worship in God's house upon the Lord's Day ; and we further recommend that a record be kept in the school class-book that would indicate the scholars' attendance at church ; and we further recommend, as a means of bringing the children out to church and impressing them with the thought that they form a part of the Church, that a sermon be preached specially once a quarter to the school at the time of public worship.

We would further recommend that every Sabbath School in this Conference would take such steps as would place a copy of God's Word with each member of the school, and that each member be encouraged to bring his own Bible at every meeting of the Sabbath School and public church services, believing that it will be a step towards wiping out the Sabbath School helps from being used in the school, and bringing before the mind of the scholar the value and importance of the Bible ; and we would also add that the Sabbath School helps should only be used at home in the study of the lesson.

Your Committee recognizes the importance of our catechism being taught in all our schools, and we are sorry to report a decrease this year along this line of work. If every pastor and the officers of the Sabbath Schools would urge the importance and value of learning the catechism upon their return to their several fields of labor, this Committee feels sure that we shall have a very large increase next year to report.

While your Committee is pleased to report such a large number of our own periodicals being used in our schools, still we believe an improvement can be made in our papers whereby they would become more connexional, and thereby bringing before our scholars the vastness of our beloved Methodism, and the important part which it is taking in moulding the future of our fair Dominion and the world at large.

Your Committee believing the time has arrived when better work is required to be done in our schools, and the necessity of giving our scholars a better knowledge of the Bible, and our officers and teachers better methods for teaching and carrying on the work of the Sabbath Schools, we would very heartily recommend, wherever practicable, to start Normal classes, whereby our Sabbath School workers may come together to study the different methods of teaching and Bible drills, as follows : On the Books of the Bible, the Writers, the Lands and Cities of the Bible, etc., and instil into the minds of the scholars the importance of knowing just where to turn to any particular or important promise or verse in the Bible. This Committee is of the opinion if this line of work is adopted, we shall become better acquainted with the Bible, which is to be a guide to us in this world in reforming and bringing the world to Christ.

Your Committee would recommend Prof. Hamill's Normal Book, which may be procured at the Book Room.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1. That we congratulate the Conference on the prosperity of the Epworth Leagues, as exhibited in the statistical table herewith presented :

2. That we recommend superintendents of circuits and missions, as far as possible, to secure the affiliation of all young people's societies with the Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor, with the suggestion that they assume that name.

3. That we strongly recommend that the spiritual division of their work be not displaced or crowded out by the literary element, and that where the latter kind of programme be desired a special night be set apart for the purpose.

4. That we commend to the special watchfulness of the League the youth of both sexes between the ages of 14 and 17, and for this purpose we suggest the formation of junior leagues.

5. That we recommend to the leagues the prosecution of a systematic course of reading in Methodist History and Theology; and for this purpose one night in each quarter be appointed.

6. That we recommend that the leagues report to the Official Board of each quarterly meeting a statement of their work, coupled with an account of all moneys raised and disbursed during the quarter.

7. That we respectfully recommend that the General Conference be memorialized to provide separate reports for Epworth Leagues, as is now done for Sunday Schools, and that columns be placed in Circuit, District and Conference schedules for Epworth League statistics.

8. Your Committee desire to call attention to the fact that at the recent Christian Endeavor Convention the representatives from the Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor were largely in excess of previous years, and that these representatives made no unimportant part of the Convention.

Your Committee cannot close its report without giving expression to its appreciation of the value of the paper issued from our publishing house in Toronto under the name of *Onward*. The elevated tone, the spiritual character of the original articles and the manifest care exhibited in the selections of other literature found in its columns, give the periodical an inestimable value as an educator of the youth of our Church. We would, therefore, earnestly commend it to the members of our leagues, and trust that it may find its way into all of the homes of our people.

In conclusion we desire to exhort all our young people to be true to the traditions of Methodism, and to strive to cultivate a high standard of Christian walk, life and conversation.

SPECIAL EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE.

Your Committee to whom the protest and petition of certain members and adherents of the Crystal City Methodist Church was referred, beg to report as follows :

1. Section 179 of the Discipline authorizes superintendents of circuits to employ evangelists other than ministers of the Methodist Church, and read with the preceding sections, seems to permit the employment of an evangelist other than such as are appointed by the Annual Conference, but not of an evangelist whose teaching is not in harmony with our doctrinal standards, or whose work tends to lessen attachment to our Church, or who is not amenable to the Church.

2. The superintendent of a circuit is not by the Discipline under any obligation to obtain the consent of his Quarterly Board before employing an evangelist who comes within the requirements of the Discipline.

3. One of the trusts upon which trustees of churches hold most of our church property is to permit and suffer only such persons to preach and expound God's Holy Word in the Church, and to perform the usual acts of worship in it as shall, from time to time, be approved, and for that purpose duly appointed thereto, in accordance with the rules and Discipline of the Methodist Church and no other, and no person shall be permitted to preach or expound God's Word who shall maintain or teach any doctrine or practice contrary to what is contained in certain notes on the New Testament, commonly reputed to be the notes of John Wesley, and in the first four volumes of sermons commonly reputed to be written and published by him. (See Secs. 2 and 3 of the Schedule B, Model Deed Act, page 294 of the Discipline.)

4. If paragraph 3 of the protest is a charge, or intended to be a charge, against the minister, your Committee respectfully submit it should be dealt with as provided by Section 229 and following sections of the Discipline.

5. If the persons protesting and petitioning consider that any of the authorized doctrines and teaching of the Church have been impugned, redress can be had by them through the established Church courts.

