

So severe has been the national loss from careless humans that Quebec has closed her forest areas to all travellers. humans that Quebec has closed her forest areas to all travellers throughout the entire outling sea-son unless they first obtain a per-mit from a public official such as a fire ranger. This provision places no hardship on the careful traveller but at the same time keeps a record that will be valu-able in case prosecution for careessness with fire becomes neces

One of the finest camping and fishing districts in the Dominion last year presented a fearful showing of 500,000 acres, of forest destroyed as the consequence of 113 fires let loose by campers, fishermen and others on holiday trips.



So potent are these apparently trilling sources of conflagration that many experienced fire rangers and forest engineers and woodsmen never smoke while on the trail and reserve their "pipe" for after luncheon or supper.

Three thousand seven hundred licensed grain elevators in Manitoba censed grain elevators in managers. Saskatchewan, and Alberta have a total storage capacity of over 100,000,000 bushels. Ontario, Quebec and Maritime provinces have storage elevators with capacity up to 33,180,000 bushels.




