Durbar II, American-Owned Horse, Wins Derby; Betting Was Twenty To One Against Him

Duryea Captures The Classic Race Of British Turf—Two Other Outsiders Second and Third

(Canadian Press) Downa, Eng., May 27.—Durbar II, belonging to H. S. Duryea, the only American entry, won the derby here today; Sir E. Cassel's Hapsburg was second, and Peter the Hermit was third. Durbar II won by three lengths. A second and a half separated the second and the third horses.

The derby stakes was established in 1760, but races had taken place on the same course as early as 1640. The stake is valued at \$82,500, and is for colts and fillies of three years old. The course is about one mile and a half in length. For this year's race there were originally 375 entries. The great favorite, the Te-trach, was scratched a few weeks ago.

Durbar II, whose recent form in France had been considered so poor that he was regarded here as such a rank outsider, was laid odds of 25 to 1 and was freely laid against him in the clubs last night. Today he had no trouble in disposing of a field of thirty horses, the largest that has turned out for race since 1868, and he won by a center by three lengths from two other outsiders, Hapsburg and Peter the Hermit. The betting just before the start of the race was 20 to 1 against Durbar II, 88 to 1 against Peter the Hermit, and 100 to 1 against Hapsburg.

Kennmore, which led the betting, behaved so badly at the post that he delayed the start and when the field was finally sent away he was left in a bad position. Polycares made all the running to the half distance with Black Je-

Ban Russel finished fourth. The time of the race was two minutes, thirty-eight seconds, a fraction of a second quicker than the average.

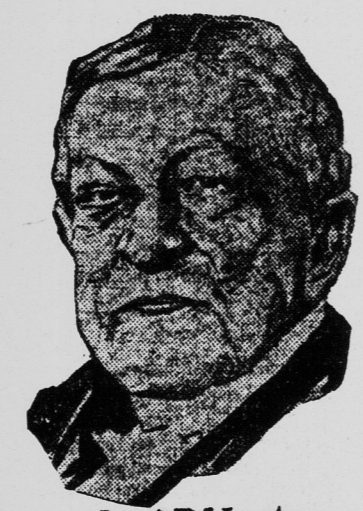
**Hints for the Cook**

**Rhubarb Pie.**  
One cup of chopped and peeled rhubarb, one egg, one cup of sugar, one rolled cracker, butter the size of a walnut. Bake between crusts.

**Strawberry Souffle.**  
Put a layer of berries in a dish, sprinkle with sugar, another layer of berries, then sugar. Set away for one hour, then pour over them a cold boiled custard. Pile whipped cream over top, set on ice till very cold.

**English Strawberry Shortcake.**  
One quart of flour, one teaspoon of soda, two teaspoons of cream of tartar (or three teaspoons of baking powder), one pint of cream. Mix flour, salt and baking powder together thoroughly by sifting four times. Pour cream into the middle of the flour and mix with knife to a light dough. Roll out quickly about one quarter inch thick and fit to Washington pie plates. Bake as quickly as cream of tartar biscuits. While cake is baking get the berries ready. Wash and mash one pint of berries with sugar enough to sweeten, according to taste. Split cake, butter slightly, put fruit on under side and sift a little sugar on top. Put on top and cover with whipped cream and berries.

