GERMANS IN SOUTHWEST AFRICA ALL SURRENDER TO GEN. BOTHA

End of Kaiser's Rule in That Territory of 322,450 Square Miles Has Come—Outwitted, Outgeneralled the Enemy in Tireless and Masterly Operations

Pretoria, South Africa, July 9—General Botha, commander of the forces of the Union of South Africa, has accepted the surrender of all German military forces in German Southwest Africa.

END OF GERMAN SOUTHWEST AFRICA

London, July 9—Under the heading, "The end of German Southwest Africa," Reuter's Capetown correspondent cables: "As a result of General Botha's tireless and swift advance and masterly enveloping movement in the face of enormous natural difficulties, he completely outgeneralled, outmanoeuvred and outwitted the Germans, and the capture or surrender of the remainder of the enemy in the field is only a matter of short time."

"As a result of the operations, all the British prisoners in the hands of the Germans have been released, 700 prisoners have already been taken, and any attempt at scattered guerrilla warfare has been frustrated."

After suppressing the rebellion against British authority in the Union of South Africa, General Botha took command of British operations against German Southwest Africa, and headed an invasion of that territory late in February. His operations were reported to be uniformly successful.

The forces under his command captured "Olymbings" on May 4. Two days later he had occupied the important railway junction of Karibib and other stations on a march of thirty-five miles over a waterless waste during which the troops suffered severely from heat, thirst and hunger.

The road to Windhoek, capital of the German territory was opened by the occupation of Keetmanshoop. Windhoek was taken May 18, without opposition on the part of the German forces. Martial law was proclaimed throughout the conquered territory.

Reports from London recently have stated that the surrender of all the German forces was expected soon. British military experts have contended that General Botha had conducted a masterly campaign.

German Southwest Africa is located on the west coast of Africa, extending from the Orange River to the Cape Colony, extending eastward to the British sphere. The area is 322,450 square miles. The population in 1913 was 14,816 of whom 12,292 were Germans. The military force including police is given in the last report as 2,992.

MINNEHAHA IS AT HALIFAX; FIRE BEATEN

Halifax, N. S., July 9—The Atlantic Transport Lines' Minnehaha, which caught fire on Wednesday while on a trip from New York to London with 15,000 tons of war munitions on board, following an explosion believed to have been caused by an infernal machine sent aboard by Frank Holt, who shot J. Pierpont Morgan, crept into Halifax harbor through a mist this afternoon. Early advice from Captain Clark indicated that the work of extinguishing the flames had proceeded satisfactorily, and that all danger seemed past. So far as could be learned the munitions had not been affected.

FATALITY IN HALIFAX

Halifax, N. S., July 9—While hauling out a piece of timber from a pile at the south terminal yesterday afternoon David Urean, a laborer, aged forty-three years, married, of Roumania, received injuries and died an hour after his removal to the hospital.

Will Release Troops For War Service In France

Surrender in German Southwest Africa Ends One of the Most Important Campaigns

London, July 9—The surrender of the entire German force in German Southwest Africa, closes one of the most important campaigns of the great war, and releases for service elsewhere the South African contingent.

The campaign against the most important German African colony was considered so vital that all the resources of the South African Union were used in it, but its successful conclusion probably means that, despite the fact that German East Africa remains unconquered, a contingent will be despatched to France, while additional forces will continue the campaign in East Africa. It is believed German Southwest Africa will become a part of the South African Union.

Grand Duke Has The Enemy In Bad Place Strategically Similar to Operations of Last August—Austrian Archduke's Blunder Costs Him 15,000 Men

London, July 9—The German position on the eastern front now exactly suits the Russian strategists, according to the Pout's Petrograd correspondent. "Grand Duke Nicholas," he says, "has got the enemy into the same position strategically, as last August, but with this difference, then the enemy held all the advantages of the smiting land, rich villages and great estates throughout this line of march, while today the enemy is in a desert ravaged by twelve months of warfare, with the roads cut up beyond all semblance of highways, while the villages and estates are mere piles of ashes. The task of feeding and munitioning three millions of men, 200 miles from their bases, must appear even to the German organization, yet the enemy must continue to advance for a pause or backward step spells ruin. Altogether matters look most promising for the Russians."

