FIRE AT MEMRAMOOC.—The stables of the Dominion Hotel at Memramoc were totally destroyed by fire Tuesday evening and about 2 o'clock Wednesday morning the hotel itself caught fire and was burned to the ground. The hotel which was a first class one was partially insured as were also the stables. The latter contained some valuable trotting stock including Nonpareil and another horse owned by Mr. Herbert Bonnie Charlie, owned by Conductor Casey of Moncton and the water works belonging to Conductor Thomas Coffey of Moncton. These animals were burned.

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FATAL ACCIDENT.—A terrible accident which has since proved fatal, took place at Moncton, Monday evening. The Brunswick Hotel coach team ran away, and at the corner of the road leading from the station collided with the Dominion express wagon, driven by a lad named Harvey Shepherd, aged about eighteen, and belonging to Chas. J. Johnston. The pole of the coach struck Shepherd, tearing off the knee cap and running up the leg, caught him at the lower part of the abdomen, fracturing the inside of the lining. The shaft of the express wagon entered the neck of one of the coach horses, going clear through and breaking off, but not touching a vital spot. The other coach horse and the express horse were badly hurt. The young man died of his injuries about 16.15 Tuesday afternoon. He suffered very little pain and was conscious of all that was going on around him up to the hour of his death, but gradually grew weaker after the first revival after receiving the first deadly blow in the stomach. He is a son of Mr. Benjamin Shepherd of Newmarket, and has been living in Moncton for the last five years. He has been in the employ of the C. P. R. express company for a year or more and on Monday night, among other express parcels, had money amounting to \$1,000 in his care. The young man's faithfulness to the trust reposed in him cannot be better pictured than by quoting the incident at the scene of the accident after he had received his death blow. Reviving from the shock sufficiently to speak he said to his companion, George Gould, "George, look after the money." ENGINE REPAIRS.—Stephen Legere of Smith's Cove, Digby county, inserted a graft of a Bartlett pear tree into a dogwood which was growing in his orchard. Yesterday Mr. W. H. Redding showed us a couple of pears picked from this tree, upon which a number of pears still remain, and which is also loaded with dogwood berries. WHEELEMEN AT BAIE VERTE.—On Tuesday evening September 12, a party of nine bicyclists from Halifax, Windsor and St. John entered Baie Verte making the air melodious with college and other songs and jovial laughter and talk. They had reached the quiet village from Moncton by way of Shediac and pronounced this section of the road the best they had passed over in their extended tour from Halifax through the provinces. At Baie Verte a Wierd Gallagher, a local man, had a accident happen to his wheel and was obliged to return by train as far as Pictou where he rejoined his party, who had gone on by way of Peggush, River John, etc.

NEW FACTORY AT BAIE VERTE.—At the first turn of the road going down town from the station at Baie Verte stands the new shoe and box factory of R. D. Wood, formerly of Tidnish, where new machinery is being rapidly set up. Mr. Wood manufactures large shoes, barrel heads and boxes, turning out last season about 4000 pairs of shoes for the Charlestown market, and 30000 of lobster boxes. The factory is two stories, and it is expected that a great mill will be set up in the upper part. A difficulty was experienced in obtaining water for the factory, but has been overcome by an artesian well 112 feet in depth and situated at a distance of 100 feet from the mill. Mr. Wood had imple some of the best machinery in his dwelling and premises, and now has a comfortable and neat residence as well as desired. A pond hole has been made into which water by the addition of about 400 loads of earth, and some 900 feet of new ornamental fencing has been placed, the place a pleasant modern appearance.

THE NEW I. C. R. BRIDGE.—Monday morning a large force of men began the placing of the bridge on the I. C. R. over Palmer's pond. This immense bridge is made of steel and is 85 feet long, made by Fleming & Sons, St. John. Crowds of people were there all day. The bridge was first taken off the road and placed on large rollers, built up at each end and securely fastened with heavy chains. The rails were taken up and the timbers of the old culvert taken out, and a new culvert of wooden nature was cleared from the bed of the bridge to begin to lower. At 5.20 p. m. the bridge was in its proper place resting on the heavy stone piers. The foremen, Messrs Stevens and Sifton deserve great credit for the manner in which the work was carried on. This bridge will be a great improvement on the former, and will fill a long-felt want.

That Marsh Valuation Again.—To THE EDITOR OF THE POST:—Sir, Like many other readers of the Post we have taken a deep interest in the reports and comments which have appeared in your issue of last week regarding the assessment on the Amherst Body of Marsh. And after you so kindly offered them space in the Post we did hope those gentlemen would embrace a good opportunity to explain to the public the principles on which they fixed that valuation on the different sections of the Body. We were much disappointed, however, in reading their answer in last week's issue when we found they had evaded all discussion of the merits of the case in question, and in casting reflections on the character of every one who has expressed a difference of opinion from them. When Messrs. Fawcett and Anderson state that the Albert Fawcett's courteous and apparently straightforward Minority Report contains "misleading and ungenerous statements" and that they "digging tide rivers and canals to renew and reclaim the several Bodies of Marsh in these two counties is attracting much attention" especially among the Westmorland marsh owners. And the principles of laying out the differently estimated sections and lots a just, and equitable valuation for the marshes, and in prospect, to cover the expenses of the work, are of very great importance.
