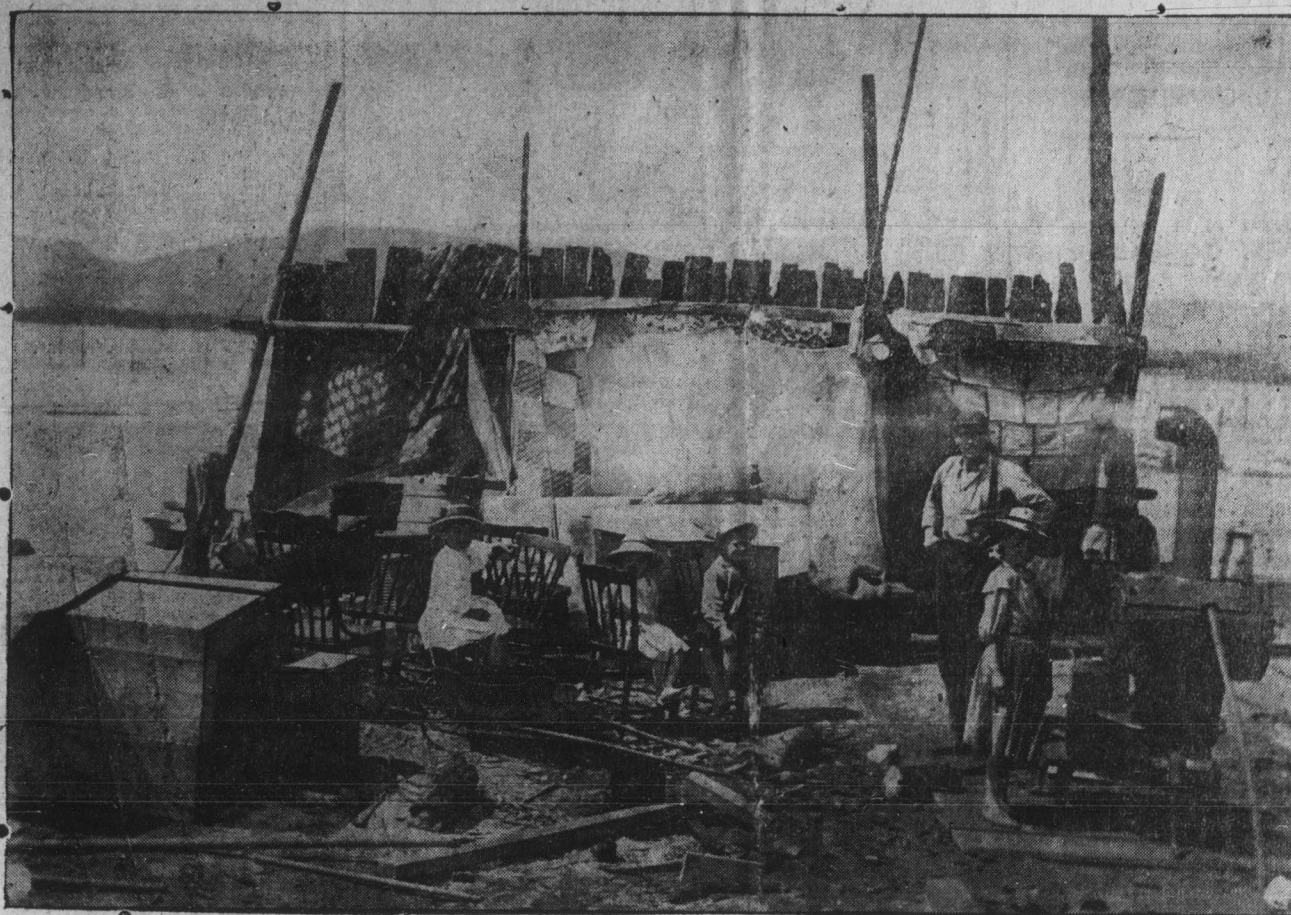
In the absence of the D. Scribe H. H. Stuart, the report on the standing of the divisions within the district was given by the committee appointed on the good of the order. The report was quite encouraging.