6. Your Committee recommend that superintendents of circuits should obtain the consent of their respective Quarterly Boards before employing an evangelist on the Circuit.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE UPON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

A year of earnest work and self-sacrificing toil on the part of the ministers and missionaries of our Conference has been, through the blessing of God, instrumental in grand results both in the material and spiritual interests of our Church.

From many charges gratifying returns have been received, showing a net increase in membership of 935, of which 535 are from the Sunday Schools, after deducting 834 for removals and deaths from 1769, the number received.

The terrible financial depression that has prevailed throughout the world has had a disastrous influence upon our great North-West, preventing, in a large measure, the usual flow of emigration from the Old Land, which, together with a partial failure of crops last year and unprecedented low prices of grain, has made this Conference year one of the most stringent in the history of our age. This has affected our Conference Funds, causing a lamentable decrease in several of them as compared with other years.

The amounts contributed for ministerial support have not measured up to the usual standard, and many of our dear brethren have suffered accordingly, the aggregate for salaries being \$157,375.00; for connexional funds, \$22,035.85; for circuit purposes, \$80,163.66, making a total of \$259,604.57.

There has been a good deal of activity in church building and repairing, and several fine parsonages have been erected or purchased during the year, so that a large increase in church property can be recorded.

The enterprise and courage of the promoters of Wesley College deserve special notice, and the earnest and sincere desire is expressed that the members and friends throughout the Conference may become as enthusiastic as the noble brethren who are shouldering this the grandest work in many ways ever undertaken by the indefatigable and aggressive Methodists of the North-West. We pray that it may be carried on to completion to the satisfaction of its most sanguine promoters, and that the top stone may be laid in due time with shoutings of "Grace, grace, unto it," with a complete provision for all outlay, and no accident to any of the builders.

The evangelistic labors of the year have resulted in the conversion of numbers and sanctification of believers. The pastors on many fields have done most effective work themselves in the ingathering of souls, many

reporting fair increases in membership through the use of the ordinary means of grace, faithful preaching, and effective pastoral visitation. It is desirable that on every circuit this year special revival efforts be put forth, so that financial depression may be more than overcome by abundant refreshings of divine grace. We recommend also that great care be taken in the employment of evangelists. In the Territories, advancement has been made and good and substantial work done. The self-sacrifice of many of the young men in persistent labor, amid many and almost overwhelming difficulties deserves special mention.

In the Indian fields the work is steadily progressing, and, though sad fatalities, such as the drowning of Rev. Edward Eves, have to be chronicled, yet the good Lord is leading on the faithful toilers to ultimate and glorious success.

The President of the Conference, Rev. John McDougall, reports prosperity, spiritual and material, among the Indians of the far west. The missionaries are prudently and persistently engaged in educating and evangelizing the natives, and conversions are a frequent occurrence. The Orphanage and Home at Morley is doing a good work and is greatly appreciated.

The work at Fisher River has had a moderate share of success, and all along the line reports come of the salvation of the Indians and their upbuilding in the principles of the Gospel.

"The best of all is, God is with us," is the general declaration of the faithful toilers in our mission fields. For all these evidences of success and victory, your Committee are devoutly thankful, and pray that the year upon which we are entering may prove one of unusual activity and intense zeal and aggressiveness in the work of spreading Scriptural holiness all over our broad and glorious lands.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report that having gone through the District Schedules we are glad to find that in some departments of the work of the Church good progress has been made.

We find an increase of 935 in the membership. With this record we are sure all will be grateful. During the year 142 have gone from us and have entered into the city and now behold the King in His beauty. We regret that a membership of 15,000 take only 859 of our excellent Church paper, the *Christian Guardian*. There should be an earnest effort to increase the circulation of this excellent agency in Christian work.

During the year six churches costing \$19,800 have been dedicated to the service of God. The total amount of church property held by the Conference amounts to \$479,195. The staff of church officials has increased 133, so that we have co-operating with our pastors 2,122 devoted laymen, who are a tower of strength and encouragement to them in their work of faith and labor of love. We regret to find a falling-off of missionary contributions of about \$150, but considering the stringency

of finances generally, it is matter of gratitude that \$9,497 are voluntarily contributed by our people for this the noblest of Christian work. Our educational interests have not been forgotten, \$6,374 having been contributed for this purpose, besides the amount which has been raised for the Building Fund of our Wesley College. The amount of assessable funds has increased \$395, making a total of \$15,898. Some districts report nothing for the Educational Fund, which should be carefully avoided another year. There are in our Conference 114 ordained ministers, seventy-nine of whom are in charge of circuits and missions, fifty-two probationers, and twenty-eight young men engaged with a view of entering the ministerial work. We are sorry to find the salaries paid these workers really inadequate for their wants and requirements in the responsible and Christ-like duties of their various charges. The average salary to ministers in charge of circuits is only \$676, while the salary of probationers under their direction averages the small amount of \$287. There is an increase in all departments of Sunday School work.

We have had much extra work on account of the lack of instructions to the auditors of schedules in the district meetings, and we would suggest that the chairman of each district carefully explain to them the nature of their work, and that he see that both the circuit and district schedules are filled in properly and audited before the district meeting is closed.

We strongly recommend that the Statistical Committee be composed of the secretary of each district and a layman elected at each district meeting, and that such Statistical Committee shall meet two days before Conference, and fill up the Conference Schedules and have them ready to place on the secretary's table the day Conference opens.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That we believe the legalization, in any form, of the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage, is a legislative blunder, and that the total suppression of the traffic is the only true remedy for the losses which it inflicts on the nation.