Storm Raises River And Helps Driving Crops, However, Suffer Because of Excess of Rain—The Antimony Mines

Fredericton, N. B., July 9—The heaviest wind and rain storm in months set in here last night and continued till morning. Several trees were blown down, and the lowlands in the back part of the city were inundated.

King Risks Life On Firing Line

Rome, July 9—King Victor Emmanuel, who is on the firing line with his troops, is risking his life every day, like an ordinary soldier. The Tribune says that while directing artillery fire against Austrian positions the king asked an artillery officer: "Do you suppose you can get at that hut over there from which comes the fire against the contingent directly below us. It seems to me impossible."

MATTER OF MUNITIONS BETTER IN ENGLAND

London, July 9—Albert Thomas, the French secretary of war, who has been visiting David Lloyd George, minister of munitions, testified in a statement to the press his belief that England is now so organized that it will be able to furnish an unlimited supply of munitions in any of the allied camps.

Fred Wade, Big Game Hunter, Chosen as Sniper For 15th Battalion—Arthur Tweedie of Chatham Appointed Lieutenant

In the 28th Battery, which left Fredericton this week for Valcartier are the following St. John men: Gunners E. E. Andrews, R. S. Goldsmith, C. S. LeBrock, C. T. Gardner and H. F. Meadows.

Three recruits were enlisted by Major W. H. Gray in Fredericton yesterday for the 48th. They are J. Billings of Hainesville, Gilbert Foster of Fredericton, and Iwanston Paul, an Indian, of French Village.

Fred Wade, of Fredericton, now with the 48th Toronto Highlanders in the trenches in Flanders, has been appointed sniper of the 15th battalion. The position requires skill and courage, as the sharpshooter's duties call for him to crawl out ahead of the line alone and pick off as many Germans as possible.

In a letter to his mother, Mrs. John Wade, of Fredericton, he tells of his appointment and says that he feels particularly honored. At home Wade was a big game hunter and guide and an excellent shot.

Mrs. Percy A. Gaultie has received a letter from her husband, Lt. Col. Gaultie, who says that he is making progress, but suffering a great deal of pain from his wounded leg.

The furniture and equipment of the sergeants' mess at Infantry Station No. 3, Fredericton, has been sold to the headquarters mess of the Royal Canadian Regiment at Halifax for about \$1,000.

REACHING CRITICAL POINT

Washington is pessimistic today—Austro-Hungarian Government Apologizes to American Ambassador Penfield For Abuse Newspaper Article

REACHING CRITICAL POINT

Washington, July 9—Information from Berlin that the German reply to the last American note would be handed to Ambassador Penfield today or tomorrow, together with the knowledge that the ambassador was to make no comment on the advance of his delivery, brought the controversy between the United States and Germany to a critical point today.

REACHING CRITICAL POINT

The fact that the German reply was not modified from the form in which it was submitted to the American ambassador a few days ago, was responsible for the feeling of pessimism because it is known that the proposals originally sent are not satisfactory to officials here. There is a disposition, however, to await the arrival of the text of the note itself.

REACHING CRITICAL POINT

Apology by Austria. Vienna, via London, July 9—Formal apology has been made by the Austro-Hungarian government to United States Ambassador Penfield because of an abusive article printed in the "Neue Wiener Tagblatt," attacking President Wilson and the American people in connection with the second note protesting against German submarine warfare.

REACHING CRITICAL POINT

As a rigid censorship is exercised over Austrian papers, Ambassador Penfield informally asked the foreign office if the article represented the opinion of the Austrian government. The result was an apology and a sharp reprimand for the official censor.

