#### MARINE NEWS.

Steamer Tregate is expected here tomorrow to take a cargo of potatoes to Havana.

The thirty-ton packet boat E. M. Haines, Captain Haines, has entered the bay-carrying trade. She made her first trip into port Wednesday, doing the sixty miles from Freeport, N. S., in eight hours, under the power of her auxiliary gasoline engine.

The new Donaldson liner Saturnia, which has been built for the Montreal trade, arrived in port yesterday, after what Captain Fraser described as a splendid passage. Her officers are delighted with her, and it is said there is some cause for their enthusiasm. Built much on the lines of the Cassandra, the Saturnia is somewhat larger, having two feet more beam and a tonnage of nearly 500 tons more than the older boat. While she has been designed to carry only two classes of passengers, saloon and steerage, there is little left to be desired in the way in which she is fitted up. Her cabins are large and airy, the dining saloon, while not so ornate as some of the vessels which come to the port on board of, is still comfortably furnished and quite large enough to accommodate all her passengers without crowding. There is a charming music room on the upper deck, which appears to have been the chosen resort of many during the first voyage of the ship, and for the convenience of the male travellers, a luxurious smoking room, in fact, perhaps the most comfortable of the public rooms on the ship, has been provided. For those of moderate means, who cannot afford to travel by one of the crack liners, such a boat as the Saturnia should prove a boon, and the fact that on this trip she brought out over five hundred passengers shows that there is plenty of room for such vessels.

Fredericton, N. B., June 24.—(Special)—The Supreme Court this morning delivered judgment in several cases, including divorce suits of Curry vs. Curry. In this case Judge McKewen refused to grant Mrs. Curry a divorce on the ground that there had not been sufficient evidence of cruelty on the part of her husband to justify a decree.
This morning his honor said that he had carefully reviewed his judgment, but saw no reason to change the conclusion arrived at. He was supported by Justices Landis and Barry.

**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**RHUBARB WINE.**  
It must be made when the rhubarb is quite ripe. Into 1 gallon of boiling rain water cut 8 pounds of rhubarb in thin slices, put into a tub and cover closely with a thick cloth or blanket. Stir twice daily for a week, then strain through a cloth and add 4 pounds of preserving loaf sugar, the juice of 2 lemons and rind of 1. To refine it take an ounce of singeing and dissolve it in a pint of the liquor in a china lined saucepan. When quite cold add it to the rest of the wine and cask it. When the fermentation is over bung it down.

**COTTAGE PUDDING WITH STRAWBERRY SAUCE.**  
Two eggs, one cup sugar, one cup sweet milk, scant 1/2 cup melted butter, two cups flour sifted with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon soda, one teaspoon cream of tartar, 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract. Serve hot with strawberry or chocolate sauce.  
**Strawberry sauce**—Mash strawberries with powdered sugar and let stand one hour or more till there is considerable juice. Pour over pudding when served.  
**Hot chocolate sauce**—One-half cup grated chocolate, one cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, one cup hot water. Cook till thick as heavy cream. Pour over cake when served.  
Thimbleberries or raspberries mashed with sugar make a nice sauce also.

**The Evening Chit-Chat**

By RUTH CAMERON

**T**HERE is one weakness that it seems to me if I were training a child, I should try to help him to grow up without—and that is the weakness of inaccurate statement.  
The famous Dr. Johnson is reported to have said: "If the child says he looked out of this window when he looked out of that—whip him."  
I certainly should not advise any such strenuous measures as that, but I do think it is a good thing to make a decided effort to teach a child the habit of accurate and exact statement.  
Teach him not to be specific unless he can be accurate; not to say "I walked four miles," or "I came home at five o'clock," unless it was exactly four miles or five o'clock.  
Teach him if he is only speaking broadly to say "about," or "somewhere near," or any word or expression that denotes approximately.  
And, above all things, try to keep him from acquiring that painfully prevalent, sloped habit of exaggeration.  
The famous boy who told his father he had seen "about a hundred cats scrapping down in our cellar," and then admitted, after a few searching questions, that after all, he was only sure of "our cat and another one," has altogether too many prototypes not only in boy life, but also among grown-ups.  
How many people's statements you take with a grain of salt!  
"She told me she cleaned every closet and every drawer and cupboard in the house, and changed the paper on all the shelves, and washed all the china yesterday, but I don't believe her."  
"He says he is getting just twice as much money as he was last year at this time, but I guess if you take ten dollars off of that you will get nearer the truth."  
I hate exaggeration.  
It is as useless as it is unbecoming. If you have the habit of exaggeration people will soon find you out, and then in self-defense will acquire a compensatory habit of deducting from your statements. Often they will deduct more than they ought. So everyone loses.  
"It is vinegar to the eyes," says Emerson, "to deal with men of loose and imperfect perceptions."  
That means exaggeration and inaccuracy, among other things.  
Train your children to accuracy of thought and observation and statement, and you will have given them an equipment that will prove most valuable in all the relations of life.