2. That in view of the prevailing public sentiment in favor of total prohibition, we believe the time has now come for the Dominion and Provincial Legislatures, without regard to party prejudices or policies, to unite all their powers in securing and enforcing this great national reform.

3. That with regard to compensation, we believe that a privilege such as a liquor license, which is sold by the State from year to year, does not carry any promise of perpetuity nor right to compensation when in any year it is withheld.

4. That with regard to interference with personal liberty proposed in a prohibitory law, we believe that the liberty of any man or body of men to inflict upon society the diseases, deaths, crimes, vices, miseries and losses arising from the liquor traffic, should be taken away, and that such a public nuisance as this traffic may be justifiably suppressed.

5. That with regard to revenue, we believe the system of raising a revenue by means of the liquor traffic to be a ruinous method of taxation.

6. That we believe the Churches should pray, "Deliver us from evil," and then actively exercise themselves to nominate and elect men to public offices who can be depended on, by the testimony of their past lives, to help the fulfilment of the prayer by securing, so far as they can, the suppression of the liquor traffic and kindred evils.

7. That we recognize and commend the organization of the Prohibition League, and elect to represent this Conference on its Executive for the ensuing year, the Rev. G. R. Turk, of Grace Church.

8. That, whereas there will be held an important National Prohibition Convention in Montreal, on July 3rd and 4th, in which this Conference is entitled to four delegates, these shall be elected upon nomination of the President of the Conference.

9. That we regard the billeting of members of Conference at licensed hotels as inconsistent with the temperance principles of this Conference, and urge that in future it shall be avoided.

10. That while we gladly recognize the past services of the Manitoba Legislature to the temperance reform, we still believe that it is not receiving the attention which its importance deserves, and respectfully lay before the Government the following suggestions:

(a) That, pending the enactment of a prohibitory law as demanded by the people in the plebiscite, no new licenses should be granted in the Province, and no old ones transferred.

(b) That, pending the enactment of a prohibitory law, which should be passed as soon as the question of jurisdiction is settled, we believe that the Liquor License Act should be revised and simplified so as to be cleared of all needless technicalities and difficulties in the way of enforcing its prohibitions and restrictions.

(c) That from evidence laid before us from south-western Manitoba, it appears to us that the actions of the License Commissioners in that district show such extreme partiality to the liquor traffic and disregard of the rights of the temperance people that, in our opinion, they should be dismissed and new ones appointed who will act with judicial fairness toward all parties.

(d) That we believe in all applications for a liquor license the burden of proof should rest upon the applicant, so that he shall be required to prove under oath that he has fulfilled all the requirements of the law in his application and in the petition of householders.

(e) That we believe the law should render it compulsory for the Boards of License Commissioners to hear each protest against the granting of licenses in the place from which the protest comes.

(f) That we think the License Act should clearly state that the protest of eight of the nearest twenty householders shall prevent the renewal of the license of an applicant during one year from the date of its expiration, and not simply say, as at present, that the license shall be cancelled.

(g) That in the interest of temperance and other moral reform, we recommend that the franchise be extended to women on same terms as to men.

(h) That a widow remaining in the house formerly occupied by her late husband shall have all the powers in regard to the signing of a protest which her late husband would have had were he living.

Your Committee recommend that a copy of this report on temperance as adopted by the Conference shall be transmitted at once by the Secretary of Conference to the Attorney-General, and that our representative on the Prohibition League be instructed to lay it before the League for further action on its suggestions.

12. Your Committee think that the time has now arrived when the Manitoba and North-West Conference should take advanced ground on the signing of applications for the sale of alcoholic liquors, and we therefore recommend that for the future this Conference declares that the signing by a member of our Church of an application for a liquor license shall be regarded as immoral. This we believe to be in harmony with the report of the Temperance Committee of this Conference for the year 1891, wherein it is affirmed that such action on the part of our members is directly opposed to the spirit of the Discipline and the teaching of God's Word.

3. That your Committee recommend the advisability of reducing the indebtedness to the Book Room as rapidly as possible.

4. That we express our appreciation of the economy exercised on the part of the District and Conferential Secretaries during the year in the purchase of stationery and current expenses, and express the hope that such may be continued.

5. That your Committee recommend the reappointment of Rev. A. B. Hames as Treasurer of the Contingent Fund.

6. We recommend that 750 copies of the Conference Minutes be printed, that the former arrangement with Wesley College for the supply of 500 copies be continued; that the price of the Minutes be fixed at 20 cents per copy, the balance of the deficiency on the account of printing the Minutes be paid from the Contingent Fund, and that a copy be sent to each minister from the Book Room, and the price of the same be charged to the minister's account.

REPORT OF CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Your Committee recommend as follows :

1. That the following memorial from the Regina District be referred to the General Conference Church Property Titles Committee, with the request that they deal with the question involved when making their report to the General Conference :

"Whereas, under the provisions of the Territories' Real Property Act, a great deal of inconvenience has been experienced in the transferring of our church property on account of so many of the trustees of the different congregations removing from the different fields ; and

"Whereas, it has been considered advisable to have the property of the Church where there are encumbrances existing held by the Church as a corporate body ;

"Resolved,—That this District Meeting recommend the Manitoba and North-West Conference to memorialize the General Conference to make provision so that our church property may be held by the Church as a corporate body, and that a bond or agreement be prepared by which the trustees may be made personally responsible for any encumbrances upon any church property for which they may be acting as trustees, and thus attain the end aimed at by our Model Deed now in use in the different Provinces of Canada, but which in the North-West Territories is inapplicable."

