








ACROSS CONTINENT BY NIGHT New York, June 13—A gigantic beacon light, said to be cap-able of projecting a white beam for more than twenty-five miles, has been sent to Cheyenne, Wyo., where it will form the western terminal of a chain of five such lights stretching from Chicago, placed to guide transcontinental and postal airmen during night flights. The light, which was made at a Brooklyn factory, has a lens thirty-six inches in diameter. At intervals between the larger lights, smaller lights will be placed.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY ORDERED BY ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

BY IIALIAN GOVERNMENT Rome, June 13.—The Italian Govern-ment has decreed that the working day for all industrial and commercial houses shall not exceed eight hours. In hospi-tals, institutions of learning or char-ity or bureaus of public works, if they have workers who are under the super-vision of some one and who receive sal-aries or any kind of remuneration, these workers shall not work more that eight hours a day, or forty-eight hours a week.
