THE STRAWBERRY IMPROVING.

(Toronto Mail.)

Strawberries have improved very much in favor since the fifteenth century. Until then the only strawberries eaten were wild strawberries, of a kind which would never find a market nowadays. By 1480, however, they were beginning to be cultivated, for Holinshed records under that date a particularly fine crop grown by the Bishop of Ely in the grounds of his palace, now covered by Halton Garden. He quotes the Duke of Gloucester as saying to the Bishop:

"My Lord, you have very good strawberries in your garden in Holborn. I require you to let us have a mess of them."
This speech was copied almost verbatim by Shakespeare in Richard III. Still, even the Bishop's fruit would not appeal much to modern connoisseurs, for the garden strawberries at that period were only transplanted wildings, the plants being



DISSOLUTION NOT LIKELY BEFORE WEDNESDAY

No Inconvenience to Civil Service If Parliament is Dissolved Next Week - Tory Exhibition Still

Ottawa, July 28-There was little change oday in the condition of the dying parliament. The obstructionists made further progress in the process of talking it to death, but the indications still are that Sir Wilfrid will not give the word for final dissolution before Wednesday o

Thursday next.

Members are packing their grips for home and a considerable number on both sides have already left, though the numerical balance between the two parties is still preserved by the whips in anticipation of several more votes on opposition amendments next week.

It is understood that there is no hitch with regard dissolution next week on the score, as alleged in opposition papers, that his excellency will first demand that parliament put through an interim supply bill to carry on the administration until the new parliament meets. Although the interim supply bill passed last May only enables the government take five-twelfths of each item not previous



Next morning at 5.15 o'clock she foundered six or seven miles off Beaver Light. At the time the sea was running mountains high with a heavy off shore gale. In the gale the cargo shifted badly, the ship listed, the water sweeping over everything tore away the hatches and in a moment it was evident the ship was doomed.

"The captain ordered the boats cleared away, but before the covers could be cub away the steamer plunged under head first, carrying all hands down with her. The second engineer, I believe, was still below and could not have reached the deck."
