From an appeal I put in the Witness, one person responded by sending me ten dollars from Brooklyn, N.Y., also two anonymous letters, initials D. J., enclosed ten dollars each, and three others, with small sums of from one to three dollars each, to be laid out in purchasing clothing for these almost naked children. St. James Street, Dominion Square, and East End Methodist Churches favored me by giving me from their poor funds the sum of twenty-five dollars, three other gentleman gave sixteen dollars for the poor of my congregation, and to defray the running expenses of the mission. My meetings are well attended. I hold services on Chatham Street, Pt. St. Charles, on Sabbath and week evenings, and cottage meetings at St. Henri. During the last year I have taken in on trial twenty-two, lost by

MONTREAL EAST.

We cannot look upon the events of the past year without thinking of the trials through which we have passed, especially on account of sickness. However, we are grateful that our lives have been spared, and we are comforted with the promise that "all things work together for good to them that love God."

We began our work under great difficulties, having no place for worship, nor any members. We also had to avoid a collision with another denomination that recently appointed a missionary to this field. After much effort we secured a room of a Roman Catholic family, that has since become Protestant. In this place we continued our labors until the first of May. Up to this time we have received nineteen persons, three from Montreal Centre and sixteen on probation. Of these eight were from the ranks of "Babylon the Great." Glory be to God.

We have lost five by emigration, one by death, and another by being dropped. We now have eleven members and one probationer. We have organized a board of stewards, who direct wisely the interests of our mission. The mission has contributed during the year the sum of \$49.55.

Your missionary has preached forty-seven sermons, and has distributed six Bibles, 170 Testaments, 157 portions (Gospels), 4,665 tracts, and 400 Christian calendars. We are glad to note that the antipathy manifested in the past with so much zeal and *finesse* has largely disappeared. Wherever we go, though sometimes we meet with indifference, yet never with violence; even when the commander inchief (the priest) has given orders to treat us ill, we have access to the people.

At the close of the year we occupy a hall which will seat eighty persons, situated on St. Catharine Street, and though facing a Roman Catholic church, crowds assemble and listen attentively to the Word of God, until the street is literally blockaded. We invite all friends of missions to pray God to pour out His Spirit to convict and to convert. Zech. 4. 6.

LONGUEUIL.

Our work on this mission has been attended with many difficulties. For instance, in the first place, our place of worship has been interdicted; so that, in spite of many efforts on our part, such as the wide circulation of printed notices of our services, and by visitation, still, the French element of Longueuil has been throughout conspicuI

ous by its absence; so our services have been and still are composed entirely of a few English families. I have held constant Sabbath services and Sabbath-school in English and occasional week-night services in English. Therefore, as far as French work is concerned, my work has been of necessity mainly visitation. But here again priestly interdict has confronted us, as more than once the French population has been warned from the pulpit to beware of us and of our books; so very few families are at present accessible, but where permitted I have read the Scriptures and conversed on religious subjects in the families. Only in one place have I met with positive persecution; perfect indifference to us is the role played now. Still, while thus dark for the present, we need not despair for the future, believing in Him who can "make the desert to rejoice and blossom as the rose." Such is our hope and prayer.

DANVILLE, WOTTON, &c.

Since my last report I have visited all the French Protestant families of this circuit, and I am glad to say that they are without exception faithful to the Gospel and to the Church of their choice. We have at present thirteen families on the roll, with a total of fifty-five souls, beside your missionary's own family, and there are many French Protestant families besides the above that belong to the different English congregations.

The crops having been poor last fall and work scarce during the past winter, not one of our friends was able to contribute anything to the support of the Gospel. However, they all hope to be able to do something next year. Although the winter has been severe and the snow very deep, I have, as a rule, Richmond excepted, filled all my appointments.

The meetings at Wotton have always been well attended, and at almost every meeting there have been present some of our Roman Catholic friends.

At St. Paul de Chester there are a number of Roman Catholics who seem to be searching for salvation through Christ, and I would not be surprised if five or six of the best families would sever their connection with the Church of Rome at no distant date.

My little publications, as a rule, are read with pleasure by many Roman Catholics. Last month I sent twenty-five copies of said publication to our brother, Octave Dupuis, at St. Paul de Chester. In a few days after I received a letter from him, saying that he had received the twenty-five copies of the *Fidèle Messager*, but that he did not have half enough, so I then sent fifty copies more, and every copy was given to and read by the people.

One of our converts in this circuit was baptized and received into the Methodist Church (English) at Danville a few weeks ago. The prospects for the coming year are good. 1884-85

I must say, in closing my report, that although our people here are well satisfied with the present appointment, they, without exception, remember with gratitude their former pastor, the Rev. A. Geoffroy, who ministered the Word of Life to them for nine years.

ACTON VALE.

