AMBRO island and light house is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N.

and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note-The western ledges lie from the light S W distant two miles, the other W S W about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the

light, bearing from it E N E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N E 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chedabucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a-breast of Chedabucto Head, run N. 1 W. for the south point

of George's island.

When within I a mile of George's island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoat which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point,





Middle, 2h. 27m. Ecliptic 8 2h. 33m. End of Eclipse 3h. 56m .- Digits Eclipsed 10 deg. 12 min.

Venus will be Evening Star until the 30th of July, then Morning

Star throughout the year.

d Conjuction, or planets situate in the same longitude. When a planet is in conjunction with the sun, or any other planet they pass the meridian at nearly the same instant | signifies planets situate quarter of a circle, or 90 deg. distant; when a planet is , or 90 deg. distant from the sun; if East from the sun, it will pass the meridian at 6 o'clk. in the evening, if West, at 6 o'elk. in the morning. 8 This mark denotes Opposition of planets, or when they are half a circle distant; when the Moon is full orb'd she is in 8 to the sun, and all planets when in 8 to the sun, pass the meridian at midnight. Perigee signifies, when the moon or any planet is in that part of their orbit which is nearest to the Earth. Apogee, denotes a planet to be in that part of its orbit which is most remote from the Earth.-N. B. the D when in her Perigee and Apogee, has a most visible influence on the Tides, the former having a tendency to elevate, the latter to depress them more than their usual height;







SIR ROBERT MAXWELL OF ORCHARDSTON.

Sir Robert Maxwell, of Orchardston, in the county of Galloway, was the descendant of an ancient Roman catholic family of the South of Scotland. He was the only child of a religious and bigoted recluse, who sent him, while yet very young, to a college of Jesuits in Flanders, for education, the paternal estate being, in the mean time, wholly managed by the boy's uncle, the brother of the devotee, to whom he resigned the guardianship of the property, in order that he might employ the remainder of his days exclusively in acts of devotion. In the family of Orchardston, as, indeed, in most great families of that day, the younger branches were but ill provided for, and looked to the inheritor of the family estate alone for the means of supporting their rank in society; the liberal professions, and the employments of trade, were still considered somewhat dishonourable; and the unfortunate junior, nursed with inflated ideas of his consequence and rank, was doomed in after life to exercise the servility, and experience the mortification of a humble dependant : In this case the culpable negligence of the father had transferred the entire management of a large estate to his younger brother, who was so delighted in the possession that he resolved to retain it to the exclusion of his nephew, the rightful heir at law. He consequently circulated a report that the boy was dead, and on the death of the old baronet, which took place about this period, he laid claim to the title and estate. In the mean time our young hero was suffering (but very reluctantly) the severe discipline of the Jesuit's college, his expences being defrayed by occasional supplies sent him by his uncle, which were to him represented as the bounties of the college, a story which he could not but discredit, as he had been placed there at an age too young to know distinctly either who he was, or whence he came; he was intelligent and docile, and was deemed of sufficient capacity to besome hereafter one of their own learned body, with which view he was educated. When at the age of 16, he found the discipline and austerities of a monastic life so ill suited to his inclination, that on a trivial dispute with the superior of his college he ran away and enlisted himself in a French marching regiment. In this situation he sustained all the hardships of hunger, long marches, and incessant alarms, and as it was in the hottest part of the war between France and England, about the year 1743, it may easily be imagined that his situation was by no means enviable. He fought as a foot-soldier at the battle of Dettingen ; he was also at the battle Fontenoy; and landed as an ensign in the French troops at Murray Frith during the rebellion of forty-five. He joined the rebels a little before the battle of Falkirk, marched with them to Derby, and retreated with them into Scotland. He was wounded at the battle of Cullcden, and fled with a few friends to the woods of Lochaber, where he remained the greatest part of the summer of 1746, living upon the roots of trees, goats' milk, and the oatmeal and water of such peasants as he durst confide in. Knowing, however, that it would be impossible to continue this course of life in the winter, he began to devise means of effecting his return to France, perfectly unconscious that in the country where he was suffering the miseries of an outcast criminal he was entitled to the possession of an ample estate and a title. His scheme was to gain the coast of Gailoway, where he hoped to get on board some smuggling vessel to the Isle of Man, and from thence to France. bardships which he suffered in the prosecution of this plan would require a volume in their description. He crept through bye ways by night, and was forced to lie concealed among rocks and woods during the day; he was reduced almost to a state of sudity, and his food was obtained from the charity of the poorest peasants, in whom only he could confide. Of this scanty subsistence he was sometimes for days deprived; and to complete his misfortunes, he was, after having walked bare-footed over rocks, briars, and unfrequented places, at length discovered, seized, and taken before a magistrate near Dumfries. His name was Maxwell, which he did not attempt to conceal; he would have suffered as a rehel, had not his commission as a French officer been found in the lining of his tattered coat, which entitled him to the treatment of a pri-This privilege, however, only extended to the preservation of his life; he was confined in a paved stone dungeon so soner of war. long, that he had amused himself by giving name to each stone which composed the pavement, and which in after life he took great pleasure in repeating and pointing out to his friends. old woman, who had been his nurse in childhood, was at this time living in Dumfries, where he was a prisoner, and having accidentally seen him, and becoming acquainted with bis name, his age, &c. felt an assurance that he was the rightful Sir Robert Maxwell. The indissoluble attachment of the lower orders in Scotland to their chiefs is well known; and impelled by this feeling, this old and faithful domestic attended him with the most maternal affection administering liberally to his distresses. After an interview of some weeks she made him acquainted with her suspicion, and begged leave to examine a mark which she remembered on his body. This proof also concurring, she became outrageous with joy, and ran

