No Pressure from Either Side Can Make Her Abandon Neutrality, but Allies Will be the Favored Ones-Government Reply to Joint Note Understood to Agree That Allies be Not Disarmed, Receive Liberty of Action on Greek Soil and All Necessary Railway Facilities-Formal Guarantee Expected Immediately.

Paris, Nov. 24—A collective note of the Allies to the Greek government, expressed in friendly spirit and general in character, requests the Greek government, accepting to an Athens despatch to the Havas Agency, to confirm the assurances already given relative to the position of the Allies' forces on Greek soil. MR. CROTHERS 400,000 MORE YOUNG MEN TO REINFORCE TRIP IN AIRSHIP TO ARMIES OF FRANCE

Paris, Nov. 24.—After hearing Gen. Golileni, Minister of War, today, the Army Committee of the Chamber of Deputies decided upon a call to the colors on December 15, of the young conscripts of the class of 1917. They will be sent to garrisons, then trained and incorporated in various regiments and services.

The class of 1917 comprises a contingent of 400,000 young men who, in peace times, would begin military service in 1917.. The members of this contingent are 18 and 19 years of age. The calling of this contingent was forecasted in a memorandum by M. Millerand, then minister of war, in September, noting that the 1916 contingent had completed its training and that it appeared to be necessary to anticipate the time of calling the 1917 contingent, so that its services might be available, if the need arose, in the spring of 1916, the minimum time of training being five months.

London, Nov. 24.—(Gazette Cable)—
Replying to an article appearing in the Sketch, alleging that Canadian Red Cross goods are wasted or piled up on docks and pilfered, Col. 

Unprincipled Dealers In all parts of Germany the newspapers complain of unprincipled dealers who exploit the more unwary members of the public, and where possible, demand extortionate prices. One has only to turn over the pages of "Vorwarts" for numerous examples of this food usury. In Munchen-Gladbach three innkeepers were sentenced to imprisonment for eight weeks for selling white cabbage at prices above the maximum. In Cologne a butcher was sentenced to fourteen days' imprisonment for charging too much for his beef. In Erfurt, Marie Hoffmann, a dairy woman, got a month for putting water in her milk, in order to prevent her supply running short. In Metz a butter dealer who was chargeing 3s. a pound for his butter was deprived of his license, and in Wolfstein (Bavaria) two persons were sentenced for raising unduly the price of groceries.