In presenting the report for the year, though not as encouraging as might be, we have great reason for thankfulness for the way in which the Lord has led us. Sickness and death have visited our homes, but abundance of grace was given at the time of visitation. Recently it was our painful duty to deposit the remains of a dear friend, a faithful mother, in the grave. This diminishes our number.

Our church at St. Theodore, commenced last year, was completed this, and dedicated by the Superintendent of the District last December, in the presence of a large gathering of people from various parts of the country. A collection of \$110 was realized on the occasion.

The church is a neat brick building, erected on a parcel of ground very suitable for the resting-place of our faithful dead, and cost about \$1,200.

Acton Vale being a centre of operations, by dint of watchfulness we were able to secure a good building, well situated, to serve as church and parsonage.

The premises cost \$1,500, on which \$500 has been paid. We hope the Lord will raise up charitable and godly men to aid us in removing all indebtedness on our mission premises.

We have access to a large number of families of good standing around us, which is to us a great encouragement for the future.

We have sown in tears, we hope to reap in joy. Present membership, 26; marriages, 7; baptisms, 5; burials, 2.

WATERLOO.

In presenting my sixth annual report of this mission, I am thankful to a kind Providence for the mercies of the past year, which has been the most successful year of my ministry on this field of labor. I am very hopeful of the future, especially at Berea, where several have been blest in the ordinary means of grace. Some of our young men have taken quite an interest in promoting the cause of God, by holding temperance meetings, and sometimes prayer-meetings, in which several take part. This has afforded your missionary encouragement, while it has been profitable to the people. The mission has lost 26 members who have been attached to another part of the work, and we return a number as received by the alteration of boundaries, which was a simple extension of our work to a place which had been vacated by our missionary for some reason. This was thought to be the best way to make the returns. Our present membership is 54.

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STUKELY MILLS, &c.

I was assigned three appointments, namely, North and South Ely and Stukely Mills. At the latter place, as there remains but one Protestant family, the others formerly there having emigrated to the United States, I thought it well to preach at Lawrenceville, the place of my residence, and the centre of a vast Roman Catholic population. Our English friends there have kindly offered me the use of their church, and, through their influence, several Roman Catholics may be seen in our meetings. I have also visited Stukely Mills occasionally. I have preached 130 sermons, have held 110 prayermeetings and four class-meetings; I have made 800 pastoral calls among Protestants and Catholics; distributed thirty Bibles and The average attendance at Testaments, and baptized two children. our meetings is from fifty to sixty, while the number of communicants is about twenty-seven. The work seems to give favorable indications for the future. While waiting for "better days," we are working and praying that God may bless the labor of our hands.

OTTAWA AND HULL.

We feel very thankful to God our Father for the measure or success that has crowned our labor during the past year. It is not that we can add any one truly converted to the number reported last year by my predecessor, but, with thankful heart to our common Lord, we can say that many persons and families have been greatly influenced under our feeble efforts, and, more especially, two among those families, though they have not yet pronounced themselves free from the Church of Rome, are strongly in favor of our Church, and more They say they believe it to be the guide of especially of the Bible. life. I may state here that the population in general in Hull, and Ottawa as well, seems to be better disposed to receive the Gospel to-day than ever before, and I believe, if this field is properly cultivated in the future, great success will be the result. I therefore hope that all possible means will be employed to continue the work of the Gospel in these appointments.

ALL things considered, the work upon the District during the past year has been encouraging. The progress of the country has been retarded from unavoidable causes, and financial stringency has been the result. A goodly number in various parts of the District have been converted to God, and much needed social reforms have been advanced. Victoria asks for the services of an additional minister Chilliwhack sorely needs additional help, but cannot undertake the entire financial burden at present. Nanaimo and New Westminster are holding their own as self-sustaining circuits. Victoria membership, 135; Nanaimo, 48; New Westminster, 57; Sumas and Chilliwhack, 108.

MAPLE BAY.

The aspect of the work on this mission is more cheering than ever before. The appointments have been regularly filled, and the attendance has for the most part been very good. Two new appointments have been taken up. This mission, as it now stands, is large enough to give two active men more work than they could do. We rejoice and give thanks to God that souls have been saved. We have six Sundayschools, which we could not carry on as we do if it were not for the help we receive from the Sabbath-school Aid Fund. MAPLE RIDGE AND YALE.

While a spirit of worldliness and indifference to Divine things prevails to a large extent among the people, yet we are cheered to find in every place a few kind, warm-hearted people who are anxious not only to hear the Word of Life but to see our Zion prosper.

We have a Band of Hope Society, which meets regularly once a fortnight, and two Sabbath-schools, one of which has been recently organized at the Johnson's Landing appointment. Seven are added to our membership, two on trial and five by letters. Members, 16.