Lieut. Kelly of St. John Wins Great Praise For a Fine Piece of Work

One of Officers In Surprise On Germans

TOOK GUNS INTO THE FRONT LINE OF TRENCHES

Enemy Only 70 Yards away and Forty Rounds Were Poured Into Them—Kelly Wounded But Not Seriously—Letter From Capt. Inches Tells of Gallant Feat

The following is an extract of a letter from Capt. Cyrus F. Inches to Lieut. Colonel B. R. Armstrong: "I feel constrained to let you know that Kelly must have a whole page in your history sheet. I heard a few days ago that the field artillery had performed a feat of arms by taking several of their guns into the front line trenches and opening up upon the enemy, who were distant but seventy yards away. The surprise of the thing caused much damage and consternation in the opposing ranks. Today Frank and I took a holiday and rode back several miles to General Wainwright's headquarters, where we met Captain Wright. He told us that Kelly was one of the officers who had the honor to be sent forward with the guns and that he had been wounded in two places. The divisional staff considered that he had acted with much credit. The Chaplain, Rev. Canon Almon was loud in his praise.

"Later in the day in a nearby town we met some of the field artillery, the two Hansons, Captain Bell, Captain Creaser and others, whom we have not seen for some weeks. They all thought Kelly had done a fine piece of work. The veterinary officer of the 1st Brigade, a great admirer of Kelly, told me of the particulars of the feat. He got off forty rounds and he was just hit in the arm, then a big Krupp came along and his gun was smashed all to pieces, and as a finishing touch, a mine exploded and the debris crushed his legs. I am glad to say that he is not seriously injured.

"With a brother officer, Craig, he is at one of the base hospitals, both are trying to stick it out, so that they will not be sent back to England, so keen are they to get back to their batteries.

Friends of Lieut. L. S. C. Kelly, formerly manager for the Royal Trust Co. here, will be interested in his exploit—one of the notable ones of the war in which other St. John men probably also participated. He was reported wounded a few weeks ago while with the artillery in action in France.

GERMANS BLOCKED AGAIN IN HEAVY FIGHTING IN WESTERN THEATRE OF WAR

Paris, July 9—The French War Office reports: "From the sea to the river Aisne there was reported last night only one artillery engagement, in the vicinity of Soissons. This was quite spirited. There was also a continued bombardment between Arras and a violent cannonade between the river Oise and the river Champagne district there was an encounter with mines, and in the Argonne there were rifle and cannon exchanges, but no important infantry engagements.

Recapture Trenches. "Between the Meuse and the Moselle, the night brought considerable activity. Between Epy-En-Haye and the forest of LePetre, French troops, by the use of hand grenades, were successful in retaking about 150 yards of the trenches lost by us on July 4.

At Croix-Des-Carmes the enemy delivered an attack last evening along a front of 350 yards. This action followed a bombardment by aeroplanes, which threw down torpedoes and the hurling of burning liquids. After having been successful in gaining a footing in our first line of defence, the Germans were driven out of these positions by an immediate counter-attack. They were able to maintain themselves only in some few of our most advanced trenches.

"In the Vosges, in the region of Ban-Sauve, at Fontelle, we gained a notable success. After having driven the enemy from that portion of our old position which they captured from us on June 22, we took possession of all the defensive positions of the Germans reaching the hill to the southeast of Fontelle as far as the road running from Launers to Moyon-Moutier.

"This total gain represents an advance of 700 yards along a front of 600 yards. We took nineteen officers, including one battalion commander, two doctors and 767 men, none of whom were wounded.

London, July 9—The Danish schooner Ellen, of Liverpool with plank, has been set adrift in the North Sea by a submarine. The crew has been landed.

General Losses Arm. Paris, July 9—General R. J. E. Gouraud commander in the Dardanelles, who was wounded recently, had his arm amputated on the voyage to France. He is suffering from fractures of the right thigh and the left leg, but is reported as "doing well."

