

### REPORT.

The past year has been much like previous ones, as regards work for young men. The Association's influence has been for good among its members, and young men generally. The reports of Committees do not show any falling off in interest among those who have had charge of its affairs.

We have however met with a most serious loss in the removal of our dear brother and ardent fellow worker James B. Morrow, None knew him better than your President and we can only say at present his loss seems irreparable. His love for our Association was intense, and he had a warm affection for every member of it, and if any of them suffered, he suffered. We will miss him for years to come, but we can by following his example as a Christian man, and living his devoted life, join him in a more blessed Association which shall stand forever.

### MISSION AND DEVOTIONS.

Advantage was taken of the arrival in this city of the deputation sent by the International Executive to the Maritime Provinces, and two or three addresses were delivered by them, which were listened to with profit. The Committee feel under obligation to the delegates—brethren Hall and Cree, for their visit.

The Gospel Meeting.—The same plan as adopted last year was pursued this, viz :—of holding Sunday afternoon services in the large Hall during the winter months, and in the Classroom during the summer, both of which were attended with the usual results.

The annual Week of Prayer was observed as heretofore, but a change was made in the mode of conducting the same—the meetings being placed in the hands of the chairman, without the additional aid of ministers to address. It being considered more in harmony with the object sought, thereby calling out more prayer on the part of the members, additional opportunity for doing so being thus afforded. The Thursday evening prayer-meeting has increased in interest and attendance and the Committee cannot but repeat their satisfaction thereat, and urge as last year that our young members persevere in their profitable gathering and entreat others to share in its blessedness.

The Sabbath School.—In compliance with the strongly-expressed wishes of the officers and teachers of the Mission-schools the Committee found themselves called upon to consent to this important feature of our work ceasing its connection with the Association. It was urged that as a separate work and mission it could be far more useful.

The Bible-class has been continued both winter and summer with varying attendance. We regret it is not better appreciated and sustained.

Special means have been taken to give publicity to all our devotional services, both by placing notices on the corner of the streets by posters, handbills and the daily papers.

The thanks of the Committee are tendered to the ministers of the various denominations who have kindly and readily responded t) our calls upon their valuable time for assistance at the Sunday Gospel meetings.

#### FINANCE.

A reference to the Treasurer's account current shews the gross income for the year 1880 to be \$2922.75, of which \$1036 was received from the membership for subscriptions, \$1600 for rent for the Banking Rooms, and the balance, \$286.75 from sundry sources. The expenditure for the year was \$2857.06, or \$65.69 less than the income, which reduced the adverse balance from \$67.27 on 1st Jan., 1880, to only \$1.58 on 31st Dec. The amount received from membership subscriptions was \$65.25 less than 1879, but there is an uncollected list amounting in the aggregate to \$178, of which from \$75 to \$100 should be realised. \$514.50 has been paid in during the year on account of the floating debt, now \$1258.86, and a further sum of \$271 is promised which, when paid, will leave a balance due the bank of \$987.86. It is to be hoped that the present year will see this floating debt paid off so that the interest charges will be lessened.

Your Committee think a larger revenue should come from the membership subscriptions, so that the rents from the Banking rooms might be used as a sinking fund for the nucleus of a reduction of the permanent debt.

On a review of the year your Committee feel encouraged at the reduced debt and that the income has fully met the expenditure, and they look forward hopefully to the future.

### LITERARY AND SOCIAL.

According to instructions, your committee, after being organized, revised and had printed 700 copies of the twenty-sixth annual Report of the Association at a cost of \$22.75.

The last course of Entertainments closed on March 23id, 1880 and your Committee would take this opportunity of expressing their sincere thanks to Rev. C. B. Pitblado, Rev. A. J. Townend, John Y. Payzant, Esq., and Professor McDonald for the very interesting and instructive lectures delivered by them during the winter, and also to all those who took part in the discussions, and in the Literary and Musical Entertainments.

In the early part of the present season your Committee were called together, in order to make arrangements for this winter's course of Lectures, &c., and immediately set to work in preparing a course of Entertainments, and in order to secure the attendance of the members of the Association, they issued a circular to each member, with a programme of the entertainments arranged for, consisting of two Socials and six Lectures.

Your Committee have much pleasure in stating that the Social held, and the Lectures already given, have been very well attended, a great improvement on last year, tho' a large number of the members do not seem to appreciate the advantages thus afforded.

In a pecuniary point of view, your committee regret to say that the they will meet all expenses, yet their expectations will not be realized from the fact that so few season tickets have been disposed of, whereas they fully expected that not less than one hundred tickets would have been sold thereby enabling them to save some \$40 to expend on the Library.

In March last the Committee sent to each member a circular giving reasons why every member of the Association should become a Total Abstainer. They have reason to believe that the few thoughts therein contained have done much good.

During the summer attempts were made to locate and license drinking saloons within a few yards of our building and of the Church of England Institute. This roused up a large amount of opposition and we trust has been beneficial in turning public attention to the degrading effects of the liquor traffic. With our present system of granting licences to sell intoxicants only on the petition of the majority of the ratepayers in the district or neighborhood, it is seen that the people have the liquor traffic in their power, and it only remains for the ratepayers to be influenced and educated aright to have the licensed liquor traffic immensely restricted or entirely driven from Halifax. If the members of this Y. M. C. A. would refuse to sign petitions for License and would use their influence to deter their friends from signing there is no doubt many would be prevented from obtaining licences. The notices exhibited in our reading room and library calling attention to the pledge has been instrumental during the year in procuring the signing by six persons of the pledge kept by our Secretary. We hope the coming year will find still greater attention drawn to this, for so many young men, important subject.

TRACT DISTRIBUTION.