And although interest in religious matters can hardly be said to have waned, our deep sorrow is, that it has not arisen to that height of religious fervor which precedes, accompanies

ALMA.

Another year has passed away, and as we attempt a review of the the same we are deeply conscious of the little that has, or appears to have, been accomplished. Few of these, however, can be in any way counted Methodist, the mass of the people belonging to another denominational fold to which they are intensely loyal. This, with other reasons, leads us to conclude that the proper arrangement of our work on the south side of the Fraser has not yet been reached. And before we commit ourselves further it is of the highest importance that the matter be earnestly inquired into and dealt with in such a manner as will preclude the certainty, as is the case now, of large demands being made in the near future upon our missionary funds, as from a financial point of view we need expect no material increase on the older parts of this mission.

As to the new appointments, we think Mt. Lehman promises fairly. But some years must elapse, on account of the nature of the holdings, before the people will be in a position to contribute more than a small fraction of the amount required to support a minister. Yet, as no other Church attends to them, and as they gladly hear and evince an interest in us and our work, we should do for them what we can.

The small number that joyfully hear us at Upper Sumas also merit attention. There, during the winter, the revival spirit was among us, and we have succeeded in organizing a class, which is doing well.

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Oh for the "baptism of the Holy Spirit," that the "wilderness" and "waste places" may become "like Eden" and the "desert like the garden of the Lord!" Members, 20. R. B. Hemlaw.

This mission is still progressing, though in spiritual things there is not that prosperity so earnestly desired. I have endeavored to leave no place and no person unvisited, but there must be more concentration of effort before we can reasonably expect much success. We have now two Sabbath-schools on the mission, one organized and the other resuscitated during the year. We have secured a few subscribers for the Christian Guardian, and have made special and successful effort to introduce our Sabbath-school literature.

Though sometimes greatly perplexed and cast down because souls are not saved, I do not despair of the ultimate success of the Gospel on this mission. Members, 15; on trial, 1.

Montreal Fifth.—No report. Members, 178.

Montreal Ninth.—The past year has been full of encouragement for this mission. The Sunday-school formerly controlled by the St. James Street church has been transferred to us, and has greatly strengthened our work. The "Family Visitor," a monthly religious paper published by the Official Board and distributed by the Christian workers of the mission, has found its way into hundreds of homes of the poor and neglected. The Sunday and other services have been well attended by serious hearers. More than seventy scholars have been enrolled in the Sunday-schools since October; and, notwithstanding the heavy losses by removals and withdrawals, our membership has made a substantial advance. The present membership is forty. There is much work yet to be done in connection with the city appointment, and with timely and liberal aid from the Missionary Fund, there is no room for doubt that an independent and flourishing W. W. MADGE. church will soon be established.

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Cote St. Paul.—The year just closed has been one of blessing, for which we feel thankful to "the Giver of every good and perfect An undenominational temperance society has been formed during the year, holding its meetings in the church. This society has done good in more ways than one, especially among the young. Prayer and class-meetings have been well sustained, and some who are not members occasionally drop in to class-meeting, and sometimes take part in the exercises. The difficulties peculiar to this Province, and to all manufacturing centres, confront us here—a small Protestant population and a migratory population. At least two precious souls have been led to Jesus, and are rejoicing in the knowledge of sins forgiven. We trust that the seed which has been sown in many hearts will not be fruitless. Though our congregations are not large, in a few years a great many people are reached because of the number that move in and out of this place, and for this reason this mission should be sustained. The people are liberal. Members, 12. W. Somerville.

LACHINE.—No report. Members, 22.

Chambly.—Notwithstanding the great depression in the cotton and woollen manufacturing interests, upon which our people largely depend, we have had some financial prosperity this year. The debt on our church property, amounting at the commencement of the year to \$754, has been fully paid, Mr. S. T. Willett giving the half of this amount; he has also donated ground for a cemetery. A new organ has been procured. The week-night services have been well attended through the year. The Sabbath-school numbers forty. The membership, notwithstanding three removals, has increased from nine to eighteen. Several French Roman Catholics occasionally attend our services. The few people we have in this French Roman Catholic wilderness are very punctual in their attendance upon the preaching services. We thank God, and take courage. Ernest M. Taylor.

ODELLTOWN.—We have to thank God for the degree of success which has attended our labors on this mission. We have two good churches, where we preach every Sabbath to attentive and growing congregations. Our class and prayer-meetings are well attended, and are in a healthy and prosperous condition. We are looking for and expecting a revival of God's work. Members, 97. Jas. O'HARA.