London, July 9—A Times despatch from its Mytilene correspondent states that there is some confirmation for the report that General Liman Von Saundern was wounded by Turkish soldiers. Evros has assumed command of the troops defending Gallipoli.

Steamship Is Sunk. London, July 9—The Wilson line steamship Guido, from Hull for Archangel, was sunk off the coast of Scotland yesterday by a German submarine. The crew was saved.

Steamers Detained. London, July 6—(Delayed by censor) The steamer Muskegoe, from New Orleans to Gothenburg, has been detained and sent to Kirkwall for examination. The tank steamers Pioneer and Polaris have been released.

OTTAWA CALL FOR BUY PIECE OF LAND NEAR LAKE ROBERTSON

An offer of a piece of land opposite Lake Robertson for sale to the city was reported by Commissioner Wignome at a meeting of the general committee of the common council today. The land does not touch the lake but is near enough that its drainage might become a problem in later years. The mayor suggested that the city's land holdings in that district might be sufficient some day for a site for a prison farm but the suggestion was not received with any great heartiness.

Commissioner Potts says that out of a jailful of prisoners he could hardly get a gang of fifteen able-bodied men, apart from those remained who can not be worked.

There were objections to the purchase of the property in question on account of the price asked and the matter was allowed to lie over for the next meeting of the common council.

RECEIPT OF THE HOLT LETTER IS ADMITTED

Dallas, Tex., July 9—Admission that Mrs. Frank Holt received a letter from her husband intimating he had planned to blow up one or more trans-Atlantic liners, with timed bombs, was made by Mrs. Holt's attorney here, J. E. Cockrell. Mrs. Holt previously had denied receiving the letter.

"The proper authorities were notified immediately," explained Mr. Cockrell, "and for that reason nothing was made public about that feature of the letter."

GREAT BRITISH POWDER MILLS ARE BLOWN UP

London, July 9—Certain big powder mills at Hounslow, Middlesex, were virtually destroyed today by a series of explosions. A hundred men were at work. No statement of the casualties is available.

PARIS DAY JULY 14

Paris, July 9—"Paris owes her safety to the national army and shall not stint her gratitude." This was the keynote of posters distributed last night announcing that on July 14, Paris Day would be celebrated.

Sisters, daughters, and fiancés of those fighting at the front, are to take collections on that day to provide food and clothing for the soldiers and prisoners, luxuries for hospital trains, help for the mutilated and to obtain necessities for the men who are fighting as well as for those who have been driven from their homes by the invader.

COALITION GOVERNMENT IN BRITISH COLUMBIA WHILE THE WAR LASTS?

Vancouver, B.C., July 9—It is not improbable that a coalition government will be formed in British Columbia for the duration of the war. Though no definite steps have been taken, it is said that not a few prominent liberals would be willing to accept positions in the cabinet, though the rank and file are reported strongly opposed to the proposal.

MORE MEN AND YET MORE MEN

Kitchener Says So In Address In London

Situation in This Respect Immensely Better than 10 Months Ago But Military Position as Serious as Then

London, July 9.—Great crowds assembled in and around the Guild Hall this afternoon to hear Field Marshal Earl Kitchener address a meeting to inaugurate a special recruiting campaign. His subject was "On the need of further recruiting for the army." The enthusiasm of the meeting and the crowds which appeared were attributed to the public's spontaneous desire to demonstrate its confidence in the field-marshal in face of attacks upon him in a certain section of the press.

MR. WILSON APPOINTED

The official announcement of the appointment of Hon. John E. Wilson, M. P., as deputy receiver general and manager of the St. John branch of the Dominion Savings Bank was made in Ottawa last evening. Mr. Wilson has not been notified formally of the appointment and will not enter upon his new duties until the appointment arrives. Anderson, of New York, will be a big figure among the celebrities here leading forces against John Barleycorn. The well known attorney is here to report his "million dollar fight" on rum and Tanmany, and set new plans. He comes fresh from his run in with William Barnes, who sued him on the same line as the papers were filed against Theodore Roosevelt upon substantially the same grounds. The suit awaits trial.