about the streets, proclaiming the discovery she had made! This rumour reaching the ears of the magistrates, enquiry was made, the proofs were examined, and it soon became the general opinion that he was the son of the old baronet of Orchardston. The estate lay but a few miles from Dumfries, and the unlawful possessor being a man of considerable power and a most vindictive disposition, most people, whatever might be their private opinion, were cautious in espousing the cause of this disinherited and distressed orphan. One gentleman however, was found, who, to his eternal honour, took him by the hand. A Mr. Gondy procured his release from prison, took him to his own house, cloathed him agreeably to his rank, and enabled him to commence an action against his un-The latter was not inactive in the defence of his crime, and took every pains to prove his nephew to be an imposter. Chagrin and a consciousness of guilt however put an end to his existence before the cause came to a hearing, and Sir Robert was at length put into the peaceable possession of an estate worth upwards of two thousand pounds a year. He now began to display those qualities and abilities which had been but faintly perceptible in his former station: he discovered a generous mind, an intellect at once vigorous and refined, and manners the most elegant and polished; his society was courted by all the neighbouring gentry, and in the course of time he married a Miss Maclellan, a relation of the family of Lord Kirkcudbright; with this lady he lived in the most perfect happiness for many years. He joined in the prevalent practice of farming his own estate, and built a very elegant house on an eminence overlooking the Frith. An imprudent speculation in the bank of Ayr, however, compelled him once more to abandon the seat of his ancestors. He had reserved a small pittance, on which he and his lady lived the latter part of their days. he bore as became a man familiar with misfortune, and he continued This calamity the same worthy open-hearted character that he had ever been. The reduction of his fortune served only to redouble the kindness and cordiality of his friends. He died suddenly in September 1786, whilst on the road to visit one of them-the Earl of Selkirk. He left behind him no issue, but his name is still remembered with ardent attachment.

SOUPS, &c.

Good Family Soup.

O eight or ten pounds of brisket of beef put a gallon of water; let it simmer very gently; skim it carefully: when it has simmered for about four hours, put in some carrots and turnips, and two head of celery, cut small; stew it for about an hour and a half longer, and the soup will be ready for table. A la mode Beef.

Take about six or eight pounds of the clod, or sticking piece of heef, which cut into bits of two pounds each; put two ounces of beef Lipping into a large deep stewpan; and when it is quite hot, flour the meat, and put it into the stewpan: turn it often until it is of a light brown, then cover it with boiling water, and allow a quart over; when it boils skim it, and put in a large onion, and half a pint of bread raspings: let it stew very slowly for three hours; then crack 12 berries of black pepper, the same of allspice and four cloves, which put into a linen bag, with half a dozen bay leaves, and a bunch of sweet herbs; and let them stew with it for an hour longer. If the meat be sufficiently tender, take it up with a slice; cut it into quarter pound pieces, and put it into a tureen, and pour the soup on it.