Valleyfield.—This mission, like many of the missions in the Province of Quebec, owing to the prevalence of the French population and other causes, is somewhat discouraging in its operation. Nevertheless, there are some signs of promise. During the past year the membership has doubled; and the Sabbath-school is in a very promising condition. The church funds are also all in advance of the previous year; and the Mission Fund is more than doubled. The members, though mostly poor, give altogether more than ten dollars per head annually for the support of the ministry, a liberality equalling that of our most wealthy city churches. They are, however,

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humiliated, disheartened and ashamed, that, owing to their paucity in numbers, and the small amount granted to help them from the Mission Fund, their minister has been so poorly remunerated: the mission grant this year, exclusive of removal expenses, being only \$38. Their church is a very nice and comfortable building which they put up three or four years ago, and is free from debt. It is hoped that the people of this mission will have in the future that consideration they require, or the mission had better be abandoned. Members, 20. G. H. Davis.

Hudson.—Though at the beginning of this year many difficulties had to be surmounted, yet we praise God that He has blessed us in every respect, especially by letting us see some of the fruit of our united efforts. Over sixty persons have professed conversion, of whom fifty-one have been received into our Church, and the work is still going on. Our Sabbath-schools are doing blessed work for God; so are our three prayer-meetings, and our three class-meetings. amount raised on the mission for all purposes is greatly in advance of any previous year, owing, no doubt, to the Lord's filling the hearts of the people with His riches, so that their pockets opened to advance His cause. The preacher's support on the mission is \$147.30 in advance of last year. A Ladies' Aid Society was formed this year, and already they have purchased a handsome silver communion service. They are now working to raise money to repair the Hudson church, and have nearly enough on hand. The other two churches on this mission are also to be repaired this summer. We think there will be no difficulty in making this mission a self-supporting circuit for the future, as several have offered to double their subscriptions for next year. Members, 86; removals, 10; increase, 42.

GRENVILLE.—This mission has for some time suffered so much from removals, that, unless it is liberally supported by the Missionary Society, it will, before long, be unable to retain the services of a resident minister. The appointments have been, so far as possible, kept, the people faithfully visited in their houses, the Gospel has been earnestly preached, and souls have been blessed, yet on account of the rough roads, long drives, and scattered condition of the members and families, the work has been somewhat up-hill. In the opinion of some, a reorganization of the bounds of the mission would result in the possibility of more efficient work. Although a few names have been added, yet, on account of removals, mostly, there is a decrease in the membership. Members, 65.

LAKEFIELD.—Some of our members have moved away and one has died during the year. Our Official Board felt it their duty to drop certain others. Four heads of families joined us. Hard times, a hard winter, and impassable roads have been much against us. Yet we have done what we could and are hopeful for the future of this mission. Members, 112.

NEW GLASGOW.—No report. Members, 50.

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ARUNDEL.—We have four appointments on this mission, with a good average attendance, and one Sabbath-school. I had two weeks' special services in the autumn, but after starting the season became so wet that it greatly prevented a successful revival. However, I can report three for the first time brought to the light of the Gospel and living therein, also two others retaken for the Lord. Nevertheless, I cannot report an increase of membership, for the reason that some have removed. The majority of our people on this mission are financially poor, but a few, to keep the work in progress and have the Gospel preached to them, gave very liberally. We are behind last year financially, but the converting spirit is working in the hearts of this people. Members, 45.

SHAWBRIDGE, one of the weakly charges of the Missionary Society, valuable because of its Roman surroundings, as darkness adds treble value even to a small lamp. Sabbath services, weekly assemblings for prayer, and a small Sabbath-school have been maintained with considerable regularity through the year. In the fall some weeks were spent in extra labor, eliciting much profession, some little of this put on open confession of Christ and remains. The missionary spirit, which for some years showed only ebb tides, appears turning to the spring and flow again. Lack of interest in the good old classmeetings explains the why and wherefore of declinings observable in this corner of the vineyard. The appointment in the Morin Mountains puts out more vigor, and a manifest desire there for the continuance of Methodist usages and ministrations of the truth is encouraging to the laborer. From each appointment a large family has removed. This emigration, so common and so constant, seems to say to the Society, "Work while you have foothold in the country, utilize your congregations and influence, which as a trust you still possess: call out colporteurs, establish systematic visits of these valuable coadjutors, and manifest that if the English-speaking people are to retire it is, by God's help, bound ere it goes to show French brethren and French congregations its heirs in the word and grace of the Gospel." A debt on the Sabbath-school room has been paid during the year and an organ purchased for the school. Our people have done well in supporting the funds, both connexional and circuit. To keep the mission together I have been obliged to preach four times on each alternate

He received six names from the Maberly register, and upon and with them he has worked, and now there are seventy-nine upon the Sharbot Lake register. We have no church, but are privileged with the use of the Presbyterian church. We have quite an efficient Quarterly Board for a mission so young. Our prayer and class-meetings are well attended. We have also two Sabbath-schools, which are quite efficiently worked. Connexional funds are very good. To God be all the praise for the general success and prosperity the mission has had during the past year.