ARE STIRRING UP TROUBLE AT HOME

Political Sensation is Being Made in London, Over Haldane

London, July 9.—The official announcement by David Lloyd George July 7, regarding Viscount Haldane and the question of the supply of war munitions, has started a political sensation and it is being made the most of by the Northcliffe press to prevent what is declared to be an intrigue to get Lord Haldane back into the cabinet. Premier Asquith's remarkable tribute to Viscount Haldane was regarded as paving the way for some attempt of this kind, and a small body of politicians is trying to force a parliamentary discussion. Sir Henry Dalziel, Liberal member for Kirkcaldy has given notice that he will ask Premier Asquith on Monday, whether Lord Haldane's disclosures of the proceedings of a confidential committee of the cabinet, made with the premier's authority, the premier will be asked to grant one day for a full discussion of the causes responsible for the deficiency of munitions.

FRENCH TRAWLER SINKS GERMAN SUBMARINE

Boulogne, France, July 9.—A German submarine was sunk the other day by the French trawler steam trawler Notre Dame de Lourdes, six miles west of Boulogne. The trawler was armed with a three-centimetre gun and a forward deck. Three shots were fired at the submarine, which sank slowly, leaving on the surface large oil stains and causing bubbles to rise. An anchor buoy was left at the spot and an attempt was made to raise the German craft, as it sank in shallow water.

RESPIRATORS FURNISHED TO FACTORY EMPLOYEES—BUCKETS OF WATER AND SAND AT HAND AND BATH-TUBS FILLED

London, June 22.—(Correspondence)—"Zeppelin drill" has now taken its place alongside the familiar fire drill in some London factories and business places. In a few cases respirators have been provided by employers and weekly or fortnightly respirator parades accompany Zeppelin drills. For households, advertisers are furnishing neat placards with directions for use in case of air raid. One such card bears the following brief instructions: "Don't go into the street. 'Close all windows and doors on lower floors. 'Keep buckets of water and sand upstairs. 'Have respirators handy in bedrooms. A housewife writes to a newspaper to describe the steps she has taken to protect her household. 'Every night the bath tub upstairs is left half full of water and sand. In every bedroom there is a bowl of water ready for moistening the respirators, and all my family have been advised to keep their respirators under the pillow so as to be within easy reach.' A school mistress writes advising parents to accustom their small children to the use of the respirators. RESPIRATORS FURNISHED TO FACTORY EMPLOYEES—BUCKETS OF WATER AND SAND AT HAND AND BATH-TUBS FILLED

London, June 22.—(Correspondence)—"Zeppelin drill" has now taken its place alongside the familiar fire drill in some London factories and business places. In a few cases respirators have been provided by employers and weekly or fortnightly respirator parades accompany Zeppelin drills. For households, advertisers are furnishing neat placards with directions for use in case of air raid. One such card bears the following brief instructions: "Don't go into the street. 'Close all windows and doors on lower floors. 'Keep buckets of water and sand upstairs. 'Have respirators handy in bedrooms. A housewife writes to a newspaper to describe the steps she has taken to protect her household. 'Every night the bath tub upstairs is left half full of water and sand. In every bedroom there is a bowl of water ready for moistening the respirators, and all my family have been advised to keep their respirators under the pillow so as to be within easy reach.' A school mistress writes advising parents to accustom their small children to the use of the respirators. NEW LAWS FOR SOCIAL UPLIFT

Thirteen Passed by Maine Legislature Last Winter, Now Effective, Arouse Hope

"Thirteen new laws bearing directly upon social welfare became effective on last Saturday in Maine, which will place the state well up the line in the march of social progress. This statewide interest in community welfare is the more remarkable since Maine is essentially a state of rural districts with a total population of less than 800,000, and no large manufacturing centers. The laws are small foreign population," says Miss Marion Porter, secretary of the Maine State Conference of Charities and Corrections.

