THE COTTON MILLS

St. John people are very much interested in the fate of the cotton mills in this city, for they are associated with a fine exhibition of public spirit in days gone by. The cotton mills were long an important local industry. At one time they led behind in the race of competition, and were closed. The operatives were scattered, and boys amused themselves by throwing stones through the windows of the factories. After the machinery had been idle several years, a public spirited merchant set out to restore the industry. He enlisted the sympathy of others, and in the end enough capital was raised to reopen the mills. The operatives came back again, and have been steadily employed ever since. Not only was this so, but the plant has been very greatly improved. Some of the machinery was antiquated when the new start was made, but under Superintendent Cudlip's management a great change has been made, and today the mills are splendidly equipped.

It is now stated that these mills are passing to new owners. If that means any lessening of activity it would be very bad for the city, but there seems no ground for the slightest fear. As Mr. Cudlip points out, the plant is very valuable, and the climate of St. John peculiarly suited for textile manufacturing. There ought, therefore, to be an enlargement rather than a reduction of activity in these mills. Whatever befall, they stand associated with a fine display of public spirit in times less prosperous, when citizens with money to invest put it into the local industry, at a critical time in its history, and restored it to activity as one of the most important industries of the city.

THE ELECTIONS

It is evident that the federal election in Canada will take place at an early date. A minority cannot rule in Canada, even if for a certain length of time it may be able to obstruct the public business. The Conservative party made the mistake of making reciprocity a party question, and they continue to blunder along in the hope that they might find a way out. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will appeal to the people and there can be no doubt as to the result. The American congress has adopted the reciprocity agreement, and that which Canada has sought for forty years is within her grasp.

An attempt will be made by the opposition to make political capital against the government on the ground that it is not in sympathy with the imperial idea, and that Sir Wilfrid Laurier does not fairly represent the loyal sentiments of the Canadian people. This, too, will fail.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier went to the Imperial Conference fully expecting, no doubt, that he would be misrepresented and perhaps misunderstood, but the records of the Conference show that in all matters affecting the interests of the Empire his views agreed with those of the other overseas premiers, and with those of the members of the British government. To say that he is a traitor to the Empire is to apply the same epithet to all the other statesmen who took part in that memorable Conference.

There can be little doubt that before parliament is dissolved Sir Wilfrid Laurier will take occasion to make his position clear, and refute charges made against him by Conservatives in Canada and Unionists in England. It pleases the Tories of this country and the old country to make common cause. It also pleases the Tories of this country to make common cause against reciprocity with the trusts and combines of the United States, who it is said will give valuable assistance in financing the Conservative campaign. Despite the forces arrayed against him, Sir Wilfrid Laurier never appealed to the people of Canada with more confidence or with greater reason to believe that he would be returned to power by a very large majority.

The obstruction in parliament was continued yesterday, and the Conservatives came off rather badly in what little debate the Liberals permitted themselves to engage in. Next week may see the dissolution of parliament.

THE PRISON FARM

What can be done with a man who after several months in jail for drunkenness comes out and is offered help if he will remain sober; but who proceeds at once to get drunk on his first day out and rejoins the brotherhood who gravitate between the saloons, the benches on the squares, and the jail?

St. John people ought to face this question and deal with it. Coun. Donovan's proposal to have a prison farm should be given prompt and full consideration by the committee having it in charge. If such a farm were established, and the police were given authority to deal with such cases as that just cited, the streets would be kept reasonably clear of the derelicts, some of whom would perhaps get back their manhood. If not, they would at least be usefully employed and the city would be the better for their enforced absence from its streets and squares.

Coun. Donovan should stir up the committee, if they are not attending to their task, and endeavor to get a comprehensive report before the municipal council.

LIBERALS WILL WIN

Hon. John Morley declares that with reciprocity as the issue the Liberals will sweep the country, and in New Brunswick he would not concede more than one constituency to the Conservatives. So far as Northumberland is concerned Mr. Morley says it will go strongly Liberal.

Mr. Morley has opportunities to learn the feelings of the province. He is in touch with all parts of it, and in his intercourse with the people of the different counties has become convinced that reciprocity will command their support. His statement of his convictions on the subject will be welcomed by Liberals throughout the province. It is obvious that the campaign will soon be in full career, and we will be told by the Conservative press that their candidates will sweep the boards. It is well to have at the outset the calmly measured opinion of a member of the provincial government who has been looking carefully over the whole situation.

It is worth noting that the Ottawa Free Press has an interview with an observant citizen who reviews the situation east and west and makes this forecast: "I would say that Laurier will come back with about the same majority as he has in the present house."

THE HAY TRADE

The removal of the American duty of 44 per cent on hay, which would be done under reciprocity, would be a great boon to Canadian shippers. New Brunswick is much interested in this matter as is the province of Quebec. The Montreal Witness has the following interesting article on the subject: "Local dealers in hay are now looking forward with confidence to a good prosperous season's business. There appears to be ample justification for their optimistic expectations, as the Quebec crop is a fairly large one, and there is a considerable shortage in England and Northern Europe—also a very serious deficiency in the United States. The position in the latter country is singular. Record prices for hay there are enforcing economies in all directions, but nowhere to a greater extent than in the stock-raising districts of the west. The west sends about 12,000,000 head of cattle every year, and the quantity of hay they use depends much on the supply. This year the crop will be 20 per cent short."