If we have had any success (and thank God we have) on this mission in bringing souls to Christ, and in building up the Church spiritually and temporally, the Gospel of Christ hath done it. CORNWALL. - It is doubtless a matter of surprise to many of the readers of our Annual Missionary Report, that a town so populous as Cornwall, and in many respects so favorably situated, should be depending on the Missionary Fund for support. Why, it may be asked, is not Cornwall self-sustaining? There are, it must be remembered, however, peculiar circumstances connected with the place which should be taken into consideration. The cause of Methodism has had a long and hard struggle here, and has had to contend with opposition and difficulties. The floating character of the population, and other adverse circumstances, have been a source of discouragement, and for several years a heavy church debt has been a great barrier to our advancement. In the midst of all, however, we thank God, and take courage. The closing of the factories has been a serious drawback during the past winter to many of our congregation. The prospect at present is brighter, and better times, financially, are expected. Our congregations are good, and our Sabbath-school, under the management of an efficient superintendent, is increasing in interest. Many interesting young people of both sexes attend the Bible class, and also the week evening services. We are praying for a revival of God's work in our midst. Most of our funds are in advance. An effort is being made to liquidate our heavy church debt, which, we believe, with the blessing of God, will prove successful, and then Cornwall will be one of our most interesting and desirable stations. If the Missionary Committee will only aid us until our church debt is paid, the money expended on this interesting field of labor will be more than repaid ere long. Our people are kind and liberal for their means, and willing to do all they can to sustain the interests of our Church. Your missionary has been kindly treated on this charge by a people whom he highly esteems. In consequence of a large number of removals we are unable to return any increase in membership. FITZROY HARBOR.—The principal appointment on this mission is at Diamond, on the ninth line of Fitzroy, and is generally known Here we have a comfortable as the Ninth Line appointment. church, a very good congregation, and a large membership. The social means of grace are highly prized by our members here, which is shown by the fact that nearly all of them meet in class, and two prayer-meetings are held each week. Most of our people in this neighborhood are in good circumstances, and give liberally for the support of the ministry and the sustentation of the various connexional funds. Torbolton is the name of the appointment next in importance. Here we have a fair congregation, and a membership of thirty-eight. The class and prayer-meetings are attended only by a faithful few. Our people here are comparatively poor, but they are willing to do what they can. A new church is much needed in this neighborhood. There is but one other appointment connected with this mission, Fitzroy Harbor. For several years our cause in this place has been very small; the few Methodist families that lived in this village have, one by one, moved away, so that now the minister's family is the only one living near the village. Onslow.—We are happy to report a good degree of spiritual and financial prosperity. The public and social means of grace have been well attended, and have been made a blessing unto many. As the result of five weeks' special services, twenty-five united with the Church, making in all thirty-three received on trial during the year. There is also an evident improvement in the spirituality of many of the members. Two of our churches have been repaired and improved. Leslie.—We are glad to report some progress. We have five appointments, four of which are interesting. Financially there is a slight advance on last year. Our church property has been improved. 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Renfrew.—This mission was by the Union reduced from eight to three appointments. In the village we worship in the Methodist Episcopal church. There is a debt of \$850 on it. The other church is vacant, and we have not succeeded in selling it as yet. Our class-meeting and prayer-meetings at the Centre have been well attended. Our Sunday-school has done fairly, and on Sunday evening we have usually had a large congregation. We are looking for an increase of the Divine blessing. Members, 111.

CALABOGIE .- We have been enabled to prosecute our work with an encouraging measure of success. Congregations have been good, and our people generally have made advancement in spiritual things. Three Sabbath-schools have been sustained during the summer months, and prayer-meetings have been well attended. The cessation of work on the K. and P. Railway, and the closing of the iron mines have thrown many of our people out of employment, and therefore our finances are not quite up to our expectations. But we think the out look is a cheerful one for the Calabogie mission. A large saw-mill has been erected, which will bring a large addition to our population. Other mills are projected, which, together with the reopening of the mines, will make Calabogie an important centre of business. At the Clyde Forks appointment God graciously blessed our efforts in a revival service: quite a number were, we believe, savingly converted, others were wonderfully revived, and twenty-one united with us in Church fellowship. In our present membership we have the nucleus of a large and prosperous church, which gives fair promise to be self-sustaining in the near future. There are five regular appointments on the mission, with a membership of 65, and 10 on trial; increase 30.