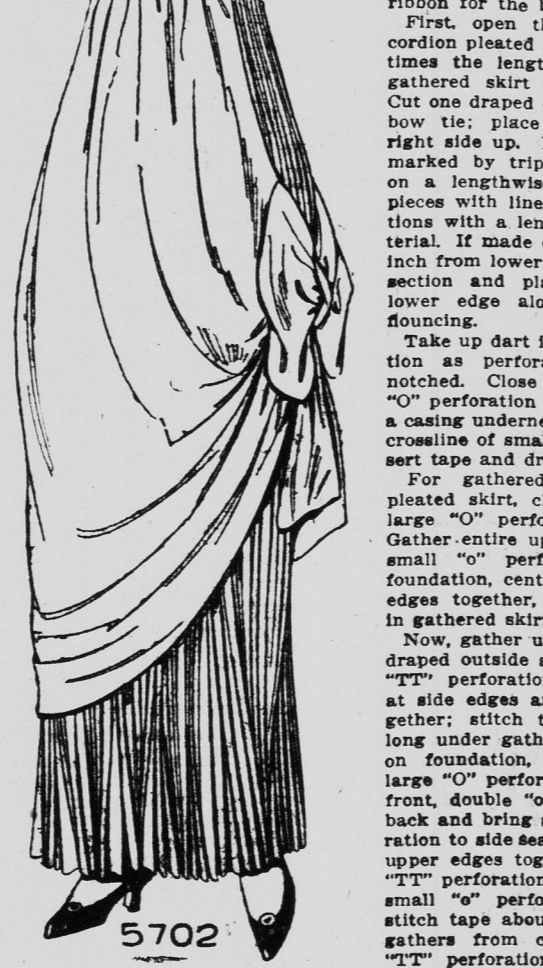

**KITCHEN KINKS**

To properly bake sponge or pound cake have oven hot enough to turn white paper light yellow in five minutes.

Cup or small cakes—Have oven hot enough to turn white paper dark yellow in five minutes.

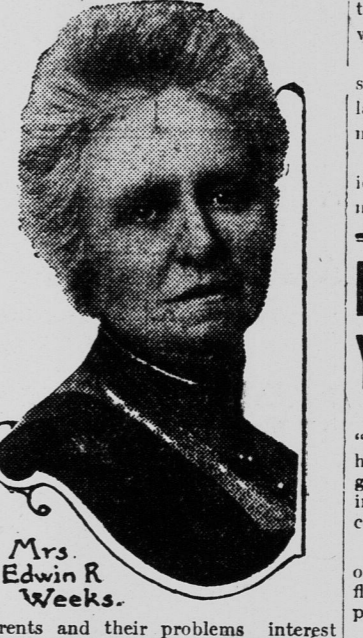
Bread or Pastry—Heat of oven must turn white paper dark brown in five minutes.

Fat sauceron of boiling water in oven when baking rolls. Steam will make crust smooth and tender.

When oven is too hot at first, a crust will form on the cake and prevents its rising. It is best to have the oven a little slower at first, then increase the heat after ten minutes.

Baking powder biscuits should be baked in a very quick oven, as hot as possible without burning the biscuits. One that will brown a piece of white paper in one minute is none too hot.

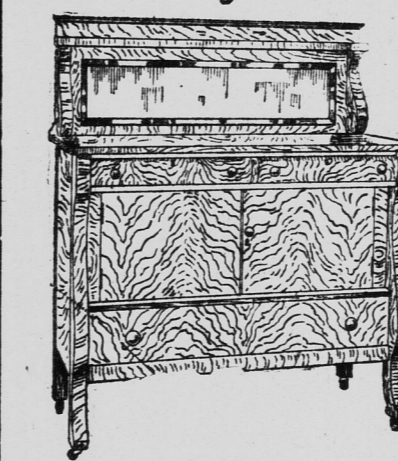

**PLEAD GUILTY TO SMUGGLING**

Former Deputy Collector of Boston and His Wife Remanded For Sentence

Boston, May 27.—Terrence L. Sherin and his wife, Annie W. Sherin, appeared in the Federal Court and pleaded guilty to the charge of smuggling upon which they were arrested more than a year ago. Their cases were continued for a week for sentence.

Sherin was at one time deputy collector of customs in Boston, and received a salary of \$2200 a year. He had a shock of paralysis and became a clerk, virtually a pensioner in the customs house at a much reduced salary.

On March 27, 1913, he was arrested and was charged with conspiracy, together with his wife and Miss Katherine Brennan, president of the Misses C. Donovan & Co., New York, a milliners firm. The government alleged that on March 17 Miss Brennan landed from the Cunard steamship Carpathia at East Boston and failed to declare a trunk containing twenty dresses and marked M. Z. Ellison. This was left on the pier, an expressman calling for it later on.

The steamship people refused to deliver the trunk and it was found that the sticker tag on the trunk, bearing the customs inspector's "passed" mark was not of the sort then in use.

The arrests grew out of the incident. The government declared at the time that the customs inspector's mark was forged.

The district attorney's office has known for several days that the Sherins would plead guilty. In fact, the hearing was originally set for last Friday, and District Attorney French appeared to take their pleas on that day.

The penalty for conspiracy to smuggle is not more than two years' imprisonment, or not more than \$10,000 fine or both.