"The workmen's compensation act, the establishment of a reformatory for delinquent women, provisions for better protection of children and the 54-hour law for women and minors under 18, the last named subject to the referendum, are considered the most important of the new laws. Other laws of the tuberculosis group, various improvements in existing state institutions in the reformatories, and a law which will place the state on a par with the best of the nation in the matter of child labor, are also of great importance."

"The workmen's compensation act provides for compensation over 300 weeks in case of death and over 500 weeks in case of permanent disability. The administrative features were taken from the bill presented by the Maine Federation of Labor and other parts from similar acts of other states.

"The centralization under state care of delinquents and those physically and mentally incapacitated, is a broad step that is being undertaken. The insane have long been so cared for, as have the blind and deaf. The state school for the feeble minded and state school for girls, the encouragement of industrial education, the prevention of fraudulent solicitation in the name of charity, and the repeal of the law allowing overseers of the poor to bind out publicly dependent children.





THE WAR NEWS.

The Russians have "come back." At one important point they have not only checked the Austrians but forced them to retreat. Today's reports say that the Russians have brought up heavy reinforcements of both men and guns, and this is very welcome news.

The Standard is still in great mental distress over the National Transcontinental Railway. This is not surprising in all discussion of the matter, however, it refrains from any reference to the fact that though the Borden government has been in power nearly four years it has failed to give St. John the promised G. T. P. connection; and that at the very least another two years must pass before such connection, by the St. John Valley Railway, could be secured.

The London Daily Mail, emphasizing the need of more big guns and machine guns and munitions, says:—"The Prussians won the war of 1866 against the Austrians with their needle gun, which was to the muzzle-loading Austrian rifle of that day much what the machine gun is to the modern British rifle. They won the war of 1870 against the French by their breech-loading cannon, which was to the French muzzle-loading cannon of that time much what the machine gun is to the present British rifle. They hoped to win the present war by their new ideas—by their machine guns in multitude, their high explosive shells, their monster howitzers, their concrete trenches, their barbed-wire entanglements, their gas apparatus. We must take extra care that they do not."

The Germans have not yet launched the threatened attack in great force in the west, and have actually lost some ground there in the last two days. In the Dardanelles the outlook for the Allies appears to have improved. The loss of a cruiser by Italy is counterbalanced by some success on land, and the Italians have declared the Adriatic closed to commerce. This will cut off one source of Austrian and German supplies.

The explosion on the steamer Minnehaha will reduce the vigilance of shipping companies whose vessels sail from Canadian as well as United States ports. Apparently there is nothing the Germans and German sympathizers will not resort to in carrying out their policy of "rightfulness," which was inaugurated in Belgium and has been conducted ever since with an utter disregard for the rights of neutrals or the dictates of humanity. Each new proof of barbarity adds another to the reasons which make it imperative in the interest of all other nations that Germany be utterly crushed and Prussian militarism made incapable of ever again plunging the world into war.

SEVEN PLEAD GUILTY TO ELECTION FRAUDS

Part of Group Arraigned in Indianapolis — Taggart, Mayor and Others Seek Change of Venue

Indianapolis, July 9.—Seven of the 132 men who are facing charges of election frauds in the registration, primary and election of 1914, pleaded guilty when arraigned in Criminal Court here.

Indictments charging conspiracy to corrupt the ballot at the primary registration and election in 1914, were returned against 128 men by the grand jury, on June 22. Four additional names were added to the list on July 3. The indictments followed an investigation which began early last January. Nearly 2,000 witnesses were examined.

TROOPS FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Capetown, July, 9.—It is officially announced that the imperial government has "gratefully accepted" the offer of the government of the union of South Africa to provide a contingent of troops to be raised in the union, and some batteries of artillery.