HALEY'S STATION.—The spiritual and financial interests of this mission are in a much better condition than at the beginning of the Conference year. We regret, however, that we are not able to report a larger accession to the Church. We have been encouraged with the growing interest in church matters over the mission, especially at the Rosebank and Brully appointments. A comfortable parsonage has been secured at Haley's Station, and all our church property improved during the year—for which purpose the sum of \$126 has been raised. COBDEN AND LOCKSLEY.—This is a large field, composed of parts of the former Beachburg Methodist Church of Canada, and Methodist Episcopal Missions, added to Alice and Egansville mission of the

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Methodist Church of Canada, except the German work, and one appointment that had previously been supplied from Pembroke. We have seven appointments in all, making a circuit of nearly 50 miles. Special services, held at three appointments, during 12 weeks, were attended with very gracious results. We were put to great inconvenience for a time on account of having no parsonage, but by prompt and persistent effort, seconded by many of the people, we succeeded in erecting a very commodious parsonage, in which the superintendent and family are comfortably settled, and on which considerable has been paid. We have also, chiefly by personal labor, erected suitable outbuildings which are clear of debt. The debt of \$184 on the Cobden church and organ has been reduced to \$47, and about one-half (\$90) of the debt on Lake Dorè church has been paid. Moneys have also been raised to improve other church properties. So far as we can ascertain there is a general increase in connexional funds. We have secured the renewal of all Guardian subscribers (13), and have obtained 27 new ones. A week night prayer-meeting and a Sundayschool have been started in Cobden, both of which promise well. All our congregations are good; that in Cobden has more than doubled. Methodist Union works well; harmony prevails. We have received 39 members during the year. Members, 168. James Lawson. NORTH BAY.—On the recommendation of the Pembroke District Meeting, the Conference last year divided the Mattawa mission, on which the work had greatly increased during the previous year, into North Bay, Lake Talon and Sturgeon Falls missions. At North Bay the labors of your missionaries have been successful. The attendance on all the services held in the house of God has steadily increased,

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and the church membership has advanced from 20 to 30, notwithstanding ten have been removed during the year. The new church at North Bay village has been nicely and comfortably seated, and a neat and commodious parsonage has been erected and occupied. Sabbath-schools, one at North Bay and one at La Vase, are doing good work for the Master. A new church is in process of erection at South-East Bay, which will be completed during the present summer. hope we entertained eighteen months ago concerning the results arising from the opening of this mission, has been more than realized. North Bay village possesses now 600 inhabitants, and has been designated the county-town of the District of Nipissing. Three other denominations have built and occupied places of worship since our last writing. South-East Bay, the point where the Northern Railway connects with the waters of Lake Nipissing, is rapidly becoming a village, second only in importance to that of North Bay. We have great satisfaction in recording the fact, that we were the first to found the Christian Church in this territory, and although several other denominations have since entered the field, our work is, by God's SILAS HUNTINGTON. blessing, abiding and prosperous.

LAKE TALON, which was first occupied as a week-day appointment, is now a mission of four or five preaching places, in connection with which four interesting Sabbath-schools are in successful operation. A new church was opened at Shields' Pit on Christmas day last, and the lumber for another has been collected near Lake Nosbunsing, which we hope will be built during the present summer. The work of evangelism here has been prosecuted with success by Bros. J. D. Ellis and Andrew Shields, students, whose self-denying and indefatigable efforts are highly appreciated by the people. The writer has personally visited and aided, to the utmost of his ability, the brethren employed in the various fields named above, and while we have striven to supply regularly the permanent settler with the ministrations of the Gospel, we have extended, as far as practicable, our labors to the railway people and the lumbermen in their camps and elsewhere, whose liberal contributions to the support of our church enterprises S. HUNTINGTON. have been highly prized.

Sturgeon Falls, which includes Sudbury, Spanish River, and Bescootasing, on the line of the C. P. R., and Nipissing village, with the adjacent territory lying south of the lake which bears that name, has been occupied during the year with the assistance of Bros. S. N. McAdoo and And. Galley, earnest and faithful men whose labors have been made a blessing to many people here. Nipissing, together with Powasin, Comanda Creek, and Dowdal's Settlement promise speedily to become an important circuit. A new church is being erected at Nipissing, which will soon be occupied and will largely increase the effectiveness of our labors in this locality. J. H. FOWLER. GASPE.—Another year's work for Jesus on this coast ends much better than at first anticipated, and the prospective is brighter and more encouraging. Satan made a heavy raid on our rank and file early in the year, but, by the Divine energy, he has had to beat a retreat; and now the spiritual state of the Church is advanced. This winter has been the longest, roughest, and most severe for many years. Last summer's fishing was very poor; farming almost a dead failure; and so scarce indeed was fodder, that cattle in most cases were fed on dog-wood, or Gaspe-timothy—locally called; some on bread (flour last fall being cheap); and others, lest fortunate, succumbed to the fate of starvation. Your missionary, however, hast just cause for gratitude that he still survives, without having suffered; and there is yet flour in the barrel, potatoes in the cellar, and a little hay left for the horse. During the year we held divine service in five churches, four private houses, and one schoolhouse; or at ten different places, including Anticosti Island, which was visited last September. The membership and support are confined chiefly to six of these appointments. Roseville forms the largest part of the former, while St. George and Indian Coves contribute the largest share of the latter. The St. George's Cove church has been re-shingled, and hanging-lamps provided. Work is expected in renovating the one at Roseville; and also the parsonage at Cape Ozo, and finishing the church at the last-mentioned place. The Sabbath-school work is progressing. The special services were productive of good; and if it be God's will, your missionary would gladly labor here for Jesus another year. Members, 87. A. WHITESIDE.

