Russians Also Win.

Petrograd, Oct. 6, via London.—The Russian offensive in Turkish Armenia in the district west and southwest of Trebizond is being successfully pushed, the war office announced today. The Turks are being forced back in the direction of the Karshu river, which runs through Ardasa, about 40 miles southwest of Trebizond, and empties into the Black Sea near Trevoil, fifty miles west from Trebizond. The official statement reads:

"Caucasus front: In the coastal front our troops continue toward the river Karashut-Darasi and have captured a number of prisoners."

North of Fogaras at the juncture of the Homorod and Alt rivers, near Reps, the Roumanians are in retreat, pursued by the Teutonic treats.

The successful repulse of the invaders on the southern end of the line was in the hands of General Von Falkenhayn, former chief of the German general staff, and who only last week routed the Roumanians around Hermann-stadt and drove them back to stadt and drove them back to their own frontier. North of Reps the Austro-Hungarians recaptured positions and took more than 200 prisoners. Bucharest admits the Roumanian troops in Eastern Transylvania have been withdrawn before attacks by superior forces in the region of Fogaras. In Dobrudja heavy fighting continues, along the line south of the Constanza-Bucharest railway, with Bucharest recording progress for the Russians and Roumanians in the center and on their left wing.

While Gen. Brussiloff apparently has eased, at least for the moment, his attacks against the Austro-German lines in Volhynia, west of Lutak, he continues southward his assaults with great internsity against the positions of the Teutonic allies guarding the approaches of Lemberg, capital of Gallcia. Aithough the Russian attacks were held up northeast of Lemberg, those to the southeast of the capital, according to Petrograd, resulted in the taking of positions south of Brzezany and the capture of 500 prisoners. Berlin, however, declares that all Russian attacks in Galicia have been repulsed, and that the Austro-Germans have taken 1,200 prisoners from the Russians.

In Macedonia the armies of the Entente Allies continue to advance. The British troops which crossed the Struma northeast of Saloniki have taken the taking of Nevolyen, which was evacuated by its defenders. South of Monastir, Serbia, violent fighting in the region of the Cerna river is reported by Paris.

The artillery continues active on the Somme front in France, according to the reports from the war offices of all the belligerents.

A delayed report from Constantinople tells of the rout of the Russian troops northwest of Hamedad, Parias. Petrograd reports progress for the Russians west and southwest of Trebizond.

"Germany has definitely decided to apply to President Wilson," the article reads, "to use his good offices in suing for peace with the Allies. This was learned today from sources in a position to have absolutely trustworthy information of these matters.

"It is understood that Ambassador James W. Gerard, who is on his way over here will lay the Kaiser's request before President Wilson within a

"It is a fact, however positively it may have been denied officially, that the possibility of President Wilson acting as mediator has been discussed by German officials with Ambassador Gerard. "NOW THAT WE ARE IN THIS WAR WE WILL CONTINUE UNTIL LASTING PEACE COMES"

LORD ROBERT CECIL MAKES PLAIN REPLY TO STATEMENT BY SWEDEN'S PRIME MINISTER

Britain Asks No Favors of Neutrals but Will Not Permit Them to Hinder Belligerent Rights in Life or Death Struggle Being Waged by Entente Allies.

London, Oct. 6 .- "We are anxious to restore to its old footing the ancient friendship and commercial intercourse between the two countries," declared Lord Robert Cecil, minister of war trades, today in an nterview with the Associated Press, in which he replied to the recent statement of Premier Hammarskjold, of Sweden.

To the assertion of the Swedish premier that Great Britain is arbitrarily limiting the imports into Sweden, Lord Robert said that Great Britain always has been and is now ready to enter into fresh engagements for a trade agreement with Sweden, in which case allowances will be made for all Sweden's requirements, which he admitted are greater now than before the war, owing to the development of her

The minister of war trades declared incidentally that the British black list violates no rule of law or equity.

After saying that he was glad to read the premier's statement, that Sweden's action had been dictated solely by the Kingdom's own necessities and future welfare, and not for any partisan reasons, Lord

"We are fighting this war to vindicate the rights of all nations to velop themselves freely and unhindered by the menace of military aggression. We ask no favors from neutrals. But we do ask that they should not hinder our belligerent rights in the life or death struggle

"The prime minister states that he is opposed to any mediation by Sweden at present as it might compromise Germany and arouse the suspicions of the allies. For Germany I am not in a position to speak, but for ourselves and our allies ! can say that we, who did not wish this war, and who entered it reluctantly, are determined, now that we are the enemy that wars of aggression will not be allowed to succeed.

"The prime minister said that he is in harmony with the American protest against the blacklist, but I observe, with some surprise, that he makes no allusion to his attitude concerning the American protest against German submarine atrocities, surely a far graver matter for eutrals. The German submarine policy is, in one aspect, an outrage upon the commercial interests of neutral nations. Hundreds of neutral of cargo have been destroyed, and all this without any pretence of judicial inquiry, and often for the most filmsy reasons.

"Peaceful citizens of all countries and of both sexes have been foully murdered at the bidding of German militarism. Others have been Others have been exposed in open boats to the fury of the seas. It is strange that these matters should have been forgotten.

Infield Fly Rule Will Hold.

Shortly after Presidents Ban Johnson of the American League and John K.