Nutritious Broth. Boil two pounds of Loin of mutton, with a large handful of chervil, in two quarts of water: let it boil till it is reduced to one. Take off part of the fat. Any other herbs or roots may be added. Half a pint of this taken three or four times a day is very nutritive.

Beef Tea. To one pound of lean beef, cut in thin slices, put a quart of water, which boil a quarter of an hour; then take out the meat and mince it small: boil it a quarter of an hour longer, and skim it well. A good Pound Cake.

Beat three quarters of a pound of butter to a cream, and mix with it the whites and yolks of eight eggs, beaten apart. Have ready warm by the fire a pound of flour, and three quarters of a pound of sifted sugar, mix them and a few cloves, a little nutmeg and cinnamon in fine powder together; then by degrees work the dry ingredients into the butter and carraways. It must be beaten a full hour. Butter a pan, and bake it a full hour in a quick oven. A common Cake.

Mix three quarters of a pound of flour with half a pound of butter, four ounces of sugar, four eggs, half an onnce of carraways, and a glass of white wine. Beat it well, and bake in a quick oven.

WINES.

Red Carrant Wines.

To every three pints of ripe currants put a quart of water: bruise the fruit, and let it stand for two days: then strain off the liquor, and to every gallon put four pounds of good moist sugar: turn it immediately, and lay the bung on it lightly: do not use any thing to work it. When it has ceased to work, put a bottle of brandy to every four gallons, and bung it close. If it be kept for three years, it will be a very fine wine.—N. B. For white currants use loaf sugar.

Orange Wine.

To one gallon of water, in which three pounds of sugar have been boiled for twenty minutes, add the outer rind of twelve oranges: cover it closely from the air till it is luke-warm, then add the juice of twelve oranges, and a small quantity of yeast: let it work two or three days before it is strained and put into casks. After it is in the cask, add at the rate of one quart of brandy to ten gallons of wine; closely bung it up for six months, leaving the vent peg out about half that time.

Ginger Wine.

Boil, for an hour, twenty-eight pounds of lump sugar in nine gallons of water, and skin it often, then add one pound of ginger in small pieces, and the peel of nine lemons;—pour it off to cool, and put with it the juice of nine lemons; when it becomes lukewarm, add four pounds of stoned raisins and a little yeast; pour the whole into a cask and stirit daily; when it has done working add a pint of brandy and bung the cask, but not tightly.

Blackberry Wine.

On half a bushel of blackberries pour five gallons of boiling water; let them stand forty-eight hours, then add half a peck of sloes and ten pounds of sugar and boil them all together for an hour;—work it as other wines.

British Champagne.

Crush green gooseberries, and to every gallon, add the same quantity of water; let it stand two days, stirring it often. Squeeze the mixture with your hands through a seive; to every gallon put three pounds and a half of sugar; mix it well together, and let it stand one day: add at the rate of a pint of brandy to seven gailons of liquor. It should remain in the barrel one year before it is bottled.

To make excellent Punch.

Take two moderate sized lemons, to which, when well squeezed, add a quarter of a pound of sugar, When the sugar is nearly dissolved, add a quart of boiling water: then put two wine glasses of rum, and a glass and a bait of brandy.

PRESERVATIVES, &c.

Cherries in Brandy.

Take the finest Morella cherries: cut off half the stalk; prick them with a needle; and put them into a wide-mouthed bettle. To each pound of cherries add three quarters of a pound of refixed sugar or white candy: fill up with brandy, and tie a bladder over. Cherry Jam.

To twelve pounds of fine Kentish, or duke cherries, quite ripe, put one pound of white sugar : add part of the kernels of the fruit, blanched; boil gently till the jam comes clear from the pan .-Keep in boxes with white paper between.

Current Jam.

Let the fruit be fully ripe, which pick clean from the stalks; bruise it, and add three quarters of a poned of loaf sugar to every pound of fruit : stir it well, and let it boil half an hour.

Black or Red Current Jelly.

