### Constitution.

THIS congregation shall be known by the name of the First Presbyterian Church, Park Avenue.

The Board of Managers shall be chosen by ballot by the congregation from among the members of the church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for that purpose.

The Board of Managers shall consist of nine members, one-third of whom shall retire annually by rotation; and their places, as also the places of any who may die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting of the congregation. The retiring Managers may be re-elected.

If any Manager be cut off from church privileges by process of discipline, or leave the congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as Manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

The duty of the Managers shall be to attend to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. More particularly it shall be their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry; to take care of the property of the congregation; to provide for the payment of the minister's and other salaries; and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge, as the congregation may from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Wednesday of each month for the transaction of business; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the chairman, by notice from the pulpit, or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

Five members present shall constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

nt. 5 Sec. The Treasurer shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the congregation from the members of the Board of Managers. His duties shall be to keep the accounts of the congregation and to receive and disburse all moneys, subject o the direction and control of the Board of Managers.

The Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of Managers at the first meeting of the Board held after the annual meeting of the congregation.

The Chairman's duties shall be to preside at the meetings of the Board of Managers, and to sign all accounts which have passed the Board. In his absence any member may be chosen to act as chairman *pro tem*. The chairman has only a casting vote.

The Secretary's duties shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and to act as clerk of the congregation at congregational meetings.

All cases not herein provided for shall be governed by the rules and forms of procedure laid down by the church courts of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Se

### Statement by the Session.

Another year has passed away, and it again behooves the Session placed over this congregation to briefly review what has been done and also to look forward to the work of 1894.

The quarterly call by each elder in his district has been made, except where it has been unavoidably prevented; and the pastor has paid his annual visit upon members and adherents, as well as attending to the many calls that are necessarily made upon the sick, not only those connected with families of the congregation but also strangers, who, in the time of need, make application for visits from a minister of the gospel. The pastor would again emphasize the fact that he reserves Thursday afternoon and evening, when he may be found at 307 Wolfe Street, and will be glad to meet with any whom it may be inconvenient to see at other times.

The net increase in membership has not been large, for although sixty-three new names have been added to the roll, through deaths, marriages and removals from the city a number of names have been removed from the roll. In every case of removal it is desirable that immediate application for certificate of disjunction be made to the Clerk of Session, as none but *bona fide* members should be retained on Communion Roll. All change of residence within the city should also be promptly reported.

There have been seven deaths among those connected with the congregation, and the pastor has attended sixteen funerals in all during the year.

At the Thanksgiving session in November, the collection in aid of the Session Fund, administered in behalf of needy

The Session notes with great gratification the progress of the Waterloo Street School. Its work is being well done, and the staff of teachers and officers must be greatly encouraged by results achieved.

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor have made considerable progress towards the completion of their task of raising \$500 for Church Building in the Northwest. They had at the close of 1893 \$458.25 on hand, and trust shortly to have the full sum, \$500.

The year 1893 has been a critical period in the history of the congregation. From the 19th of March, 1893, to the 14th of January, 1894, inclusive, worship was held in Victoria Hall. There are certain drawbacks inseparable from such a state of affairs; and while the attendance of visitors kept up well in the Hall, certain of the members and adherents of the congregation have been irregular in attendance. But whatever loss may have been suffered under such conditions there is good ground for hope that in the beautiful new church building, opened so successfully on January 21st of this year, not only shall lost ground be regained but great advance will be made under present favorable circumstances. Details are furnished in the various reports. Let it suffice to say here that the Session views with great gratification the outlook for this congregation, over which, in God's providence, it has been placed. Never has there been brighter promise of prosperity and usefulness. Let us thank God and take courage.

The receipts in aid of the various schemes of the church have increased a little over the ordinary contributions of a year ago, but the Session is assured that the chief reason the increase is not greater has been the fact of our worshipping in a public hall. The pink envelopes will, in future, be placed in the seat occupied in church, one for each month, and it is sincerely hoped that *all* members and adherents will see their duty in contributing therein to the Schemes of the Church nine funds in all, and two of which, the Foreign and Home Mission funds, cover such large fields. The allotment made of the funds at the disposal of the Session will be found in the report of the Missionary Society.

No very extended reference to the work of the choir for the year is needed, and indeed would hardly be fair, seeing it has been performed under unfavorable circumstances. During a considerable portion of the year, too, the pastor's choir has been silent. But row, with the new building and the new organ, both the main choir and the pastor's choir are girding themselves up to do their best in the days to come. It is earnestly to be desired that those who can render efficient help in choir service should be willing to do so; and also that in any efforts to enrich the praise service in the new building the congregation may lend its earnest and sympathetic cooperation.