Official statistics lately published in England show that one-half of the paupers are women, one-quarter are children and one-quarter are men, while of the criminals four-fifths are men and only one-fifth women. The Conservative and Unionist Women's France Review says: "In spite of there being twice as much poverty among women, there seems to be a great deal more honesty."

MORNING LOCALS

The wharf was built of white pine and it is said cannot be replaced for less than \$20,000. It is said that the collapse was caused by the washing out effect of the high tides which last night reached a maximum of 27 feet. The shock drove the schooner some distance out. A crew of men nearby secured the wreckage with hawsers. It is not expected that St. John will lose the York and Cornwall Cotton Mills because of the transfer which took place yesterday of the controlling interests to factions closely allied with the Dominion Colored Cotton Mills, Montreal. On the contrary, it is possible that further expansion and development may be looked for. J. B. Cudlip, manager of the company, said that the transfer of stock which had taken place would not affect the existence of the company. Some of the members of the company had disposed of their interests, he said, but he did not know whether or not it would be enough to shift the control to outside parties. Schooner Wilfrid M., which arrived last evening from Barbados with a cargo of molasses, slid out of her berth at Walker's wharf last night, doing considerable damage. The tide was low at the time and as the vessel slid off the mud bed she parted her hawsers and her rigging fouled the low spirit of the schooner Neva at the end of the wharf, and ripped it badly. The schooner drifted into the harbor, but was taken back.

DISSOLUTION NOT LIKELY BEFORE WEDNESDAY

No Inconvenience to Civil Service If Parliament is Dissolved Next Week — Tory Exhibition Still Continues

Ottawa, July 28.—There was little change today in the condition of the dying parliament. The obstructionists made further progress in the process of talking it to death, but the indications still are that Sir Wilfrid will not give the word for final dissolution before Wednesday or Thursday next.
Members are packing their grips for home and a considerable number on both sides have already left, though the numerical balance between the two parties is still preserved by the whips in anticipation of several more votes on opposition amendments next week.
It is understood that there is no hitch with regard to dissolution next week on the score, as alleged in opposition papers, that his excellency will first demand that parliament put through an interim supply bill to carry on the administration until the new parliament meets.
Although the interim supply bill passed last May only enables the government to take two months in full, it is understood that there will be no inconvenience to any public service during the interval between dissolution and the assembling of the new parliament.
Practically all salary votes for the civil service have been voted in full and five-twelfths vote on public works estimates is sufficient to make necessary arrangements for two months yet on work now in progress.
In the event of an emergency vote being required it can be obtained through a government-general's warrant.
None of the ministers in the chamber paid any attention to Mr. Madden's outbreak.
The agreement between the imperial, Canadian, Australian and New Zealand governments for the co-operation of navies, made at the recent imperial conference in London, was presented to the house of commons this morning by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The prime minister announced that he had received from the British government permission to make the agreement known without prejudice to any copy to reach Australia for joint publication.

MEMBER OF HAZEN GOVERNMENT SAYS LIBERALS WILL WIN


What, in the event of a dominion election in the fall will be the result? The Liberal will sweep the country, was the opinion expressed by Hon. John Morley, M. P., commissioner of public works, who was in the city yesterday afternoon attending a meeting of the local government.
Northumberland, his own constituency, he said, in speaking to a reporter for The Telegraph, would go strong Liberal and, with the exception of York county, he expected that every county in the province would go likewise. He said he would cheerfully support the Liberal return a Conservative in the event of an election being held.
"Let me tell you," he remarked, "the opposition in Ottawa will have to be made up of a different class of men than it is at present before the assembly will rally to its support."

At the meeting of the provincial government which was held in the government rooms, Church street, yesterday afternoon, chiefly routine business was transacted. Applications were received from several agricultural societies seeking incorporation and a few minor appointments were made.
Those present at the meeting were Acting Premier Fleming, Hon. John Morley, Hon. H. F. McLeod, Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, Hon. Dr. Landry and Hon. Robert Maxwell. The construction of a new bridge across the falls was discussed, and Mr. Snyder, a prominent engineer who yesterday morning in company with Hon. Mr. Morley, Hon. Robert Maxwell and A. A. Wetmore, provincial engineer, made an inspection of the site proposed for the new bridge, was present. Mr. Snyder said he would submit complete plans for the proposed bridge within the near future. The site selected is between the Suspension and Cantilever bridges. The plans for the triple bridge proposed some time ago providing opportunity for railway, street car and traffic, have been abandoned. The proposed share of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the bridge has been eliminated owing to the "danger" due to the proximity of the steam and team traffic. When the plans have been finally prepared they will be submitted to the St. John Street Railway Company and a consultation will be held.
It was stated after the meeting that the Valley Railway did not come up for discussion.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