2. That the consent of Conference be granted to the trustees of the Port Arthur congregation of the Methodist Church, to sell their church

and parsonage property, being lots 14 and 15 South Waverley Street, according to the Crown Survey of Prince Arthur Landing, now in the town of Port Arthur, the proceeds to be applied toward the purchase or erection of church or parsonage property or of both.

3. That the consent of Conference be granted to the trustees of Fort Qu'Appelle congregation of the Methodist Church to sell their church and parsonage property at Fort Qu'Appelle, being lots 25 and 26 in block 5, according to a plan of the town of Fort Qu'Appelle made by Montague Aldons, D.L.S., dated October 10th, 1882, and duly registered, and being a portion of the H. B. Co.'s reserve at Fort Qu'Appelle, and to apply the proceeds toward the purchase or erection of church or parsonage property or both.

4. That the consent of Conference be granted to the trustees of the McGregor congregation of the Methodist Church to sell the parsonage property at McGregor, being lot 18 in block 9 as shown on the plan of McGregor, duly registered at Portage la Prairie, and that the proceeds be applied to the payment of any debt which may be on the said property, or the purchase of other property for church or parsonage purposes.

5. That the consent of Conference be granted to the trustees of the Oak Lake congregation of the Methodist Church to sell the following portion of land, being described as parts of lots 37, 38, 39 and 40 in block 13, in reputed village or township of Oak Lake, in the County of Dennis, in Manitoba, according to a plan of sub-division of part of the north half of Section 23 in Township 9, Range 24 west of the principal meridian of Manitoba, duly registered in the Brandon Land Titles Office as Plan No. 2621, and which may be described by metes and bounds as follows, that is to say: Commencing at the north-west corner of said lot 40, thence along the northern boundary line of said lots 37, 38, 39 and 40, a distance of 100 feet to the north-east corner of said lot 37, thence southerly along the eastern boundary of lot 37 a distance of 20 feet, thence westerly parallel to the northern boundary of said lots 100 feet to the western boundary of lot 40, thence northerly along said boundary 20 feet to the place of beginning; and that the proceeds be applied toward the purchase of lot 36 in said block 13, for church purposes.

6. That in the opinion of this Committee the award of the arbitrators in the matter of the Morden and Miami parsonage property has never been disturbed, and that there is not sufficient material before the committee upon which they can base any further recommendation.

7. That in the matter of the request of the trustees of the Carman parsonage property, action be deferred until such time as sufficient material be furnished upon which to found a recommendation.

4. With reference to the clause in the memorial from the Morden District, on the subject of lay representation on all the courts of the Church, making an exception in the case of examination of ministerial character, we recommend that no action be taken.

5. We recommend that no action be taken upon the memorial regarding the appointment of the choir leader by the Official Board instead of by the minister.

6. Your Committee further recommend that the resolution from the Winnipeg, Crystal City and Morden Districts, to the effect that the rules of our Church be so altered as to make it imperative on our members to refrain from signing applications for liquor licenses, be adopted and forwarded to General Conference for favorable consideration.

7. That the President of the Ladies' Aid, provided she be a member of the Methodist Church, shall, by virtue of her office, be a member of the Quarterly Official Board.

8. That the resolution making it obligatory on all ministers of the Methodist Church to do away with the use of alcoholic wine at the administration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, be adopted and forwarded to General Conference.

9. We recommend that the memorial *re* change in the statutes of Manitoba relating to marriage, be adopted and forwarded to General Conference.

"RESOLUTION.—Whereas, there is a want of agreement between the civil law of Manitoba and the Discipline of the Methodist Church on the question of marriage; and

"Whereas, the law gives the right to any person to solemnize matrimony irrespective of moral character or ecclesiastical connection when he can show that he was at one time ordained a minister; and

"Whereas, location for any cause, expulsion or deposition from our ministry for immoral conduct does not deprive him of his legal power to perform the rite of marriage; therefore

"Resolved,—That we request the Annual Conference to memorialize the General Conference to seek and secure, if possible, such changes in the statutes of Manitoba on this question as shall remedy the evil, protect our people from impostors, and bring the law into harmony with our Constitution, so that none but accredited ministers of the Church shall have legal authority to perform the marriage ceremony."

10. We most heartily recommend that the General Conference be requested to hold its session of 1898 in the city of Winnipeg.

11. We also recommend that any delegate failing to attend the regular sessions of the General Conference shall be entitled to receive only a proportionate amount of his expenses.

12. That provision be made for the election of alternate lay delegates to the Annual Conference.

13. We recommend the approval of the memorial requesting the change in Discipline by which Paragraph 175, Sub-section 6, may have added to it, "to leave also for his successor a circuit book containing a list of all the adherents of the Methodist Church within the bounds of the Circuit or Mission, with their addresses, specifying, if heads of families, the number in such household."

14. We recommend that the memorial of Winnipeg District, *re* basis of ministers' salaries, be considered favorably by the General Conference.

"RESOLUTION.—Whereas, differences have arisen as to method of calculating deficiencies of ministers' salaries; and

"Whereas, it is expedient that there should be uniformity in reports; be it

"Resolved,—That the basis for ministers' salaries be that laid down by Discipline, together with the amount appropriated by the Quarterly Board—fuel, rent, horse keep and incidental expenses, as recommended by Financial District Meeting, and that the deficiency be the difference between amount received from all sources for minister's support and amount required by Discipline as above."

15. We further recommend that the minister's salary be the basis for the Superannuation Fund assessment.

16. We recommend that Clause 5, of Section 153 of Discipline be amended by adding thereto the words, "unless such attendance be dispensed with by permission of the President of the College and the Chairman of the District to which such probationer belongs."

