The accident which was the worst in the county for many years has cast a gloom over the community. The man was terribly bruised, the forehead being badly fractured. An Indian named Noel Barnaby also received injuries in the accident, but his condition is not serious. Mr. Delano was a valued employee of the Edward Sinclair Lumber Company and was well and favorably known.

The unfortunate man had been working as usual on Wednesday morning at the slasher. The machinery in some way became entangled and in his endeavors to straighten out matters, he used the peavey. Hardly had the hook entered the slasher when it flew back with great force. It struck Delano across the forehead, knocking him to the ground unconscious. The peavey also struck the Indian a heavy blow, but his injuries were not serious. Delano was picked up and carried to his home nearby. Medical aid was summoned from Newcastle and Drs. 