The Treasurer's report which was given by the D. W. P. in the absence of the treasurer, showed a snug balance on hand.

After the various reports had been given problems of various kinds arising out of the working of the order were taken upon and discussed. Reports of the work being done were then given from a number of the delegates from the several divisions represented.

A motion was then carried to the effect that this District Division urge upon the grand Division the necessity of putting an organizer in the field at the earliest possible date and in order to help secure such an organizer that the grand Division be asked to advertise at once through the press calling for a suitable man. It was then moved by the D. W. P. and seconded by R. H. Assisting a distressed brother and his family is one of the cardinal features of this fraternity and Moncton Council has fully exemplified it in deeds of kindness.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

During the heavy lightning and thunder storm yesterday morning the residence of Mr. John McKenzie, Douglastown was struck by lightning. The shingles were torn from the roof of the building. The lightning passed to the wood shed and passed down the pump. Mrs. McKenzie who was standing near the pump filling a bottle of water was reported to have been injured. Dr. Desmond was summoned and found that the lady was suffering from nervous shock. She is very much improved today. Mrs. Richard Anderson, an elderly lady residing just across the street also received a shock but not serious. The building was damaged to the extent of about \$35 and was insured in the Anglo-American company, represented by Mr. M. R. Benn. Mr. Benn looked after the claim very promptly.

THE CANADIAN MAGAZINE for August is an unusually strong number. Perhaps the feature of most importance is a fine article by Professor W. L. Grant entitled "Goldwin Smith at Oxford." Professor Grant has been for some time lecturer on Colonial History at Oxford, and the researches for this article were made on the spot. There is also a splendid appreciation by Dr. A. H. U. Colquhoun, Deputy Minister of Education for Ontario, of the work and place of Goldwin Smith in Canada. These two articles are well illustrated. Professor Archibald MacMechan contributes an entertaining account of some early associations in Halifax. Mr. Arthur O. Wheeler, President of the Canadian Alpine Club, has a beautiful illustrated article on "Canada's Wonderland." The second act of Arthur Stringer's play "The Blot" is in this number, as well as some fine short stories.

Sackville, July 25—The General Committee of the New Brunswick Methodist Conference, at its meeting at St. John last week, decided to appeal to the churches throughout New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to raise \$5,000 to supply the needs of the church at Campbellton. A special meeting of the Quarterly Board of the Sackville Methodist church has been called for Thursday in order to determine what steps said church shall take in regard of this matter.

AWFUL DEATH OF HOWARD DELANO

Struck with terrible force on the brain, by a peavey, which rebounded from the machinery, Howard Delano sustained such injuries in Sinclair's mill on Wednesday morning, that death resulted a few hours later. The accident which was the worst in the county for many years has cast a gloom over the community. The man was terribly bruised, the forehead being badly fractured. An Indian named Noel Barnaby also received injuries in the accident, but his condition is not serious. Mr. Delano was a valued employee of the Edward Sinclair Lumber Company and was well and favorably known.

The unfortunate man had been working as usual on Wednesday morning at the slasher. The machinery in some way became entangled and in his endeavors to straighten out matters, he used the peavey. Hardly had the hook entered the slasher when it flew back with great force. It struck Delano across the forehead, knocking him to the ground unconscious. The peavey also struck the Indian a heavy blow, but his injuries were not serious. Delano was picked up and carried to his home nearby. Medical aid was summoned from Newcastle and Drs. Pedolin and Desmond responded with great haste. They found the injured man in a very low condition but worked vigorously to revive him. The accident took place about 7.45 o'clock and when the physicians left on their return home, they entertained but little hope that he would survive. Dr. Pedolin went to the Bridge a second time and found Delano in a much worse condition. The injured man lingered until 1 o'clock when he breathed his last.