17. We recommend that the General Conference create a Board of Examiners to provide uniform papers for the whole Methodist Church in Canada.

18. We recommend that Kidder's Homiletics be placed on the list of studies for first and second year students.

19. Regarding the memorial advocating the setting apart of a "self-denial week,"

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF
WESLEY COLLEGE.

To the Manitoba and North-West Conference of the Methodist Church:

BRETHREN,—The Board of Directors of Wesley College in presenting their sixth annual report desire to again express their high appreciation of the great liberality towards, and the sincere interest manifested by, the members of this Conference in the work of the College. And as the years pass by, and the number of our graduates and students who are devoting their lives to the Master's work and have entered your ranks, grows ever larger, we confidently expect that this interest will correspondingly increase, and that the work of our College may each year grow larger and more far-reaching in its results for good, not only upon our own cause, but upon the whole country.

In addition to the regular College work during the past year the Board have had under consideration, and have taken active steps toward, the erection of our new College building, and such progress has already been made that we are now in a position to extend to the Conference a most hearty invitation to be present and participate in the laying of the corner-stone on Tuesday next, 26th inst., at 3.30 o'clock.

In our report of last year the hope was expressed that building operations would have been begun before the close of the year. Difficulty, however, in deciding upon suitable plans, occasioned such delay that it was found impossible to enter upon the work until the spring. But we are pleased now to say that the plans finally selected, were adopted by the unanimous voice of the Board, and the building, when completed, will, we believe, be the finest in the country, and an honor and credit to Methodism.

The plans of the building will be in the hands of the Principal at the close of this meeting, that any who wish may have an opportunity of inspecting them. Indeed, we would strongly advise every member of the Conference to examine them carefully, as we believe you will agree with us that we will have a building in every way worthy of our great cause.

The work of building is now being actively carried on, already several feet appearing above the ground, and though it will be impossible to have it ready for occupancy next fall, as we had confidently hoped last year, it will certainly be ready for our classes by the opening of next year's session. Our present accommodation is highly inadequate in every way, and, in the interests of the College and of the Methodist Church, it is highly important that everyone should put his shoulder to the wheel and do his utmost to further this important cause.

The Building Fund, already, through the indefatigable efforts of Principal Sparling and the liberality of our people, amounts to the noble sum of nearly \$90,000. It is desirable that the amount aimed at, viz., \$100,000, should be obtained as soon as possible.

While, however, the possession of a suitable building free from debt is greatly to be desired, we must not neglect the Sustentation Fund, or allow it to be diminished, in our zeal to promote the former project. With the increasing number of students, and the consequent increase of responsi-

REPORT OF THE FACULTY TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF WESLEY COLLEGE.

GENTLEMEN,—Your Faculty, in presenting this its sixth annual report, has much pleasure in being able to announce the termination of another prosperous year in all the departments of College work.

The attendance during the year has been, on the whole, entirely satisfactory, though there has not been the pronounced increase in members that other years have witnessed. This falling-off in the increase has been more noticeable in the preliminary class, and is attributable, doubtless, to the fact that a gradually increasing number of students who contemplate taking a University course, avail themselves of the increased efficiency of the High Schools throughout the Province, in order to obtain the training required for the preliminary examination. We regard this as a favorable sign, for we find that, generally speaking, those students whose preliminary training has been received in the schools are better able to undertake the advanced work of the University. Indeed it were to be desired that more of our primary students would avail themselves of these advantages, since in these schools the students can receive a greater share of the teacher's time and attention than is possible where this is not a special feature of the work done.

While this is the expressed opinion of the Faculty, we feel, however, that our facilities for doing the preliminary work are fully equal to that of any kindred institution in the Province.

The following analysis will show the attendance for the year :

This making a total of sixty-eight students in all, nineteen of whom were appointed by the Manitoba and North-West Conference to attend College.

In addition to the above, two of our graduates have been pursuing their studies in the Divinity Course, while Rev. N. J. Brown, B.A., a graduate of Victoria University, has completed the full course with us, and has already been granted the B.D. degree. Of the above students, forty-eight went up for the University Examinations of May last, of whom but one failed to have his examination sustained, while the partial failures were very few in number, and confined almost entirely to the preliminary year.

This is the depressing side of our report. It is, however, we believe, more than relieved by the success achieved by others of our students. Mr. W. R. Sparling was successful in obtaining a bronze medal in Mathematics; Mr. J. Halpenny, a bronze medal in Mental and Moral Science; while Mr. W. T. Lathwell won the first scholarship of \$100, and was awarded the Governor-General's Bronze Medal, which is given at the end of the previous year in the departments of Latin, Mathematics, and Chemistry, and for which there is the keenest competition, it being the only medal open to all the students of any year from all of the colleges. Mr. Lathwell has the further distinction of having received honorable mention in Greek.

In addition, Mr. Fritz Sparling obtained a scholarship in the same branches of the previous year. In the higher years, Messrs. Loftus, Soady, Hugg, and J. P. Wadge obtained scholarships in the departments of the General Course, the Mathematical Course and the Natural Science Course, respectively, thus again placing Wesley College in the second place with regard to the number of students sent up to the University and to the honors won at the examination.

We are further pleased to report that, notwithstanding the inadequacy of our class-room accommodation, our students have been blessed with general good health, there having been but a very few students who found it necessary to drop their classes owing to sickness. This pleasing state of affairs is due in great part, doubtless, to the hearty interest manifested by the students in out-door sports and exercises.