In the supreme court at Georgetown, P. E. I. Mrs. Webster, of that place, secured a verdict of \$800 against the Summerside Rifle Club for injuries received last fall. She was out hunting when a bullet from the range struck her.
According to experiments made at the government firing grounds in London with armor plate made of molybdenum used in alloy with nickel and steel it is stated that it proved to be 20 per cent superior to the recognized armor plate standard in resistance to super-caliber projectiles.
Edward M. Sheppard, one of New York's leading lawyers, died at his home there last evening. He was a prominent politician and took an active interest in the Democratic party.
Miss Hazel and Maude Shannon, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Shannon, of Newburg Road, Toronto, died of septic poisoning yesterday within fifteen minutes of each other. They were 15 and 11 years old respectively. They contracted the disease from a defective sewer.
James Rose, a miner, committed suicide at Poreupine on Thursday night. He lost all his belongings in the recent fire.
The jury in the county court at Newcastle yesterday brought in a verdict of guilty in the case of the King vs. James McKenzie, who was charged with taking a horse belonging to a third party in a horse trade.
At a meeting of the Western Grain Growers' Association held at Brandon last night, it was decided that separate candidates would not be run in the coming federal contest.
The coal shortage is acute in Saskatchewan and Alberta, and railway officials declare that the only relief for the winter is by a suspension of the tariff so that coal may come over the line.

HENWOOD GETS LIFE SENTENCE. Denver, Col., July 28—Defiant and bitter to a degree, Frank H. Henwood heard the court in a preliminary hearing today for killing George E. Copeland, while shooting at Louis Von Paul, an aeronaut, of St. Louis, whom he also killed, in a barroom here on May 24 last.

When asked if he had anything to say by way of defence, Henwood said he had nothing to say, but that he was innocent of the crime.

The woman in the case was Mrs. John W. Springer, wife of a banker, and the double shooting was the result of a quarrel over her. Her husband has obtained a divorce since the tragedy.

As he stood at the bar, Henwood declared to the court that his trial had been turned into a preliminary hearing of the Springer divorce trial. He asserted that while the prosecutor had denounced him as a destroyer of Mr. Springer's home he was and is in reality John W. Springer's best friend.

Henwood further charged that the first day Mrs. Springer was on the stand, when she said she possessed knowledge "advantageous to me," she was excused. Later when she was recalled, "a package of letters written by her to S. L. Von Paul were placed on the prosecutor's table in plain view, and she was confronted with the threat that they would be read in open court if she testified to any facts in my behalf. Not only this, but her otherwise kind mind was dulled by drugs. I am now ready for your unjust sentence."

In sentencing Henwood, Judge Whitford said: "I am not surprised at your state of mind, since you have been surrounded by all classes of prisoners, fourteen of whom I recently sent here."

"I am of the opinion that the verdict of the jury in your case should have been first degree murder. I believe that you shot Von Paul because of jealousy over the Springer divorce case, and for some reason the jurors returned a finding of second degree murder. The law leaves the sentence to

COST OF LIVING NO HIGHER THIS YEAR THAN IS USUALLY THE CASE

Many Householders, However, Waiting for Price of Strawberries to Drop Will Do Without Preserves—Country Produce Plentiful in Market

Housekeepers in St. John will be glad to know that the berry crop, as well as all other farm products, is expected to be a record breaker this season, and consequently, low prices may be looked for. At the present time blueberries are rather high, 9 and 10 cents per box being asked, but just as soon as the farmers get through with the heaviest of their haying, the market will be plentifully supplied with them. Then the prices will drop.

The strawberry crop this season was practically a failure, large quantities of them being burned up with the sun. Many economical householders were waiting for the price of this fruit to drop in order to lay in a supply for preserving purposes, but they were eventually left in the lurch. Only on one day was the price very easy, and then it went down to six cents. This figure lasted quickly, for they began to soar the very next day, and the market closed at 12 cents per box. Consequently many families will do without their strawberry preserves this winter.

There need be no fear, however, for this occurrence with the blueberries, for unless something unforeseen happens, the crop will be a good one.

At the present time sugar is exceedingly high, this product having advanced about 35 cents within the last few weeks, and the market at the present time has an upward tendency. This may be a drawback to some with their preserving, but it is believed that sugar is as low now as it will be for some time, as the European crop this season has been a failure. Raspberries are but few offerings, and although there are but few offerings, it will not be long till they are within easy reach of all. Corn, potatoes, cabbage, beans, peas and other farm products are now coming into the market in good quantities, although many of the farmers are too busy on their farms to come to town with their goods. This will not be the case for long, however, as the haying season will be over in a few weeks.

Meat, too, is comparatively cheap, and there is lots of it being offered for sale. Roast beef, lamb, veal, and many other kinds are plentiful and will continue so for some time. Prices are not exorbitant, in fact, they compare very favorably with last year's prices.

Taking all in all, the cost of living at the present time is not greater, if as great, than it was a year or two ago, although one or two household necessities, such as sugar, is soaring just now.