Delano's injuries were a fracture of the frontal bone with depression. The deceased was married and kept the cookhouse at Sinclair's mill. The accident marks the first fatality at Sinclair's mill and the sad affair is greatly to be regretted.

The sincere sympathy of the community will be extended to the bereaved family in the tragic death of Mr. Delano. The deceased is survived by his wife (formerly of Fredericton) two daughters, Nettie and Dorothy and one son Earl, and his parents and seven brothers.

A funeral took place on Friday the interment being made at the Derby cemetery. Over a hundred followed the remains to the grave. The pallbearers were George Russell, Ernest Russell, John Curtis, John Creamer, Geo. Henderson, and Dennis McLean.

CAMPBELLTON'S FUTURE.

The future of Campbellton is the subject of much discussion by the inhabitants of the stricken town who remain, and it is a very important question to all.

Campbellton is the natural centre of trade for a very large territory, and in our opinion it must grow and become an important city.

The fire of July 11th but delays the onward trend of business, and as the destruction was complete, it makes possible the laying out of the town in a systematic manner. In five years Campbellton will be a city far exceeding that of the past.

At present the pressing need of the inhabitants is homes to live in. While tents and shacks are comfortable enough in fine weather, in rainy weather life therein is very uncomfortable, and the women and children are great sufferers.

The relief committees in charge of affairs are working night and day and it is remarkable how systematically they have been able to attend to the needs of the people. At the present time the best of order prevails, and for the most part the inhabitants are cheerful and uncomplaining.

What is needed now is money to assist those who cannot otherwise erect homes to do so. Up to the present time about \$45,000 has been received but more than double that amount is required. Graphic readers in all parts of the world are asked to contribute to this fund, and if sent to

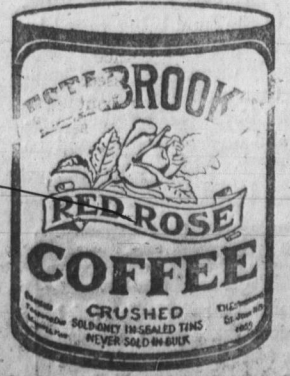
The cry that comes from stricken Campbellton is one that must go to the hearts of the people of New Brunswick. Conditions would be better there today if Premier Hazen, instead of merely visiting the place and coming away again, had sent a special commissioner promptly to the scene to remain and aid, the sorely pressed relief committee. The food supply is running short, the people suffering in rain-soaked tents, the future full of uncertainty. This would appear to be a time for a government with a grasp of affairs to prove its usefulness. The dread of winter is upon these people, and adds to the misery of their present state of utter want. They alone cannot grapple with the situation. They are still dazed by the blow inflicted upon them. The provincial government should not sit in slothful ease while these unhappy victims of a great misfortune cry for food and shelter, and for some assurance that the town of their hopes is to be rebuilt. Daily the press sets out the conditions. What does the government propose to do about it?

WORK OF THE SALVATION ARMY

In all towns and cities, there are numbers of children who are growing up to manhood and womanhood, and their training is one of vast importance. A growing child is very easily impressed either for good or bad, and alas there are so many things to influence a child for bad, either through the eye or ear. Many children sin, through ignorance, they do not realize the wickedness of bad language and other sins, when they see older people who should be an example indulging in sin. The churches of today are awakening to the fact, that a great work can be done among the children, and are making efforts to help them. Among the great work being done, the Salvation Army has for some time been doing a great work. In some of the large cities, great numbers of children, who have been in the habit of wandering on the streets

and mixing in with questionable company, are gathered in, and taught, not only to be Christians, which is ever the aim of the Army, but are taught many useful things. Classes are held for sewing, fancy-work, cooking, singing, music, carpenter work, etc. The results have been very gratifying, the children have been interested and learned many useful things. This work has not been merely confined to salvationist children alone, but children of all denominations attend these meetings held by the Army. Men and women of high social standing have shown their appreciation by supporting the work and sending their children. Many zealous church workers and ministers can look back with pleasure on the happy hours they spent in the Army Junior meetings. It will be a pleasure to parents in Newcastle to know that the Army officers who have lately come here, intend to make special efforts in this direction. Sunday School will be started in the S. A. Hall on Pleasant street on August 7th at 4 p.m. Very special meetings of great interest will be held every Wednesday night at 7 p.m. The first one will be held Wednesday August 7th. 10-YEAR-OLD BOY MADE A THRILLING RESCUE IN WATER