Missionary Society of The Methodist Church.

ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL CONFERENCE, 1883.

I.-NAME.

This Society shall be known as "The Missionary Society of the Methodist Church."

II. —Овјест.

The object of the Society is the support and enlargement of the Indian, French, Domestic, Foreign, and other Missions, which are carried on under the direction of the Conferences of the Methodist Church.

III .- MEMBERS.

Every person paying annually the sum of Four dollars and upwards, and every person collecting annually Ten dollars and upwards, for this Society, shall be deemed a member, and entitled to a copy of the Annual Conference Report. And any person paying annually Twenty-five dollars, or collecting for the Society Thirty dollars or upwards, shall also be entitled to a copy of the General Report.

IV.—AUXILIARY AND BRANCH SOCIETIES.

The Methodist Missionary Societies within the bounds of any Annual Conference shall collectively be entitled "The Auxiliary Missionary Society" for that Conference; and severally shall be entitled "Branch Societies" of such Auxiliary. Missionary Societies formed in our Sunday-schools shall be entitled "Juvenile Branches" of the Conference Auxiliary.

V.—TREASURERS.

1. Each Annual Conference may appoint a Treasurer, through whom all remittances from the General Treasurers may be sent. In case any Annual Conference does not make such an appointment, then all remittances to and from the Mission Rooms shall be made through the Superintendents of Districts of such Conference.

2. The Superintendent of a Circuit or Mission shall be Treasurer of the Branch Society of his Circuit or Mission.

VI.—REMITTANCES.

The money raised on any Circuit or Mission shall be transmitted, as soon as collected, to the Superintendent of the District, deducting only what has been disbursed for incidental and local expenses; and the District Superintendent shall, in turn, remit promptly to the General Treasurer, through the Conference Treasurer, or directly, if there be no Conference Treasurer.

VII.—CIRCUIT LISTS.

The Superintendent of each Circuit or Mission shall prepare annually, not later than the first day of the Annual District Meeting, a list of all subscribers, of Two Dollars and upwards, also the aggregate of all collections and sum under Two Dollars; such lists to be sent without delay to the Conference Treasurer or District Superintendent, who shall forward them to the Mission Rooms, together with a statement of the gross receipts, local disbursements, and remittances.

VIII. - GENERAL BOARD.

1. There shall be a General Missionary Board for the management of the Missionary Fund, which shall meet annually at such time and place as it may appoint.

2. This Board shall be composed of the General Superintendents, the Officers of the Missionary Society, one minister to be chosen annually by the ministers of each Annual Conference, one layman to be chosen annually by the laymen of each Conference Missionary Committee, and eighteen other persons—one half of whom shall be laymen—to be appointed by the General Conference, and to continue in office four years.

3. The duties of this Board shall be to review the Missionary work, and apportion the funds committed to it, to the respective Conferences according to the necessities of the various departments of the work. Also to make the necessary appropriations to the various Missionary Districts. Provided also that the Japan, Victoria and New Westminster, and Port Simpson Districts only, shall be considered Missionary Districts, and the General Board may appropriate directly to each of the Missions in these Districts.

4. When an appropriation is made by the General Board to any particular department of the work, or for any special object, the Annual Conference Committee shall not be at liberty to divert any part of such grant to any other depart-

ment or object.

5. Vacancies occurring amongst Conference representatives may be filled by the Special Committee of the Conference affected; the vacancies occuring among those appointed by the General Conference may be filled by the Committee of Consultation and Finance.

6. In the event of the death or disability of any of the Officers of the Society, the Committee of Consultation and Finance shall appoint a suitable person to fill the vacancy till the next meeting of the General Board, when such appointment may be confirmed or changed, pending the meeting of the next General Conference.

7. The Committee of Consultation and Finance shall also have authority to suspend any Officer of the Missionary Society for incompetence or for culpable neglect of the duties of his office, and supply his place till the next meeting of the General Board, which shall have authority to fill the vacancy till the next

General Conference.