Strip the fruit carefully from the stalks, and squeeze the juice from it through a tammy, and to every pint of juice add a pound of loaf sugar; put it into the juice in large lumps, and when nearly dissolved, put it into a preserving pan: let it simmer over a charcoal fire, and skim it carefully. When it well jelly on a plate, it is ready to put into the glasses or jars. Steep the paper in brandy, and keep it in a dry place

Raspberry Jam. Weigh equal proportions of time ripe fruit, and lump sugar; put the fruit into a preserving pan, boil and break it; stir constantly, and let it boil very quickly. When most of the juice is wasted, add the sugar, and summer for half an hour.

Peppermint Drops.

Pound, very fine, a quarter of a pound of the fivest loaf sugar, which beat with the whites of two eggs till perfectly smooth; add sixty drops of the oil of peppermint, beat it well, and drop on white pepper; let it dry very gradually at the fire.

To keep Currants. Let the bottles be perfectly clean and dry: to prevent the currants from being damaged, a small portion of the stalk should be left to each. They should be gathered quite dry: and it would be preferable to cut them off the trees, and allow them to drop gently into the bottle; stop the bottles with cork and rosin, and bury them in the garden with the neck downwards. Damsons and cherries may be kept in a similar way.

Excellent Stomachic. One ounce of gentian root, sliced, one ounce of fresh rind of lemon, two drachins of cardamon seeds bruised, three drachms of Seville orange peel; pour a pint and a half of boiling water over the ingredients, let it stand an hour, then decant the clear liquor,

and take a wine glass full two or three times a day. It should be kept closely covered after the water is put to the ingredients.

Ditto.

Take the thin parings of three or four lemons, which steep in a bottle of good gin some time.

White Wine Whey.

Take a quarter of a pint of sherry or Lisbon wine, and the same quantity of skim milk : after they have stood for a few minutes, add half a pint of boiling water. In a short time the curd will collect and settle at the bottom; the whey should then be strained into another vessel, and sweetened with sugar; a slice of lemon will much improve the flavour.

Barley Water.

Take two ounces of pearl barley: wash it clean with cold water, and put it into half a pint of boiling water, and let it boil for five minutes: pour off this water, and add to it two quarts of boiling water; boil it to two pints, and strain it. A squeeze of lemon will render it a more refreshing beverage.

PICKLES.

Red Cabbage.

Let it be sliced into a large dish, and sprinkle each layer with salt; put it into a jar and pour therein boiling vinegar enough to cover it. Boil spice with the vinegar.

Walnuts.

Put them into a jar with cold vinegar, let them stand about four months, then pour off the pickle, and boil as much fresh vinegar as will cover the walnuts, adding to every three quarts about a handful of salt, one ounce of ginger and allspice, one once of pepper, three quarters of a pound of the best mustard, and a small stick of horse radish sliced: pour the whole, boiling hot, on the walnuts, and cover them close; they will be fit for use in three months. N. B. The pickle in which the walnuts stood the first four months will make good walnut ketchup.

Young Cucumbers. Spread them on dishes with salt and let them lie a week; then drain them, put them into a jar, and pour boiling vinegar on them; if they are not then a good green, boil the vinegar again, cover them with vine leaves and pour the vinegar on: this will improve

To make Walnut Ketchup.

Beat a bushel of green walnuts (before the shell is formed,) in a stone mortar, squeeze out the juice through a coarse cloth, and to every gallon add one quart of red wine, a quarter of a pound of anchovies, a quarter of pound of bay salt, one ounce of allspice, two ounces of black pepper, a small quantity of ginger and horseradish, in small pieces; boil the ingredients together till they are reduced to half the quantity; bottle it off when cold, and be careful to use good corks. The ketchup will be ready for use in about

Mushroom Ketchup.

Take the largest broad mushrooms, break them into an earthen pan, strew salt over, and stir them occasionally for three days. Then let them stand until there is a thick scum over : strain, and boil the liquor with Jamaica and black pepper, mace, a clove or two, ginger, and some mustard seed .- When cold, bottle it, and tie a bladder over the cork; in three months boil it again with some fresh spice, and it will then keep a twelvemonth, which it rarely does, unless it is boiled up a second time.

Mushroom Sauce.