Your Faculty mention with great pleasure the very valuable acquisition to the teaching staff in the person of Mr. W. F. Osborne, B.A., who has amply sustained the record for scholarship and the ability to instruct which he brought with him from his *Alma Mater*. We are gratified to know that his services have been secured for another year. Our thanks are also again due to the Rev. Mr. Turk for the efficient services rendered by him in the department of Homiletics.

The intercollegiate system of lectures has also been continued this year with benefit to the students of, and with great harmony between, the Colleges concerned, and we wish that the Board of Directors will continue to endorse this system.

A lively interest has been displayed throughout the year by the great majority of the students in the various College Societies. The lack of sufficient accommodation has been a serious drawback to them in their work, yet they are looking forward with cheerful anticipation to the time

In concluding, we would again express our hearty thanks to those who have so generously favored the College and the students with contributions of newspapers, magazines, etc., to the Library and Reading-room, especially mentioning, as we have already on several occasions had pleasure in doing, the name of the Rev. Dr. Young; as well also as that of Mr. Bean, of Regina, who has lately added to the Library about thirty valuable volumes in Mathematics, Natural Science, and General Literature.

REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Even when in the fall the ripening crop is in danger of destruction, or partial destruction, by frost, and when the twenty-four hours is of greatest value,

no binder enters the field, nor is any attempt made to save the crop at the expense of the sanctity of the Sabbath. In our cities the worshipping congregation is not disturbed by the noisy street car traffic, and, as far as your Committee know, no chartered excursions break the hallowed associations of the day.

2. Nevertheless, while your Committee commend the progress already made in securing a proper observance of the Sabbath, and add the exhortation to "walk" still "by the same rule and to mind the same thing," we think there is still need to call for further effort along those lines.

The attention of your Committee has been called to the fact that there is, in certain quarters, considerable Sunday travelling. For instance, among business men whose affairs call them often to the city, it is a common thing to take the Sabbath train to the city in order to save the time on the Monday morning which it would take to travel in on the morning train. These things ought not so to be.

Your Committee would also call attention to the fact that the old evil, Sunday visiting, is not eradicated from our midst, and would earnestly recommend our people to let it be understood that the consecrated home circle and fireside is not to be lowered to such a purpose, but to be made a place of hallowed influence, thought and prayer, and that especially the hour of public worship is not to be misspent in either making visits or entertaining visitors, but in attendance at the house of God.

Their attention has also been called to the fact that worshipping congregations and assembled Sabbath Schools are frequently interrupted by parading bodies, military and otherwise. We would respectfully call attention to those in control to this fact.

Your Committee would also call attention to the fact that the Sabbath is often robbed of its effects as a day of religious service and of spiritual good because of the fact that stores and other places of business are kept open to such a late hour on Saturday night, often approaching midnight before closing, the result being that employees are so exceedingly wearied, both physically and mentally, on the coming Sabbath that much of its influence is lost. We would, therefore, recommend our people to make it a matter of conscience to get their purchasing done early so as to give the opportunity of early closing; and would also recommend our business men to endeavor so to order their business that it should not draw in advance upon the time and energy which should be dedicated to the keeping of the Sabbath.

Your Committee would recommend all to carefully read, and to freely distribute, the tract supplied by the Book Room, entitled "The Original Design of the Sabbath," by Galbraith.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending July 31st, 1893.

The Board is gratified in being able to report that all claims have been paid in full, leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$1,719.47.

The balance due Permanent Fund, as per last Annual Statement (principal and interest), amounting to \$1,851.27 and \$500 on commutation, has also been paid.

The receipts are in excess of the previous year: From Circuits, \$2,092.56; from Ministerial Subscriptions, \$480; from Interest on Investments, \$617.51, and from Book Room, \$500, making a total increase for the year of \$3,689.27.

The capital account has been increased by \$2,373 from Ministerial subscriptions, and \$340 from legacies.

On account of the exceptionally large number of ministers who have been superannuated this year, the claims on the Fund for the next year will be increased by about \$3,000.

Resolved,—That whereas, it is important to conserve the unity and peace of the Church; and whereas, we have reason to believe that certain doctrinal views have been taught, and certain practices indulged in, which have resulted in disunion and strife; this annual Conference recommends that wherever, on any of our circuits, any of our ministers or official members have knowledge of any such preaching or practices, they report the same to the Chairman of the District in which they occur in order that an investigation may be held, and, if necessary, a charge preferred.

Re CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

Moved by Rev. John Maclean, seconded by M. H. Fieldhouse, and

Resolved,—That the Conference instruct superintendents and probationers to pay all their funds, except the Missionary, Superannuation and General Conference, to their respective Financial Secretaries as soon as received, and that Financial Secretaries pay the amounts received from Circuits and Missions to the several Conference Treasurers, in order that a uniform financial system may be adopted and complications avoided in the management of our funds.

DISTRICT HISTORIANS.

Resolved,—That the Theological Union respectfully request the Conference to call the attention of the Chairmen of Districts to the great importance of preserving facts relating to the establishment and development of Methodism within the bounds of the Conference, and to recommend them to record in permanent form in books annually supplied them, under the direction of the Historian of the Theological Union, all matters of historical interest belonging to Manitoba and North-West Methodism.

QUESTION.—What ministers have died during the year ?

Edward Eves, Winnipeg District ; George Hanna, Calgary District.

REV. E. EVES.

Rev. E. Eves, Missionary at Norway House, was engaged to superintend the erection of a new church at Cross Lake, a point about seventy miles north-west of Norway House. It appears that the Hudson Bay Company had run short of stores of bacon and flour, and were compelled to deny Mr. Eves what was needed of these commodities. This threw the mission party upon their own resources. It was a matter of procuring food locally or giving up the work. It was known that the Nelson River had a great many sturgeon at certain points, and as these were always considered excellent food, our brother started, in company with three others, for the fishing grounds, only a few miles away, still towards the north-west.