In closing the report the Session earnestly expresses the hope that temporal prosperity will not be the only or even the chief aim of the congregation. Indeed, no fear need be felt concerning such matters if first we seek the "kingdom of God and His righteousness;" then we may claim the promise that "all these things shall be added unto us." Let us look to God and we shall be blessed indeed. Let pastor and people, officers, members and adherents pray "God be merciful unto . us, and bless us, and cause His face to shine upon us."

# Board of Managers' Report

#### FOR 1893.

Your Board of Managers in presenting their Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1893, desire to gratefully acknowledge the Lord's goodness whereby we are enabled to lay before the congregation this encouraging statement.

Your Board of Managers have great pleasure in calling your attention to the amount raised for carrying on the ordinary work of the church, as per Treasurer's Statement submitted, viz., \$4,383.50. (The returns per quarter are, first quarter, \$1,086.92; second quarter, \$1,058.51; third quarter, \$1,017.81; fourth quarter, \$1,220.26), an increase upon the whole of \$15.69 over the preceding year.

It is gratifying to note that we have been able to meet all liabilities with a balance in our favor of \$540.72 in the Treasurer's hands. On entering upon the year just closed it was predicted, and generally believed by your Board that, in consequence of the unsettled state of the congregation, in moving to their temporary place of worship during the period that the new church was being built, a falling off in the receipts would be felt, whereas an increase has been the actual result.

You will observe that among the disbursements are several amounts, aggregating \$424.23, that were unavoidably contracted during the year, consisting of architectural work in connection with changes contemplated to be made to the old church, law costs, and rent for Victoria Hall. These amounts, though not current, were paid out of the year's returns, but we are much pleased to state that such demands upon the revenue fortunately are not likely to ever occur again. Another item is that of a three years insurance, amounting to \$155.00, that has been paid out of the returns of 1893, twothirds of which, viz. \$103.00, belong to the two succeeding years. Were it not for these amounts, aggregating \$527.00, the statement would have shown a balance in favor of revenue

While we all rejoice at our prosperity during the years that are past, yet realizing our increased responsibility consequent upon the completion of our new church edifice at a considerable cost, thereby necessarily increasing our expenses in the future, your Board would therefore urge upon the members and adherents of the congregation *who may be careless* the absolute necessity of adhering strictly and promptly to the weekly offering system of contributing to church ordinances by envelopes, and as liberally as their means will afford.

over expenditure of \$1,067.72.

Your Board of Managers gratefully express their appreciation of the liberality of the members and adherents of the congregation who have contributed so largely for the support of the church during the year, to which we are in a great measure indebted for this encouraging report of the church's finances now presented.

We are also especially grateful to the Ladies' Aid Society who have so liberally contributed to the church furnishing account.

Realizing the arduous duties devolving upon the Treasurer, in consequence of continued large additions to contributors by envelopes, and in order to facilitate as much as possible his labors, we request of the congregation punctuality and promptitude in all matters pertaining to his official work.

Three members of the Board have retired by rotation, viz., R. Reid, R. Henderson, and A. McPherson. All are eligible for election.

Your Board respectfully recommend the following :

1st—That the usual grant of \$50.00 be given the Sunday School of the church.

### Report of Sabbath School.

# Report of Missionary Society.

The Missionary Committee, in presenting its annual report, begs to announce that the total amount received for the various Schemes of the Church during the year 1893 was \$617.75. This sum includes a collection of \$38.30 for Dr. McKay, of Formosa, and a special contribution (which we have received for several years past) of \$25.00 for Dr. Robertson's work in the Northwest. The envelope collections during the year were \$579.35, which, although showing a deficiency of \$5.60 as compared with the previous year, may be considered, as so far, satisfactory in view of the comparatively unsettled state of the congregation while it had no church building of its own, and when, consequently, it was difficult to maintain the interest of many in the general work of the church. While the number of contributors has declined from 109 in 1892, to 95 last year, the average contribution has increased somewhat, having been \$5.36 in 1892 and \$6.09 in the year lately closed.