Pick a pint of very small mushrooms very clean, wash them, and put them into a saucepan with on blade of mace, half a dozen corns of allspice bruised, and half a bay leaf, a pint of milk, an ounce of butter, and a table spoonful of flour: set them over a gentle fire, and stir frequently till they boil: let them boil ten minutes, and leave them near the fire, to keep hot, till wanted.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Dr. Boerhaave's Fever Powder.

Take nitre, eight ounces, camphor, a quarter of an ounce, saffron, one-eighth of an ounce, cochineal, eight grains. Pound it and keep in dry bottle. - Ten grains every four hours is a dose for adults.

Hooping Cough.

Dissolve a scruple of salt of tartar in a gill of water, and ten grains of cochineal, finely pounded; sweeten this with sugar. Give an infant the fourth part of a table spoonful, four times a-day; to a child two or three years old, half a spoonful. To which may be added, as auxiliaries, a Burgundy pitch plaster on the pit of the stomach, a flannel waistcoat or shirt next to the skin, and a change of air when practicable. The diet should be light and easy of digestion, avoiding every thing of a salt or oily nature.

Fumigation. Three drachms of gum benjamin-three do storax-mixed and divided into twelve powders; burn one of these in the patient's room every night on a pan of coals, previously closing the

chamber-door.

Effectual Cure for Corns and Warts.

Rub the wart or corn with the juice of Red Spurge, and it will soon be removed .- By putting a drop into the hollow of a decayed and aching tooth, it will destroy the nerve, and thereby remove the pain.

Cure for the sting of a Wasp or Bee.

Apply to the part affected either solution or potash, or wellbruised mallows, and immediate ease will be obtained.

Remedy for Burns or Scalds.

Immerse the part scalded in cold water: afterwards apply linen steeped in common brandy; avoid the use of poultice or oils.

To make Lavender Water.

To one pint of the best rectified spirits of wine, and one shilling's worth of oil of lavender, and sixpenny worth of essence of ambergris; mix these well together and keep close from the air. When clear, draw it off for use.

To make Rose Water.

To a peck of fine dry rose leaves, add a quart of water, then put them into a cold still, under which make a slow fire: the slower it is distilled the better: bottle off, and in two or three days it may be corked.

To make Court Plaster.

Take half an ounce of isinglass, which melt in one onnce of water, and boil the solution till the water is nearly consumed, then add, gradually, one drachm of Friars' balsam, stirring them well together.—After it has continued a short time on the fire, take the vessel off, and spread the extended silk with the liquid whilst hot; use a brush for spreading it.

To make Milk of Roses.

To one pint of rose water add one ounce of oil of almonds, and ten drops of oil of tartar, which must be poured in last.

Lip Salve.

To an ounce of white wax and ox marrow, add three ounces of white pomatum, and melt all by a very gentle heat; add a drachm of alkanet, and stir until it acquire a reddish colour.

To remove superfluous Hair.

Take two ounces of quicksilver: yellow orpiment, starch and litharge, each one ounce. Sift, and afterwards mix them with soap and water till they become a paste; anoint the part; in a few minutes it will dry, when you can with ease rub off the hairs—wash in warm water immediately.

To increase the growth of Hair.

Beat hartshorn shavings fine, and mix them with oil; this composition being rubbed in the head will much increase the growth of hair.

To keep of Flies.

Place camphor near, which will effectually drive them away.

To make Phosphorus.

Two-thirds of quick lime, and one-third of flour of brimstone put into a crueible for an hour, and afterwards being exposed to the sir for the same time, become phosphorus.

To prevent Beer from becoming flat.

In an eighteen-gallon cask of beer becoming flat, put a pint of ground malt suspended in a bag; and being careful to make the bung tight. In a short time the beer will recover its original flavour.

To recover stale Beer

In a gallon of stale beer infuse a table spoonful of salt of wormwood: this will cause the beer to effervesce like bottled porter.

To obtain a good Crop of Onions.

Sow in light soils, in the months of August, January, or early in February; -for wet soils, March, or early in April, is preferable.

Easy Method of producing Mushrooms.

If the water in which mushrooms have been washed be poured upon an old bed, or if the broken parts of mushrooms be strewed thereon, a great quantity of them will soon spring up.