Fredericton, July 23.—Maurice Boyd, a lad of ten years, was the hero in a thrilling rescue from drowning at Nashwaaksis on Thursday.

A young son of Mr. Peter McFarlane, aged about 7 years, was in wading in the Nashwaaksis stream when he suddenly got into deep water and was drowning when his cries attracted young Boyd, who with some other lads was swimming nearby.

Without a moment's hesitation young Boyd hurried to the little fellow's aid, but in his efforts to effect a rescue was clutched about the neck by the almost-drowning boy. After a struggle he freed himself and got back to the shore. There other boys were congregated, but it was young Boyd who rushed to the rescue again as soon as he got his breath and strength back again. Finally the McFarlane boy was rescued.

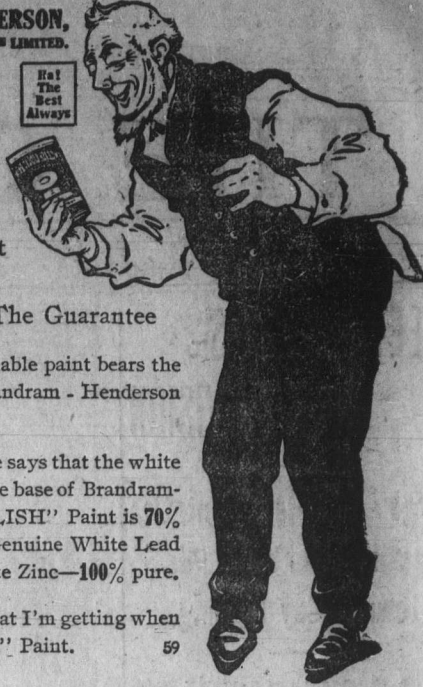

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section, alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