The morning on which this start was made was an auspicious one. The subject of our sketch was in excellent spirits, and many a joke and pleasant repartee and hearty shout enlivened the journey down the river. At last the Pelican Rapids were reached, and the subject of attempting to run, or shoot, them, was introduced. Andrew Paupanikis, the guide, opposed any attempt in this direction, remarking that, although he had been up and down the route many times, he had never risked his life in such an effort. His Indian companion also agreed that it would be an unwise experiment. Bro. Eves and W. H. Fry, the school teacher at Cross Lake, took a different view of the case. They thought their Indian comrades were fearful, and lacking in courage if not in skill. So they resolved to try the strength of the waters alone, the Indians protesting even after the canoe had started out on its fatal journey. There was apparent indecision as to the point from which the descent should be made. At one moment the canoe was in the centre of the river above the rapids ; at another, the point of vantage chosen was nearer to the shore. Satisfied as to the course, a rush was made, the swift current bearing the frail craft on with the speed of the wind. About half way down, the canoe struck a rock, and both the occupants were thrown into the water.

Then came the struggle for life. The men seemed to be close together for a moment or two. Mr. Fry being an expert swimmer, struck out for the shore, and, aided by a back current, was in a short time out of danger. His companion was not so fortunate, although he, too, was a good swimmer. The main current caught the missionary, and bore him down until an eddy was reached. Here he was whirled around for a time, and it appeared that he was hoping to gain the outside of the circle, but his purpose was not realized. He lost ground, drifted towards the centre of the swirl, and, raising his hand to signal his distress, was drawn down by the suction of the vortex, and was seen no more.

Great grief fell upon the land. The work on the Cross Lake church was ended. The congregation at Norway House was grief-stricken. The church was draped in black, tears of regret fell like rain, and the



village went into deepest mourning. The home circle at Rossville was paralyzed with anguish, and the Methodist Church joined in the general grief over the loss of an earnest worker.

Fortunately, the Chairman of the Winnipeg District, the Rev. John Semmens, and the Superintendent of Missions, the Rev. James Woodsworth, though unfamiliar with the sad facts above related, went to Norway House by the first steamer, and made such temporary arrangements as the circumstances of the case required, placing Dr. Ronald Strath, the school teacher, in charge until further orders.

From the day of the drowning, men were employed from time to time in searching for the body of the lost missionary, but without avail. It was supposed that, if caught in the rocks at the bottom of the river, it might never be seen again, but on the 14th of July, John McDonald, returning from Split Lake, made the discovery which had been so long desired.

Mr. Fry at once started to the point indicated by the Indian named, but found the remains in an advanced stage of decomposition, making removal to any distance impossible. It was ordered by the Chairman of the District that the grave should be made in some noticeable spot adjacent to the line of travel, and with this in view, the body was removed about a quarter of a mile down stream from where it was found, and a last resting-place was provided in "White Mud Portage," than which no more suitable place of burial could be found.

A suitable marble shaft, duly inscribed, was ordered by Mrs. Eves, and shipped to Norway House to be placed in position over the grave, as the tribute of her love to the memory of the dear departed head of her family.

Many thanks are due to Henry McLeod, the Hudson Bay Company's officer in charge of Cross Lake, by whom the cost of interment was generously defrayed.

REV. GEORGE HANNA.

George Hanna was born in the township of Manvers, in the County of Durham, Province of Ontario, on the 28th September, 1862. As a boy his character was one of singular transparency, lacking only that personal consecration which brings the will into close touch with God.

Early in life he developed a love for literary pursuits, and at the age of seventeen years was engaged in teaching school near the village of Millbrook.

During the ministry of the Rev. Newton Hill, at Millbrook, a series of special services was held in the early part of the year 1880, which Bro. Hanna attended. Often convinced of the need of personal consecration he made the surrender at these services. Immediately after conversion the Church laid its hand upon him and sent him forth to preach Christ. As a local preacher he was very acceptable, and soon gave promise of great usefulness. Having attended Victoria University for one year, he was accepted on probation for the ministry at the Toronto Con-

ference of 1883, and stationed on Plumb Creek and Souris River Mission, under the superintendency of the Rev. J. M. Harrison.

Physically Bro. Hanna was never robust, but with commendable zeal he entered upon the work of one of the harvest fields within the bounds of the Manitoba and North-West Conference. At the close of his first year's pastorate he received a unanimous invitation from his Quarterly Official Board to remain a second year, and the Conference which met in the new city of Brandon made the desired appointment. At the close of that year's work the mission covered an extent of territory thirty-six miles from north to south and forty from east to west, comprising fifteen appointments. The third year of his ministry was spent on the Griswold and Alexander Mission, from whence he went to Cobourg and spent the two closing years of his probation at the Victoria University. On the close of his collegiate work, Bro. Hanna supplied at Carberry until the meeting of Conference at Portage la Prairie in 1888, when he was ordained under the presidency of Rev. Thomas Argue.