\$5,000,000 FOR DRY PRESIDENT

Anti-Saloon League Headless of Party Allegiance

MUST BE FOR PROHIBITION

Say That Republican Floor Leader Mann Worked Against Temperance, So Will Work Against Him

Atlantic City, July 9.—The Anti-Saloon League of America in annual national convention here has not yet decided for what presidential candidate it will spend the \$5,000,000 now fund to be raised, but it will not be for Congressman James R. Mann, of Chicago the republican floor leader of the House of Representatives. Hundreds of delegates who say they represent one half of the voting population of the United States, were pledged to work against the president.

Aspirations of the republican whip, who, they say, did everything in his power to block the measure to submit prohibition to a national vote, which passed the house in the last Congress in a single committee. The campaign against Mann was inaugurated when there was read the following circular letter seeking to boom him for the republican nomination for president in 1916. Will you serve on that committee?—Very truly yours, E. W. Sims. Mr. Sims is former United States District Attorney for the Chicago District.

It does not make any difference to the Anti-Saloon forces whether they back a Democrat or a Republican so long as it is for prohibition or the submission of the prohibition constitutional amendment to a popular vote. Because of the mistakes which bedclouds the selection of the Republicans, there are now two names in consideration. One of course, is William Jennings Bryan. The league would like to have prohibition the main plank in the platform of the democratic party next year. The members expect Mr. Bryan to make Woman Suffrage and prohibition his two issues for national favor, and they are naturally leaning toward the former secretary of state.

There are those who form a strong wing of the league who do not think so highly of the Nebraska's running chances, and believe that in view of the house's action on the prohibition measure last year and of other recent developments, President Wilson should be their choice. Delegates are much encouraged by the recent Wilson note to Texas in the prohibition fight there. Delegates believe he will make the submission of the prohibition question one of the planks of his platform.

At a luncheon there was a movement started for the collection of a war fund of \$5,000,000, to be used in the next presidential election to favor the interests of the candidate who will pledge to work for the league's purpose. Twenty-five millionaires, including some of the country's biggest employers of labor were present. Among them were Filmore Condit, of New York; E. S. Collins of Oil City, Pa.; George D. Shelby, of Boston; Jonathan K. Taylor and William F. Cochran, of Baltimore.

Calling Congressman Mann the "Dr. Jeckyl and Mr. Hyde of the United States Congress," General Superintendent H. J. Baker, of Westerville, Ohio, in his annual report said: "The author of the law against white slave traffic is an unaccountable transformation."

GERMANY DIPPING INTO INDEMNITY  
Sovereigns Paid by France in 1872. Reach England—German Treasury Notes at High Rate  
(Montreal Gazette.) London, July 6—The manager of a prominent British bank informed the Gazette today that recently Germany had been seeking to discount German treasury notes abroad, with extremely unsatisfactory results. In one instance notes were discounted by a New York firm at the ruinous figure of 86 per cent. The statement is so surprising that I transmit it under reserve for investigation.

The same authority declared that he was able fully to confirm the reports recently current here, and denied in the Gazette today that recently Germany had dipped into the Spandau war gold reserve, exhibiting in proof of his statement English sovereigns minted in 1872, which bore no trace of usage. It is well known that part of the indemnity paid by France after the war of 1870-71 was in English gold.

The banker says that these sovereigns came from one bag of 500 which reached London via a Scandinavian country, and on which cables showing that the bag formed part of the gold payment made by France after the Franco-Prussian war were still intact.

One label is now in possession of Mr. Lloyd George, and the other in the hands of a high official of the Bank of England.

My informant was unable to say whether more than one bag of these indemnity sovereigns had reached London, but he said it seemed reasonable to suppose that a serious hoard was being made in the Spandau war chest, and in any case the indication of growing scarcity of gold in Germany was significant.

