THE INCREASED COST

When Hon. Mr. Foster criticized the government for the growth of expenditure for civil government this journal pointed out that the country had been growing in population, in business, and in general prosperity, and that necessarily there would be an increased cost of extended civil service.

ity meant increased business and increased business meant that more people were required to do the work. The period prior to 1890 was a period of stagnation, while the years which have elapsed since then have been years of progress and prosperity.

We quote a paragraph from the speech of the finance minister: "It is rather too late to arraign the government for this large expenditure on the civil service, unless we are prepared to take due account of the tremendous change that has come over Canada; of the enormously increased business, of the thousands and one things which devolve upon the government today and which did not devolve upon the government of some few years since."

LEADERS REBUKED

Thus the Hamilton Spectator points out that "For Canadians to thus admit that they dare not close a trade treaty with another country without first asking permission from the United States is to admit that the government is the dictator of our foreign policy."

FOSTER MAKES A TWO HOUR SPEECH

Proceedings in Parliament Yesterday—Duncan C. Ross, New Member Introduced

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—With the object apparently of furnishing the opposition with material for future discussion on imperial topics, particularly of naval defence, G. E. Foster, occupied two hours in the house this afternoon with a speech devoted entirely to a review of the proceedings of various imperial conferences held since 1887.

The pretext for this lengthy exposition of matters, set forth clearly and in detail in blue books and other official documents, was a resolution moved by the member for North Toronto, asking for the production of all correspondence and papers relating to the formation and work of the secretariat decided upon by the imperial conference of 1907. While Mr. Foster's summary of the proceedings of the conferences in 1887, 1884, 1892, 1897, and 1907 was very comprehensive, he laid special emphasis on the views of the admiralty and of the representatives of the overseas states on the subject of military and naval defence.

In closing he declared that these conferences had grown not only in public favour but in their sphere of action and usefulness. They constituted the only medium for the discussion and conciliation of the views of the best and strongest sentiment in the empire. He hoped that in the future similar able conferences would attend these conferences and that the same unanimity and wisdom would characterize their discussion and conclusions, as had been shown in the past.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier congratulated Mr. Foster on his fair and accurate summary and said there was no objection to the motion for papers relating to the secretariat.

An interesting feature of the session was the introduction of Duncan C. Ross, the new member for West Middlesex, who was greeted with loud Liberal cheers, and escorted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. He was presented to the speaker and afterwards took his seat.

Mr. Jameson (Digby) asked the prime minister whether he had yet elected to sit for Quebec East or Ottawa. Sir Wilfrid Laurier—I have not yet decided. It is a case of "how happy could I be with either were the other dearer away." (Laughter.)

Petitions praying for an amendment of the criminal code to suppress race track gambling continue to pour in on members. Among those presented today was one by Hon. Charles Murphy, secretary of state, on behalf of his constituents in Russell county.

Mr. Martin (St. Marys) introduced a bill to amend the Railway Act by providing for fortnightly payment of railway employees.

Replying to Mr. Crockett, the minister of railways said that the Transcontinental commissioners were aware that certain parts of the work on the New Brunswick line, but that that could be done without content. They did not know of any case where a contract had been broken by one subcontractor to another.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier informed Mr. Smith (Nanaimo) that the revenue to date from the sale of Canadian annuities was \$337,634, the number having purchased annuities being 428.

The remainder of the session was spent in the consideration of the public works estimates.

LIBERALS CARRY BY-ELECTIONS IN NOVA SCOTIA

Premier Murray Achieves Triumph—Wins Three Seats; Conservatives Hold One

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 24.—Premier Murray achieved a great triumph today in the by-elections for the provincial legislature in Victoria (C. B.), Angus A. Buchanan in Amherst and the labor candidate for support him.

In Cumberland, J. H. Livingstone is elected by more than 300 of a majority over T. Sherman Rogers, Conservative, the labor candidate, A. L. Landry, being at the foot of the poll.

Lansburg piled up the splendid majority of 405 for the Conservative, the labor candidate, A. K. MacLean, attorney general, who was opposed by J. W. Margeson, a young lawyer of Brunsrigue. The Conservatives were able to hold Hants, where they elected Albert Parsons, of Walton, with a majority of 100. He succeeded the late C. S. Wilcox, who in the general election had 67 majority over MacKeffey (Lib).