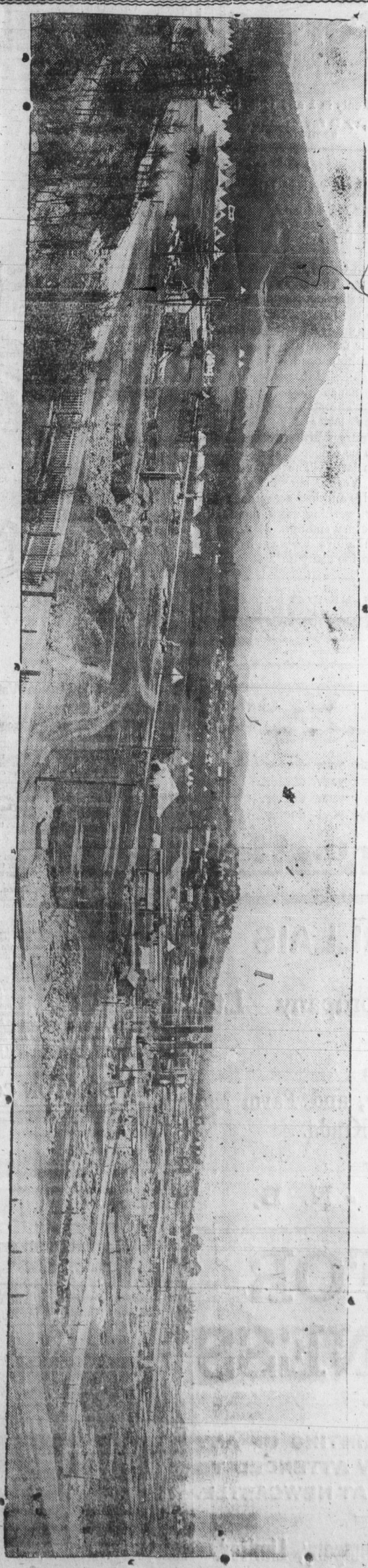

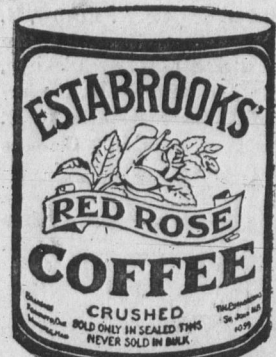

CONDITIONS ARE PITIABLE

Rain-Drenched Campbellton People Must Sleep With Ground Water Soaked—Two Reported to Have Become Mentally Unbalanced.

Campbellton, N. B., July 22.—Thunder storms and heavy rain falls during the last two days have made the condition of the homeless population of Campbellton more miserable than ever. Only today, in fact, are they beginning to realize their helplessness. The thunderstorms which swept over the ruins today forced the majority of the homeless people to sleep in their wet clothing, with the ground water soaked. There were no mattresses or bedding of any kind to relieve the hardships of the majority of women and children.

In the absence of regular sewerage or water supply, the physicians of the town are preparing for a serious outbreak of sickness, and a temporary hospital is being rapidly completed. The members of the relief committee are doing their best to distribute provisions justly, but it is a difficult task under the circumstances, and the cash subscriptions are coming too slowly to supply the immediate needs.

Subscriptions should be addressed to Judge McLatchy, chairman of the finance committee, Campbellton. The cash received is deposited in banks in Campbellton and the funds are not paid out except upon checks drawn out and signed by the three members of the finance committee. So far only \$33,000 has been received in cash. How far this will go toward relieving the situation is shown by the explanation of the

finance committee. It is absolutely necessary to rebuild the homes before winter sets in, to avoid abject misery. To do this it is important to keep the present working population on hand, and first of all the homes of the working men must be rebuilt. This means the expenditure of a large amount of money, but the future of the town depends upon it.

Two people are reported to have become mentally unbalanced, one over the automobile accident in which Chas. W. Anslow was killed on Tuesday. There have been several cases of diphtheria, but the other patients on hand have minor complaints.

In regard to the indebtedness of the town, an effort will be made to place the facts before the Provincial and Federal governments. The municipal authorities have no revenue nor is there any prospect of collecting any even the last assessment has not been collected, and there is no likelihood of any of it being collected from the ruined population. It is not so much this part of the situation however, that the public in general are asked to relieve. It is for the immediate aid of the homeless that the general call for aid is being made. The relief committee is in the meantime trying to distribute provisions justly, and is awaiting an answer to the appeal for funds.

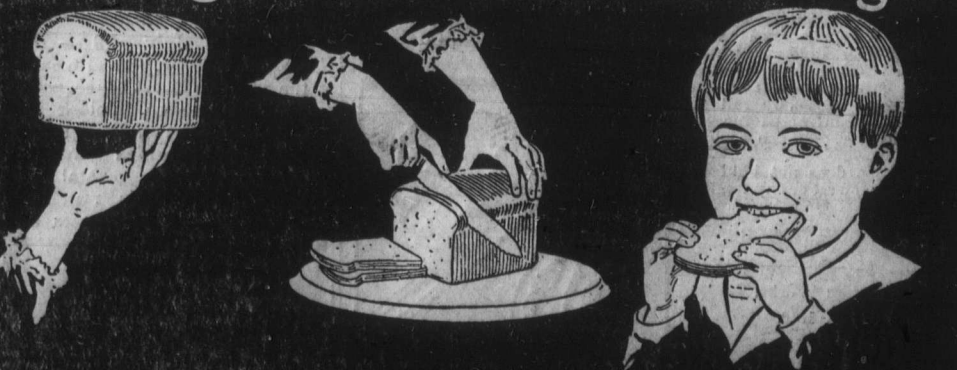