Immediately on the rise of Conference he was married to Sophia Dalmage, of Milton, Ont., and went to Gladstone, where he remained for two years greatly endearing himself to the people, but owing to ill-health was obliged to resign his charge and locate for one year. Resuming work he supplied Wolseley, Assiniboia, for a few months, and was then stationed at Medicine Hat for two years. Realizing the need of a man of some experience and deep devotion there, he was stationed by the Brandon Conference of 1893 at the town of Edmonton. After nearly one year of faithful service he contracted rheumatic affection, and in a few short days death claimed him as its victim. No thought of serious consequences was entertained either by friend or physician until unconsciousness had seized upon him, and hence no words of dying testimony were spoken, but our brother has left behind him the better testimony of a life of unselfish devotion and spotless character. He was ever an energetic and tireless worker for Christ. His work was characterized by thoroughness, exactness and method. As a preacher he was clear, earnest, intensely spiritual, and very considerably above the average. His last sermon was deeply impressive, being apparently prophetic of his early death, so much so that when news of his fatal illness was circulated, his congregation felt that a vision of the near eternity had been granted the speaker, and with almost supernatural power he had intensely thrilled them. On reaching the parsonage after that last discourse he said, "I have had a blessed day."

Our brother fell asleep, May 22nd, 1894. The secret to the devotion and success of Geo. Hanna's life may be gathered from this one extract taken from a letter written to his brother just before leaving for Manitoba. Among other things, he says: "I see there is no use in being fretted or fearing about temporal things, as there is nothing in life worth living for but glorifying God and doing the good we can. During the past few days I have been thinking—oh, so much—about my going out to preach. I shudder when I think of it. Just fancy, that two months more and in all probability I shall be hundreds of miles away, proclaiming the unsearchable riches of Christ. Oh, the responsibility! I feel as if I would fall down under the weight. No man need tell me it is an

easy matter to go to a strange place, among strange people, to fight the battle of life. No man can do it in this calling except God be with him. Yet, amidst it all, I feel that I must go—must go—compelled to go. 'Woe is me if I preach not the Gospel.' Yet, thank God, through the seeming difficulties I feel a yearning desire to be off. 'If God be with us, he is more than all that can be against us.'"

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Geo. Dean, Chairman of Calgary District, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Stevenson, of Medicine Hat, and D. G. McQueen (Presbyterian), Stunden (Anglican), Mellick and McDonald (Baptist), and C. E. Somerset (Methodist). Mr. McQueen preached a short sermon from 16th chapter of the Gospel by St. John, 33rd verse. One of the most touching scenes was the procession of bright little boys and girls—members of the Children's Guild, a society formed by the deceased only a few months before—following the remains of the one whom they had learned to love to its last resting-place. On the following Sabbath evening, the Rev. Mr. Dean, of Calgary, preached a memorial sermon from the text, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are called according to his purpose." Bro. Hanna leaves behind to mourn his loss a wife and one beautiful little girl.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST CONFERENCE.

The membership of the Church has increased by 935. The year has been one of great financial stringency, and our hearts have been greatly saddened by the very meagre support which has been given to many of our brethren on the weaker fields throughout the Conference. We believe in the loyalty of the membership of our Church, and trust that the general adoption of systematic giving on the part of our people will result in increased financial strength and more liberal support of the ministry.

Notwithstanding the straitness of the money market, we rejoice to be able to report that the funds for the sustenance of the great enterprises of the Church have been liberally sustained.

We again commend to your sympathy and support the interests of Wesley College, which, we are glad to recognize, has obtained an honorable place among the institutions of learning in the Province and Territories. Youngest among the quartette of colleges, we hope and confidently expect, with increased facilities, that "Wesley" will soon take the foremost place among the educational centres of the Province.

It has given us unmixed gratification to mark the rapid growth of the young people's societies, as indicated in the report of the Epworth League Committee and that of the recent Convention of Y. P. S. C. E., which showed that the Methodist Church had the largest number of young people's societies in the Province.

Let the past successes but impress the youth of Methodism with the responsibility which is laid upon them of greater activity in supplying that missing link which existed formerly between the Sabbath School and the membership of the Church.

We would urge the organization of Junior Epworth Leagues wherever possible.

We can only indicate in a few words the living questions of the day with which, both individually and collectively, we must presently deal.

The Christianity of our time and country seems to be moved by the spirit of God to seek such common grounds of belief and practice as will afford a foundation upon which the sections, hitherto separate from one another, may be unified. We counsel you to consider this great matter with much prayer, that we and all Christian people may know what the mind of the Lord is. These times are marked by unrest in the political life of the nation, and by much foreboding of changes soon to come.

In the contest which will shortly be upon us in connection with the Dominion election, permit us to impress upon you the solemn obligation of using your ballots only for men of tried, moral worth, who will ever uphold that which is pure.

We desire nothing of you, nor for you, but that you shall act in the body politic in the utmost freedom from ecclesiastical control; and that you shall remember that the franchise affords a practical test of your loyalty to God, who is supreme over all the parties and princes of the earth, and has a will to be served or frustrated in every issue which is now or ever shall be before the Canadian people.

These are days of great variety and enterprise in both religious and anti-religious thought and teaching. We do not affirm that our Methodism has attained perfection in Christianity. God has ever been present with us in soul-saving power, and we counsel you to be in no haste to seriously change, much less to remove, any of the doctrinal, spiritual, or institutional landmarks of a system which has been so greatly and continuously honored by the Lord.

During the year we have been led to mourn the loss of two of our most energetic and self-denying fellow-laborers in the ministerial ranks. These having served their generation, fell on sleep. Let us hope that we who are in the ranks militant may catch, not alone their descending mantles, but also the heavenly inspiration which transfigured them into the image of God. And now, beloved in the Lord, we commend you to God and to the word of His grace. Continue steadfast and unmovable in faith and love, and abound always in every good work in the Lord.

And may the Lord Jesus Christ, whose you are and whom you serve, save you to the uttermost and to the end.