The labor candidate in Cumberland county polled 641 votes in the town of Springhill. This is a greater vote than the combined votes received by the Liberal and Conservative candidates in that town who had together 540 votes—233 for the Liberal and 307 for the Conservative. Livingstone's total vote was approximately 3,000; Rogers, 2,700, and Landry's, 1,200. The labor candidate will lose his deposit.

A. K. MacLean today has a majority in Amherst of 465, compared with only 201 to his credit in the federal election of 1908. He will add considerably to the debating strength of the Liberals in the house of assembly and will make a capable attorney general.

Albert Parsons is a merchant engaged in business in Walton. He made heavy gains in Windsor, doing about 100 better in that town than the Conservative in the last election.

The superstructure is to be built of nickel steel instead of carbon steel and will weigh 130,000,000 pounds as against 70,000,000, the weight of the former structure.

In the Australian commonwealth house of representatives yesterday a resolution was adopted that immediate steps be taken to provide an Australian navy unit. The vote stood thirty to nine.

K. S. Aboud, of Grand Falls denies that he had any connection with the case of the Syrians said to be mixed up in business frauds. He denies that he is going away. Any goods he bought, he asserts, he paid for.

President Roosevelt, toward the latter part of his presidential term refused to run for mayor of Greater New York to aid the Republicans against Tammany in the recent contest.

Rev. Dr. Andrew Robertson, the new pastor of St. James' Square Presbyterian church, Toronto, was met at the Union station in the Queen City yesterday on his arrival from Montreal by a large delegation from the church.

In Moncton yesterday Ed. Hazlewood, of St. John was found guilty of stealing \$30. He will be sentenced on Dec. 18.

ROSEBERY DECLARES BUDGET RUINOUS BUT WILL VOTE FOR IT

Believes its Enactment Would Cast Liberals From Power—Peers Courting Disaster—Raises Historic Struggle To a New Plane

London, Nov. 24.—Lord Rosebery, the former Liberal premier, today said at the historic struggle between the lords and the house of commons to a new plan by one of the finest speeches he has ever delivered, in which he warned the lords of the grave risks they were running if they adopted Lord Lansdowne's resolution to reject the budget.

Lord Rosebery contended that the budget taxed the lords freely and abundantly without their having a word to say or a vote in the matter. After referring to the budget as having spread over the country like a fog, want of confidence and want of credit, the worst disease which could affect commercial nations, he uttered a solemn warning that the pressure of great armaments was eating out the heart of the nation.

Dealing with the question of the reform of the House of Lords, Lord Rosebery has long advocated, he expressed the conviction that no final adjustment of the differences between the two houses could ever be arrived at without some form of referendum. He denounced the budget in the strongest terms, and said that one maxim burned in them by bitter experience was that there should be no taxation without representation.

SEVENTY MILE WIND SWEEPS COAST; SCHOONERS ASHORE



NO RECORD HERE

Registrar Has No Account of McMillan Marriage in Which it is Said Divorce is Sought

A despatch from Boston, published this morning, stated that Mrs. Celia M. McMillan was petitioning the Suffolk County Superior Court for divorce from her husband, John McMillan, both former residents of this city. The despatch stated also that the couple had been married here on November 22, 1900.

WATER MAIN REPAIRED

The break in the water main near St. Patrick's Industrial School at Silver Falls was repaired and the pressure restored to the normal at 11 o'clock last evening. It was found that the break consisted of a hole about 3 1/2 feet long and triangular in shape, varying from practically nothing to 15 inches in width. A new piece of pipe was set in and at 6:15 o'clock last evening the pipe was gradually filled until at 11 o'clock the water was again flowing through as usual.

A day and a night crew of men were employed on the work.

LINE OF FREIGHT STEAMERS FOR ST. JOHN RIVER

Plan Being Worked Out But is Not Advanced Sufficiently for Definite Announcement

A freight line for the river is one of the possibilities for next year. It is understood that behind the scheme are some of the largest shippers along the river between here and Fredericton. An official of one of the river steamship companies is spoken of as having been offered the management of such a line, but when asked today by a Times man, he would not discuss it other than admit that the scheme was being worked out.

From what can be learned from other sources the plan is to run two trips a week between St. John and Fredericton. There would be two boats and they would be built especially for freight purposes, being constructed similar to freight boats on the Thames with engines and machinery away aft giving almost the entire length of the boat for freight.

LUMBERING CONDITIONS BAD SAYS MR. KILBURN

There has been no snow and continued wet weather has put the tere-roads in frightful condition.