IX.—COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

A Committee, to be called the Committee of Consultation and Finance, shall be annually appointed by the General Board, consisting of the General Superintendents, the Officers of the Missionary Society, and eighteen other members—nine ministers and nine laymen—the majority of whom shall be members of the General Board, who shall provide during the interval of the sessions of said Board for any exigencies that may arise. All the proceedings of said Committee shall be entered in a

minute book, and reported to the General Board at its next annual meeting.

X.—Annual Meeting.

An Annual Public Meeting of the members and friends of this Society shall be held at the time and place appointed by the General Board, connected with such religious services, as may be deemed expedient.

XI.—General Officers and their Duties.

1. The General Conference shall appoint the General Secretaries and Treasurers of the Missionary Society, who shall be ex-officio members of the

General Board.

2. The General Secretaries shall, previous to each Financial District Meeting, furnish each Superintendent of a District with a schedule to be filled up by said District Superintendent at the Financial District Meeting, showing the estimated income and expenditure of each Mission for the support of the ministers and preachers, the amount of Missionary grant recommended by the Financial District Meeting, etc., etc., which schedule shall be forwarded to the General Secretaries without delay. From these schedules the General Secretaries shall prepare a tabular state-ment for the information of the General Board, in order that its members may intelligently and justly apportion the funds of the Society to the several Conferences.

3. It shall be the duty of the General Secretaries to make themselves acquainted with the entire Mission field, by official correspondence, and personal visitation when practicable. It shall also be the duty of the Secretaries to publish the Annual General Report of the Society, and the Reports of the several Annual Conferences, with a statement of their

income and expenditure.

4. In the discharge of their duties, the Officers of the Society shall act in harmony with the legally appointed courts and officers of the General and Annual Conferences. Provided always, that in case of any emergency arising, that may require prompt action in the matter of supplying any remote Mission, it shall be competent for them, on the recommendation of the Committee of Consultation and Finance, to request the proper authorities of any Annual Conference to aid them in meeting such emergency, by appointing one of its ministers or preachers to such Mission.

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STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

SPECIAL CLAIMS.

Supply in case of Sickness—In case a Missionary is laid aside during the year by sickness which incapacitates him for work, the President of Conference and Superintendent of the District may, if they judge it necessary, procure a suitable supply; and the Treasurers, on being duly certified of the facts, accompanied by a Physician's certificate as to the health of the Missionary, are authorized to pay towards the cost of such supply an amount not exceeding the proportion of a single unordained man's salary, for the period during which his services are necessary, within the current Conference year.

Supply in case of Death.—In case of the death of a Missionary, his family shall be privileged to remain on the Mission and receive the allowance for the rest of the year; and an amount for a supply, similar to that mentioned in the preceding regulation, may be allowed.

SUPPLY PENDING THE REMOVAL OF A MISSIONARY.—In case a Missionary is removed from a distant station, and it is found necessary to supply his new field of labor until such time as he can reach it, a grant for such supply may be made, similar in amount to that mentioned in the preceding cases.

. AFFLICTION.

These grants are intended to HELP in cases where expenses incurred by sickness are exceptionally great, or the salary unusually small. It is to be understood, therefore, that only cases of this exceptional character will hereafter be entertained, and the Board reserves the right of granting either the whole or part of such claim, as it may judge expedient

In order to prevent unnecessary delay in the settlement of Special Claims, it is recommended that they be presented at the next District Meeting—Annual or Financial—and, if recommended by such meeting, forwarded at once, with the physician's (or other) bill, duly receipted, to the General Secretaries.

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Standing Resolutions.

ERECTION AND REPAIRS OF MISSION PREMISES, &c.

- 1. No application for a grant for new Mission premises or buildings will be entertained, unless a description of the proposed buildings, with their estimated cost, has first been submitted to, and the expenditure distinctly authorized by the General Board, or the Committee of Consultation and Finance.
- 2. The same rule will be observed in regard to the repairing of Mission buildings, and the purchase of Furniture.

REPORTS OF MISSIONS.

A Report of the Religious State of the Mission shall be prepared by the Superintendent of each Mission, and read in the May District Meeting, subject to the revision of that Meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE.

The District Superintendents shall require semi-annual communications to be made by each of the Missionaries on their respective Districts, to the Secretaries of the Society, giving information of the state and prospects of the several Missions in which they are employed.

PUBLICATION OF ANNUAL REPORTS.

- 1. The General Report of the Society shall contain the religious reports from Missions, the aggregate amount of Missionary contributions from each Circuit, the names of subscribers of Twenty-five Dollars and upwards, and the details of the expenditure.
- 2. Each Annual Conference Missionary Report shall contain the religious Reports from the Missions within its bounds, together with those from the Indian and French Missions and the Missionary Districts; the lists of subscribers of two dollars and upwards, and the details of expenditure within the Conference.
