

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six menths' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention

I know of no sickness to compare with it. Sea-sickness is bad but it has its compensations, when you are seasick you are not afraid to die.




### BRITAIN ASKED TO STOP PIRACY IN THE CHINA SEA

Steam Launch Captured by the Pirates---Japan the Sole Power in Manchurla---White Races Being

PEKING, Feb. 9.—Representations have lately been made to Sir Edward Grey with regard to the piracy in Chinese waters and other foreign governments will be notified in addition to the British Foreign office. Taking control of the engines the bandits manoeuvred for some time until the Chinese launch, Chen Fok came in sight. As the latter was the fastest boat it was decided to collide with her and board her in the confusion and the polain succeeded. The result was the acquisition of an additional \$1,500, and a fast and powerful launch whose vital parts were protected with a loop-holed bullet-proof shied in steel.



### TRYING TO AVERT WAR IN CENTRAL AMERICA

Governments to Use Their Influence in Preventing an Outbreak

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 8—At the instance of the President of the United States, the President of the Republic of Mexico has sent to the Presidents of Guatemala, Salvador and Costa Rica, a request that they use their united influence with the Government of Honduras and Nicaragua to induce them to suspend all preparations for war and give full freedom to the board of arbitration, which is now in session in Salvador, with the object of deciding the difficulties between Honduras and Nicaragua. The board of arbitration has convened in conformity with the treaty of Corinto, of 1902, and now has under consideration the invasion of Nicaragua by Honduras soldiers. The prompt action of the Presidents of the United States and Mexico working with the Central American Governments, it is expected, will avert a war which, if it should occur, would probably involve practically all of the Central American Governments.

No official advices were received today as to whether or not the Governments of Honduras and Nicaragua have taken any steps to comply with the request that they suspend preparations for war, but in diplomatic circles here it is thought both governments will comply with this request and that the board of arbitration now meeting in Salvador will be left free and untrammelled in settling the dispute.