ONE OF EVERY FOUR DOCTORS IN SERBIA DIED IN NINE MONTHS  
Belgrade, Serbia, June 10—(Correspondence)—Official figures show that 25 per cent. of the Serbian doctors have died in the last nine months. Most of them were victims of typhus; only one was killed in battle.

Of 14 foreign doctors who have come to Serbia since last August, 85 have died all of typhus or typhoid. The list of dead includes four Americans, three British, two Belgians, six Austrians and several Greeks. These figures, of course, do not include the considerable number of medical students, nurses and other Red Cross workers who have succumbed to the epidemic.



## RUSSIA PREPARING FOR NEW CAMPAIGN

Traveler Tells of Work on Munitions and Drilling of Troops -- Japs as Instructors


New York, July 8. -- Dr. R. B. Ward of New Haven, Conn., here from Copenhagen, after spending a year in Russia, said that the Russians were making extensive preparations in arms and munitions for an early offensive against the Germans in Galicia. The Volzhska and Archangel Railroads, with newly constructed lines reaching from Volzhska toward the battle line, has been taken over in its entirety by the government for the transportation of munitions of war. Only two passenger trains a week were being run when he left Petrograd, he said, and all freight traffic had been suspended.

Since Archangel opened to navigation, Dr. Ward asserted, ammunition-laden ships from England and Canada have been arriving almost daily. Thousands of soldiers at Archangel are busy day and night transferring munitions to trains, and all railroad equipment that can be handled is being operated over the road, the southbound trains being loaded to capacity.

"I left Petrograd about the middle of June," said Dr. Ward. "Despite the Russian reverses there was no indication of discouragement. Thousands of new troops are already in training and in readiness to be rushed to the front as soon as the danger of another shortage of munitions is past. They are simply awaiting ammunition and equipment."

Within ten miles of Petrograd over 600,000 troops are encamped ready for the word to go into action, and I was reliably informed, as many more are in readiness in a dozen other places.

"While Russia is not receiving much help from Japan in the form of munitions or men, I know of my own knowledge that hundreds of trained Japanese officers are engaged in drilling Russian troops in the use of heavy artillery."



In the following May Courtney rowed Hanlan and Riley at Washington but Courtney was taken ill before he had gone 500 yards. The "Old Man" is a carpenter by trade.

**CITY POPULATION ABOUT SAME**

The St. John city directory for 1915, published by The E. McMillan Company, gives an estimated population of 58,650 for the city. This is based on the number of names appearing in the directory, which is 12,550, multiplied by three according to the usual average. Last year the directory contained 19,844 names, the largest number in the history of the city, giving an estimated population of 59,532. In spite of the fact that so many citizens have left to go to war and that the reduction of employment on public works has lessened the floating population, the total population for 1915 is thus only 222 less than in 1914.

## Fisherman Drowned; Boat With Three Others Missing

### Tragedy in Bay Off Chance Harbor—Wm. Neil of Strait Shore Loses His Life—Companion Saved Exhausted

The heavy easterly gale which arose suddenly early this morning has claimed at least one life as its toll. William Neil, aged about thirty-one years, resident of the Strait Shore, was drowned this morning off Chance Harbor. Another boat, owned by Wallace Belding, with George Tyner and Rodney Seward of Chance Harbor, on board, did not return this morning and fears for the safety of these men are entertained also.

With the fishing season at its height great numbers of men were out along the coast last night waiting for the morning tide and when the gale, which blew at forty-one miles an hour for a time, came up, they were taken by surprise. The worst of the storm came about daylight at the time when most of the boats were putting out their nets. Neil was working with them. The grove of Chance Harbor, for the fishing season was on a recent and with him. As they were putting out the nets this morning the gale with heavy seas struck them and overturned the boat. Neil was swept to his death and was not seen again.

Hargrave managed to catch the capsized craft and clung to it for several hours until rescued by other fishermen. When taken on board he was exhausted and seemed to be in a serious condition.