**TRADE WITH OUR NEW SISTER**

(Hardware and Metal, Toronto).  
Each once in a while the British colonies in North America forty-three years ago, it is not too much to hope that between these two "Dominions beyond the Seas," a trade and commerce of important and lasting proportions may develop.  
There is no sound reason why such should not be. They are buyers of that which we are sellers of and vice versa. Lack of enterprise is the only thing that can prevent it.  
The nucleus of a great trade has already been laid and particularly that pertaining to our exports to South Africa, we selling last year \$1,679,738 worth of merchandise and in return buying from them \$801,190 worth.  
Our chief article of export to South Africa is wheat flour, of which we send approximately a million dollars' worth. Agricultural implements, iron, steel and metals came in for \$15,787; paper \$125,646; wood and manufactures of \$115,586; automobiles and other vehicles, \$32,659; fruits \$22,683; cotton and manufactures of \$9,802; leather and manufactures of \$4,567; condensed milk, \$12,715; provisions, \$54,924.  
Sugar makes up the largest part of our imports from South Africa, the quantity received last year being 31,817,292 lbs., valued at \$829,292, which, by the way was the first sugar we imported from that part of the British Empire since 1906. Without sugar our imports are small indeed. In 1907 and 1908, during which we imported no sugar from South Africa, the total amount of our imports was \$28,222 and \$32,193 respectively.  
Next to sugar our chief article of import from South Africa is wool, of which we bring in a little over \$20,000 worth. Hides and skins and breadstuffs come next at \$8,080 and \$7,169 respectively.  
Three years ago Canada subsidized to the amount of \$160,000 annually a line of steamers between Canada and South Africa. The service is monthly and sails from St. John and Halifax in the winter and from Montreal in the summer. So far the subsidy cannot be said to have any appreciable effect on the total volume of trade between the two countries.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the district, on certain conditions, by fatherly mother, son, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn (homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

**HERE FROM DEMERARA FOR TRADE**

Representative of Large Firm of Wholesalers in Town

MORE OF OUR PRODUCTS

Mr. Webb Will Seek to Arrange to Handle Larger Quantity—Trade is Growing and There is a Good Market

Among the passengers arriving on the steamer Ocano this morning was Harris S. D. Webb, of Georgetown, Demerara, who is on a visit to Canada to look into the trade possibilities of the Dominion. Mr. Webb is a son of Samuel Webb, secretary of the firm of Weiting & Richter, who carry on a big wholesale business, and import large quantities of goods from Canada and the United States. He will go from Halifax to Montreal and thence to Toronto.

In talking to a Times-Star reporter, he said he wanted to see how flour was milled, fish cured and various other goods that his firm handles, are prepared for the summer. He will also try to arrange for handling a more extensive line of Canadian products.

Trade between Canada and Demerara, he says, has improved greatly in the last few years, and there is a good market in the latter for Canadian flour, cured fish, lumber, etc.

His firm recently built a large cold storage building in Georgetown and they hope to work up a trade in butter, eggs and meats. The building was erected only about a year ago, and thus far the trade in this direction has not been very great, but it is thought that with proper cold storage facilities on the steamer considerable business in this line of goods can be worked up.

The exports from Demerara consist mainly of sugar, rum and molasses. The former is shipped largely to Montreal direct, though it was only a few years ago that the bulk of the business was handled via New York. The rum and molasses are shipped to the United Kingdom. The British commission inquiring into trade relations between the West Indies and Canada, is in Demerara recently and gathered information that is expected to result in improving the trade between the two countries.

Mr. Webb has never been in Canada before and he said he was surprised to find that St. John was such a large city. He had supposed it was quite a small place. It was refreshing, he said, to get into the cooler weather. In Demerara the thermometer seldom went below 80, and it reaches 130 degrees in midsummer. He will leave this evening for Halifax.