Your Committee thinks, however, that out of a congregation numbering 350 members there should be more than 95 who contribute to the Schemes of the Church. There never was a time when money was more wanted for efficiently carrying on the work, and urgent appeals have been received from the various treasurers for increased contributions to meet engagements already entered into, without speaking of taking up new work, also urgently demanded. Some of those who are holding aloof from the Missionary Society are, of course, doing something in other departments, but many are doing nothing; and we think that now, as we are entering upon a new era in our history as a congregation, it becomes all to take the matter into serious consideration with a view to a in t of t at l of t the give

to ascertain and, if possible, act up to our duties and privileges in this respect, remembering that we are members, not merely of this congregation but of the Canada Presbyterian Church at large, and, as such, responsible for the efficient carrying out of the great work devolving upon her, and remembering also the words of the Master, "Freely ye have received, freely give."

Another year of work in connection with our Auxiliary of the W. F. M. S. has drawn to a close, and reviewing the work of the past year we find much to encourage us in the year about to open. Fidelity to our purpose has shown itself in the work of the past, and with this spirit to guide our future efforts we shall surely be successful.

Twelve meetings have been held during the year, and all have been interesting and instructive. A marked improvement has been shown in the attendance, the average being twenty, nearly double that of the preceding year. Eight new names have been added to our membership. Thirty-two copies of the Missionary Leaflet have been distributed monthly and have apparently been warmly appreciated. We feel that the Leaflet does a great deal to encourage deeper interest in mission work. The offerings at our regular meetings amounted to \$90.45. Disbursements, \$35.00; balance for the year, \$102.18.

# Report of Victoria Mission Band.

Another year has rolled by, and the Victoria Mission Band has made sure though perhaps slow progress in the work it has taken up.

On the membership roll we have over forty names, but we are sorry to say the average attendance is only twenty-two.

During the past year we have held nine regular monthly meetings, a thanksgiving meeting, and one open meeting, or as it might be more properly called, a concert, in which most of the members of the Band took part. The work assigned to our Band this year by the Presbyterial Society was to provide clothing, games, etc., for the McKay Mission in the Northwest. For this cause a garden party was given, and which proved a decided success, for we were able to send a box valued at \$40.00.

Let it here be stated that much of the success of the garden party was due to the kindness of Mrs. Leonard, who so willingly gave us the use of her grounds for that evening.

From a financial point of view the Band has been very successful. During the year we have raised \$109.88; \$18.49 of which was spent for the Northwest box, and after other expenses have been paid we have a balance of \$62.39, most of which we send to the General Fund.

In closing we ask the members to try, if possible, to make an effort to attend more regularly and to bring a friend with them, for the Victoria Mission Band of the First Presbyterian Church is truly working for a good cause.

### Report of

### Christian Endeavor Society.

In reviewing the work of our Society for the past year, we cannot but feel thankful for the success that has attended our efforts, and although the numerical increase has not been quite as great in 1893 as in 1892, yet there have been signs of greater spiritual growth in some of the members, and this should be, and 1s, cause for great gratitude.

In December, 1892, we had a total of 94, of whom 64 were active, 28 associate, and 2 affiliated members. During the past year we have enrolled 13 active and 7 associate members, whilst the names of 22 active and 19 associate have been struck off. Of these, 22 have left the city, 3 associate were transferred to the active, and 2 active members were placed on the affiliated list. We have now a total membership of 75, of whom 50 are active, 19 associate, and 6 affiliated members.

We have held forty-one weekly meetings, besides two special services; one at the Convalescent Home, the other at the Aged Women's Home.

During the vacation months of July and August we held no meetings on account of the absence from the city of many of our members. As a means of promoting the element of sociability among the young people of the congregation we held two socials in the school room, to which we endeavored to invite all the young strangers in our church, and we trust that our efforts were not in vain.

The special work taken in hand by our Society was the cause of Home Missions, and so we undertook to raise the sum of \$500 in three years, this money to go towards the church-building fund in the Northwest. Our success in this scheme has been even greater than we hoped for, and we would convey our thanks to the different members of the congregation who so generously gave us their encouragement in this our first undertaking. We would like to state just here, for the satisfaction of those interested, that we started our missionary collection in April, 1892, and the total amount now in the bank is 463.35, leaving a balance of 36.65, which we hope to clear off as soon as possible, in order to use our efforts to co-operate with those who have assisted us, by doing what we can to pay off the debt now resting upon the church.

We regret very much the loss of our late president, Mr. Faskin, but our regrets are brightened when we think that the field upon which he has entered will only give him greater advantage to work for the Master than he had in the past.

While we are encouraged by the success that has attended all our efforts, and the profit and pleasure derived by each of us from these services, yet we earnestly hope that many others may be won over to connect themselves with this branch of Christ's work.
