Dumping of Sawdust and Refuse into Provincial Waters Must Be Stopped.

There has been a good deal of complaint late regarding the dumping of sawdust and other mill refuse in provincial waters.

The effect of this dumping is to contaminate a good many of the streams and lakes to injure the fish in these waters. Fishery mmissioner D. C. Smith, has consequent ty deemed it desirable to issue a circulair o friendly warning" to provincial millmen Mr. Smith, in the circulair, points out that the waters are in many cases the homes of valuable non-migratory fishes, or are the breeding grounds of still more valuable fishe migratory in their nature. Continued pollution of the waters, the circular contines, must result in great injury to the inland and coast fisheries. Under the Fisheries Act dumping sawdust and refuse into fish tine not exceeding \$100. If the warning given in the circular is not heeded, Mr. Smith says legal proceedings will be taked against offending millmen.