In presenting the report of this committee for the year 1880 we have nothing of special interest to communicate. The work of Tract distribution has been prosecuted by the distributers with their usual zeal and fidelity, and they now "rest from their labors" for a season in the prayerful hope that the seed thus sown among the "hardy toilers on the sea," will with the blessing of God, bring forth much fruit to the praise and glory of His name.

Vessels at the wharves, from North Street to the end of Water street have been regularly visited and supplied with Tracts and other Scriptural papers every Sunday morning, whilst our boat has

visited 211 vessels lying in the stream and thus supplied two thou-SAND NINE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY men with suitable reading matter. Mr. Potter has also occasionally held an afternoon service on board, and thus opportunity has been afforded for personal conversation with the men, which we trust may lead to saving results. In these ways there have been distributed over TWENTY THOUSAND tracts and papers in the English language, and TWO THOUSAND in Foreign tongues for which we tender our thanks to the B. A. B. & Tract Society.

A Cottage meeting is held every Friday evening at No. 15 Dresdon Row which is well attended and supported by several of onr active members and we hope to open one at the North end



## CONSTITUTION

Revised and Amended at a Special Meeting called for the purpose March 11th, 1875.

#### ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called "THE HALIFAX YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN Association-"

### ARTICLE II.

The object of this Association shall be, the improvement of the spiritual, moral, mental and social condition of the young men of the City of Halifax by the support and maintenance of religious social meetings, sermons, lectures, library, reading-rooms, and such other means as may conduce to the accom-

#### ARTICLE III.

Any person of good moral character may become a member of the Association by the payment of such fee as may be fixed by the Bye-laws to entitle him to all the privileges of membership. He shall be proposed by a member of the Association, and shall be elected by ballot by the General Committee. But no person shall be eligible to serve on a Committee, or be an officer of the Association, who is not a member of good standing in one of the evangelical

#### ARTICLE IV.

Any member, on payment of Forty Dollars at one time, may become a Life Member.

#### ARTICLE V.

The officers of the Association shall consist of a President, not more than six Vice-Presidents, Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer (who shall be ex-officio members of the General Committee), and a General Committee of not more than thirty-two members, comprising, as far as possible, members of each evangelical denomination, all of whom shall be elected annually by ballot, but such ballot may be dispensed with by a unanimous vote of the mem-bers present. The General Committee shall have the power to fill vacancies occurring in their body after the Annual Meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI.

All meetings of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The Committee shall have power to suspend or expel any member whose conduct may be found inconsistent with the character of the Association.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

The Real Estate owned by the Association shall be held in the corporate name of the Association, and shall be managed by a Board of Trustees to consist of the President of the Association for the time being, and eight Trustees to be elected by the Association. Two members of the Board of Trustees shall retire annually, who shall be eligable for re-election. The two members of the Board of Trustees first named in the Act of incorporation shall retire at the end of the first year, the second two the end of the second year, the third two at the end of the third year, and the remaining two at the end of the fourth year.

### ARTICLE IX.

No Article of this Constitution shall be altered or amended unless six months' notice of the proposed alteration is given in writing, and then only if recommended by a majority of the General Committee, and adopted by a twothird vote of the members present at a meeting, of which regular notice has been given at least two weeks previously.

They shall be empowered to strike from the roll of membership any person who fails to pay his duce for two years consecutively, unless, in their opinion, there are special circumstances in the case. They shall also, by such means as they think best, endeavour to interest the membership in the work of the Association.

5. The Employment Committee shall consist of five members, and it shall be their duty to aid young men in getting employment.

6. The Temperance Committee shall consist of seven members, whose dpty it shall be to promote the principle of total abstinence from intoxicating liquors.

7. The Committee on Tract Distribution shall consist of five members, and it shall be their duty to distribute tracts and religious periodicals as opportunity may offer.

8. The Visiting Sick Committee shall consist of five members. They shall carefully visit any of the members who may be laid aside by sickness, affording them such sympathy and assistance as may be in their power, and when considered necessary, report such cases to the General Committee.

9. The Rooms and Library Committee shall consist of seven members. They shall have clarge of the rooms of the Association, and make provision for furnishing, lighting, warming, and keeping the same in order. They shall use all suitable means for the increase and preservation of the Library-provide papers and periodicals for the Reading Room, and shall approve all publication. prior to their admission into the Library and Reading Room.

10. Any member of any Standing Committee absenting himself from four consecutive meetings, without sufficient reason, shall cease to be a member of such Committee, and his place shall be filled by the General Committee.

# ARTICLE IV .--- VISITING ROOMS COMMITTEE.

There shall be a Committee of Visitation of the Rooms, to consist of r embers of General Committee, in rotation, as may be arranged, whose duty it shall be to visit the Rooms as often as possible--to be present at the Prayer Meeting on Thursday evening; also the Saturday evening Bible Blass. They shall acquaint themselves with the religious condition of the Association, and the working of each of the Committees, and shall report to General Committee at their Quarterly Meeting.

## ARTICLE V.-MEETINGS.

1. The Annual Meeting of the Association, for the election of officers and the transaction of other business, shall be held in the month of January in each year.

2. Quarterly Meetings of the Association shall be held in the months of April, July, and October, at which meetings reports from the several Standing Committees shall be presented, and general business transacted.

 Meetings may be called at any time by the Committee, or by the President on the requisition of five members.

4. The General Committee shall hold regular Quarterly Meetings, and may be called together at any time by the President or any three members.

# ARTICLE VI.-ALTERATIONS.

No Bye-Law shall be altered, except by a two-third vote of those present at a business meeting-notice of the intended alteration having been given at a previous meeting; but any Bye-Law may be suspended for the time being by a unanimous vote.