To destroy Rats or Mice.

Mix flour of malt with some butter; add thereto two or three drops of oil of annisced; make it up into balls, and bait the traps with it.

Composition for preventing Iron or Steel from rusting.

To one pound of hogslard, free from salt, add one ounce of camphor, two drachms of black lead powder, and two drachms of dragon's blood in fine power; melt it over a slow fire, and let it cool for use.

Excellent Cement for mending broken China or Glass.

The juice of garine applied to the pieces to be joined, is the strongest cement for that purpose, and if done with care, will leave little or no mark,

Cement for Wood or Paper.

Dissolve isinglass in a small quantity of spirits of wine by a gentle heat; and preserve it in a bottle for use.

To clean Mahogany Furniture. One pint of cold drawn linseed oil, three pennyworth of alkanet root, two pennyworth of rose pink; put these into a pan, and let them stand all night: then take some of this mixture, rub it over the table, or chairs, and let it remain one hour; then take a linen cloth and rub it well off, and it will leave a beautiful gloss on the furniture. If the pinky shade, occasioned by the alkanet root and pink is disagreeable, they may be omitted in part, or entirely.

To clean Marble.

Beat pumice stones to a fine powder, and mix it up with verjuice; let it stand for two hours, then dip in a sponge, and rub the marble: after which wash it with a cloth and fresh water, and dry with clean linen rags.

Varnish for Furniture.

To one part of virgin's white wax, add eight parts of an ounce of oil of petroleum: lay a slight coat of this mixture on the wood with a brush, while a little warm; the oil will then evaporate, and leave a thin coat of wax, which should afterwards be polished with a coarse woollen cloth.

To stain Wood a fine Black.

Drop a little oil of vitriol into a small quantity of water, which then rub on the wood; hold it to the fire till it becomes black, and when polished, it will be very heautiful.

To stain Wood a fine Green.

Dissolve verdigris in vinegar: and with the hot liquid brush the wood over until perfectly stained.

To remove spots of Grease from Paper.

Take an equal quantity of roach alum, burnt, and flour of brimstone, finely powdered together; wet the paper a little, and put a small portion of the powder on the paper, rubbing it gently with your finger, and the spot will disappear. To take out Spots of Ink.

As soon as the accident happens, wet the place with the juice of lemon, or with vinegar, and the best white soap.

To take Iron-moulds out of Linen.

Hold the iron-mould over a jug of hot water; rub on the spot a little juice of lemon, and a little salt; when the linea has imbibed the juice, wash it in ley of pearl-ashes.

To take spots out of Silk.

Rub the spots with spirits of turpentine, which speedily removes them.

For cleaning Paint.

One pound of soft soap; two ounces of pearl ash; one pint of sand; one pint of table-beer. Summer the above in a pipkin; be particular that the ingredients are well mixed; put a small quantity on a flaunel; rub it on the wainscot: then wash it off with warm water; thoroughly dry it with a linen cloth.

Blacking.

Three ounces of ivory black, one once and a half of oil almonds, one ounce of oil of vitriol, three onces of treacle, one ounce of powdered gall, one ounce and a half of rectified spirits of wine, and one quart of vinegar.

Boot Top Liquid.

Take an ounce of oxalic acid, to which add a pint of milk, and a pint of water, which should be boiled, and poured over the acid

Permanent Ink for marking Linen.

Take one drachm of lunar caustic, to which add two drachms of tincture of galls. The cloth must be previously wetted with the following liquid, viz.:-one ounce of salt of tartar, and an ounce and a half of water; which must be quite dry before it is written on.

To make fine Black Ink.

To three quarts of water add three pints of vinegar; fifteen ounces of blue galls slightly bruised; let these stand near a fire for six days; then put in six ounces of green copperas, and seven ounces of gum arabic finely pounded: it should remain near a fire six days more, and stirred up frequently: strain the liquor through a fine cloth, and bottle up for use.

Red Ink.

Take a quarter of a pound of the best Brazil wood, one ounce of cream of tartar, and one ounce of allum; boil these ingredients in a quart of clear water till half is consumed, then add to the ink, when filtered hot, an ounce of gum arabic and an ounce of fine sugar.