**BALFOUR SEES WORK A FAILURE**

Life Long Effort to Prevent Home Rule—Tells of His Hopes

London, May 27.—The speech of Hon. Arthur Balfour in the recent debate in the House of Commons on home rule, wherein the former leader of the Unionist party admitted the failure of his long life efforts toward maintenance of the union, was one of the most eloquent in the recent history of parliament. It had its parallel more than 100 years ago when Grattan, in his maiden speech in the imperial House of Commons on May 12, 1813, referred to the Irish Parliament, whose legislative independence had been achieved by his exertions, and whose destruction he deplored.

"Of that assembly," Grattan declared, "I have a parental recollection; I sat by her cradle, I followed her bier."

Mr. Balfour is much in the same position. He is one of the last to admit that home rule, in some form or another, is now inevitable. He has steadily fought against a Dublin parliament, hoping that time would bring about a reconciliation between the people of the two islands, and old quarrels would be forgotten. He is still bitterly opposed to home rule, and yet is willing to make great sacrifices to avoid civil war. After a severe attack on what the Unionist term "The Plot Against Ulster," and particularly against Winston Churchill, the First Lord of the Admiralty, to whom he referred as an "agent provocateur," Mr. Balfour said:

"There was a time, not so very long ago, as my life is measured, when I cherished the dream that if law was restored in the southern province of Ireland, if every grievance was removed, if every inequality was smoothed away, if every encouragement was given to the legitimate industry, if every equality and more than equality were given to our Irish fellow-subjects, ancient memories would gradually soften, men would look forward as well as backward, and there would grow up what there ought to be between the two islands—a common hope, a common loyalty, confidence in a common heritage—and that all this might be accomplished under one parliament."

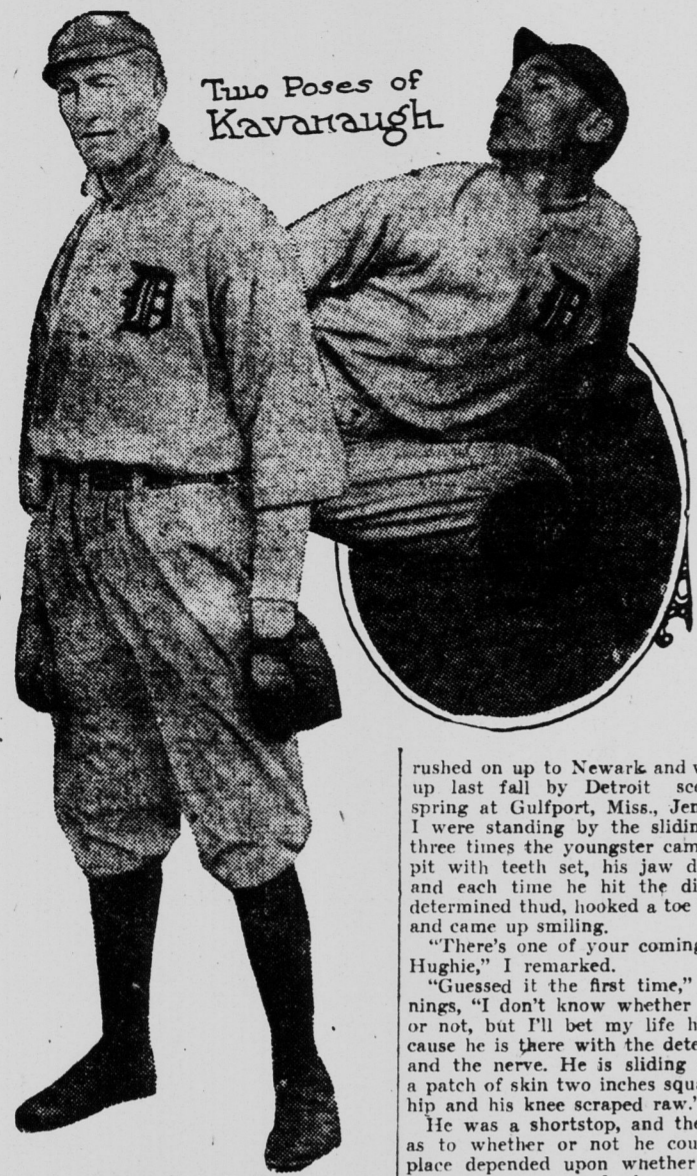
